Bank is major hurdle for new grocery store

Efforts to attract a grocery store to Cass City appear to be stalled, while plans to expand another food vender in the village are proceeding full steam ahead.

For the second consecutive month, Clarence "Bud" Schneeberger addressed the Cass City Village Council Monday on developments related to ending the absence of a food liner in the village.

"Any progress on getting a grocery store?" the long-time Cass City business owner inquired during the council's regular monthly meeting.

Trustee Steve Erickson, who serves as the Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) executive director and has been at the center of the negotiations to secure a grocer along with Village Manger Peter Cristiano, could offer little encouragement on efforts to bring a new entity to the former Erla's Food building near the intersection of Veterans Drive and Church Street.



Hospital set to host Freedom from Smoking program series

Hills and Dales General Hospital in Cass City is gearing up to host its next smoking cessation course, 'Freedom From Smoking.'

The program is for individuals looking to quit smoking and is taught by a certified facilitator of the American Lung Association. The course lasts eight weeks with sessions each lasting two hours. People who complete the program are six times more likely to be smoke-free one year.

Each participant will receive a "Freedom From Smoking" workbook, relaxation CD, and certificate upon completion of the program. With a physician referral, participants will be able to bill insurance to help cover the \$75 class fee.

Recreational park is community jewel

Kelli McIntyre, director of the Cass City Parks and Recreation Department, reports that an average of 50 to 60 kids attend the village's camp on a daily basis and the number of youths registered for the summer – 124 - is about the same as last year.

McIntyre also says the campers have taken a number of field trips this summer, including trips to Frankenmuth Wilderness Zoo and Splash Village, Kokomos in Saginaw and McGraw Park Beach near Port Austin that have provided campers with extreme smiles from the adventures.

Other activities campers have participated in over the summer include using the computer lab in the elementary school to help keep their academic skills sharp, and utilizing the Helen Steven Memorial Pool every Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons.

At the Helen Stevens Memorial Pool, a large number of campers have also taken swim lessons. To-date, approximately 225 kids have ity is also at 90, so your backside remains damp on enrolled in swimming instruction.

Of course, kids aren't the only one using the pool — back by popular demand are water aerobics classes that are offered Monday and Wednesday evenings or Tuesday Thursday mornings. Both time slots have proven quite popular among adults in the community.

Hollocker is in charge of the village's Fundamental Sport Camps. He will have directed 10 camps by summer's end, including two basketball and flag football camps, in addition to volleyball, tennis, bowling, disc golf, dodge ball/kick ball and competitive swim camps.

Our recreational park has long been known for its baseball and softball fields, and Doug Hyatt and Troy Perry have helped to continue that tradition by organizing ball tournaments this summer that have brought well over a 1,000 people into town, according to Cass City Police Chief Craig Haynes.

We are seeing a consistent pace with 2014 Cass City housing improvements, reports Village Manager Peter

Last year the village issued 18 building permits for residential and commercial work. Thus far in 2015, the village has recorded 7 building permits for residential and commercial construction. These permits range from signs to new dwellings and commercial buildings for the first 6-months of 2015.

Turning to code enforcement matters, to-date there have been 88 properties with grass-blight concerns, 5 properties in violation of the Inoperable Vehicle Ordinance and 25 animal complaints.

Of the properties with grass-blight problems, 10 have been mowed - and billed - by the Cass City Parks Department.

Sanilac woman tries to grab deputy's gun, pair arrested

A Sanilac County couple faces multiple felony charges stemming from a domestic violence complaint that escalated when deputies arrived at their home last week.

It has been a few years since I've covered the 4-H and FFA small and large livestock sales at the Tuscola County Fair, but without a full-time summer intern this year, I dove in last week and handled the job myself.

And I'm glad I did.

Don't get me wrong – I wasn't exactly thrilled with the idea of spending the better part of a day – roughly six hours — trying to keep track of dozens of young people with their homegrown birds and animals, not to mention buyers' names and prices as each entry was placed on the auction block and sold to the highest bidder, all the while taking photos of as many local kids as possible.

On the other hand, Thursday's sale was blessed with great weather, and the folks in charge of the Tuscola County Fair have done an outstanding job of providing a great venue for the annual livestock sales.

But the most fun, for me, was watching all of these young people proudly display months of hard work in front of an appreciative audience. You only have to glance at the livestock – everything from rabbits to lambs to steers – to conclude these animals have been well cared for. The kids have also obviously spent many hours working with their livestock, which is why it isn't uncommon to see a youngster all of about three or four feet tall leading around a 1,200 pound

It's impressive because these young people didn't get to the auction ring by sitting on their backsides playing video games and texting their friends non-stop. They earned what they achieved, including well-deserved praise and a nice paycheck, through hard work, dedication, drive and perseverance.

I don't know about you, but these are the sort of people I would like out of her classroom at Cass City to deal with years down the road, whether they pursue careers in medicine, business, agriculture, education or any other field that requires an honest to goodness long-term work ethic.

I'll tell you about another group that feels the same way: many of the folks you do business with year in and year out – local banks, insurance agencies, auto dealerships, agribusiness firms and others, not to mention friends and neighbors, all of whom demonstrate a deep sense of appreciation for these kids by spending a few hundred to several thousand dollars during the livestock auctions.

They don't have to, but they do, which is why you might consider businesses that are actively involved at a county fair the next time you steer took top market beef honors go to open a checking account, buy a new truck or take out a new insurance policy on your property. That goes for auctioneers, too, considering all of the auctioning services are donated.



years and eight months for the crime. The sentencing followed a circuit court trial in late April in which the jury handed down a verdict of guilty to delivery of a controlled substance – causing death.

Vanvalkenburgh, who was given credit for 82 days already served in jail, could remain in prison for up to 15 years. She may also be ordered to make restitution to the victim's family for funeral expenses and other costs the family has sustained. A hearing is to be scheduled to determine a specific

The March 27 death occurred at an apartment complex in Elkton, where Vanvalkenburgh admitted she and her boyfriend, 19-year-old Ryan A. Shemka, had injected each other with methadone multiple times over a period of more than 30 hours, resulting in Shemka's fatal overdose.

According to police reports, deputies were dispatched to the complex to investigate a report of a man who was unconscious and not breathing.


Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said dispatchers worked with occupants of the apartment to initiate CPR. An Elkton Ambulance crew arrived and took over the life-saving efforts, but Shemka was pronounced dead at the scene a short time later.

"It was learned that the victim...who had been temporarily residing at the apartment, had fallen asleep with his girlfriend in a closet used as a bedroom," Hanson said. "This was apparently after the two had spent several hours intravenously injecting each other with methadone and consuming

The investigation by deputies and the Elkton Police Department resulted in the request for a search warrant for a Colfax Township residence, where officers seized several methadone pills and a small amount of cash.



The Cass City Board of Education tied up loose ends on administrative contracts and began reviewing board goals during a brief monthly meeting

The board unanimously approved extending the administrative contracts of Chad Daniels, junior-senior high school principal; Aaron Fernald, elementary school principal; and Don Markel, athletic director and assistant principal (both buildings).

Each administrator works under a two-year contract that is extended by one year annually based on performance reviews school Supt. Jeff Hartel conducts and submits to the board. All three principals were rated as being effective in their positions during the 2014-15 school year.

Turning to goals, Hartel and the board reviewed the goals they set for the past school year, and agreed those goals were largely met. Hartel also asked board members to prepare to set goals for the 2015-16 coming school year during the next regular meeting, Monday, Aug. 24, starting at 7 p.m. in the high school board room.

The past year's goals set by the board were:

*Strive to make improvements in the area of curriculum, and close the gap in student achievement via efforts such as academic coaching, soliciting teacher feedback and purchasing new textbooks.

*Improve professional development by hosting quarterly meetings to promote this area, and participate in individual professional development programs designed specifically for school board members.

*Maintain/improve finances by maintaining a minimum fund balance of seven to 10 percent (the balance currently adds up to an amount equal to 13 percent of Cass City's general fund budget), ensuring the superintendent and district chief financial officer continue to work closely together to monitor all financial information, and by presenting the board with a balanced budg-

*Improve visibility of board members by encouraging them to attend school functions and volunteering at least a portion of one day in one of the school buildings.

*Maintain/improve superintendent's communication with board members and the community by ensuring the board is well informed and by arranging for regular school departmental reports during monthly board of education sessions. The superintendent is also encouraged to be active in the commu-

In other business Monday, the board:

*Accepted the resignation of special education teacher Tammy Downing. *Approved a request for a one-year leave submitted by lead Great Start Readiness Program teacher Mandy Haag.

just after 4 p.m. to investigate a missing persons report.

"It was reported that (Ricketts), who is in good mental health but visually impaired, had left home on foot and was last seen walking in the area of Arnold and Severance roads around noon," Biniecki said. The call was made for assistance in locating the woman due to her visual abilities and being away for that length of time.

"A command post was set up and resources were called in to search the area by land and from the air, ending at nightfall without locating her," the sheriff added. "Deputies continued to check the area throughout the night until the search could resume in the morning."

Search teams gathered at the Argyle Township Fire Hall Monday morning. "Investigators were not able to get a picture of the missing woman from friends or family, but resumed the search based on the last known description and witness accounts," Biniecki said. "After rechecking her home, surrounding fields and wooded areas by foot, ORVs and by air, the area where she was last seen was checked again.

At about 3:25 p.m., a Sanilac County Sheriff's Department Aero Squadron plane crew spotted Ricketts sitting in cornfield off Severance Road, west of the ground search party.



Sheriff's department commissions new patrol boat

"If this boat's service to our county accomplishes at least half of what it replaced, some people will stand a second chance at life because it and our other patrol boats have at times literally been the difference between life and death," Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said.

It took considerable effort to obtain and refurbish the military surplus Boston Whaler patrol boat, which has been named The Sheriff Joseph J. Murray in honor of the former Huron County sheriff who lost his life in the line of duty more than 80 years ago. But in the end, Hanson noted, the sheriff's department ended up with an updated vessel costing roughly one-quarter of the price tag for a new boat.

The sheriff's department spent several months working to secure a replacement for an existing patrol boat that has been in use since 1988.

"After being in service on the waters of Huron County for over 27 years, our 26-foot Boston Whaler patrol boat, the 'Skipper II', was decommissioned last Friday (July 17)," Hanson explained. "We had been dealing with hull integrity issues on it for the last six years and have been researching alternatives since last year.

"In February of this year, we were fortunate enough to find and acquire a military surplus patrol boat hull through the Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO), which works through the Department of Defense," he said. "It was in good

feet wider than the boat we were in and money. need of replacing. However, it was in California and it needed to be hauled to our county from there."

With financial support pledged from the Huron County Board of Commissioners, officials contracted with Country Side Transport, Sebewaing, to transport the boat to Huron County to have the engines and accessories from the old patrol boat installed.

"As the project started to unfold, it was decided to put engines because engines from the old were nearly 15 years old," Hanson said. "New 250horsepower

Evinrude 250 E-TEC outboard motors were purchased and eventually installed by Finn and Feather Marine out of Bay Port. Cosmetic hull repairs were completed by the J.W Hunt Body Shop of Bad Axe, and decal graphics were installed by Goats Graphics of Bad Axe. Different specialty fabrication chores were handled by American Technical Fabricators of Bad Axe.

"Several talented deputies also preformed tasks outside of their normal daily duties, such as installing electronics, maintenance-related repairs and general refurbishing," the sheriff continued. "We were very fortunate condition and cost no money to pur- to be able to do that portion 'in

"The total cost to the taxpayers will be under \$55,000," Hanson said. To have purchased this boat brand new, equipped with what it has and a trailer would have cost nearly \$200,000. A brand new similar hull alone is estimated at \$90,000."

The Sheriff Joseph J. Murray boasts a length of 27 feet and width of 10 feet, carries 350 gallons of fuel, has a carrying payload of 4,000 pounds, and can reach speeds of up to 50 miles per hour. The vessel joins the Huron County Sheriff's Department's fleet of five patrol boats, including a 31-foot Grady White, a 22-foot Aquasport, a 13foot Boston Whaler and a 16-foot

"It will also be one of three that is stationed in the water during the boating season. Some basic specifications of the boat are: It is 27' long, 10' wide, drafts 21" of water, carries 350 gallons of fuel, has a carrying payload of 4,000 lbs. and can travel at speeds of 50 miles per hour.

"This boat has been named after Sheriff Joseph J. Murray, who drowned June 2, 1932, off of what is now known as the Port Crescent State Park Day Use," said Hanson, who noted Murray was the county's 25th sheriff. "He accidentally fell overboard while looking for illegal fishing nets."

Murray's death was detailed in the following Cass City Chronicle story, published June 10, 1932:
