With lack of grocery

Village officials: we are frustrated, too

Cass City Village officials say they're every bit as frustrated as the community's residents over the continued lack of a grocery store in town, especially after a Thumb businessman purchased the former Erla's Food Center building last fall and announced plans to eventually open a grocery in the

What many people don't understand is the amount of time and pre-planning work that goes into the process of opening a business, starting with ironing out all of the details involved in making a multi-million dollar investment, according to Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) Executive Director Steve Erickson.

Erickson was among the speakers during the fifth annual Farm Market Day, held Friday at the Cass City Municipal Building. The event included an announcement by Greater Thumb Agribusiness Corp. officials, who said plans are set for a year-round, indoor farmers' market to open in mid-May in a former Save-A-Lot store building on Frank Street in Caro.

The news prompted a local business in attendance, Bud Schneeberger of

Foundry in a Box gives O-G students taste of metal casting process

Owen-Gage students recently enjoyed an opportunity to try their hand at creating metal castings in conjunction with a program designed to spark interest in the craft among the next generation of engineers and technicians. The American Foundry Society (AFS), Saginaw Valley Chapter (SVC), visited Owen-Gage Schools and presented an educational, hands-on activity called "Foundry in a Box".

"This unique experience was created to get the next generation of engineers and technicians excited about Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (TEM), and this one associated career – called castings," explained Mary Ann Minkler, administrative assistant at Owen-Gage.

"A 'Foundry in a Box' is just what it sounds like; a portable foundry," Minkler said. "The goal of this experience is to teach youth what a foundry and metal melting are all about."

CPR in state schools simply a no-brainer

The American Heart Association recently brought together more than 60 volunteers from across Michigan to meet lawmakers and urge them to support the CPR in Schools legislation, which would ensure that all Michigan students learn the life-saving skill of CPR.

Many of the volunteers were everyday people whose lives have been impacted by CPR.

Melissa Johnson, whose fiancé passed away just two and a half years ago, was among the volunteers who spoke with lawmakers.

"When my fiancé went into cardiac arrest while playing basketball with some of his students, they waited for eight minutes until emergency responders arrived because none of them knew CPR, and the young people and myself are still haunted by the guilt and the 'what ifs,'" said Johnson. "I'm meeting with lawmakers today as a way of honoring the legacy of my fiancé who was referred to as 'Coach' and 'Superman,' in hopes that this legislation will prepare the next generation of students to save lives."

Nearly 357,000 people have cardiac arrest outside of a hospital every year, and only eight percent survive.

CPR can nearly triple survival rates for cardiac arrest by providing assistance until EMTs arrive. If a victim doesn't get help within the first three to five minutes, brain damage may begin to occur. That's why bystander CPR is so critical.

"As a CPR trainer, former teacher and coach for 37 years, and a father who had to perform CPR on my 6year-old son, I've seen first-hand how CPR can save lives," state Rep. Thomas Hooker (R-Byron Center) said. "Having our kids trained in CPR will become enemy, endurance during combat, conquering the increasingly important as Baby Boomers continue to age. Today's students could be tomorrow's lifesavers.

Hooker and Sen. Schuitmaker are sponsoring HB 5160 and SB 647 to make that a reality by requiring all of the state's schools to provide CPR training to students before they receive a high school diploma.

If every high school student in Michigan learned CPR before graduation, Michigan would gain 100,000 more qualified lifesavers each year. Twenty-eight states have already passed similar laws to ensure that every high school student is CPR-trained before graduation. Cardiac arrest survival rates have increased in the states and communities in which students are taught

"Contrary to belief, you don't need to be a professional to perform CPR, and even young people are capable of learning and performing CPR correctly," said Brad Uren, an emergency room physician. "Fire, police and ambulance agencies and healthcare professionals like myself are enthusiastic about working with schools to educate our students in the life-saving skill of CPR."

The legislation is supported by the American Heart Association, Michigan Association of Ambulance Services, Michigan College of Emergency Physicians, Michigan Emergency Nurses Association, Michigan Fraternal Order of Police, Michigan State Medical Society and more.

We support it, too. In an age when so many educationrelated proposals and mandates make little sense, this one is a no-brainer, one that could mean the difference between life and death for someone special in your life.

It's always nice to get away on vacation. And it's always nice to come home.

The latter, however, almost didn't happen for me Friday night as the Haires attempted to fly home from the Denver International Airport, capping a week of holiday time spent out west.

We - Kacey, Parker, Karen and I - arrived at the Denver airfield plenty early to make our flight home on Spirit Airlines. The time to spare came in handy as Transportation Security Administration (TSA) personnel made certain the family patriarch wasn't a terrorist threat before allowing me to board the 8:20 p.m. flight

The TSA screening process started harmless enough. After passing through the first check point where flight plan and boarding passes are verified, I slipped off my shoes, removed my belt, and put anything that I thought might trip the "millimeter wave advanced imaging technology" alarm into a plastic bin. That tub was then x-rayed before the contents could be returned. Millimeter wave advanced imaging technology safely screens passengers without physical contact for metallic and non-metallic threats, including weapons and explosives, which may be concealed under clothing.

Meanwhile, another screening process required me to walk through a stand-up metal detector. After doing so, things got a little more interesting.

Evidently, a gray-haired, 195-pound man, dressed in Carhartt jeans, was too much of a safety risk and needed additional testing. So, I was told to turn my palms over and they were quickly swabbed. Approximately five minutes later, I was informed there were traces of explosive discovered. That led to a pat-down screening by a pair of TSA officials in a different and private location.

"Assume the airplane position," said one of the same gender TSA officers.

Halfway through the scrutiny, my jeans (remember I had taken off my belt) started to slip towards the floor. "Hold up your pants," instructed the other TSA bureaucrat.

That confused things. "I can't assume the airplane at future meetings and would appreciate your input in position and hold unto my pants at the same time," was my response to the nearly apologetic TSA representatives, who I thanked for helping to keep our airways sor; Joann Peters, clerk; Val Peters, treasurer; and

Anyway, while waiting for the test results, the TSA folks told me "If this search confirms the presence of explosive materials, you will need to talk to some scary

It didn't, and our flight back to Michigan was smooth sailing going forward.







Schneeberger's Furniture and Appliance, to express his frustration with having no grocery store locally, especially for those senior citizens in the community with limited means when it comes to traveling to other communities to shop.

"I want to know what you're going to do in Cass City," Schneeberger said. "They (seniors) can't even buy the fruits and vegetables they need here. We need something done, and not wait three, four or five years to get something done."

Erickson responded, saying county EDC officials work with local units of government to support business ventures – new ones as well as those involving relocation or expansion by seeking out grant opportunities and other resources. But in the end, he pointed out, "We're not the guys who turn the dirt. We're not the investors. All we can do is work to move the (process) forward."

Erickson, who also serves as a Cass City Village Council trustee, later noted that he is working closely with Cass City Village Manager Peter Cristiano in offering assistance to Jim Zyrowski, president of Ben's Supercenter Inc., who last fall conthe Erla's building.

were sold via an online auction, and officials have said Zyrowski would like to construct a new store on property located across from the Shell station on the former Croft Clara property along Main Street. Negotiations reportedly are underway with Frankenmuth Credit Union, which now owns the land and recently installed an ATM there.

Cristiano suggested during a regular council meeting last week that it could be another year or two before Cass City residents will have a grocery store, but both he and Erickson say they're hoping it will happen sooner.

"We're all frustrated, but it's not our fault that the previous owner (of Erla's) closed," said Erickson, who pointed out it's a challenge to get businessmen to come into a community and invest, especially when rumors circulate regarding big box stores looking to locate in nearby communities. At the same time, he added, anyone looking to invest must follow certain time-consuming steps, such as completing the market stud-

DNR: 2 additional deer tested positive for CWD

positive deer was a nine-month-old male from Meridian Township (Ingham County), and the other was a 2 ³/₄-year-old female from Watertown Township (Clinton County).

Since May 2015, nearly 4,900 deer have been tested for CWD. Seven of these have tested positive for the dis-

At this time, samples are being collected through road-kill pickup and professional sharpshooters from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Wildlife Services. Since the initial case was confirmed, four of the last six positives were collected through efforts of USDA Wildlife Services staff.

In all total, sharpshooters have collected just over 630 deer from the Core CWD Area, which includes nine townships. Of those, 467 deer were taken from Meridian Township, 108 from Williamstown Township, 41 from Bath Township, 12 from Lansing Township, six from DeWitt Township, and none from the remaining townships. Another 33 have been taken outside the core from Watertown Township.

"The partnership with area landowners and USDA Wildlife Services is a critical component of our surveillance efforts to determine the distribution of this fatal disease," said Chad Stewart, DNR deer specialist. "Now, with these additional CWD-positive deer, that support is needed more than ever."

"The intensive removal of deer in these areas has a two-part benefit," Stewart added. "One, it helps us understand prevalence rates and spread so we can make informed decisions on disease management moving forward; and two, by removing individual deer around areas with known disease occurrence, it reduces the potential for spread and accumulation in our deer herd, which has benefits not only locally, but on the periphery of the management zone as well.'

To-date, there is no evidence that chronic wasting disease presents any risk to non-cervids, including humans, either through contact with an infected animal or from handling

animals.

Cecelia Irene Orban passed away peacefully on March 26, 2016 at her home in Adrian, Michigan.



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Baker program gives students a jump on college education

A new Baker College initiative is increasing emphasis on giving Michigan high school students a running start on their college education.

Under the program, called Running Start, students earn college credit, at no cost to them, and graduate high school ready for college, careers and community. Running Start bundles state-sanctioned programs that allow high school students to earn college credit — early/middle college, direct credit, dual enrollment and articulation — under one umbrella.

"This change is in response to the considerable increase in the number of secondary school administrators interested in college-credit programs for their students," said Bart Daig, Ph.D., Baker College System president and CEO. "Our goal with Running Start is to make it easy for administrators to sign up and implement the programs they select.

'As a private, not-for-profit organization, Baker College can be highly flexible. We can quickly adapt and tailor a program to meet the need of an individual school district," Daig added.

Baker College has eight early/middle school colleges operational through its campuses in Auburn Hills, Cadillac, Flint, Jackson and Owosso. That number will likely double during the next few months.

Enrollment in Baker College's direct credit program is also increasing. An example is the program through Baker College of Cadillac. In 2011, approximately 200 students were participating; today nearly 1,100 in the same area are earning college credit in high school.

The students save hundreds of dollars in tuition and other college costs in Running Start programs because the courses are subsidized by the sponsoring school districts. Credits earned through the programs may also shorten the time required to complete the students' college education beyond high

Another benefit is increasing college readiness, according to Peni Aldrich, Ph.D., director of Running Start.

"High school students introduced to the challenges of college have the support of high school and college resources," she said. "They will be better prepared to succeed in college after high school."

The Running Start programs are:

*Early/middle college is a five-year high school program in which students can earn a high school diploma and substantial college credit – up to 60 credit hours, even an associate degree.

*Direct credit offers Baker College courses at a high school, technical center or site other than a Baker College campus. These courses may count for high school or college credit, or both.

*Dual enrollment allows students to take high school courses at their school and college courses at a Baker College campus.

*Articulation provides college credit for students who demonstrate skills and competencies learned in designated high school courses in which they received a grade B or better at participating schools and enter Baker College within two years of course completion.

"Secondary school administrators are interested in these programs because they understand that earning a postsecondary credential, whether it's a certificate or doctorate or anything in between, is required in today's knowledge-based economy," Aldrich said.

"Our Running Start programs provide higher education that's definitely affordable for more students. When the students gain confidence that they can succeed in college, they will more likely pursue higher education following high school.

Aldrich said a big part of the success of these programs lies in choosing students capable of meeting the challenges. "Selecting students who can handle college curricula is key," she added. "It is rigorous; these are college
