Coast Guard offers boater safety tips

Michigan Secretary of State Ruth Johnson reminds all watercraft owners to make safety a priority when enjoying Michigan's many lakes, rivers and other waterways this sum-

"Michigan has so much to offer when it comes to great water recreation," said Johnson, herself an avid boater. "Don't let anything mar your boating experience this summer. Take time to plan for safety for you and your passengers."

Life-or-death situations most frequently arise when passengers aren't wearing a personal floatation device. Drowning remains one of the leading causes of death in boating acci-

dents, and of all drowning deaths reported to the U.S. Coast Guard in 2013, 84 percent of victims were not wearing a floatation device. Michigan law requires that each boat have enough life jackets for every person on board.

The Coast Guard also reports that alcohol use is the leading contributing factor in fatal boating accidents, when the primary cause is known. Boaters should be aware that a new Michigan law lowers the limit for bodily alcohol content for watercraft operators from .1 percent to .08 percent, similar to automobile drivers. People age 21 or younger may not operate a boat with any bodily alcohol content. The law also prohibits the use of certain drugs and any Schedule 1 controlled substances when boating.

"Alcohol and boats are a dangerous mix," Johnson said. "Why risk possible death, personal injury or damage to your watercraft? Keep yourself and your passengers safe by obeying the law."

While on the water, the U.S. Coast Guard recommends that boaters:

*Take extra precaution near boats towing skiers or tubers.

*Never reverse the boat to pick up someone out of the water but instead circle around to the person.

*Examine the boat's stern to make certain no one is near the propeller before the engine is started.

*Be especially alert when operating in congested areas and never enter swimming zones.

*Don't allow passengers to ride on the bow, transom, seatbacks or other locations where they might fall overboard.

*Stop immediately if someone falls overboard and slowly turn the boat around while keeping the person in sight as you approach.

*Learn to recognize scuba diver

Residents interested in taking a boating safety course may find one from the searchable online list maintained by the Department of Natural Resources

www.dnr.state.mi.us/recnsearch. The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary (www.cgaux.org), the U.S. Power Squadron (www.usps.org) and many county sheriff's offices also offer courses. A boating safety course is required

for anyone born after 1978 who operates a personal watercraft and for anyone born on or after July 1, 1996 who operates a motorboat.

Additionally, state law requires that a boat pulling a skier or tuber must operator to observe the person being Michigan.

Johnson's office oversees the registration and titling of more than 915,000 watercraft. Michigan is third in the nation for sales of watercraft, boat trailers and accessories, behind Florida and Texas, according the National Marine Manufacturers Association.

Boaters are reminded that they can renew their watercraft registrations online at www.ExpressSOS.com as well as order a replacement watercraft title, a convenient service if a boat is being sold this summer and the title can't be found. The Recreation Passport, which is available for \$11 when renewing a vehicle plate, provides boaters with access to any of the boat launches have another person besides the found in state parks across





and judicial status hearings.

"We're pleased to see that the work we have been putting into our program is paying off," Tuscola County Chief Judge Kim David Glaspie said of the TRSC, which was established in late 2013 after the Thumb's trial courts embarked on a cooperative experiment designed to give them tools outside of the traditional fines and jail time to encourage those repeatedly convicted of driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol to turn over a new leaf.

"Investing our time and energy now to get these people off the cycle of substance abuse, criminal consequences, and further abuse leading to recidivism, makes our community happier, healthier and wealthier,' Glaspie said.

The new Michigan Supreme Court report provides a detailed look into the accomplishments of problemsolving courts.

For example, graduates of sobriety courts are one-fourth as likely as the general population to be convicted of

any new criminal offense within two are saving millions each year. years of admission to a program. When that window is extended to four years from admission, sobriety as likely as the general population to be convicted of any new criminal

When attention shifts to the drug- or alcohol-related offenses that sobriety courts target, the results are even more impressive.

Even though sobriety court participants are, by definition, people with uniquely difficult substance abuse problems, they are less than onethird as likely as the general population to be convicted of a new drugor alcohol-related offense within two years of admission, and about half as likely to be convicted of a new drugor alcohol-related offense within four years of admission.

"We can also measure the success of Michigan's problem-solving courts in dollars and cents," the Michigan Supreme Court justices wrote in their introduction to the "Solving Problems, Saving Lives" report.

"Drug and mental health courts alone handled more than 10,000 cases over the past two years. In a state of ten million people, that might seem small, but consider this fact: A conservative estimate of the cost to incarcerate an offender in that the work we are putting in to prison for one day is about \$66. So, avoiding incarceration for those 10,000 participants saved taxpayers us, but we are excited to see that it \$66 per day – that means taxpayers has been worth it."

According to research conducted on six different programs, for every \$1 invested in drug treatment court, court participants are still about half there was an average benefit of \$2.21 to \$6.32, and an average cost savings per defendant of \$2,615 to \$12,218.

"What do these numbers mean to communities and families all across Michigan?" the justices added. "Communities are safer and stronger. The quality of life is better, not just for participants, but for all families. And, most important: lives are being saved."

The TRSC, which was established with a \$255,000 grant from the State Administrative (SCAO), currently has roughly three dozen participants. The first three graduates of the program were honored in May after completing an intense 36-week program that includes group and individual counseling sessions, support group meetings, frequent drug/alcohol testing, and attendance at regular status review hearings.

Another batch of program participants were scheduled to graduate Thursday, prompting Glaspie and Tuscola County Circuit Court Judge Amy Grace Gierhart to say they're looking forward to seeing even more success stories unfold.

"It is tremendously satisfying to see TRSC is paying off," Gierhart added. "This is new ground for all of
