Grinding out success

Littles carve out niche with custom smoked meat treats

Business is booming these days at Little's Meat Processing.

That's no surprise, considering Thumb area hunters are in the midst of a productive regular firearm deer season, and Little's owners, brothers and partners Matt and Micah Little specialize in full-service wild game processing, from butchering to production of their own custom line of smoked snack sticks, summer sausage, fresh sausage, jerky and smoked venison ham.

It's one-stop shopping at Little's, where the crew will even field dress your deer for a fee.

"The numbers (of deer being brought in) are definitely up from what it was last year," said Micah Little, who three years ago joined the meat processing business Matt established eight years ago. In fact, he noted, the crew was so swamped with deer early in the first week of the gun season opener, they had to temporarily stop accepting orders while they scrambled to get caught

"We had about 90 deer come in had about 90 deer come in had been seen as well those first two days," Matt recalled. "It's only the second time in eight years that we've had to shut it off like that."

Two days later, they were accepting deer again.

The Littles say they're typically busy throughout gun-season, but this year was particularly hectic because mild early-season weather prompted

School, teachers okay new, 3-year contract Monday

The Cass City Board of Education Monday ratified a new, three-year contract for the district's 56 teachers.

The vote during the regular monthly meeting was 6-0. Trustee Dan Manwell was not in attendance at the

The contract, already ratified by members of the Cass City Education Association (CCEA), provides for a one-step advancement in pay for eligible teachers (about 25 who are currently on steps one through 10), and a one-percent pay hike for teachers on step 11 and beyond in the first

In each of the second and third years of the contract, teachers eligible for step pay will receive a halfstep advancement, while those who do not receive step advances will get a one-half percent pay increase.

School Supt. Jeff Hartel estimates the new contract will cost the district an additional \$94,000, including benefits, in the first year.

Cass City teachers have been working without a contract since mid-August, when they're previous twoyear pact expired.

Negotiations, which began last spring, took an unusual turn during Please turn to page 6.

Campbell has two interested buyers

Cass City School officials appeared poised to accept an offer for the former Campbell Elementary School building Monday night, but a decision to revise the property description to include an adjacent grassy area and parking lot in the sale delayed final action.

Meeting in regular session, the Cass City Board of Education agreed to gather again in a special session slated for Thursday, Dec. 3, to accept one of two offers on the table.

School Supt. Jeff Hartel told the board he received both proposals within a week. Sean Astley, Silverwood, has offered \$50,000 for the largely vacant building, while Thumb Psychological Services, which has been renting the southern end of the structure for the past two years, is offering \$45,000.

"Both of these (offers) are contingent on the building passing an inspection," Hartel noted.

School officials earlier this year dropped their asking price for the building from about \$120,000 to \$79,000.

Hartel said the property description doesn't include the grass and parking lot, but he agreed with board members who suggested including those items Please turn to page 6.

Thumb motorist found dead

Deputies say it appears a motorist found dead in her vehicle over the weekend in Huron County's Gore Township apparently suffered a medical emer-

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said deputies were dispatched to Pochert Road, south of M-25, where they located the victim in her Dodge Minivan Saturday morning.

"Investigation is indicating that sole occupant Benita J. Lawes, age 62, of Bad Axe, most likely had a medical emergency, which made her lose consciousness and leave the road way at a slow rate of speed and come to rest against a tree," Hanson said. "Her vehicle was found still running, in gear and the doors were locked."



Firemen had to break out a window in order to get access to the victim, according to the sheriff, who added it appears the incident most likely

occurred Friday afternoon, as witnesses reported seeing the vehicle in that location and thought it was there because someone was hunting. "It was parked in a manner that if one didn't actually get out and look at the vehicle closely, it would have appeared to have just been parked there," he said.

"The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by the Huron County Medical Examiner's Office, and an autopsy has been ordered," Hanson said. "Our office was assisted by the Port Hope Fire Department, the Harbor Beach Fire Department and the Harbor Beach Police."


Here's How It Works:

Ubly students already foot a \$50 pay-to-play fee and granting them free admission to cheer on their classmates seems right.



I've been sober for nearly four years now, when I probably should be dead. That little item alone generally keeps my gratitude gauge on



last month's regular school board meeting, when board President Alice Zaleski publicly outlined specific items in the school bargaining team's

Zaleski offered a list of nearly a dozen concessions she said school officials have offered - but union bargainers had declined to accept. School officials said the union initially agreed to the school's offer, but later backed out pending the results of the district's 2014-15 fiscal year

At the time, Zaleski indicated bargainers, who were working with a state mediator, would not be resuming talks until January due to scheduling conflicts.

CCEA President Kris Milligan and bargaining team member Josh Stern later voiced disappointment at the district's bargaining tactic. They also suggested there was no need to put negotiations on hold because the union and school could come to terms on the remaining unresolved issues without attorneys or a mediator present.

Milligan and Stern declined to address specific issues, but said local teachers deserve a fair shake - not only because they have repeatedly accepted concessions in the past when the district was facing hard financial times — but because they have as much personally invested in the school district as anyone, especially considering how important the school system is to the community.

Asked for comment Monday night after the board ratified the new contract, Milligan she's "just glad that we were able to come to an agreement."

The local teaching staff was more than a month into the 2013-14 school year before that contract was ratified. Negotiations had started months

before - in early spring - and bar- budget. gainers had agreed on much of what the pact would include, with the key exception being salaries.

late October 2013, adopting the previous two-year contract, which lifted a five-year freeze on step pay. At the time, the board agreed to add 1 ½ percent to each step and move all instructors up a step.

Hartel estimated the contract would \$100,000 in 2013 and another \$70,000 in 2014.

in order to reduce the district's liability and maintenance costs.

Board members indicated they're ready to sell at a reduced price and unanimously approved a motion to that effect on a vote of 5-0. Board Vice President Craig Bellew did not attend Monday's session, but participated via speaker phone. Also unable to attend was Trustee Dan Manwell. Trustee Stacey Bliss, who works part-time for Thumb Psychological Services,

After discussing the need to revise the property description, the board briefly considered a motion to accept an offer Monday. Board Secretary Janie Meeker and board Treasurer Dave Osentoski both indicated they first want to make a counteroffer. Board President Alice Zaleski, Bellew and Trustee Emily Phillips said they were ready to vote in favor of accepting an offer. No one made a motion, however.

The board also briefly discussed the offers. Meeker indicated she felt a responsibility to accept the highest amount, but Phillips pointed out Thumb Psychological Services has been a good renter and provides important services within the community.

Hartel pointed out the board is not obligated to accept the highest offer.

During the public comment portion of Monday's agenda, Nicole Kohaif, who along with Deb Thomas and Kathy Mroz formed the partnership that owns Thumb Psychological Services, pointed out their business is the only provider of specialized clinical services for autistic children in the Thumb

Currently, she told the board, Thumb Psychological Services has 250 clients in the community as well as nearly two dozen salaried employees.

"We are more than just a purchase agreement, and I we wanted you to know that," Kohaif added.

If Thumb Psychological Services is able to buy the building, she said, the business would welcome the opportunity to retain a lease agreement with a call center business that also currently utilizes a portion of the former school and specializes in snowmobile parts distribution.

Cass City School officials voted to list the structure for sale in April 2014 after several months of debate and discussion over its future.

The decision came after the board had hoped to let voters decide the issue at the polls, but subsequently learned it isn't a legal option. At the time, it had been more than two years since school officials closed Campbell in a consolidation effort designed to cut expenses following a multi-year trend of declining enrollment that has cost the Cass City Public Schools hundreds of students.

In early 2013, the board began talks with representatives of a group of Thumb dentists who had proposed utilizing the building to house a non-profit regional dental clinic to serve Medicaid patients.

The dentist agreed to a three-year lease and offered to buy the building outright, but negotiations stalled when the board approved, on a split vote, a n to not sell the former school

Board members opposed to selling expressed concern for the possible need for more space in the future, especially in light of construction of the new Dairy Farmers of America (DFA) plant in town. However, other board members suggested it's highly unlikely enrollment would increase significantly due to the plant construction. They also noted the district has some existing space that could be used to accommodate additional students. Since then, the district has not seen a notable increase in enrollment due to

the DFA plant. In fact, student numbers have continued to decrease. In the meantime, school officials have continued to spend an estimated

\$20,000 annually on utility costs at Campbell.








"It's four of us working continuously. I think all together we've gotten shift ends, the Littles set time aside 30 hours of sleep over the past five days," Micah commented Sunday.

"They just pulled their fourth 24hour shift since opening day. It's been pretty crazy this year," said Matt's wife, Jamie Little, who serves as bookkeeper for the business.

"I would say it's an above-average year based on where we're at right now," said Matt, who added the crew can butcher 25 deer a day. "We also try to have the sausage made, smoked and packed within 24 hours of cutting it.

As the season progresses, the number of deer hunters arriving at their door can vary greatly. "We can get two or three deer a day for four days, then all of a sudden 40 in a day,' Jamie said. "I would say an average for them is 10 to 15 deer a day."

And those days start early -5 a.m. – and continue long into the night. A typical day will find the crew cutting meat throughout the morning until noon. "Matt and (Jonathan Fields) are our main cutters, and they can butcher six or seven deer an ucts? hour," Micah noted.

Regardless of how late or early a every day for a complete cleaning and disinfecting of the processing facility.

The project takes up to two hours, Jamie said. She explained the work includes cleaning everything from the plastic bins used to hold venison, to every piece of equipment (grinders, mixers, stuffers, etc.), to the walls and floors.

Micah attributes some of the business' success to the custom venison snack sticks, sausage, jerky and other popular products they've earned a reputation for in the Cass City area and beyond. Convenience is another key - hunters can have their deer processed into cuts of meat as well as order the specialty snacks they know will be produced inhouse.

The barbecue and cheese snack stick is probably the most popular, and the regular summer sausage -I'd have to say those two are the best sellers," he said.

Just how popular are those prod-

From Saturday night to Sunday After the lunch hour, they're back at morning, the Littles crew turned out 150 pounds of summer sausage and another 50 pounds of summer sausage with cheese, 75 pounds each of their BBQ with cheese and jalapeno with cheese snack sticks, 50 pounds of pepper snack sticks, 25 pounds each of hunter and hunter with cheese snack sticks, and 12 1/2 pounds of pepper with cheese snack

"We don't stop until Thanksgiving. We take the day off, then the next morning we're right back at it again," Micah said.

Although this is the busiest time of the year, the Littles' season kicks off in September in conjunction with the state's early doe and youth hunts. During the firearm seasons, the business is open seven days a week, from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Regular business hours continue through the first of January. But customers can still bring their deer in after that by appointment by calling (989) 872-

Jamie said a solid base of regular customers keeps the family on its toes, although she's pleasantly surprised to see the number of new customers that word of mouth seems to bring through their doors.

"We've got some really loyal customers," she said. "They keep coming back to us each year."

Looking back, Matt says he never expected the business to grow as it has. Eight years ago, he had an idea of butchering maybe a hundred deer and smoking some sausage for customers. "Now, we work 24 hours a day and we grind as hard as we can to keep up with the work."


Making that dream come true has always been a family affair, according to Matt, who credits his mom, Donna Little, with playing a key role early on, starting with setting up a business office as well as helping to wrap meat. She's also cared for grandchildren along the way so her sons and their wives could juggle work and family life.

"She's a heck of a woman, I'll tell you that. She played a pivotal role in this business being a success," Matt

"I think part of how we got where we're at is we started out really small," he commented. "I did the work and I got to talk to the customer. I think that's what got the ball rolling."

He credits his wife and brothers, including older brother Bill Little, as well as longtime friends and fulltime employees Jonathan Fields and Joshua O'Dell, with keeping that ball rolling — each of them can tackle just about every job at the business, he noted.

"I have the best crew, I believe, ever," Matt said. "We're where we want to be, (but) without our crew, we wouldn't be where we are. I had an idea, but it was all of us that made it come to light."







Michigan DNR announces large game hunting seasons

Prospects for the 2015 big-game hunting and furbearer hunting seasons are very good, according to Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) wildlife biologists. Michigan offers a diversity of species and a wide variety of seasons to maximize recreation-

al opportunity. Here's a quick overview of some of the upcoming seasons:

Elk

Season: Hunt Period 2 is Dec. 5-13 in all of elk range. Hunt Period 3, Jan. 13-17, will only be held if needed.

Outlook: Michigan's elk population, which was above goal for a number of years, has been reduced to a level more in line with management goals. As a result, fewer licenses are available than in some recent seasons. A total of 100 licenses were issued by lottery. The early season is held largely outside the core elk range. In December, hunters are issued licenses for specific units within the core elk range, but hunters may opt to hunt outside the core area as well. If wildlife managers determine the harvest was insufficient to meet management goals, a January hunt will be held with additional licenses available to hunters who have already applied.

Deer

Season: Firearms season is Nov.15-30, statewide. Muzzleloading seasons are Dec. 4-13 in Zone 1 (Upper Peninsula) and Zone 2 (Northern Lower Peninsula) and Dec. 4-20 in Zone 3 (southern Michigan).

A late antlerless hunt in selected Lower Peninsula counties on private land is Dec. 21-Jan. 1. Please see the 2015 Hunting and Trapping Digest and the 2015 Antlerless Deer Digest for per-

The season limit is two bucks. Hunters must purchase a combo license to take two bucks, one of which must have at least four antler points on one side. Hunters who purchase the deer license may harvest a buck with at least one antler that is 3 inches in length unless hunting in an area with antler point restriction. For specific antler point restriction information by location see pages 32 and 33 in the Hunting and Trapping Digest.

Hunters may take one antlerless deer per antlerless deer license. Antlerless licenses are available by quotas for each deer management unit (DMU) by public and private land. In most DMUs, hunters are restricted to five antlerless licenses. IN DMU 487, hunters may buy up to 10 licenses. There is no restriction on antlerless licenses in the nine-township Core Chronic Wasting Disease Area - DMU 333 - that encompasses parts of Ingham, Clinton and Shiawassee counties. Please see the 2015 Antlerless Deer Digest for details.

Outlook: Overall, there is reason for optimism heading into this deer season. Preliminary field reports indicate a good fawn crop and healthy-looking deer. Last year an estimated 614,593 hunters spent 8.8 million days afield, harvesting roughly 329,000 deer, a significant decrease from 2013. Some 41 percent of hunters successfully tagged at least one deer last year.

The deer harvest in the Upper Peninsula is expected to be low again following a series of difficult winters and the subsequent effects on the deer herd. In addition, the population may take longer to rebound due to the number of predators on the landscape. Therefore, new regulation changes aimed at protecting antlerless deer have been enacted, which includes removing the antlerless option from archery season for license and combo license holders.

Prospects in southern Michigan may be improved because of a later-than-usual corn harvest last year. Hunters are reminded that the progress of the corn harvest has an effect on early season hunting results, but the corn harvest is almost always complete by the end of the regular firearms season, and good opportunities remain during muzzleloader, late-archery and lateantlerless seasons. Hunters also are encouraged to bring their deer to check stations. Check the DNR website (www.michigan.gov/deer) for details.

Bobcat

Season: Jan. 1-March 1 in Unit A (Upper Peninsula except Drummond Island); Unit B (Drummond Island); and Unit C (Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Emmett, Montmorency, Oscoda, Otsego and Presque Isle counties). Jan. 1-Feb 1 in Unit D (Clare, Crawford, Gladwin, Iosco, Kalkaska, Missaukee, Ogemaw, Osceola, Roscommon and Wexford counties and Arenac north of M-61 and west of I-75). Jan. 1-11 in unit E (Leelanau, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Manistee, Mason and Lake counties); and Unit F (Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Isabella and Midland counties, the reminder of Arenac County and part of Bay

The limit is two per season, but only one may be taken from Units C, D, E and F combined, and only one may be taken in Unit B.

Outlook: Bobcats are found primarily in the northern two-thirds of Michigan. The population is stable to increasing in the Upper Peninsula, where harvests vary widely because of snow conditions and road access. The population also is stable to increasing in the Lower Peninsula.

Hunters are reminded that in addition to a fur harvester license, they must acquire a (free) bobcat kill tag in advance of hunting. Hunters must immediately apply the kill tag to the animal when they kill a bobcat and the carcass must be presented to a DNR office within 10 days of the close of the season. DNR personnel will collect data including the date of kill, location and method of harvest, and the skull. The bobcat pelt will be sealed by the DNR.

Season: July 15-April 15 statewide. Coyotes may be taken year-round on private property if doing damage or about to do damage. There is no bag limit. Resident hunters may take coyotes on a base hunting license or fur harvester license.

Outlook: Covotes are widespread across the state and abundant in some areas. Retiring, often nocturnal creatures, coyotes may be present in significant numbers without being visible. Coyote hunters in the Upper Peninsula are advised to be cautious not to confuse young wolves for coyotes. Coyotes may be hunted at night, but hunters are restricted to .22 caliber or smaller rifles or handguns, archery gear or crossbows, or shotguns containing shells with shot smaller than buck shot. Check the 2015 Michigan Hunting and Trapping Digest for additional information. Raccoon


Season: Oct. 1-Jan. 31 statewide, though they may be taken year-round on private property if doing or about to do damage. There is no bag limit.

Fox

Season: Oct. 15-March 1. There is no bag limit.

Outlook: Both red and gray fox are found across Michigan. The more numerous red fox are found largely in agricultural areas with mixed habitat, including fence rows, fallow fields and shrub land, especially adjacent to wood lots or waterways. Gray fox typically are found in woodlands. Although they are found in all counties, fox numbers vary widely from abundant

Generally, fox do not compete well with coyotes, so in areas with large coyote populations they may be hard to find. Although they are commonly hunted with hounds, often in conjunction with coyotes, hunting with predator calls has become increasingly popular. Hunters are reminded that they must have a fur harvester license to take fox.





DNR is optimistic CWD can be eliminated in state

Wildlife officials are optimistic, however, that CWD can be eliminated in Michigan and are asking for moose - that attacks the brain, caushunters' assistance.

'Most people right now are on board with what we are doing," he said. "They seem to understand the regulatory changes we've made. Not everyone likes them, but they understand them."

In April, Meridian Township police dispatched a 6-year-old female deer that was exhibiting signs of neurological disease. An initial screening at the DNR Wildlife Disease Laboratory identified the deer as a CWD suspect.

CWD is a type of transmissible spongiform encephalopathy (TSE). The disease is an always fatal affliction for cervids - deer, elk and ing lesions, which leads to emacia-So far, public response has been tion, loss of fear of humans, loss of body control, drooling and, ultimate or virus but by prions, which are

mutated proteins. CWD is spread by animal-to-animal contact with saliva, urine, feces, blood or infected soil. There is no treatment for CWD in deer.

The ailment has never been shown to cause illness in humans. For more than two decades, CWD has been present in free-ranging populations of mule deer and elk in Colorado. During this time, there has been no known occurrence of a human contracting any disease from eating CWD-infected meat.

Because of the occurrence of CWD in other states, the Michigan DNR has been vigilant about testing for the disease. Since 1998, tens of thousands of free-ranging deer have been tested in the state. The Meridian Township deer marked the second time CWD was identified in Michigan. In 2008, a single deer was found to be CWD-positive in a captive cervid facility in Kent County.

With the most recent finding, the DNR immediately instituted a policy that called for reducing deer numbers in the area of the infected deer and testing all deer – those taken by federal animal damage control officials as well as road kills - from the area for CWD.

In July, a two-year-old buck found less than a mile from the initial CWD-positive female tested positive. In August, a five-year-old CWD-positive female was found in close proximity to the other two. Genetic testing showed all three positives were related. Finding deer with CWD within the same extended family is not uncommon. "When we found the first one, we didn't know what we would find," Stewart said. "Given that that deer was symptomatic – it obviously had the disease for some time – we expected to find additional animals. It's encouraging that the ones we're picking up are from the same family group and relatively close to where we found her. But we still have a long road ahead

Extensive testing of deer from the CWD-infected area is ongoing. As of Nov. 13, of the 1,403 deer tested in DMU 333 – and another 337 in the three-county area - only three have been determined to have chronic wasting disease, with a fourth suspect positive waiting final testing.

All 141 tested from other counties have been negative.
