#### Taxpayer-funded mosquito abatement program focuses on county citizens' health and comfort

Green noted mosquito abatement is Integrated on Management (IPM) practices, which include identification of the pest, understanding its biology, monitoring the pest, developing sound goals to manage the pest, and implementation of an IPM program.

TCMA officials strive to maintain public use areas such as parks, campgrounds, trails and golf courses in an effort to keep residents safe from disease-carrying mosquitoes.

"We begin in the early spring with

Green explained. "This is done with technicians using a hand spreader to deliver granular BTI or a backpack sprayer to deliver BVA oil to flooded areas.

"We utilize a citizen tracking database which allows us to keep a historical record of homeowners and locations throughout the county with woodlots that may need treatment in the she spring," said. "Biology staff and larviciding crews conducted

> each of them for roadside treatment. "Treatment is conducted on a routine basis in all public use areas," Green said. "Tuscola County has many 'no spray' areas - organic farms, beekeepers. Assigning technicians to specific townships allow them to become familiar with these special conditions.'

> Crews conducted roadside truck fogging throughout the county in 2014, including 1,364 miles in Elkland Township, 1,036 miles in Ellington Township, 667 miles in Elmwood Township, 1,597 miles in Novesta Township and 1,229 miles in Wells Township.

Roadside ditch treatments, meanships: Elkland (433 miles), Ellington mologists, conservationists and sci-(440), Elmwood (348), Kingston entists review the agency's efforts (288), Koylton (589), Novesta (468) every March.

TCMA crews also treat, where necessary, the county's nine sewage lagoon sites, cross country ditches and flooded fields.

In all, TCMA's 20-truck fleet covered nearly 183,000 miles last year.

The department's proactive approach to mosquito abatement has led to partnerships such as a collaboration with the Tuscola County Recycling Center and various townships. "We hosted 15 tire collection sites throughout the county (in 2014). We were also pleased to assist the Cass River Greenway organization in their annual Cass River clean-up. Volunteers used canoes to remove trash and tires from the river and its banks. Many tires were collected and sent to be recycled with the trailer provided by TCMA," Green said.

"We will continue the satellite tire collection sites in 2015, with plans for 15 sites to be scheduled throughout the county.'

Green noted TCMA also strives to promote public education in its effort to reduce mosquito populations by explaining ways to eliminate breeding sites, for example.

"This task is completed in many different ways. Some of the most important ways TCMA distributes this information are through citizen phone calls to our office, and faceto-face contact with our technicians, as well as our Facebook page," she

The TCMA district was originally formed in 1997 after county residents passed a millage to fund the program. In August 2014, voters renewed the levy. Funding for the 2014 mosquito control season — .65 of a mill — was collected during the winter of 2013 taxes.

# Tax season bringing out IRS scam artists

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson is urging Thumb residents to be on the lookout for scam artists attempting to use tax season to their advantage. "Our office has recently been alerted to a scam involving individuals calling and representing themselves as IRS agents. The scam's been attempted on at least four Huron County citizens over the last two days," Hanson said

'They're all similar to what a Fairhaven Township woman reported, which involved improper tax returns. It appears they're being told that they need to send in over \$3,000 for penalties or a warrant would be sent to our office for their arrest," Hanson explained.

"I personally called a contact number supplied to a victim by a suspicious agent and spoke to an individual with a foreign accent claiming to be an agent. After extending an invitation to that person to come to our office so we could meet and work more closely with him or any other member of his agency, he used obscenities and hung up," he added. "I attempted a follow up call with no answer. Clearly an attempted scam."

Hanson pointed out that the IRS doesn't handle its affairs via telephone, nor does the agency send warrants to local police departments requesting arrests. 'Residents should never send money to someone that they don't know or

# Tornado!

### Monthly siren testing set to begin April 16 in Tuscola Co.

When it comes to spring weather in Michigan, the only certainty is

Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management Coordinator Steven Anderson is all too familiar with that reality, which is why he is reminding residents that it's time once again to prepare for the worst Mother Nature can dish out in the coming weeks.

The threat of damaging thunderstorms and tornadoes each summer is behind Michigan Severe Weather Awareness Week, established by the Michigan Committee for Severe Weather Awareness and former Michigan Gov. Jennifer Granholm.

In conjunction with the observation, slated for April 12-18 this year, fire departments throughout Tuscola County will be preparing by testing their tornado sirens on a monthly basis, starting Thursday, April 16, at 2 p.m. Tornado siren tests will continue on the first Wednesday of each month at 10 a.m. through October.

A tornado warning is announced with a two-minute blast. The all-clear signal is three short blasts.

A severe thunderstorm or tornado "watch" is issued whenever conditions exist for severe weather

to develop. A warning, indicating that residents should seek shelter immediately, is issued when severe weather or a tornado is spotted on radar or when a funnel cloud has been sighted.

Each year, more than 1,000 tornados strike the United States. Since 1950, more than 239 people have been killed due to tornados.

Last year, Michigan had a near average number of tornadoes; however, it was the lightning, thunderstorm wind, hail and flooding that was responsible for one death, 19 injuries

and the most damaging

severe weather season in Michigan's history.

While tornadoes are nature's most violent weather, all forms of severe weather can have a huge impact on the state. Michigan's citizens are urged to be vigilant whenever severe weather is in the forecast – not only tornadoes, but also wind, hail, flooding and lightning.

Michigan experienced the most damaging severe weather event in its history last August, when four to six inches of rain fell over the most populated areas of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties in just a three- to four-hour period. The resulting flooding affected more than 115,000 homes and thousands of vehicles, and caused an estimated \$1.8 billion in damages, according to the National Weather Service (NWS),

NWS officials reported the one severe weather-related death in 2014 involved a lightning strike June 18 in Washtenaw County.



# Be a good neighbor, offer to lend a hand

Most folks think of law enforcement when they consider the role of the Michigan State Police, but Community Service Trooper Mark Swales is on a mission to demonstrate the state police are concerned about much more than taking a bite out of crime.

Being a good neighbor, for example.

Swales, who works out of the state police post in Caro and serves residents throughout the Thumb, says a simple act of kindness can go a long way, and with nearly 30 percent of the elderly living at home alone, a friendly neighbor can make a huge difference by simply assisting an older person in need.

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration on Aging, nearly half of older women, ages 75 and older, live alone. The proportion of living alone increases with advanced age and can often lead to the elderly not being able to do the simple tasks they once could do on their own.

Consider these facts: The generation born following the end of World War II – the baby boomers (born roughly between 1946 and 1964) – now range in age from roughly 51 to 69. This is the largest generation of U.S. residents ever born, and as this group has grown from childhood to adulthood, its size has affected all aspects of American life, from housing to education to health care, and now it's impacting retirement and other aging issues.

At the same time that baby boomers are entering senior status, health care advances have reduced mortality rate for several diseases that once took the lives of people at an earlier age. The U.S. life expectancy these days is nearly 77 years.

Which makes the need for helpful neighbors even greater, and it doesn't take that much effort to lend a

"If you're an able bodied person, there is likely a task you can do to help out," Swales says. "Even if you're not physically able to assist, listening and providing companionship can help, too. Often times there are simple things one can do, like helping with snow clean-up, being a good listener, or offering to pick up something at the store, that can make a real difference in the life of a senior."

Don't know where to start?

Swales suggests that neighbors simply be friendly and introduce themselves. You could provide company and offer to cook a meal, offer to help around the house and/or yard or with other jobs an elderly neighbor can no longer tackle.

You could run errands if you're going shopping or into town, help a senior create an emergency contact list that includes your contact information, and place it in an easy access location in the home. Swales also suggests that residents be aware of and read the signs of stress, and follow up if they have any concerns about a neighbor's well-being or suspect suspicious

It all comes down to compassion and a willingness to help make life better for someone else, something that already seems to come naturally for many Thumb area residents.

You may never know just how much your offer to help out will mean to someone else, but that's okay.

An act of kindness is never a waste of time.

# Deputies seize pot and cash after arresting Huron man

A search warrant recently enabled Huron County Sheriff's deputies to arrest a Sebewaing man on drug charges and seize more than \$1,000 worth of marijuana along with \$1,300 in cash.

"Our office, with the assistance of the Huron County Prosecutor's Office and the Sebewaing Police Department, was able to serve a drug search warrant (at a residence) on Elm Street in the village of Sebewaing," Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson reported. "Just prior to execution of that warrant, a 30-year-old male resident was taken into custody as he was leaving his residence."

In addition to the marijuana and cash, the search netted prescription pills, a scale and packaging materials, Facebook page.

according to Hanson. "The suspect's vehicle was also seized," he noted.

The suspect was booked into the Huron County Jail for felony delivery of marijuana and has since posted bond.

"He is expected to be formally arraigned...while other charges are under review. Child protective services has also been contacted due to minor children living at that residence," Hanson said.

school year before its current contract was ratified. Negotiations had started months before – in early spring – and bargainers had agreed on much of what the pact would include, with the key exception being salaries for the district's 56 teachers. Both sides came to an agreement in late October 2013, adopting the cur-

rent two-year labor agreement that lifted a five-year freeze on step pay incremental salary increases based on years of service. At the time, Hartel noted the board agreed to adding 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  percent to each step and moving all instructors up a step. The union, meanwhile, agreed to concessions that included increasing class

guaranteed when a teacher has a class that exceeds a set number of students. Hartel estimated the new contract would cost the district an additional Montei, Joe Kampo, Jack Stern and \$100,000 in 2013 and another \$70,000 in 2014. In addition to the union contract, the board approved a salary increase of 1 ½ percent for each of the district's four administrators, which translated into

a combined \$5,000. The Cass City Public Schools' financial picture has improved since the last teachers' contract was ratified. At the time, school officials were projecting a year-end fund balance of close to \$800,000, an amount equal to 8.7 of the

schools' 2013-14 general fund budget. According to revised 2014-15 spending plan figures discussed by the board last month, officials are anticipating a fund balance totaling nearly \$1.2 million by mid-summer, or an amount equal to 13.47 percent of the budget.

At the same time, the board has spent considerable time in recent months sorting through a list of expensive repairs and upgrades, including replacing the bus garage roof (an estimated \$10,500 to \$12,000), parking lot repairs around all buildings (\$22,500), repairing/replacing old water pipes above ceiling tiles at the junior-senior high school (\$12,000 per classroom), an English textbook series purchase (\$50,000), and technology upgrades (\$219,000 over three years).

### Reporter's notebook



**Spelling snob?** No, not really

Not surprisingly, I've been called a few names during the course of my nearly 30-year career as a newspaper reporter and editor. Most I'm not allowed to repeat in this or any other family newspaper.

But I also take a lot of good-natured ribbing from family and friends, especially on Facebook, where I've been referred to as a grammar Nazi and spelling snob a few times because of my tendency to point out major faux pas in the use of the English language.

Most folks don't like to be corrected. I know, because I'm one of them. However, I don't do it to be mean.

The fact is, I'm sort of pleased with my command of spelling and grammar. It's a talent and skill I've worked to improve for years. I think it's important to be able to communicate well. And, it's something I'm actually reasonably good at, unlike, say, fixing cars or building stuff. I stink at those things.

I suppose spelling and grammar are intimidating to some people, sort of like how I feel when I have to talk to a mechanic who may or may not be going out of his or her way to demonstrate their ability to diagnose and repair any number of hundreds of issues under the hood of my car by using all of the technical lingo they can muster, suddenly causing the pride in having changed my own oil to quickly fade into a cloud of

"Yeah, Mr. Montgomery, I'll need to hook into the ECM before I can give you a full diagnosis, but there could be something wrong with the EGO sensor. We should probably also bleed the brakes and R and R the dust boots."

Of course, at this point, I have two choices: nod in agreement while thinking, "Well, don't I feel stupid now", or just stand there with a blank look on my face and whisper, "Huh?"

I resist the urge to blurt out, "For your information, pal, there's nothing wrong with my EGO. Just ask anyone."

My point is, he or she is probably proud of their abilities and skills, too. Maybe, just maybe, they're not going out of their way to make me feel inferior by using the jargon that has been an integral part of their training. Perhaps I feel that way because I secretly want to know what they know, but I'm just not interested in putting the effort into learning the skills it takes to fix my own jalopy.

On the other hand, you're never going to convince me – as a number of people have tried – that language skills aren't all that important. "Well, yeah, except for when you need to communicate something," is my response.

If you think I'm just blowing smoke, go ahead and try to use the letters "r" and "u" for "are" and "you" on a job application and see how quickly you're escorted to the door and on your way to the next interview.

Now, having said that, the newspaper business has a way of reminding you that absolutely no one is anywhere near perfection in anything.

I've been around long enough to know that bragging about what you know (or think you know) will always – eventually – come back to bite you on the backside. Translation: the Bible was spot on in the passage, "Pride goeth before a fall."

Hey, it's great to be able to stick my tongue out at spell check most of the time, but that doesn't mean all that much if I find myself stuck on the side of the road, my brakes in need of bleeding, you know?







can't absolutely verify their authenticity," he said.

Avoid being scammed

Attorney General Bill Schuette recently issued a consumer alert with tips for Michigan residents to avoid IRS scams and tax-related identity theft.

"Con artists take advantage of tax season at the expense of Michigan taxpayers," said Schuette. "This time of year can be stressful enough for famlies without having to worry that their personal information may be stolen I encourage consumers to follow these tips to avoid falling victim to IRS

Schuette noted that anybody contacting a consumer claiming to be from the IRS and asking for personal identifying information is a crook. Schuette encourages consumers to report fraudulent IRS e-mails or phone calls to the

Beware of These Common IRS Phone and E-mail Scams:

\*Back taxes or penalty phone call – these high pressure calls threaten legal action that can only be avoided by immediate payment. Payment must be made by difficult-to-trace Green Dot or similar money transfer methods.

Rebate phone call - aimed at seniors, the caller identifies himself as an IRS employee and tells the targeted victim that he or she is eligible for a sizable rebate for filing taxes early. The fake IRS employee requests bank account information for direct deposit of the rebate.

\*Paper check phone call – a fake IRS employee indicates the IRS sent a check that has not been cashed and the IRS needs to verify the individual's bank account number. The only way the IRS collects bank account details is if consumers choose to put them on their tax return. \*Refund e-mail – falsely claims to come from the IRS and informing the

sonal identifying information. The crooks try to make this look legitimate by using a specific refund sum that sounds convincing. \*Audit e-mail – informs the recipient that his or her tax return will be audited. The e-mail may include a greeting in the body addressed to the specific

recipient to click on a link to access a refund claim form that requires per-

recipient by name. \*Tax law changes e-mail – invites the recipient to download information on tax law changes. Clicking on the link downloads malicious software also known as malware. For more information on the dangers of malware, view

Schuette's consumer alert, "Malware – What Is It and How To Avoid It". \*Cash reward for completing online customer satisfaction survey - pur-

ports to pay taxpayers for completing an online survey that, of course, includes questions asking for personal identifying information. The IRS will never initiate an e-mail to a taxpayer so e-mails purporting to

be from the IRS are fraudulent. Consumers should be on the lookout for the following tricks:

\*The official IRS logo.

\*Whole sections of text from the IRS's website.

\* A fake "from" address (reported Michigan variations include: irs@getrefundnow.com, support@irs.gov, service@irs.jg.gov, tax-refunds@irs.gov and other variations on the irs. gov theme).

\*Forms with numbers similar to those the IRS already uses, often with a jumble of numbers and letters.

If an e-mail purports to be from the IRS, consumers should forward e-mails to phishing@irs.gov, the address established by the IRS to receive, track, and shut down these scams. It is important to remember the only genuine IRS website is www.irs.gov.

#### **Tax-Related Identity Theft**

Tax-related identity theft occurs when someone uses a consumer's stolen Social Security number to file a tax return claiming a fraudulent refund. The IRS is often the first to inform a victim that identity theft has occurred. Victims should immediately contact the IRS Identity Protection Specialized Unit at 800-908-4490, report the fraud and ask for ID Theft Affidavit Form 1439. After completing the form, consumers should continue to file their tax return and pay any amount owed even if it must be done through the paper method.

After fielding Cass City's largest squads in recent history a year ago, Coach Jon Zdrojewski says he expects participation to be up about 25 percent for the 2 teams in 2015.

Kingston, meanwhile, was led by Sarah


Savage. The junior playmaker recorded game-scoring honors with 19 points, while Cassidy MacGuire added 8 markers and Madison Cofer, 6.

# Lifetime of smiles

#### Dr. Thomas' staff shares healthy dental habits with first graders at Cass City Elementary School

Each year for the past 18 years, a dental hygienist from Dr. James Thomas' Cass City dental practice has spent time with first grade students at Cass City Elementary School, teaching them about the habits that help to keep their teeth healthy.

"The goal is to have the kids understand how important healthy teeth are. With tooth decay being the single most common chronic childhood disease, millions of school hours are lost each year to dental-related diseases," said Kim Gray, the dental hygienist who recently met with local students.

"The first graders are targeted because at that age, they are starting to get some adult teeth," Gray explained. "At each classroom visit, we discuss proper brushing and flossing techniques, healthy diet...and how a cavity forms, to name a few things.

"Also, Dr. Thomas makes sure each first grader gets a new toothbrush, floss and toothpaste to take home with them, as well as educational information for both the child and the parents.

"We want to make it fun for the kids, so there is no fear of coming to the dentist and getting their teeth cleaned," Gray added. "Early education is important. Not only will it give them a healthy smile for life, but also their overall health in general will be better."


