Barrios and Young battling for county board seat this year

Ellington Township; not enough candidates year terms) unopposed are Tuscola go around in Novesta.

Local resident and Cass City Village Council Trustee Nancy Barrios will challenge District One Tuscola County Commissioner Thomas Young for his seat in the August primary election.

Young, of Unionville, was appointed to the post in January following the resignation of Commissioner Roger Allen. Barrios was among five individuals who sought the appointment. She and Young will now square off in the Republican pri-

District One is composed of Columbia, Elkland, Élmwood, Fairgrove, Gilford and Wisner town-

That battle is among a handful of races shaping up both at the county and township level following the recent deadline for candidates to file for the upcoming election. Residents in Tuscola County will also be deciding a trio of countywide millage renewal requests in August.

County seats

Resident in District Three (Dayton, Fremont, Indianfields, Koylton and Wells townships) will be electing a new commissioner, as incumbent Christine Trisch is not seeking reelection to the post. The challengers are Kim Vaughan and John J. Sauber, both running on the seats. Republican ticket.

Seeking reelection to two-year terms unopposed are Republican commissioners Thom Bardwell, District Two (Almer, Ellington, Kingston and Novesta townships and the city of Caro); Craig W. Kirkpatrick, District Four (Arbela, Millington, Tuscola and Watertown townships); and Matthew Bierlein,

Races aplenty in District Five (Denmark, Juniata and Vassar townships and the city of Vassar).

> Also seeking county offices (four-County Undersheriff Glen Skrent, who is running to be the county's next sheriff - Sheriff Lee Teschendorf has opted not to seek another term; Prosecutor Mark E. Reene; Clerk Jodi Fetting; Treasurer Patricia Donovan-Gray; and Drain Commissioner Robert Mantey.

> Register of Deeds John Bishop faces a challenge from former county Register of Deeds and fellow Republican Dan Grimshaw.

> Voters will also elect two county road commissioners. Seeking the six-year terms are Michael Zwerk and Julie M. Matuszak.

Township races

Races are set in three Cass City area townships, including Ellington, where incumbent Supervisor Duane Lockwood is facing a challenge from fellow Republican Russell Speirs, and three Republicans - Diane K. Wilder, Carmell K. Pattullo and Jodi Beecher — are vying for the treasurer's seat. Democrat Joddy Ehrenberg and Republican Bobbie Mozden, meanwhile, are both running for the office of clerk.

In addition, two Republicans -Gregg Campbell and Michael Wagner - along with Democrat Patrick Price are seeking two available trustee seats.

All of the terms are for four years.

In Koylton Township, Supervisor Doug Kramer is being challenge by fellow Republican Karl Thom for a four-year term, and four Republicans - Justin Boyl, Rex W. Vroman, Jerome Ford and Kyle Thom – are vying for a pair of available trustee

Running unopposed for four-year terms are Clerk James R. Borek and Treasurer Faye Stoll.

In Kingston Township, Republicans Gary S. King, Paul B. VanHorn and Timothy Ruggles are vying for two available four-year trustee seats.

Seeking reelection unopposed are Supervisor Wm. Jesse Zimba, Clerk

Early warning

School officials: initiative addressing local at-risk students' academic, behavior problems is working

Cass City Junior-Senior High School students assigned to Nick Moyer find out quickly that not doing their homework is no longer an option. Under Moyer's watchful eye, blowing off a class or two – or the whole day – is going to be a thing of the past, too.

However, they also learn to trust Moyer, which often leads to the kids opening up to him when it comes to talking about the issues that are getting in the way of achieving success in school.

The students, 15 of them currently in grades seven through 10, were all assigned to Moyer in conjunction with a new initiative called the Early

Warning Signs Program. "They're at-risk kids academically or behaviorally - or both — and need some extra guidance so that they can be successful," Cass City School Supt. Jeff Hartel said of the program, which under Moyer's direction is already yielding some

positive results. After the first nine also in contact with parents. weeks, he says, 11 of the 15 students have improved their grades in at least one subject, and two of them have seen their grades rise in most of their subjects.

School administrators place students in the program based on a number of criteria making them eligible for at-risk services. The behaviors that bring them to Moyer include attendance issues, failure to complete assignments, fighting and demonstrating disrespect to other students and staff members.

"One of the big things we're trying to get down to is the motivation why the kids are acting out," said Moyer, who has been with the Cass City Schools since 2008, serving as a substitute teacher, para-professional and, for the past four or five years, as the district's Title I (federal funding)

Moyer's role is to work with the students, building trust and relationships while also serving as a liaison ation, or because they've failed to between the students and their teachers as well as administrators. He's

The goals, he explained, include building respect for the staff and to show them the teachers are willing to help them succeed. "The kids have blinders on to that. They've been in the negative so much," he said. "They've almost been labeled. It's time to break that label, but the kids don't feel they can without some

"The first thing they say is, you don't understand," added Moyer, who tells the kids he does understand because, as a youth, he struggled with some of their experiences. "I was a bad kid - I made a lot of bad choices, and it took somebody to say, hey, you've got to turn the corner."

Moyer's students don't spend time every day in a classroom dedicated to the Early Warning Signs Program. But they see plenty of him; whether they simply feel the need to leave another class to talk to him about their frustration or anger over a situ-

Study: leaders happy with law enforcement

A recent University of Michigan study revealed what many of us in the Thumb already know: most local officials are satisfied with law enforcement services.

The study also indicated more than half of officials from the state's largest jurisdictions say their funding is *insufficient – a problem local law enforcement agencies* are all too familiar with as well, prompting them to scramble for grant funding in order to keep up with the latest technology without busting small town budgets.

The report, compiled by the University of Michigan's Center for Local, State, and Urban Policy (CLOSUP), presents the opinions of local government leaders on law enforcement services in their community, including perceptions of crime, satisfaction with and funding for law enforcement services.

The Fall 2015 Michigan Public Policy Survey (MPPS) questioned local government leaders from 1,418 Michigan jurisdictions (counties, cities, townships and villages) regarding law enforcement issues in their jurisdictions.

The results showed local government leaders generally express high levels of satisfaction with law enforcement in their jurisdiction, and also believe their citizens are satisfied with law enforcement services, if at slightly lower levels than the leaders' own satisfaction.

Key findings included:

*Statewide, more than half (54 percent) of local leaders statewide said drug crimes are a problem in their community, and 48 percent said property crimes such as burglary, vandalism, identity theft, or embezzlement are a community problem. Violent crimes and public-order offenses such as drunk driving and disorderly conduct are seen as less common.

*However, satisfaction with law enforcement services is high, with local officials statewide saying they are either somewhat or very satisfied with performance of the state police (74 percent), county sheriffs (79 percent), and local police (94 percent) in those jurisdictions that have them.

*When it comes to local law enforcement services, 28 percent of the state's cities, townships and villages provide police services directly by running their own police Little League facility departments, 24 percent contract for law enforcement services with another provider, and 48 percent do neither, instead simply relying on the county sheriff and/or state police to respond when called.

*Overall, 22 percent of officials reported they do not have sufficient funds to meet their law enforcement needs, but few have or plan to seek out new millages to fund services.

As we see it, Thumb residents are especially fortunate, because we have not only a strong law enforcement presence, but also a law enforcement community that is successfully tackling some big city issues - heroin and other narcotic trafficking, criminal sexual conduct, assault, etc. – on meager budgets.

With few exceptions, our law enforcement agencies have also demonstrated, time and time again, their dedication to community-oriented policing, a strategy of policing that focuses on law enforcement building ties and working closely with members of communities to address public safety concerns.

That's the sort of effort that doesn't frequently make the headlines, but it plays a key role in making our towns and neighborhoods better – and safer – places to live, work and raise our families.

Charmaine Fahrner came across this bit of trivia from a story printed in the Hawk Herald in 1979. She thought I might find it interesting – and I do – so I'll share it with you.

The school newspaper wrote: Mr. Paul Smarks died Monday, Feb. 18 after a serious illness of 18 months. He taught and coached at Cass City High School between 1925 and 1927. He replaced Mr. Geister who resigned the year before.

In 1927 his basketball team compiled a 6-1 record. The games were then played in the Cultural Center.

Smarks donated a trophy to the school to be given to the top athlete in the school.

The bachelor gave financial aid to athletes during the depression. He helped by paying for shoes, clothing, books, etc.

Smarks taught at the old high school. The foundation of the building can still be seen on dry summer days from the Intermediate School's third floor.

Born in Pelston, he graduated from Central State Teachers College (Now Central Michigan University). Smarks founded the Michigan Coach Association. He also donated \$50,000 to establish MHSC's Hall of Fame at CMU. The Hall of Fame members include 300 coaches and five special members including President Gerald Ford.

Senate passes bill to cut school red tape

The Michigan Senate has passed time focusing on student achievelegislation designed to significantly reduce red tape for public schools across the state.

Senator Phil Pavlov, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and lead sponsor of the legislative package, said Senate Bills 754-767 would eliminate unnecessary and redundant paperwork and streamline reporting requirements.

"Red tape in any organization means wasted time and frustration, but this kind of bureaucracy for our schools — specifically the red tape of endless forms and reports — is even more serious because it takes away from learning," said Pavlov (R-St. Clair Township). "Reducing these burdensome requirements means educators can spend more

ment."

The legislation has been widely praised by statewide education leaders as helping schools redirect their attention to the important task of educating students. The Michigan Association of School Administrators (MASA) considers it a top priority for their membership.

"There are more reports than there are school days for school districts," said Brad Biladeau, MASA's associate executive for government relations. "We've heard from school districts that have hired or designated

individuals whose sole function is to

respond to these state and federal

reports." Michigan school districts are mandreds of reports to state and federal

entities. These reports can be timeconsuming and tedious to produce and are often redundant or even obsolete by the submission date.

Education reporting requirements are sprinkled throughout Michigan law — not just in the state's education code. Unfortunately, there is no published comprehensive index to easily locate all mandated reports, and these reports are costly, often taking a great deal of staff time and

"The bills we passed...direct valuable school resources toward the classroom rather than Lansing," Pavlov said. "Educators will be able to spend less time on paperwork and more time teaching our kids.'

I'm not sure I'll ever have the patience my grandfather did when it comes to taking a youngster fishing, although I believe I'm better at it these days.

I suspect my problem is I'm always trying to fix everything for the kids – coach them step by step – when they go to bait hooks, cast, hook fish, land fish, hold fish – as if my expert instruction, angling skills and experience are going to keep them from doing all of the awkward and wrong things I did when I was a kid developing what would become a lifelong passion.

Truth is, trying to fix things isn't what they really need from me, any more than my wife, Deb, needs me to "fix her" when she's upset.

Confidentially, I still don't really understand the whole "I just want you to listen – not fix it" thing women torture men with from time to time. It's not easy being a husband. It's also not easy being a columnist who frequently wanders from the subject at hand. Maybe I'll address the "just listen and don't fix it" dilemma in a future column. Of course, if I do ever figure out what's wrong, I'll probably try to fix it

Anyway, I recently enjoyed a quick trip out to my pond with two of my grandsons, and if Curly Howard could have come back from the dead to join us, I'm certain the outing would have been outstanding material for a Three Stooges short (minus most of the eye pokes).

After briefly instructing the boys, ages nine and 11, in the fine art of baiting a hook with a minnow, I pointed to the water and told them to start casting. Evidently I wasn't specific enough, however, as the eldest grandson could only seem to find the water about half the time, and when he did, the patience level of an 11-year-old took over, and he was reeling the bait back in 3.4 seconds later, probably out of the mouth of a hungry young bass.

After 15 minutes, the boys were certain there were, in fact, no fish in the pond, in spite of the fact that Grandpa pulled out a largemouth bass, a fat bluegill and nice rainbow trout. Of course, grandpas are always lucky, right?

I told the boys that there's a direct correlation between the amount of time a bait is in the water and the number of fish an angler catches, but they just sort of stared at me like I do when my son tries to explain some computer programming thingy he's mastered.

In the end, the eldest grandson did manage to catch a 10-inch bass. I'm still not sure how. I don't see many fish hanging from tree limbs or sunning themselves on waterlogged stumps, which is where most of his casts landed.

Oh, well. Like I said, the grandkids don't need me to talk them to death while they're figuring out how to put a few fish on a stringerthey just want me to be there.

And that's okay, because it's an investment in time that will pay off several-fold in the future as they increase their knowledge and polish their angling skills. They'll come to learn the same things their grandfather figured out long ago; that persistence and a little luck will reward them in good time.



While a few offices are drawing interest, officials in Novesta Township are facing a vacant supervisor and clerk seats along with a pair of empty trustee chairs following the recent deadline to file. Incumbent Clerk Joann M. Peters is the only official listed as seeking an office in the township.

Currently serving as supervisor is Ralph Zinnecker, while Val Peters is treasurer, and Marlene Sieradzki and David Little are the trustees

Officials are facing a similar situation in Wells Township, where Democrats have filed to run for Supervisor (Melvin L. Witkovsky) and Treasurer (Patricia Gettel), but no one met the filing deadline to run for clerk or two

"My understanding is some of the vacancies will be filled with candidates filing with no party affiliation," said Tuscola County Clerk Jodi Fetting, who noted that filing deadline is Thursday, July 21.

Seeking reelection unopposed in Elkland Township are officials Dan Erla (supervisor), Ed LaBelle (clerk) and Cindy Kruse (treasurer), along with trustees Terry Muntz and Tavis Osentoski.

In Elmwood Township, the candidates are incumbents Chris Graff (supervisor), Connie McNaughton (clerk) and Cheryl L. Kilbourn (treasurer), along with trustees Joan Sattelberg and Nicholas Bliss.

Millage renewals

County residents are being asked to support three renewal requests, including .9657 of a mill for eight more years, through 2023, to provide funding for repairs and upgrades to primary county roads and streets.

If approved, the tax would raise an estimated \$1.674 million in the first year. For the owner of a home with a market value of \$60,000, the levy costs \$29 annually, while the owner of a \$100,000 home pays roughly \$48.

Likewise, county officials are seeking renewal of .4807 of a mill for an additional eight years to pay for repairs and upgrades to the county's local bridges as well as for road and street repairs.

If approved, the renewed tax would raise an estimated \$833,300 in the first year. The levy translates into about \$14.40 a year in taxes for the owner of a \$60,000 home, and \$24 annually for the owner of a \$100,000 home.

The third millage question – renewal of .15 of a mill for eight years – would continue to fund recycling services in the county.

The millage generates about \$262,000 a year and costs \$4.50 annually for the owner of a \$60,000 home, and \$7.50 for the owner of a \$100,000 home.

Township millages

Among Cass City area townships, both Novesta and Koylton townships will be asking voters to renew millages in August.

In Novesta Township, officials are requesting renewal of one mill for four years, 2017 through 2020, to fund ditching, grading, graveling and paving of

The tax raises about \$33,400 a year and costs the owner of a \$50,000 home \$25 in taxes, while the owner of a \$100,000 home pays \$50 annually.

Koylton Township officials, meanwhile, are requesting renewal of two mills for four years, 2017 through 2020, to pay for road maintenance and improvements.

Two mills generates \$75,000 a year in the township and costs \$100 annually for the owner of a \$100,000 home, while the owner of a \$60,000 home pays \$60 a year.

"My assessment is that it's a very good program and I believe Nick's doing a great job at it," Hartel said.

DNR approves new coyote hunting regulations

The Michigan Natural Resources Commission (NRC) recently approved new coyote and nighttime furbearer hunting regulations, including a year-round coyote hunting season in the state, although dogs cannot be used to hunt coyotes April 16 through July 7.



Night time hunting season dates now match the daytime hunting season dates by species. Coyote and opossum hunting are open yearround. Raccoon hunting is Oct. 1 through Jan. 31, and fox hunting runs Oct. 15 through March 1.

Raccoons, opossums, foxes and coyotes now may be taken at night with three and four buckshot. Nighttime furbearers can be taken with a bow and arrow, crossbow, a rimfire firearm .22 caliber or smaller, or a shotgun with loads other than buckshot larger than number 3, slug or cut shell. Centerfire rifles may not be used to take furbearers at night.

Portable artificial lights may be used throughout the open nighttime season of the target species. Examples include flashlights, portable battery-powered spotlights and headlamps.

Night time hunters must use the aid of a game or predator call and/or dogs while hunting at night. Dogs may not be used from April 16 through July 7. While hunting with dogs at night, a firearm, crossbow or

bow and arrow may be loaded at the point of kill only.

To hunt coyotes, Michigan residents must have a valid base license, and nonresidents must have a valid base license and a valid fur harvester license. Residents hunting other furbearing species will need a base license and a fur harvester

Raccoons and coyotes may be taken all year on private property by a property owner or designee when the raccoons or covotes are doing or about to do damage to private property. A license or written permit is

These changes are for coyote and nighttime furbearer hunting only. Trapping season dates and regulations are not affected by these changes.

Governor signs Green bill to strengthen recycling

State Senator Mike Green, along gathered for a signing ceremony for Natural

with Gov. Rick Snyder, recently Green's legislation that reforms the Environmental Protection Act to

Resources strengthen Michigan's guidelines for recycling.

The legislation was introduced as a result of Snyder's 2014 call to improve the state's recycling pro-

"I am proud to have worked with everyone who turned this legislation into a reality," said Green (R-Mayville). "There was a tremendous amount of work done between industry, the DEO and the recycling folks, and as a result, Michigan will now have an effective means to collect recycling data in order to help make accurate future decisions."

Senate Bill 507, now Public Act 55 of 2016, amends the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act by adding Part 175, which sets the guidelines for recycling reporting. Any recycling establishment will now be required to report to the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) on an annual basis via a form provided by the department.

This will allow the department to anonymously gather data on the state's recycling efforts to eventually determine, with greater precision, a statewide recycling rate.
