

Finances looking good for annual Freedom Fest

The Cass City Freedom Festival is one of the most well-attended celebrations in Cass City, bringing in 10,000 to 15,000 people each year according to Carrie Luana, chairperson of the event.

The festival relies on donations from businesses in the area and residents in the community. This year, committee members had their work cut out for them financially, as they combined the Freedom Festival with Summer Mania and a special celebration honoring the village's sesquicentennial.

"The fireworks alone are usually between \$6,000 and \$7,000," Luana said. "The parade usually costs us around \$2,000, and tent rental is around \$2,500, so overall we spend around \$15,000," Luana added. This is in addition to the costs of Summer Mania and the sesquicentennial.

So, how did they do it?

"What we did was just ask the businesses to consider donating the amount they would normally give to Summer Mania as well

since we weren't going to be asking for donations for Summer Mania," Luana said. "The donations that have been coming in so far have been more generous than in previous years."

The donors include platinum sponsors Cass City Downtown Development Authority, Cass City Lions Club, Rolling Hills Golf Course, Thumb Cellular, Thumb National Bank and Walther Farms.

"The Freedom Festival wouldn't be possible without the individuals and companies that support (it), as well as the village itself - the parks and recreation department as well as the police department, (which is) having extra officers on duty that weekend. We want to have a fun event, but also a safe event," Luana said.

While it does cost a lot to put on the Freedom Festival, there is a payoff for the town.

"The people that are coming in, they're spending money somewhere, whether it be gas or going out to eat or stopping in a store to shop. The businesses are bound to generate more business on that weekend," Luana explained.

"There's absolutely an increase (in sales). I can't even give numbers. It's always just crazy busy," said Sherry Parks, manager of the Shell gas station on Main Street. Erin Jaenicke, manager of the local McDonald's, agreed. "Any festival, like homecoming or this, there's an increase (in sales)."



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
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

2 tablespoons red colored sugars 2 tablespoons blue colored sugars

Directions:

Beat granulated sugar, butter, almond extract and egg in large bowl with electric mixer on medium speed 2 minutes. Stir in flour.

Divide dough in half, cover half and set aside. Place remaining half on waxed paper or plastic wrap; press into 8-inch square. Sprinkle with one tablespoon each of the red sugar and blue sugar. Using waxed paper to lift, roll up dough. Repeat with remaining dough and colored sugars. Wrap rolls in plastic wrap and refrigerate about 1 hour or until firm.

Heat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit. Cut rolls into 1/4-inch slices. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake six to eight minutes or until edges

begin to brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheet to wire rack.

Fun facts for Independence Day

*The oldest continuous Independence Day celebration is the Bristol Fourth of July parade in Bristol, R.I. The town has hosted the parade every year since 1785.

*July 4 also marks a day of independence for the Philippines and Rwanda. For the Philippines, July 4 marks "Republic Day," the day that the U.S. officially recognized the nation as an independent state in 1946. However, the country has celebrated an official Independence Day on June 12, since 1962.

*Americans reportedly consume about 155 million hotdogs on Independence Day alone. However, the origins of how the hotdog came to be a popular American food remain a mystery.

*The famous Liberty Bell has not been rung since 1846, due to increasing concerns about its crack. Instead, the bell is tapped 13 times to signal for bells across the country to start ringing.

*The Fourth of July wasn't a legal federal holiday until Congress declared it to be so in 1941.

*There have been 28 versions of the United States flag to-date. The latest version, designed in 1958 to accommodate Alaska and Hawaii, was designed by a 17-year-old whose pattern won a national competition for the new flag.

"I'm hoping that it brings more peo-


ple into our town than we have in the past," Luana said. "I'm hoping this is something (the kids) will be super excited about and that it's something that people will look forward to and bring the kids to."
