Deadly weekend

Area woman, granddaughter, among three killed in fatal Huron County traffic crashes

The weekend turned deadly on roadways in Huron County, where an Owendale woman and her 16-year-old granddaughter both died in a twovehicle accident Saturday night, and a Bad Axe woman died from injuries she suffered in a separate, one-vehicle crash Sunday morning.

Two people were injured - one of them seriously - in another collision Friday just west of Cass City.

Saturday's double fatal crash occurred at the intersection of Sebewaing and Gagetown roads, about 1 1/2 miles east of Owendale in Brookfield Township. Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson reported deputies were dispatched to the scene shortly after 9 p.m.

The investigation has revealed that a 1997 Dodge pickup being driven by 18-year-old Bryan A. Pinkoski of Gagetown was southbound on Gagetown Road when he failed to yield the right-of-way (to) an eastbound vehicle on Sebewaing Road," Hanson said. "He then impacted with that vehicle, a 2003 Buick Rendezvous driven by 73-year-old Judith G. Davidson of Owendale.

Hanson said there were two passengers in the Davidson vehicle; her daughter, Shereen D. Mulrath, 47, of Owendale, and Mulrath's daughter, 16-yearold Myah C. Mulrath.

'Unfortunately, Myah was pronounced dead at the scene and Judith later died at Scheurer Hospital," the sheriff continued. "It appears Mr. Pinkoski wasn't injured and Shereen Mulrath was transported to a Saginaw area hospital by ambulance after being stabilized at the Scheurer Hospital.'


Sheriff's department accident investigators processed the scene, which was closed for several hours, according to Hanson, who noted autopsies were to have taken place Sunday.

The Owendale Fire Department, Elkton EMS, Scheurer EMS, Elkton police, Pigeon police and the Huron County Medical Examiner's Office all assisted deputies at the scene.

Fatal near Ubly

Deputies were dispatched to the second fatality Sunday at about 6:20 a.m. The single-vehicle crash occurred on Atwater Road, east of Verona Road, about three miles east of Ubly in Huron County's Parish Township.

"I just thought, 'Thank God, I'm here," Lefler recalled. "It made me feel better to see someone I knew; I just felt safe."

In the ER, Lefler was seen immediately by Robert Chadwick, DO, and a CAT Scan he ordered revealed the true extent of her injuries: 10 broken ribs, contusions on her heart and lungs, trauma, and knee and leg injuries.

Lefler was airlifted to Covenant HealthCare in Saginaw, where she spent two days in the intensive care unit (ICU) and three more days in a 'step-down" unit.

While Lefler was still in the hospi-

They can be configured with optional accessories such as vent valves, return lines, level senders, roll-over valves, drain valves and other common fuel system components to create a customize fuel system solution.

Bikers restore a piece of Colwood history; party on tap this weekend

A group of motorcycle enthusiasts will be hosting a party Saturday, July 16, at the old Colwood Bank, located across the street from the Colwood Bar, to coincide with the 100th anniversary of the building's existence

The party will also be held to showcase what the group has spent the last couple of years doing to the historical structure — revamping it into a clubhouse of sorts

We ride through that area a lot and stop up at the bar," Lance Stowe, one of four members of the group, said of how they came to become familiar with the old bank building. "The bank seemed like a great place to stop at. We liked the structure and the historical aspect of it."

The group purchased the structure a few years ago, and apart from a few hiccups with construction, and most recently a problem with the well, it has been smooth sailing, according to Stowe, who said if the spot becomes popular enough, they will likely hold fundraisers and other various events in the future.

And the locals all seem to be very excited for the change of scenery in the sparse hamlet of Colwood.

"Everyone loves the idea. People are just glad to see the building saved," Stowe said. "We aren't a big scary biker gang; we want to get along with everyone in the community."

At this point everything related to renovation of the building has gone well; the group has aimed since conception of the idea to have the place ready to go in time for the 100th year anniversary of the bank, and the local bar has even seen some extra business from people wanting to check out what's going on across the street.

The bank itself is full of history, which is to be expected given how long it has existed. It was originally built in 1916 and was closed in 1934 due to the impact of The Great Depression.

Everyone held on to their cash back then; they kept it under their mattresses," said Colwood resident and historian Wayne Dillon.

The building was used as a residence for many decades, including for migrant workers in the 1950's. Most recently a pair of men bought the building to renovate it about a decade ago. However, one of the men passed away and the project, and with it the building, was abandoned. It remained that way up until a few years ago when Stowe and his friends bought it.

According to Dillon, residents in the tiny community are thrilled that the old bank will be used again.

These are professional business owners who like to ride bikes — they aren't your stereotypical bikers,' said Dillon. "They are all great neighbors who respect the old community and the locals." This weekend's party kicks off at 1 p.m. with a bike Please turn to page 6.







Adults should ensure vaccines up-to-date

When it comes to the importance of staying on top of vaccines, most people think of youngsters being protected from a myriad of diseases that are preventable these days.

But adults need protection, too, according to the state health officials.

In fact, every year, tens of thousands of adult Americans suffer serious health problems resulting *in hospitalization and even death from diseases that* could have been prevented by vaccines.

The best way to ensure protection from several serious diseases and related complications is for adults to stay up-to-date on vaccines recommended by the *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)* and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS).

In Michigan, even high risk groups are not getting the vaccines they need. For example, only 30.6 percent of adults younger than 65 years old who are at high risk for complications from pneumococcal disease are vaccinated. Adults living with diabetes, chronic lung disease, chronic kidney disease, chronic liver disease, HIV, and heart disease are particularly vulnerable. Vaccines provide adults with protection against pneumococcal influenza, disease, shingles, meningococcal disease, hepatitis A, hepatitis Brelated chronic liver disease and liver cancer, HPVrelated cancers and genital warts, whooping cough, tetanus, and more. *Most health insurance plans cover adult vaccines.* Talk to your healthcare provider today about vaccines that are recommended for you. If your healthcare provider does not offer the vaccines that you need, ask for a referral so you can get the vaccines elsewhere.

Once we stopped, I had to consciously will myself to let go of the handles. They'd been stretched and mangled beyond their original shape, and even though they


were made of rubber, it was unlikely that they'd ever spring back.

It's been awhile since Bob Papovich has had his name printed in the Chronicle.





Madness can end with united stand by Tom Montgomery

Down Memory Lane

5 YEARS AGO (2011) A Facebook friend of mine said it well: this madness has to end.

He was referring to the fatal shootings of several police officers Thursday, a horrific scene that unfolded in Dallas, Texas, where a peaceful protest against police brutality - focusing on the recent killings of two black citizens by police officers – suddenly turned violent with gunshots ringing from above. The source of the chaos that ensued was a black Army veteran by the name of Micah Johnson, who used a military-style semi-automatic rifle to shoot a dozen officers, killing five of them.

Johnson, later killed himself by a robot-delivered bomb, was reportedly upset about the recent fatal shootings of Philando Castile in Minnesota and Alton Sterling in Louisiana – both black men shot by police officers under circumstances in which the officers have been widely criticized for using deadly force unnecessarily.

Investigators said Johnson apparently was determined to exact revenge on whites — especially white police officers - following those fatal shootings. The Dallas tragedy quickly became labeled the deadliest day for U.S. law

enforcement since the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Of course, Johnson wasn't alone in his anger/frustration over the deaths of Castile and Sterling, but did he really think he would make a difference – put an end to what many perceive to be racially-motivated violence - by committing more of the same?

Maybe he didn't care. Maybe he was simply blinded by his own anger. We'll never know.

In the end, he took innocent lives. Those police officers - like most of their brethren across the country – were devoted to protecting the lives of others. Now their families are left with a profound sense of loss, the same sort of loss felt by family members still coming to grips with the deaths of their loved ones at the hands of police officers.

My friend was right. This madness does have to end.

Perhaps it will when people stop feeling compelled to take sides (i.e. I support law enforcement OR I support citizens brutalized by law enforcement). After all, we can all agree there's no excuse for racism or hate or excessive force, right?

It all seems so far away from the rural Thumb region of Michigan, and yet Peoples' Choice Award, according to it's not. If there's anything we've learned when it comes to senseless shootings over the past several years, it's that small communities are every bit as susceptible to violence as their urban peers.

We've also learned that many of our politicians use these horrible tragedies as an opportunity to support their views on gun laws, which sickens me. Laws will not impact the sort of hate and violence we've seen escalate in this country.

Instead of scattering every time another tragedy erupts, we need to stop and seek each other out. And unite as a community and as a country. We can't allow ourselves to throw up our hands in defeat. We're stronger (and better) than that

Library offers plenty of activities for kids

Out of all the things to do over the summer, some people don't think about going to the library.

Younger kids who are out of school don't even think about stopping by, and they are missing out on not just that wonderful gust of air conditioning you get as you enter the building. Rawson Memorial District Library in Cass City also provides a variety of events

throughout the year for all ages, thanks to dedicated employees such as Jessika Struve.

Struve is 30 years old, has lived in Cass City since she was in sixth grade and has been the programming librarian at Rawson for the past seven years. more than just the Fall Family Days," Octagon Barn coordinator David Jaroch said of the decision to organize the concerts. "So we decided on this event, (which) has been five years in the making.'


And for those who wanted to give a little bit more to the Rienas family, there was a silent auction as well as a 50/50 raffle, with half of the proceeds going back to the family.






