Daytime dilemma

Fire chiefs relying on mutual aid to offset lack of numbers for first-shift emergency runs

A well-trained and available membership makes all the difference when it comes to a volunteer fire department's ability to save lives and reduce property damage when that siren screams, signaling the call for these men and woman to put their lives on the line as they battle heat, flames and smoke.

Elkland Township Fire Chief Glenn

Guilds rarely has to worry about a lack of dedication among the firefighters in his department, but numbers are a different matter altogether. And he isn't alone.

A blaze that gutted a trailer house about six miles southwest of Cass City last week is a good example; a half-dozen Cass City firefighters responded to the 8 a.m. alarm.

"We had to call four departments to get 14 guys out to a fire," said Guilds, who requested assistance

from the Elmwood Township-Gagetown, Kingston and Caro departments. fire "It's getting harder and harder to get enough (firemen)" to respond to alarms on a regular basis.

"The biggest problem we have anymore is so many guys are working out of the area," Guilds said. Locally, fewer businesses allow an leave the job at a moment's notice - or many cases the employee can't afford are able to leave work, they face the prospect

More than three dozen Tuscola Technology Center welding students gathred at the new Baker College of Cass City Welding Lab for a competition Thursday that enabled two seniors to win college scholarships and provided all of the students with more experience as they work towards their welding ertifications.

This is the second year Baker College hosted the event, according to Aaron aist, admissions advisor for Baker College of Cass City. Still takes a village to protect our kids

If it takes a village to raise a child, it also takes a village to protect a child, and that reality is never more important than when a child is being abused or neglected.

Preventing child abuse is a community responsibility that needs involvement from all Michiganders, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) officials say.

Throughout this month, the MDHHS is reminding people that they can help protect children from abuse and neglect.


"Michigan's children can be protected through the power of one person, one community, one dollar or one action," said Michael Foley, executive director of the Children's Trust Fund, a nonprofit group within MDHHS established to prevent child abuse and neg*lect*.

Gov. Rick Snyder proclaimed April as Child Abuse *Prevention Month in Michigan, making it the 32nd year* that April has had that official designation.

Michigan had 23,813 confirmed cases of child abuse or neglect in fiscal year 2015.

According to Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette's office, the state saw 284 complaints last year involving a child that may have died as a result of possible abuse and/or neglect, with 74 of those cases substantiated that the death was caused by parental abuse.

Nationally, child abuse and neglect data for 2014 indicated the number of children abused and neglected increased by three percent. The same national statistics revealed that roughly 70 percent of child abuse cases involved children under the age of three, and in 80 percent of the cases, parents were the perpetrators. In cases of human trafficking, 40 percent of the cases involved the sexual exploitation of a child. Residents can prevent abuse by working as a community to create healthy environments for raising children, according to Foley. "They can also promote preventive factors to strengthen families – including family resiliency, social support systems, nurturing and attachment and knowledge of parenting and child development. Or they can donate money to prevention efforts and report suspected abuse or neglect using an anonymous state hotline that is answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week, he said. The toll-free number in Michigan is 1-855-444-3911. The hotline is available to everyone in Michigan, including the general public and mandatory reporters such as teachers and health professionals, who are required to report suspected child abuse or neglect. "Tips from the public are crucial in identifying situations in which children are being harmed or are at risk," says Steve Yager, executive director of the MDHHS Children's Services Agency. "Once we are alerted, we can take action to provide services to families to keep them together safely or, when necessary, petition courts to remove children from unsafe homes." There's never a good reason to abuse or neglect a child, but sadly it happens all too frequently. If you see a youngster who needs your help, report it. Not getting involved should never be an option, especially if you have good reason to believe a young life is in danger. Make that call. You could save a life.





Mayville School officials address second threat in less than 2 weeks

A Tuscola County school district last week faced its second threat of violence in less than two weeks, prompting officials to implement a lockdown and later an evacuation of students and staff.

Mayville School officials reported the incident Tuesday, saying students at their elementary school were evacuated to the high school after it was reported that a written bomb threat had been discovered in a bathroom

"By approximately 11:45 a.m., it was determined that students could return to class as the elementary building was cleared," school Supt. Barry Markwart stated in a letter to parents.

"The police department is now investigating the threat. However, there will be an increased police presence in and around the school," Markwart said. "All threats to our school or students are taken seriously and investigated thoroughly.'

The incident came 12 days after police arrested a 16-year-old addressed a student threat recently. investigation.

Tuscola County Prosecutor Mark E. 


But that's another column altogether.



"Most students have not considered a career in insurance, mainly because they are unfamiliar with our industry, the good we do for others and the wide variety of opportunities that exist. Having a first-hand look from the inside may help them realize they can have a rewarding career in insurance," said Fred Edmond, president and CEO.

Students will attend class at Frankenmuth Insurance as well as at the Tuscola Technology Center in Caro. While at Frankenmuth Insurance, the students will job shadow, participate in presentations by insurance industry professionals and learn specific job skills.

"I really didn't have to think too long before I signed up," commented Riley Klein, a student at Cass City High School. "This is a great opportunity to earn free college credits and get valuable hands-on experience in a leading company.

Northwood University, through its undergraduate program in insurance and risk management, will teach the courses and provide the students who successfully complete the program with nine semester hours of college academic credit at no cost to the students.

"This innovative program will provide students from Tuscola County and Frankenmuth Public Schools an advantage as they embark on their life after high school. Not only will they have nine free college credits, they will have experience that puts them on a path to a great career in the insurance industry," said Gene Pierce, superintendent of Tuscola County ISD.

of giving up a day's pay, "and you're not going to make it up at \$8 an hour," he added, referring to a fireman's pay rate.

A lack of attendance for fire and accident runs is most acute during regular business hours.

"For Cass City, 10 years ago you'd have 10 to 12 guys show up for a daytime fire. Today, you have three, maybe four," said Guilds, whose department totals 22 members, most of whom work outside the community.

"We're in the same situation. I think everybody in the county is," commented Caro Fire Chief Randy Heckroth, who oversees a department boasting 25 firefighters. "For a daytime fire, we're going to be close to five (firemen on hand) - that's first shift for a lot of guys - and to get that first truck out, you need six."

"It puts everybody at risk. It puts everybody at a liability, and it puts a restraint on what we can do," Guilds said. He and Heckroth explained that for every fireman who enters a structure, there must be a firefighter outside the structure. "We can't make an interior attack (of the blaze) until we have more people there," Guilds added. "All we can do is fight it from the outside.'

NUMBERS DOWN

The two chiefs agreed it isn't easy to maintain volunteer fire department membership rolls these days.

Among the trends that have hurt Thumb fire department recruiting efforts is a shrinking population, according to Guilds. "We lose a daycare, we lose our grocery story, our school enrollment is down. When parents leave the area, we're losing our youth, and a lot of the times it's the youth who are joining the fire department," he said.

"I've probably gotten, in the last year, maybe three applications," added Guilds, a veteran firefighter of nearly 27 years whose membership includes, perhaps, a half-dozen firefighters under the age of 30, with the majority of the rest in their 40s and 50s.

Heckroth, who joined the Caro Fire Department in 1991 and has served as its chief since 2012, indicated he's received more applications, "but again, it's that daytime (availability)," he said. "I could get 20 applications and still void for daytime fires

On the other hand, Heckroth added, it's the experienced firemen who deserve a lot of credit in terms of sharing their experience with younger "Even though they're not certified fire members fresh out of training. instructors, they're instructors.²

Making the decision to become a volunteer firefighter is one thing - a willingness to complete the training and follow through with the job's other obligations is another, especially at a pay rate of \$8 to \$9 an hour.

According to Heckroth, who serves as a certified fire instructor for the Tuscola County Fire Instructors Association, which teaches the Michigan State Firefighters Training Council curriculum to trainees in Tuscola County, most of today's volunteers must complete Level II training consisting of 295 hours plus a specialized six-hour driver's training course and 16 hours of NIMS (National Incident Management System) training. Once they finish, those trainees are qualified to apply for firefighting positions anywhere in the state, he noted.

"It's a commitment. It's a commitment that doesn't end," Heckroth said. In addition to fire and accident runs, he explained, there is mandatory monthly training, plus the time members volunteer for fire prevention and fundraising activities

As for the job itself, firefighters live with the reality of being on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week - which means plenty of missed family dinners and other activities - and the prospects of potentially life-threatening conditions in weather ranging from blistering heat to bitter cold.

"It requires a mental toughness. It's a takes a certain person to want to do the job," Heckroth said.

While departments are struggling with attendance at daytime fires, they're addressing the shortage with measures such as mutual aid agreements in which, for example, one department can count on the automatic dispatch of a tanker from a neighboring department.

SMART911

Tuscola County's participation in the new Smart911 Emergency Notification System also promises to save precious minutes in a structure fire. Smart911 is a free service that enables residents to create a secure safety profile for their household by logging onto the website www.smart911.com, The profile can include any information they may want 911 call takers and first responders to have in the event of an emergency.

Once that information is recorded, when a participating resident dials 911 for help, their safety profile will immediately display on the call taker's screen.

"It's definitely a positive tool," said Guilds. For example, he added, the new system tells a responding fire department how many people live inside a residence and whether any of them have special medical needs. Residents can even include a floor plan of their homes in their safety profiles, he said, and fire fighters can have additional or specialized equipment dispatched to a scene more quickly if needed.

"It also makes it safer for the people responding," Guilds said. He explained that knowing the location of hazardous or flammable materials on a property could prevent additional accidents, as well as indicate whether emergency responders should evacuate a neighborhood or area.

The system also helps to prevent a life-threatening scenario in which a fire fighter is sent into a home that appears to be inhabited, but isn't, he said.

"The possibilities of this (system) are countless. We really encourage everybody to sign up for it," Guilds continued. "It's just a no-brainer. The more knowledge we have, the better decision we can make.'

Residents can do their part to avoid tragedy in a fire by also preparing for the worst, Heckroth said, adding, "They're biggest weapon is smoke detec-tors, and then get out and stay out, and have a meeting place."

Still, the thought of inadequate staffing during the daytime concerns Guilds and Heckroth. Both emphasized the minutes it takes between a 911 call and an adequate fire department response is vital. The bottom line, Guilds said, is too much time can turn a rescue into a recovery operation.

"It's a major issue. It hasn't really cost us yet, but it could cost us," he added.



At the end of the school year, the students take either a national or state certification exam offered through the American Welding Society and paid for by the tech center.

"A lot of students will walk out of here with both (certifications)," Loney said. For students planning to pursue a college degree, he explained, the tech center program provides an avenue for them to get a jump start by earning free college credits via dual enrollment and/or articulation.

In fact, Loney said, Tuscola Loney. Technology Center students can earn multiple free credits through Delta College as well as Baker College.

halfway to an associate's degree by the time they're done (at the tech center) and have zero debt at that point, so it's pretty cool," he added. If college isn't part of a student's future plans, Loney noted, he or she can take the certification they've earned and apply for an entry-level job paying \$12 to \$25 an hour after graduation.

Baker College opened the new welding lab in Cass City back in early 2014 and the response has been good, according to Baker College of Cass City welding instructor Alex

"Some of them are more than three different groups going on at one time. We have high enrollment and it keeps climbing," said Loney, who added school officials are looking at expanding in the fall if enrollment continues to climb. "It looks like it's going."

> The local welding lab draws students from throughout the Thumb. The nearest other welding labs are located in Bay City and Flint.

> Baker officials invested roughly \$250,000 in the state-of-the-art lab, saying their goal was to help meet the needs of employers, especially in the Thumb area, who were lamenting a lack of trained welding specialists. The 5,000-square-foot lab, located a few blocks from Baker's Cass City campus in a renovated portion of the old Nestles Building, is equipped with 12 two-man workstations, each featuring a MIG (metal inert gas) and TIG (tungsten inert gas) welder. Other equipment shared by students includes multiple torches, a plasma cutter, bench cutter, drill press, grinder, tube bender, band saws and a Scottsman Sheener that cuts steel.

leaders of the Deford Dazzlers since the club was formed in 2009-10.

The Deford Dazzlers 4-H Rocketry Team has finished 10th, 14th, 44th, and 40th in its previous finals appearances. The group has also won the Engineering Presentation Competition, an additional challenge based on the academic principles of aeronautical/aerospace engineering.

"This year we have a three-man team; Peter Hansen, Chrysler Parrish, and Alexander Hansen," Hansen said. "The challenge was to design, build, and successfully launch a rocket to 850 feet with both sections of the rocket being tethered to fall together, two raw hens' eggs weighing between 55 and 60 grams in the payload — with one oriented horizontally and one vertically - returning to earth without crack or defect, with a total flight time of 44 to 46 seconds using a motor with a maximum of 83 newton seconds of thrust'

The qualification scores are based on the sum of the best two out of three official qualification launches, according to Hansen.

"Every second or portion thereof, above or below the flight time window, is multiplied by four and added to a one-point penalty for every foot above or below the target altitude," he explained. "So, like golf, teams are aiming for low scores. Also, fully loaded with the motor, altimeter, recovery devices and eggs, the rocket cannot weigh more than 650 grams.

"Our qualification flights were 17.56 and 0.52 — perfect altitude, a tiny bit outside the perfect flight time — for a total of 18.08," he continued. "The cut-off to get into the finals, based on 100 lowest scores submitted, was 36.72 this year.

The team, sponsored by Tuscola County 4-H, will be competing May 14th at The Great Meadows Equestrian Center in The Plains, Va., about 45 minutes west of Washington D.C.

The Hansens were quick to voice their appreciation for Tuscola County voters' overwhelming support of a special millage earlier this spring to fund MSU Extension programs, including 4-H, in the county.

Without the generosity of Tuscola County residents, we would not be able to participate in this competition, which has been an amazing, life changing experience," Hansen said. "Over the years, our trips have been made possible by the generosity of private and local business donors. We are grateful for the support."

Other major boosters, he noted, include Jim and Sue Baughman, owners of White Creek Farm, who have allowed the team to use their horse pastures as a launching field, and who also joined the National Association of Rocketry as the Dazzlers' official qualification flight officials.

"They brave the cold, snow, and ice to freeze alongside us all winter as we practice, tune in our rockets, and launch our qualification flights. In addition, they allow our STEM club to descend on the farm each summer to launch rockets built by other club members," he said. "None of this would be possible without them.'

VETERAN TEAM

As for the prospects for this year's 4-H team from Deford, the Hansens have experience on their side, but they will be the first to say weather conditions and flight times frequently make all the difference in the outcomes at model rocket competitions.

And, of course, at the national level, the competition is fierce.

"The kids are all very experienced. But luck tends to be everything for the teams that do most of their flying in the fall and winter," Hanson said. "That part of Virginia is hot and humid, very dense air by the middle of May, and the winds always pick up substantially in the afternoon. So teams from the south Atlantic coast, South, Texas, and Southern California definitely have the advantage," he explained.

"The hardest part is engineering a rocket that performs well in your home climate so you have a chance at qualifying. However, with rockets and motors this size, the ability to adjust for thermals, high winds, and dense air is somewhat limited.

"Historically, usually the best flights of the day occur during the first two flight windows, which account for the first 42 of 100 launches, and the last two years rain has occurred during the last part of the day," Hanson continued.

"Our 10th and 14th place finishes were from years when we were assigned the very first flight window of the day - early morning, lower humidity, and almost still outside," he recalled. "The third year we had the second flight window and flew a near perfect flight, but the rocket caught in a tree and couldn't safely be retrieved. Our flight time was in the perfect range, so no penalty, and the altimeter was chirping only three feet off the target altitude. But there was nothing we could do about it, and the re-flight which we were given was at the end of the fourth flight window and it was already beginning to spit rain with 12- to 15-mph winds. That rocket is still in that tree." At the same time, Hansen pointed out, "This is one of those competitions where you have to remember that the season began with over 700 teams more than 4000 students - and you engineered and successfully flew this rocket 12 to 20 times, collected the data and analyzed it, made the right adjustments for your own environment, built your back-up rockets, tested them, and finished ahead of 600-plus teams.

"I really try not to pressure the kids to bring home trophies. They have worked so hard, and I want them to enjoy the day and not be stressed.

"They have the chance to meet astronauts, engineers, congresspersons, CEO's, industry leaders, and scientists galore as well as participate in numerous activities provided by AIA, NASA, the military, and tech companies. The whole event is amazing," he added.

Two years ago the Dazzlers won the presentation competition and part of their presentation was on the mathematics of rocket design, including the use of Barrowman's Equations to find the center of pressure of a rocket.

"One of (our) team members always solves these equations by hand even though there is software that will do the calculations for them, because I like the kids to see the practical application of the math," Hansen said. "That year, John Barrowman, the creator of these equations, was one of the range safety officers for the competition!

"Sophomore Zane Wright and senior Michael Rader should shine in the distance events," he said.



DNR: no hunting fatalities in '15

For the second year in a row, Michigan recorded no fatalities in 2015 during all hunting seasons, according to reports compiled by the Michigan

Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Law Enforcement Division.

Thirteen incidents resulting in injuries were recorded in the state during the year, up slightly from 10 incidents in 2014. Twelve incidents occurred in the Lower Peninsula and one in the Upper Peninsula.

The numbers reflect an overall trend toward fewer hunting-related fatalities and injuries over the past several decades, a downward trend that started in 1988 when completion of a hunter education class became mandatory for all first-time hunters born after Jan. 1, 1960.

In 1988, the state saw the lowest fatality rate – four deaths – since annual record keeping began in 1970, when there were 18 fatalities. Record keeping began in the 1940s, but fatalities and injuries figures were compiled per decade rather than per year.

"Our excellent hunter education program saves lives," said Sgt. Steve Orange, supervisor of the DNR's Recreational Safety, Education and Enforcement Section. "When looking at the downward trend over the last five decades, it becomes very clear that our hunter education program is one of the major factors attributed to preventing fatalities and injuries."

Injuries have fallen substantially since hunter education classes became mandatory.

From 212 injuries in 1970 and climbing to 275 injuries by 1974 – the most recorded in a single year – injuries have, for the most part, steadily decreased every year since. Incidents involving injury fell below 50 in 1991 for the first time, and after a very slight increase over the next several years, injuries began dropping again. Incidents resulting in injury have not exceeded 15 per year for the past five years.

Orange says the steadily decreasing numbers are due, in part, to the dedicated team of hunter education volunteer instructors - currently numbering more than 3,400 - and the expanded hunter education programs, which now include a home study program and online hunter safety courses.

"Our many hunter education volunteers - who cumulatively donate over 35,000 hours every year – are dedicated to providing new hunters with the skills needed to handle and operate their firearms or archery equipment safely, which results in enjoyable experiences for them and others in Michigan's out of doors," Orange added.

He also noted the benefits for experienced hunters in taking or retaking a hunter education class as a refresher.

Individuals completing home study or online hunter safety courses must still complete a hands-on field day, where they receive instruction and practice in operating firearms, bows, traps and more. Field days are taught by volunteer instructors and conservation officers.

Hunter education classes have been available since 1946, although they were not mandatory at that time.

In 1971, the program became mandatory for first-time hunters ages 12 to 16. That was expanded in 1988 to all first-time hunters born after Jan. 1, 1960. Since 1988, more than 600,000 hunters have completed hunter education classes. In recent years, over 20,000 hunters have been completing the program annually.

During the 2015 season, 651,588 base licenses were sold. Michigan's hunting incident rate per license is .002 percent. The base license is required to purchase any hunting license.

Of the 13 incidents resulting in injury reported in 2015, one involved a turkey hunter, one involved a waterfowl hunter, one involved a trapper and six involved deer hunters. One injury does not specify animal hunted because the report is pending. The victims ranged in age from 21 to 74. The majority of injuries - more than 60 percent -were the result of self-inflicted gunshot wounds.

Five of the deer hunting incidents were reported during the firearm deer hunting season Nov. 15-30 and occurred in the counties of Calhoun, Gladwin, Roscommon, St. Clair and Van Buren. The sixth deer hunting incident that resulted in injury occurred during late antlerless firearm season Dec. 19-Jan. 1. The incident took place in Lapeer County.

The DNR reminds hunters to follow all safety rules and recommendations to ensure a safe hunting season.

Cpl. Dave Painter of the DNR's Recreational Safety, Education and Enforcement Section reminds hunters to wear hunter orange during designated seasons. "It's the law, and it's paramount in keeping hunters seen and safe," Painter said.
