Board approves revised spending plan for 2015-16

Revised budgets can sometimes bring bad news for school officials, but the Cass City Board of Education Monday reviewed new numbers that — in spite of some red ink – may have come as a relief, considering the number of unexpected factors impacting the district's financial picture.

The board, meeting in regular session, reviewed the figures with Chief Financial Officer Allison Zimba, who presented a revised 2015-16 spending plan that revealed a deficit of just \$9,393 in a budget totaling nearly \$10 mil-

The figures, adjusted since the board adopted the budget last June, were affected by several changes, according to Zimba. Among the most important, she pointed out, was a decrease in enrollment – school officials projected 20 fewer students, but the actual number was 35, translating into a loss of nearly \$111,000 in state revenue. The number of children enrolled in Cass City's Great Start Readiness Program is also down, costing some \$10,500.

The new teachers' contract also cost more than anticipated when school officials drafted the budget. Instead of a proposed one-percent pay hike Please turn to page 6.

Police, Kingston School officials hope to identify author of threat by Tom Montgomery noting school was dismissed 10 minpotential harm or criminal activities

Law enforcement officials are continuing their investigation into a written threat that prompted officials in the Kingston Community Schools to initiate a lockdown in the district last Wednesday afternoon.

School officials are also hoping someone will come forward with information leading to the individual(s) responsible for the incident. A number of Thumb schools have dealt with similar situations in recent dents to confidentially report tips on via the OK2SAY website. years.

"I'd like to catch them," school Supt. Matt Drake said following the incident. "It's not fun to be threatened. It disrupts the day, it gets the kids very upset, it gets the parents upset, it gets the staff upset.'

Drake put the high school in "lockdown" mode early Wednesday afternoon after a student reported finding a "general mass threat" written on a bathroom stall.

A note posted on the district's website and Facebook page stated Kingston's administration immediately contacted the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, which worked with Michigan State Police troopers and the Mayville and Kingston police departments to ensure the students and staff were safe.

"Police were on the scene very quickly to perform a visual sweep of the building. Within an hour, the state police arrived with a canine unit and swept the building using a trained dog," school officials said, Cleaver Rd., Caro.

"A suspect has not been identified at this time and the investigation is on-going. If you have the opportunity to talk to your student and they believe that they may know anything that would help us catch the person responsible for this or any crime, they may make an anonymous contact on-line at 'OK2SAY'," The note to parents stated.

OK2SAY is a statewide student safety program which allows stu-

directed at students, school employees and schools. It uses a comprehensive communication system to facilitate tip sharing among students, parents, school personnel, community mental health service programs, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services and law enforcement officials about harmful behaviors.

Foundation sets meeting for those planning to apply for spring grant dollars

Area residents interested in learning how to apply for grant money in conjunction with the Tuscola County Community Foundation's annual spring grant distribution are encouraged to attend an upcoming information meeting.

Ken Micklash, executive director of the foundation, will host the meeting to explain the application process and to answer questions. The session is slated to get underway at 3 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 11, at the Tuscola Technology Center, 1401

"Approximately, \$109,000 will be available to apply for during this upcoming spring grant cycle for eligible Tuscola County organizations," Micklash said. "The meeting will acquaint participants with the community foundation's grant guidelines, its grant application forms and additional details concerning the available funding."

Attendance at the meeting is not required in order to apply for grant funding, but applications must be postmarked by March 1.

Funding available for the spring distribution will come from the following funds:

*Janks Fund — \$50,000 (for unrestricted projects).

*Andrews Fund — \$15,000 (chil-

dren's activities). *Future Youth Involvement (FYI)

Fund — \$30,000 (youth programs). *Homelessness Fund — \$1,800 (to aid the homeless in Tuscola County).

*Healthy Youth/Healthy Seniors Fund — \$4,000 (tobacco cessation). *Founders Fund — \$2,700 (unrestricted projects).

*Greater Millington Area Fund - \$5,000 (projects for the betterment of the Millington community). *Anne S. Laethem Fund — \$500

(preservation of historic buildings in Tuscola County). *Don List Fund for Special Needs

Children — \$800 (to provide for

The Tuscola County Community Foundation was founded in 1998 with three funds. Today, foundation officials oversee more than 90 funds - roughly half of them scholarships. The foundation boasts assets of more than \$10 million, with combined annual distributions of about \$450,000 via spring and fall grant

The foundation's combined assets include more than \$900,000 in funds established by Cass City area residents and organizations.


The incident occurred Jan. 10, but details were not released until Monday morning.



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

Frigid weather can threaten life, limb

Thumb area residents have been getting a healthy portion of the sort of arctic-like cold Michigan is known for this time of year, and although milder weather may return now and then, chances are good the winter of 2016 will bring more in the way of frigid temperatures and bone-chilling breezes.

Which is why officials with the Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD), are reminding everyone to be extra cautious when going out in the cold.

Exposure to extremely cold temperatures could potentially cause frostbite and hypothermia, as well as create hazardous driving conditions.

To stay safe during cold weather:

*Stay indoors if possible. If you must go outside, wear protective gear — hats, mittens and gloves, etc. — in addition to a warm coat. Always protect your lungs with a scarf.

*Understand the hazards of wind chill. As wind speed increases, heat is carried away from a person's body more rapidly and could lead to severe hypothermia.

*Watch for signs of frostbite, which include loss of feeling or pale appearance of fingers, toes or face. A wind chill of 20 degrees below zero can cause frostbite in just 30 minutes.

Frostbite is an injury to the body that is caused by freezing, causing a loss of feeling and color in affected areas. It most often affects the nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers, or toes. Frostbite, indicated by a white or grayish-yellow skin area, skin that feels unusually firm or waxy, and numbness, can permanently damage the body, and severe cases can lead to amputation.

*Watch for signs of hypothermia, which include uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, drowsiness, and bright red, cold skin.

When exposed to cold temperatures, the body begins to lose heat faster than it can be produced. The result is hypothermia, or abnormally low body temperature. Body temperature that is too low affects the brain, making the victim unable to think clearly or move well. This makes hypothermia particularly dangerous because a person may not know it is happening and won't be able to do anything about it.

Hypothermia occurs most commonly at very cold environmental temperatures, but can occur even at cool temperatures (above 40°F) if a person becomes chilled from rain, sweat, or submersion in cold water.

*Weather-proof doors and windows to trap heat inside your

*Check heating units. Poorly operating or damaged heating units can release carbon monoxide gas. Test carbon monoxide detectors for proper operation and battery life.

*Check on family, friends and neighbors who are at risk and may need additional assistance.

*Watch pets closely and keep them indoors when possible. Animals can suffer from hypothermia, frostbite and other cold weather injuries.

*Check and restock your emergency preparedness kit. If you don't have a kit, make one.

*Minimize travel. If travel is necessary, keep a full tank of gas and an emergency preparedness kit in your vehicle. Put warm clothing — such as gloves, blankets and hats — in your kit in case you become stranded.

Michigan weather is unpredictable any time of year, but especially during the winter months. If you are stranded, do not leave your vehicle. Stay with the vehicle and wait for

"A requested search warrant was issued and additional illegal controlled substances were found in the 7100 block of Maplegrove Road," Johnson reported. "The search warrant at the residence resulted in seizure of marijuana, plants, illegal prescription pills, suspected Ecstasy, cocaine, and packaging materials supporting drug sales along with over \$1,500 in cash.

"The 43-year-old driver/residence occupant was transported to the Sanilac County Sheriff's Corrections Division for booking and was released pending lab analysis of the seized drugs."

Earlier this month, the drug team assisted the Sandusky Police Department on a suspected heroin overdose death Jan. 11 at an apartment located on South Morse Street in Sandusky.

"Investigators obtained a search warrant and recovered suspected heroin, prescription medications, marijuana and other drug paraphernalia that may be tied into the death of a 36-year-old Deckerville man," Johnson said.

A lesson in fixing what isn't broken

I wonder why some folks feel the need to fix things that simply aren't broken.

The thought occurred to me recently when I flipped on what has been my go-to radio station for years – 96.1FM WHNN – and found myself listening to the sort of modern mamby pamby, pablum puking, did-someone-actually-pay-this-person-to-record-this crap that I avoid like the plague.

What happened to my "oldies" station? Actually, I've never been fond of that term. Seems to me the hits of the past should be called classics.

But I digress.

And what happened to veteran morning radio personalities Johnny Burke and Blondie?

The answer to the first question is an abrupt format change sprung on listeners, announced as the all new "My 96.1... The Best Variety of Yesterday and Today."

No. thanks.

The answer to the second question is the apparent surprise and unceremonious dismissal of both Johnny and Blondie after years of service to the station and its listeners.

Why?

While the powers that be are droning on and on about their new "evolutionary" format, they don't appear to be any more interested in explaining their decisions than they've been to acknowledge the social media backlash that has followed.

That's okay, I'll take a shot at it. I'm guessing maybe they figured they could draw in some younger listeners and, presumably, boost ad sales. Times are tough these days for media companies all over, so I get that. But did they really take a hard look at how many of us oldies in their audience they would lose in the process? If the gamble turns out to be a wash or worse, what have they gained? More importantly, what have they lost?

Whether or not you liked the Johnny or Blondie show, there's a reason these two have been drawing in listeners for all these years: a lot of people liked their show. It was a niche, full of variety, that WHNN's competitors haven't been able to compete with. Well, up until now. The station's focus on classic rock was also niche.

If the change in format wasn't enough to send listeners to other stations – you know, the ones that have been doing what WHNN is now also doing – I'm betting the way the media executives in this case treated their employees has offended a chunk of the station's now-former audience, even those listeners whose feathers were ruffled by Burke's own tendency to be abrupt on the air at times.

And if listeners are abandoning the oldies ship in droves, what about the station's advertisers? Can they afford to ignore listeners?

Can't be all that comfortable for the remaining employees, either. I mean, if the suits upstairs can dump a pair of veteran broadcasters (seemingly) that quickly, how secure can their jobs be?

I initially thought I might be overreacting a bit. Then I logged onto WHNN's Facebook page, which has been bombarded with blistering comments from listeners, with a majority of those speaking out saying their goodbyes to what's left of WHNN.

As for this oldie – er, classic – I've joined the ranks of music lovers now in search of another radio station, hopefully one run by people who aren't tempted to fix what isn't broken.

(\$40,000), the new labor agreement included .75 of a step and a .75-percent raise (\$95,000), Zimba said, and the district spent \$7,800 more than expected in legal expenses due to lengthened contract negotiations.

Zimba noted school officials also opted to reduce the district's staff sick day payout liability by an extra \$26,000. A number of teachers have "banked" 100 days in sick pay, and the additional payment will reduce that

On the positive side, the district has sold the former Campbell Elementary School building, bringing in roughly \$49,000, and revenues were higher than anticipated in the areas of property taxes (up \$9,000) and athletics (\$12,000, with an additional \$5,000 from the Cass City Gavel Club).

Zimba reported the sale of Campbell saved an estimated \$10,000 in anticipated utility bills, offsetting expenditures in lighting upgrades at the elementary and high schools, and excavation work at the elementary.

Under the revised 2015-16 spending plan, Zimba reported the district began the fiscal year with a fund balance of just over \$1.4 million and is expected to end the year with nearly \$1.4 million, or an amount equal to 14.21 percent of expenditures.

M-STEP SCORES

Turning to academics, elementary school Principal Aaron Fernald and high school Principal Chad Daniels briefly discussed Michigan schools' longawaited inaugural M-STEP (Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress)

Both indicated school officials were generally pleased with the scores, but pointed out the data provided to districts by the state so far has left them with more questions than answers.

Fernald acknowledged Cass City's elementary scores were among the highest in Tuscola County, but noted there were weak areas, particularly among fifth graders in English-language arts and math.

Fernald pointed out the scoring doesn't make sense in some areas. For example, he said, students who scored 80 percent or better in social studies were not deemed proficient in the subject, while those who correctly answered 50 percent of the questions in math were deemed proficient.

Daniels indicated getting answers to those sorts of questions is frustrating, but that administrators and staff are forging ahead with ideas to help students learn the subject matter they are expected to understand, based on the new standardized testing program.

"I'm happy with the scores," Daniels said. Can we do better? Yes."

M-STEP is the state's new standardized student assessment exam. It replaced the bubble-based, multiple-choice MEAP (Michigan Education Assessment Program) exam that Michigan school officials have administered for the past 44 years.

The M-STEP, administered for the first time in the spring of 2015, tested students in the areas of English language arts, mathematics, science and social studies.

Statewide, the results were less than impressive. Just 12 percent of Michigan fourth graders tested proficient in science; the highest proficiency rate was in the third grade language arts at just 50 percent; and in math, proficiency ranged from 28 percent among high school juniors to 49 percent in third grade.

State and local education officials said they anticipated scores would be low initially. However, Cass City School Supt. Jeff Hartel reported local students performed well in a number of subject areas and grade levels.

"(We) did very well in third and sixth grade, scoring well above state and county schools in both math and English language arts," Hartel said. "Modest results were also achieved in seventh grade, scoring above county and state schools in math and science, but below county and state schools in English language arts.

"Improvement is needed in fifth grade and eighth grade," Hartel continued, adding students scored below both county and state schools on math and English language arts. Eighth graders scored above county and state students in social studies, while fifth grade students scored below their peers at the county and state levels in social studies.

"Eleventh grade MME (scores) showed great results in math and English language arts, scoring above both county and state schools in both area," Hartel said. "However, science results showed us below county and state schools, and social studies showed us ahead of county schools but below state schools."

IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business during the regular monthly meeting Monday night, the

*Heard a report from veteran teacher Lloyd Schinnerer on a relatively new program called the "Social Studies Power Hour", which requires seventh and eighth grade students who fail to complete homework assignments to do so during their lunch hours in a monitored classroom setting twice a week.

The program was implemented to instill in students a work ethic that encourages them to complete unfinished assignments for partial grades rather than settling for a failing grade. "That's what so many of the kids want to do – they don't want to do the work. They take the zeros, and the zeros just kill their grades," Schinnerer told the board.

"I feel it's been successful. I think overall the failures are down," added Schinnerer, who says he sometimes has as many as 30 or 40 kids in attendance during the lunch hour sessions. "It needed to be done, and hopefully these kids will begin to catch on to these skills.'

*Approved a resolution urging repeal of Senate Bill 571, which was included in campaign finance reform legislation at the last minute in December and subsequently signed into law by Gov. Rick Snyder.

Critics of Senate Bill 571 say the legislation, in effect, implements a gag order on local schools and municipalities when it comes to discussing upcoming ballot proposals. The law now prohibits any public body from using tax dollars in any form – via phone calls, emails or any other form of communication – to openly discuss a proposal within 60 days of the election.

*Held its annual reorganization meeting, which included election of officers. Re-elected were President Alice Zaleski, Vice President Craig Bellew, Treasurer Dave Osentoski and Secretary Janie Meeker.

*Noted school officials will be holding mandatory bid meetings for the three-year lease of 32 acres of district-owned farmland (Wednesday, Feb. 3) and for a three-year contract for the district's trash pick-up and recycling (Thursday, Feb. 4). Bids for both contracts will be opened Wednesday, Feb. 17, at 3:30 p.m.

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Village of Cass City, Michigan Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for 2015

In 1996, Congress amended the Safe Drinking Water Act. This legislation added a provision requiring all community water systems deliver to their customers a brief Annual Water Quality Report.

The Village of Cass City is pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the water quality and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is, and always has been, to provide a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. The Village of Cass City obtains its water from three different municipal wells. All three wells are located in the Village Park, at the east end of town. Wells No. 1 and No. 2, located just east of the tennis courts, were installed in 1946. They are 290 feet and 240 feet deep respectively. Well No. 3 is located on the west side of the volleyball courts. Well No. 3 was installed in 1998 and extends to a depth of 311 feet. All three municipal wells are drilled into the bedrock of the Michigan Formation. The Village now has the capacity to pump 1,656,000 gallons of water per day.

On January 23, 2006 the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) lowered the MCL(Maximum Contaminant Level) for arsenic from 50 ppb to 10ppb. The Village of Cass City did not meet the new Arsenic standard. An arsenic removal plant was constructed by the village to meet the new standard. On April 18, 2007 the Village started supplying water that exceeds the new standard of 10ppb. The arsenic was reduced from a high of 29ppb to under 5ppb.

The State of Michigan has produced a Source Water Assessment for each of the Village's wells. This Assessment reports the susceptibility of our water supply sources to contamination. The susceptibility score is broken down into 7 categories. Very Low, Low, Moderately Low, Moderate, Moderately High, High, or Very High. The score, given by the State, for all three of the Village wells, is **Moderately High**. The susceptibility rating is based primarily on geologic sensitivity, water chemistry and contaminant sources. The complete Source Water Assessment is available by contacting the Village office.

This report shows our water quality and what it means to you, our customers. Copies of the report are not mailed directly to each individual customer. Customers may request a paper copy from the village office at 6506 Main Street, Cass City, MI., 48726 or by calling (989) 872-2911

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. As water travels over the land or underground, it can pick up substances or contaminants such as microbes, inorganic and organic chemicals, and radioactive substances. The Village of Cass City routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The Village has conducted tests for over 150 different contaminants, on each municipal well and throughout the system. The following table shows the results of the most recent monitoring for 2015.

TERMS AND ABBREVIATIONS USED IN TABLE BELOW

Non-Detects - (ND) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present. **Parts Per Million** - (ppm) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts Per Billion - (ppb) - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Maximum Contaminant Level - (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water . MCL are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual disinfectant Level - (MRDL) is the highest level of free chlorine allowed in the distribution system.

Action Level - (AL) is the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Picocuries per liter - (pCi/l) picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

The State of Michigan allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of our water quality, but some are more than one year old. The tables below represent the most current testing information available.

POTENTIAL HEALTH CONCERNS FOR CONTAMINANTS LISTED IN TABLES ABOVE

<u>Arsenic</u> - Some people who drink water containing arsenic in excess of the MCL over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing arsenic in excess of the MCL, over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

<u>Barium</u> - Some people who drink water containing barium in excess of the MCL, over many years could experience an increase in their blood pressure.

<u>Chlorine</u> - Some people who use water containing chlorine well in excess of the MRDL could experience irritating effects to their eyes and nose. Some people who drink water containing chlorine well in excess of the MRDL could experience stomach discomfort.

<u>Copper</u> - Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor

<u>Fluoride</u> - Some people who drink water containing fluoride in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

Lead – If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of Cass City is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. <u>Total Trihalomethanes</u> - Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous systems, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Radiological Contaminants

<u>Gross Alpha</u> - Certain minerals are radioactive and may emit a form of radiation known as alpha radiation. Some people who drink water containing alpha emitters in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

<u>Radium 226/228</u> - Some people who drink water containing radium 226 or 228 in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Contaminants Not Regulated by The State of Michigan

Unregulated Contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. Monitoring helps EPA to determine where these contaminants occur and whether it needs to regulate those contaminants. Potential health concerns are not listed for these contaminants.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or man-made. These substances can be:

Microbial Contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.

Radioactive contaminants, are naturally occurring, or can be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public systems. The FDA regulates contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

MCL's (Maximum Contaminant Levels) are set at very stringent standards. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated contaminants, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime, to have a "one-in-a-million chance" of experiencing the described health effect.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. 
The trailer also contained miscellaneous power tools, according to McComb, who said investigators have not determined if the trailer was

Survey reveals Tuscola Courthouse users felt they received fair, prompt treatment

Not surprisingly, a number of people who come into contact with the Tuscola County court system aren't thrilled with how their cases turn out, but a majority of those participating in a recent survey agreed their treatment was fair and expeditious.

And this isn't the first time such a survey resulted in praise for how the local court system operates.

According to the survey, "Overwhelming majorities of customers said that Tuscola County's judiciary was fair, dealt with their case in a timely fashion, and treated them with courtesy and respect."

"For a third consecutive year, court customers in Tuscola County said they are satisfied with their experiences with the Tuscola County trial courts, according to Adam D. Pavlik, Tuscola County Circuit Court administrator.

"As part of a statewide survey, the Tuscola County trial courts asked court users about their level of satisfaction with court services," Pavlik explained. "Overwhelming majorities of customers said that Tuscola County's judiciary was fair, dealt with their case in a timely fashion, and treated them with

'We are extremely pleased to have gotten such positive feedback from the public we serve," said Tuscola County Chief Judge Amy Grace Gierhart. "When you consider that the nature of our work usually leaves one side or the other dissatisfied with the outcome, it is a remarkable accomplishment that the vast majority of court users come away feeling like they were treat-

The survey results included several areas of strength: 95 percent of user's surveys reported they were treated with courtesy and respect by court staff, 88 percent stated they were able to get their business done in a timely fashion, and 82 percent reported they felt that their case was handled fairly.

"Of course, we recognize there is always room to improve," Gierhart said. "However, only 54 percent of survey respondents said their case was resolved in a fashion that was favorable to them. We are very pleased that we are courteously helping people deal with their court business in a timely fashion, whether or not they are pleased with the outcome in their specific

The survey was developed with input from judges and court administrators around the state, and was offered to a broad range of court users, from litigants and attorneys to jurors and people simply observing court proceedings, according to Pavlik, who noted the project is an initiative of the State Court Administrative Office, which tabulated the results.

The Public Satisfaction Survey program is one of a variety of initiatives being pursued by the Michigan Supreme Court to measure court performance in Michigan. Statewide results for the 2015 survey will be available at http://courts.mi.gov.

additional land if deemed necessary."

Other goals include providing facilities and programming to the community at current levels that allow for social interaction for all ages, plus continuing to improve and upgrade the facilities while improving marketing of recreational programs to the community.

"Park facilities are among the most visible indicators of a community's identity and pride, as well as local tax dollars at work," said Cristiano, who emphasized the need to keep park facilities safe and well maintained, and add support facilities to improve the ease of use, especially for people with disabilities, by making sure all improvements and upgrades, where feasible, are barrier free.

Yet another goal of the parks and recreational plan is to improve the health and fitness of local residents.

"Because there are limited opportunities for fitness in the area, the village wants to offer facilities that will allow residents to enjoy the benefits of physical fitness," Cristiano said.

Future improvements to the park call for improved sand at the volleyball courts, construction of a splash park, renovation of the bathhouse, construction of an enclosure for the pool, replacement of old playground equipment, renovation of the tennis courts, installation of a surveillance system, improvement of existing trails, construction of an ice ring, and paving and improving existing roads.

"The capital improvements are not a fixed element and are neither all-inclusive nor exclusive. Goals are the broadest level. They are overreaching and general. They merely reflect the results from input by village staff, board members and input from the community," said Cristiano, noting the plans will most likely be amended at some point in the future due to unanticipated circumstances and available funding.

Two steps have to be completed before the Parks and Recreation Master Plan can be used to apply for any grants through the state. Step one has been completed with the public review having been held Jan. 8. The second step calls for a public hearing to be held Monday, Feb. 8, at 1 p.m.at the village

While the five-year master plan is a work in process, equipment for the Helen Stevens Memorial Pool was approved during the half-hour session. Through the efforts of Trustee Nancy Barrios, Village Treasurer Nanette Walsch and DPW Superintendent Gary Barns, a matching grant was obtained in the amount of \$4,500 for the purchase of picnic tables, umbrellas and benches for the crown jewel of the park.

"The total cost of this equipment is \$8,647. With the Tuscola match, the cost to the village is \$4,147," said Barrios.

Also Monday, Barrios' motion for the purchase of playgroup equipment – an Aiden's Pass Play System with slides, swings and riding toys - was unanimously approved.

Once again, a matching grant obtained from the Pinney Foundation in the amount of \$5,000 will reduce the cost to the village to just \$3,351.
