# Fatal cycle crash report on way to county prosecutor

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies have released the name of the victim in a two-vehicle traffic crash that claimed the life of a Millington area motorcyclist.

Tuscola County Undersheriff Glen Skrent reported Victor Bennett, 51, died in the Monday, April 6, collision in Arbela Township.

According to reports, deputies along with an MMR Ambulance crew and the Millington-Arbela Fire Department were dispatched to the corner of Belsay and Birch Run roads at about 4:50 p.m.

"Preliminary investigation (showed) the motorcyclist (Bennett) was westbound on Birch Run Road and a car traveling south on Belsay Road failed to yield at the intersection. The driver of the motorcycle struck the car when it entered the intersection," Skrent said.

The name of the other driver has not been released.

"The accident is still under investigation and a report will be forwarded to the prosecutor's office for said Skrent, who noted troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro and Vassar police also assisted deputies at the scene.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies recently arrested a Deford area motorist after responding to reports that a vehicle was swerving all over the road on M-81 in Caro.



A sophisticated phone scam targeting taxpayers has been hitting home in Sanilac County throughout this tax season, prompting Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki to again remind Thumb residents to beware of how the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) does and doesn't contact citizens.

Biniecki referred to a news release issued by the federal agency back in 2013, referring the scams.

Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it must be paid promptly through a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer. If the victim refuses to

# Proposal 1 should guarantee road \$\$

A poll among Michigan voters, commissioned by the Mackinac Center for Public Policy earlier this month, found that nearly 80 percent of respondents have already made up their minds regarding their support or lack of support – for Proposal 1.

We wonder if that spells bad news for Lansing, particularly if enough voters are betting this proposal will turn into the same sort of shell game residents bought into when they approved a statewide lottery back in 1972 to all but solve Michigan's K-12 education funding woes.

More than 40 years later, residents are still wondering where the lottery money goes, many unaware that lottery profits merely replaced what was already being spent, so there was no massive increase in education spending.

Proposal 1, to be decided in the Tuesday, May 5, election, was placed on the ballot by the Legislation, which along with Gov. Rick Snyder touted the plan as a bipartisan solution to fixing the state's crumbling roadways, among other things. If approved, the measure would raise an estimated \$2 billion via an increase in the sales tax from six to seven percent.

Few motorists would disagree that many of our roads are in poor shape, but we're not convinced this *statewide ballot question is the only viable – or appropriate* – *option to get the job done.* 

For starters, why are legislators asking voters to approve additional funding to fix a problem they could and should be tackling by, say, implementing cuts in the state's budget to come up with more money for roads, rather than asking citizens already saddled with a significant tax burden to tax themselves even more?

Or, if they really wanted to get voters on board, why not offer one proposal, for one purpose, and put into writing a guarantee the dollars will go for that specific purpose ONLY?

Instead, a group of lame duck legislators delivered a monster proposal composed of multiple bills that add up to one of the largest tax hikes in Michigan's histo-

Now, we're not saying some of the included spending proposals – an additional \$300 million for the School Aid Fund, \$40 million for at-risk schools and \$94 million in additional funding for local units of government, for example – don't have merit. But holding various programs hostage while promising better roads is bad policy and, sadly, politics as usual.

We find it interesting that money generated for education in Proposal 1 would be constitutionally protected (a method we fully support), and yet the funding for roads is not, meaning Lansing could decide to shift some of those dollars around for other purposes.

Sorry, but we simply don't trust that sort of promise from government officials, not after watching them rob Peter to pay Paul time and time again, especially when it comes to education funding.

Obviously, the need for decent, safe roads won't go away if voters say "no" come May 5. But neither will the state's responsibility to provide them, not only for motorists' safety, but also when it comes to boasting about Michigan's infrastructure when trying to lure new business and industry to the state.

The final stage, number seven, involves the inevitable return trip home. While en route, your creative juices start flowing. April is Car Care Month, and although nobody needs to tell any Michigan motorist about potholes, the non-profit Car Care Council is doing just that by offering some tips to help you determine if your vehicle has sustained damage after hitting one.

Here's a sample: Loss of control, swaying when making routine turns, bottoming out on city streets or bouncing excessively on rough roads (damaged steering and/or suspension); pulling in one direction, and uneven tire wear (alignment problems); low tire pressure, bulges or blisters on the sidewalls, or dents in the wheel rim.

Experts say that if you've hit a pothole, it can be difficult to know if your vehicle has been damaged in the process, so it's a good idea to have a professional technician check out the car and make the necessary repairs to ensure safety and reliability.

By the way, the Car Care Council offers a host of free tools on its website, including its 80-page Car Care Guide and a custom service schedule and email reminder service.

Since 2000, the Michigan Youth Livestock Scholarship Fund (MYLSF) has awarded more than \$360,000 in scholarships and educational awards to outstanding youth who have exhibited at the premier livestock events in the state of Michigan.

To be eligible for either the MYLSF general scholarship or the statewide scholarship, the applicant must be a resident of Michigan and a graduating high school senior or a high school graduate continuing their education at an accredited institution in the year in which they are applying.

For the general MYLSF scholarship, the applicant must be a youth exhibitor at the Michigan Livestock Expo, the Michigan Dairy Expo or the former Michigan State Fair, for a minimum of three calendar years prior to the year of application. For the statewide scholarship, an applicant must be a youth exhibitor at a local, county, or statewide exhibition for a minimum of three years prior to the year of application.

Specific proceeds from the Michigan Livestock Expo Sale-Abration auction as well as charitable donations help fund the scholarships. The fund is governed by a 10-member board comprised of volunteers from Michigan's agricultural community, with the corpus of the fund held at the Battle Creek Community Foundation.

In 2014 approximately \$15,000 was deposited in the Michigan Education Saving Plans for youth exhibitors that compete in judging and showmanship events at the Michigan Livestock Expo on the Michigan State University campus.

The 2014 MYLSF scholarships for \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$500 were awarded to a dozen students, including Kylie Bates of Sebewaing (\$1,000)

# Motorists escape serious injuries in Sanilac County traffic crashes

Sanilac County Sheriff's deputies recently responded to a pair of personal injury traffic accidents in the Cass City

According to reports made available to the media last week, both crashes occurred Saturday, April 4, with the first reported at the intersection of VanDyke Road (M-53) and Robinson Road at about 10:30 a.m.

'A 36-year-old male of Cass City was southbound on Van Dyke Road. He stopped his Ford pickup, signaled a left turn onto Robinson Road and was waiting for northbound traffic to clear. At the same time 21-year-old male of Cass City was driving a Chevrolet pickup south on Van Dyke. At this time he failed to see the other pickup stopped in the roadway until it was too late," reported Sanilac County Sheriff's Department Administrative Assistant Amanda Wojcik. "The collision caused minor injuries to both parties.'

Department officials did not release names, saying the 21 year old male was treated by a Cass City MMR at the scene and then released, and that both drivers indicated they would seek their own medical treatment at a later

Both drivers report wearing their seatbelts and alcohol was not a factor. Deputies cited the 21-year-old driver, according to reports, which noted Elkland Township fire the occupants were wearing seatbelts.

fighters assisted deputies at the scene.

The second accident occurred about an hour later at the corner of M-53 and M-46. Wojcik stated the Marlette and Lamotte Township fire departments, Marlette EMS and Marlette police were all dispatched to the scene along with deputies.

"A 39-year-old male from Capac was stopped at the four-way stop sign at (the intersection) in his Chevy Silverado. Simultaneously a 25-year-old male and his 22-year-old male passenger were traveling northbound in a 2010 Freightliner box truck delivering furniture for Art Van," Wojcik reported. "They did not see the stop sign or the vehicle stopped at the intersection. The 25year-old male driver applied the brakes and swerved in an attempt to avoid the collision. The front of the freightliner truck impacted the rear of the Silverado, causing extensive damage to both vehicles.

The intersection was partially closed down for several hours until the vehicles and wreckage could be removed.

The passenger of the Freightliner box truck was transported by Marlette EMS to Marlette hospital for minor injuries. The driver of the box truck sought his own medical treatment, and the driver of the Silverado was transported by private vehicle to Marlette Hospital for treatment minor injuries.

cooperate, they are then threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license, according to IRS officials, who said that in many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting.

"This scam has hit taxpayers in nearly every state in the country. We want to educate taxpayers so they can help protect themselves. Rest assured, we do not and will not ask for credit card numbers over the phone, nor request a pre-paid debit card or wire transfer," said IRS Commissioner Danny Administration at 1-800-366-4484. Werfel.

auction in Cass City.

"We've been blessed. It's just a way to give back," he said.

Although Osentoski recalls his first performances as an auctioneer as being less than stellar, he's found plenty of solid footing on the path he chose to tread since then, although the road to success has also been paved with a pit-

Like the time back in the early 1980s when he and his father were touring an Ubly area dairy farm where they had been contacted to handle an auction, and they were walking along, admiring the herd. Osentoski recalled his brother, Marty, and the landowner were bringing up the rear as they talked about the sale. Then, suddenly, David heard the owner yell "Don't go!" And in a moment, the thin crust of ice below his father and himself gave way, the pair plunging down waist deep into pool of liquid manure.

Fortunately, the good times have far outweighed the difficult times. Even after 50 years on the job, Osentoski isn't showing signs of slowing down, largely because he still enjoys the work.

What I like about it is the people. You get a lot of the same people from sale to sale – you get a following – but you also get new people," he said.

Times have certainly changed since the mid-1960s. However, the Osentoskis' devotion to carrying on the family legacy – as a family – hasn't. 'We are very much a family business – our strength is our bond," Osentoski said. "Preparing, organizing and setting up for an auction can take a lot of work, and everyone pulls together."
