## Still takes a village to protect our kids

If it takes a village to raise a child, it also takes a vil lage to protect a child, and that reality is never more important than when a child is being abused or neglected.
Preventing child abuse is a community responsibility that needs involvement from all Michiganders, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) officials say.
Throughout this month, the MDHHS is reminding people that they can help protect children from abuse and neglect.
"Michigan's children can be protected through the power of one person, one community, one dollar or one action," said Michael Foley, executive director of the Children's Trust Fund, a nonprofit group within MDHHS established to prevent child abuse and neglect.
Gov. Rick Snyder proclaimed April as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Michigan, making it the 32nd year that April has had that official designation.
Michigan had 23,813 confirmed cases of child abuse or neglect in fiscal year 2015

According to Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette's office, the state saw 284 complaints last year involving a child that may have died as a result of possible abuse and/or neglect, with 74 of those cases substantiated that the death was caused by parental abuse. Nationally, child abuse and neglect data for 2014 indicated the number of children abused and neglected increased by three percent. The same national statistics revealed that roughly 70 percent of child abuse cases involved children under the age of three, and in 80 percent of the cases, parents were the perpetrators. In cases of human trafficking, 40 percent of the cases involved the sexual exploitation of a child.
Residents can prevent abuse by working as a community to create healthy environments for raising chil dren, according to Foley.
"They can also promote preventive factors to strengthen families - including family resiliency, social support systems, nurturing and attachment and knowledge of parenting and child development. Or they can donate money to prevention efforts and report suspected abuse or neglect using an anonymous state hotline that is answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week, he said.
The toll-free number in Michigan is 1-855-444-3911. The hotline is available to everyone in Michigan, including the general public and mandatory reporters such as teachers and health professionals, who are required to report suspected child abuse or neglect.
"Tips from the public are crucial in identifying situations in which children are being harmed or are at risk," says Steve Yager, executive director of the MDHHS Children's Services Agency. "Once we are alerted, we can take action to provide services to families to keep them together safely or, when necessary,, petition courts to remove children from unsafe homes.'
There's never a good reason to abuse or neglect a child, but sadly it happens all too frequently. If you see a youngster who needs your help, report it. Not getting involved should never be an option, especially if you have good reason to believe a young life is in danger. Make that call. You could save a life.

Continued from page one. of giving up a day's pay, "and you're not going to make it up at $\$ 8$ an hout,
he added, referring to a fireman's pay rate. A lack of attendance for fire and accident runs is most acute during regula
business hours. "For Cass City, 10 years ago you'd have 10 to 12 guys show up for a day
time fire. Today, you have three, maybe four," said Guilds, whose depart ment totals 22 members, most of whom work outside the community, "We're in the same situation. I think everybody in the county is," commented Caro Fire Chief Randy Heckroth, who oversees a department boast-
ing 25 firefighters. "For a daytime fire, we're going to be close to five (fire men on hand) - that's first shift for a lot of guys - and to get that first truck out, you need six."
"It puts everyb.
"It puts everybody at risk. It puts everybody at a liability, and it puts a
restraint on what we can ", "Gilds said He and Heckroth restraint on what we can do," Guilds said. He and Heckroth explained that
for every fireman who enters a structure, there must be a firefighter outside for every fireman who enters a structure, there must be a firefighter outside
the structure. "We can't make an interior attack (of the blaze) until we have more people there," Guilds added. "All we can do is fight it from the out-
side."

The two chiefs agreed it isn't easy to maintain volunteer fire department membership rolls these days.
Among the trends that have hut Thumb fire department recruiting eff is a shrinking population, according to Guilds. "We lose a daycare, we lose
our grocery story, our school enrollment is down. When parents leave the area, we're losing our youth, and a lot of the times it's the youth who are joining the fire department," he said
"I've probably gotten, in the last year, maybe three applications," added
Guilds, a veteran firefighter of nearly 27 years whose Guilds, a veteran firefighter of nearly 27 years whose membership includes
perhaps, a half-dozen firefighters under the age of 30 , with the majority of perhaps, a half-dozen firefig.

Heckroth, who joined the Caro Fire Department in 1991 and has served as

not fill that void for daytime fires." On the other hand, Heckroth added, it's the experienced firemen who deserve a lot of credit in terms of sharing their experience with younger

Making the decision to become a volunteer firefighter is one thing -a willingness to complete the training and follow through with the job's other obligations is another, especially at a pay rate of $\$ 8$ to $\$ 9$ an hour.
According to Heckroth, who serves as a certified fire instructor for the Tuscola County Fire Instructors Association, which teaches the Michiga State Firefighters Training Council curriculum to trainees in Tuscola County
most of today's volunters must complete Level II training consisting of 295 hours plus a specialized six-hour driver's training course and 16 hours of NIMS (National Incident Management System) training. Once they finish,
those trainees are qualified to apply for firefighting positions anywhere in those trainees are qualified to apply for firefighting positions anywhere in
the state, he noted the state, he noted In addition to fire and accident runs, he explained, there is mandatory monthly training, plus the time members volunteer for fire prevention and fundraising activities.
As for the job itself, firefighters live with the reality of being on-call 2

Once that information is recorded, when a participating resident dials 911 for help, their safety profile will immediately display on the call taker' screen.
"It's definitely a positive tool," said Guilds. For example, he added, the new system tells a responding fire department how many people live inside a residence and whether any of them have special medical needs. Resident can even include a floor plan of their homes in their safety profiles, he said
and fire fighters can have additional or specialized equiment dispatched to and fire fighters can have additio
a scene more quickly if needed.
"It also makes it safer for the people responding," Guilds said. He
explained that explained that knowing the location of hazardous or flammable materials on a property could prevent additional accidents, as well as indicate whethe emergency responders should evacuate a neighborhood or area. fighter is sent into a home that appears to be inhabited, but isn't, he said. "The possibilities of this (system) are countless. We really encourage everybody to sign up for it," Guilds continued. "It's just a no-brainer. Th more knowledge we have, the better decision we can make."
Residents can do their part to avoid tragedy in a fire by also preparing for
the worst, Heckroth said, adding, "They're biggest weapon is smoke detectors, and then get out and stay out, and have a meeting place."
Still, the thought of inadequate staffing during the daytime concerns Guild
and Heckroth. Both emphasized the minutes it takes between a 911 cal and and Heckroth. Both emphasized the minutes it takes between a 911 call and an adequate fire department response is vital. The bottom line, Guilds said,

DNR: no hunting fatalities in' '15 For the second year in a row, Michigan recorded no fatalities in 2015 dur ing all hunting seasons, according to reports compiled by the Michigan
Department of Natural Resources (DNR ) Law Enforcement Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Law Enforcement Division.
Thirteen incidents resulting in injuries were recorded in the state during the Thirteen incidents resulting in injuries were recorded in the state during the Lower Peninsula and one in the Upper Peninsula.
The numbers reflect an overall trend toward fewer hunting-related fatalities and injuries over the past several decades, a downward trend that started in 1988 when completion of a hunter education class became mandatory for al first-time hunters born after Jan. 1, 1960
In 1988 , the state saw the lowest fatality
record keeping began in 1970, when the rate - four deaths - since annual ing began in the 1940s, but fatalities and injuries figures were compiled per decade rather than per year.
"Our excellent hunter education program saves lives" said Sgt Steve Orange, supervisor of the DNR's Recreational Safety, Education and Enforcement Section. "When looking at the downward trend over the last five decades, it becomes very clear that our hunter education program is one of the major factors attributed to preventing fatalities and injuries." Injuries have fallen substantially since hunter education classes became From 212 injuries in 1970 and climbing to 275 injuries by 1974 - the mos recorded in a single year - injuries have, for the most part, steadily decreased every year since. Incidents involving injury fell below 50 in 1991 for the fegan dropping again. Incidents resulting in injury have not exceeded 15 per year for the past five years.
Orange says the steadily decreasing numbers are due, in part, to the dedicated team of hunter education volunteer instructors - currently numbering more than 3,400 - and the expanded hunter education programs, which now
include a home study program and online hunter safety courses "Our many hunter education volunteers - who cumulatively donate over 35,000 hours every year - are dedicated to providing new hunters with the skills needed to handle and operate their firearms or archery equipment safe ly, which results in enjoyable experiences for them and others in Michigan' out of doors," Orange added.
He also noted the benefits fo
hunter education class as a refresher. Individuals completing home study or online hunter safety courses must still complete a hands-on field day, where they receive instruction and prac
tice in operating firearms, bows, traps and more. Field days are taught by tice in operating firearms, bows, traps and more. Field days are taught by Hunter education classes have been available since 1946, although they were not mandatory at that time.

16. That was 16. That was expanded in 1988 to all first-time hunters born after Jan. 1
1960. Since 1988 , more than 600,000 hunters have completed hunter educa tion classes. In recent years, over 20,000 hunters have been completing the program annually
During the 2015 season, 651,588 base licenses were sold. Michigan's hunt ing incident rate per license is .002 percent. The base license is required to purchase any hunting ilense. in injury reported in 2015, one involved
Of the 13 incidents resulting in injor turkey hunter, one involved a waterfowl hunter, one involved a trapper and six involved deer hunters. One injury does not specify animal hunted because the report is pending. The victims ranged in age from 21 to 74 . The
majority of injuries - more than 60 percent -were the result of self-inflicted gunshot woounds.
Five of the deer hunting incidents were reported during the firearm deer hunting season Nov. 15-30 and occurred in the counties of Calhoun, Gladwin, Roscommon, St. Clair and Van Buren. The sixth deer hunting inci dec. 19-Jan. 1. The incident took place in Lapeer County.
