Blowin' in the wind: turbine tax battle finally headed for court

vay wind turbines are taxed will Hoagland finally be heading to court.

The issue of changing the taxable started in 2011 when the Michigan

rate of turbines is expected to go to Tax Commission (STC) arbitrarily court in March or April after several changed the taxing methodology and years of waiting, according to depreciation related to wind tur-An ongoing controversy over the Tuscola County Controller Mike bines. The change lowered taxable values on turbines and resulted in Contention over wind development faster depreciation rates.

The STC refused to answer questions regarding why it made the changes and has refused to review the impact of its actions. Because the change meant millions of dollars in lost revenue, the counties and some townships that were impacted joined together to form the Michigan Renewable Energy Collaborative (MREC). Among the MREC members are the counties of Gratiot, Huron, Mason, Sanilac and Tuscola, as well as a number of townships in those counties.

The collaborative hired attorney Clark Hill to represent them in challenging STC's decision.

Under the state tax commission's 2011 ruling, wind turbines went

Sheriff encourages citizens to join the ranks of advocates

Glen Skrent has been Tuscola County's new sheriff for just a couple of weeks, but he's already focusing on programs designed to improve his department's response to local citizens, especially accident and crime victims and their families.

And he's asking residents to play an active role in that response.

Skrent last week utilized the sheriff's department's Facebook page to ask members of the community to consider volunteering to serve on his victim services unit. He noted the number of people serving on the unit has dropped and more people are needed.

"The unit, which was formed in 1996, is a group of volunteers who make themselves available to help victims of major crimes or other serious life-changing incidents in the first hours after the incident," Skrent said.

"The three major roles of victim services unit advocates are to provide immediate comfort and to help victims, to make referrals to appropriate agencies and services according to need, and to serve as a go-between for the victims, their families, scene officials, and emergency service providers," he explained.

"Many volunteers have been victims themselves and understand the need for support through a crisis that can feel overwhelming at times."

Skrent said victim advocates take turns being available 24 hours a day. "Currently, advocates are signing up for a week at a time, so more volunteers would lighten the load," he added.

"If the sheriff's office or other first responders in Tuscola County requests a response to a scene, two advocates are required to respond," Skrent said. "Types of situations advocates are typically called to include domestic and sexual assaults, homicide, suicide, natural deaths, natural disasters, missing persons, drownings, auto or recreational vehicle accidents, and other catastrophes as needed.

'Advocates make initial contact with victims and families and place a follow-up call, but are not counselors and will not be involved in a long-term relationship."

Community mourns the loss of Dagmar "Walker" Brown, 94, last week

An iconic Cass City figure has passed away.

Dagmar (Martinek) Brown, 94, of Cass City, died suddenly, Tuesday, Jan.

Brown's claim to local fame was walking. She walked every day whenever possible. She completed the annual Labor Day Mackinac Bridge Walk and the Tuscola County Human Development's Walk for Warmth several

She was known for a unique walking style, described as having a halftrot/run gate to her stride.

"She was always proud of her service in the Navy as well as the many bridge walks which resulted in meeting many Michigan governors," said Tuscola County Commissioner Thom Bardwell.

At 94, she completed her 56th Mackinac Bridge walk over the 2016 Labor Day holiday weekend, even though she was legally blind and had to use a walker.

Brown missed the first two bridge walks because she couldn't find a ride. However, she completed the bridge walk with each governor since the event was founded by Governor G. Mennen "Soapy" Williams in the late 1950s. Until age started slowing her down, Brown kept track and prided herself on

how fast she could walk the five-mile length of the bridge. "Her walks and waves will be missed, yet we know that she accomplished all she desired, and no doubt more in the hearts of her friends, family and those who knew her and her determination," Bardwell said of the woman who lived only a few miles from him.

In addition to being an avid walker, Brown was a true patriot.

Because of those rulings, abortion is legal through all nine months of pregnancy.

"After 44 years, we are still here, still ready to march and defend the lives of babies preparing to be born," said Right to Life of Michigan President Barbara Listing. "Positive changes are being made in Michigan, the pro-life movement is thriving, but our life-saving work continues because there is a need to value human life."

According to the Michigan Department of Community Health, a total of 27,151 induced abortions were reported in 2015 throughout Michigan - a decrease from 2014 and a 45-percent drop since 1988, the year when the largest number of induced abortions was reported.

There were 46 babies from Tuscola County who were aborted in 2015. At one time there were as many as 72 abortion clinics operating in

Michigan. Today, there are about 19. "We celebrate the decrease in abortions performed in Michigan and mourn the lives lost," Listing said. Abortions represent a void in our communities. This reality leaves many heartbroken. Abortion hurts

women, babies and families.

'To think that an abortion only impacts a mother and her child preparing to be born removes the genuine pain family members experience when abortion touches their lives," she added. "That is why Right to Life of Michigan is made up of local pro-life groups in the cause of protecting life. As communities pulling together, pro-life people join to offer real options to women facing untimely pregnancies.

"I am honored to represent Right to Life of Michigan," Listing continued. "We are people who acknowledge that human life is precious and irreplaceable. The values we embrace lead us to reject the taking of human life to resolve the challenge of life itself.

"The memorial of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton give us an opportunity to reflect on the sanctity of human

Shop smart when seeking out a gym

Area residents who included joining a fitness center to jump-start a healthier lifestyle in the new year will want to be careful when they go shopping for a gym.

That's the message Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette is once again sharing by encouraging residents to shop smart and check out the consumer alert his office has available regarding making educated choices when it comes to fitness center and health club memberships.

In 2016, the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division received 84 complaints from Michigan consumers against health clubs and fitness centers. The majority of the complaints involved discrepancies between what consumers say they were told by sales personnel and what the signed contract actually guaranteed.

In particular, consumers reported the written cancellation procedure frequently differed from what they were told by the salesperson. Consumers also complained about high-pressure sales tactics and feeling rushed to sign contracts.

In the consumer alert, "Lose Weight, Not Money", Schuette advises consumers to follow these guide-

*Check with your doctor prior to beginning a fitness program.

*Stop by the club during the times you would normally use the facility to determine if it is overcrowded. Examine the facility for cleanliness and the condition of the equipment.

*Carefully consider the cost of the membership and whether you can afford to make the necessary payments. If the services of instructors and/or trainers are provided, inquire about the training qualifications of the staff and whether you will be charged for the service. Do tannings, aerobics, or other classes require additional fees?

*A long-term contract may not be right for you. Ask whether a month-to-month or other short-term contract or trial membership is available. Regardless of the length of your contract, ask if you can pay monthly. If the club closes you may lose less money.

*Make sure you understand the cancellation and refund policies before signing the contract. What happens if your move, are injured, or get a serious illness? Also, what happens if the fitness center goes out of business? A "lifetime" membership is really only good for the lifetime of the business, not your lifetime.

*Read any contract carefully before signing, and after you sign, make sure to keep a copy to ensure you aren't being asked to pay additional fees not mandatory to keep your contact in good standing.

It's also wise to ask friends or relatives for recommendations. Search for reviews online and contact the Consumer Protection Division to find out if complaints have been filed against the health club you are considering. If you are considering a membership at a large franchise, find out whether all of the locations will honor your membership.

Life has a rhythm... even in journalism.

Over the course of more than three decades of being a journalist, there have been certain stories I knew I would write at certain times of the year.

There used to be a little ceramic shop tucked away in Gilford. Each spring students of that ceramic shop would take home top honors at several competitions. I wrote about their accomplishments for many years until the shop closed.

Each summer a man would pay for a tribute to his wife in honor of their anniversary. I have never seen such a devoted couple. I looked forward to his annual visit and proof that love could endure. She passed away, and he did also a few weeks later — I'm sure from a broken heart.

And, each September I looked forward to writing about Dagmar "Walker" Brown of Cass City tackling another Mackinac Bridge walk. At age 94, she completed her 56th Mackinac Bridge walk over the 2016 Labor Day weekend. She missed the first two bridge walks because she couldn't find a ride up to the bridge

Brown passed away Jan. 3, and the news of her passing hit me hard.

"She was an icon of the neighborhood - out walking all the time," said a friend when I told them of her passing.

I cannot say that I knew her well, but I greatly admired her. As long as there wasn't lightning during a rain storm, she walked at least four miles every day. Her dog, Barney Brown, accompanied her on many of those walks and she would talk to him in Czechoslovakian.

She completed the bridge walk with each Michigan governor since the walk was started by Gov. G. Mennen "Soapy" Williams in the late 1950s. Until age started slowing her down some, Brown kept track and prided herself on how fast she could walk the five-mile trek across the bridge.

Her bridge walks made so many headlines in area papers, Senator Mike Green honored her with a state resolution in 2013. I seriously doubt anyone else has racked up 56 consecutive bridge walks.

Besides her annual Mighty Mac walk and daily constitutionals, Brown also participated the Tuscola County Human Development Commission's annual Walk for Warmth each February. She participated in each walk for warmth since it started. The walk raises funds for those who needed help with utility bills. I wrote about her doing that walk also.

She was an amazing lady.

Several years ago I was in the middle of doing a stress test on a treadmill at a hospital, when Ms. Brown walked in, thinking it was her turn for the test. When I completed my walk on the treadmill, I told the technician he was going to have to turn up the speed on the machine for her. He just lifted a quizzical eyebrow like, "yeah right."

When I saw the technician again, he said I wasn't kidding about Ms. Brown's stamina, and that some high-school athletes would be hard pressed to keep up with her pace. At that time, she had to be in her late 70s.

I wish I could have gotten to know her better and do


an in-depth interview with her, but she never seemed to have the time. Wherever she went, she had this halfwalk/half-trot pace that was hard to keep up with until


By the way, did you know: the typical Tuscola County resident spends 7 percent of their income on heating fuel in the winter and that Walk for Warmth recipients spend over 30 percent of their budget to heat their homes? Or that more than 62 percent of those who seek HDC help with fuel payments receive no public assistance, and 56 percent are employed or have become recently unemployed? And finally a typical Walk for Life recipient is a two or three person household, 18 percent are disabled, 60 percent have children in the household, and 100 percent live in poverty.

County eyes Thumb recycling site

by Mary Drier **Special for the Chronicle**

There is a possibility of a recycling program throughout the Thumb if there is a positive environmental report on a 10-acre parcel of property south of Caro.

Tuscola County Commissioners authorized county Controller Mike Hoagland to investigate the possible purchase or lease of the former Riverview Auto and Recycling as a site to establish a new recycling facility.

The property at 987 Ellington St. includes a building totaling roughly 7,000-square foot and has operated as a scrap and salvage yard since the early 1980s.

"Because of that, the soil could be contaminated," said Hoagland. "The commissioners are interested in the site to relocate the county's recycling center there, but we need to know if the ground is contaminated. An environmental assessment study is being done. It will take some time to complete."

ed as a grassroots movement in the 1990s. It has steadily grown to become a county-operated program funded by a millage. In the August 2016 election, voters renewed a special tax of .15 of a mill for eight years to fund recycling. That millage will generate about \$262,000 in the first year.

Currently, the county's recycling program operates on a one-acre site at 1123 Mertz Rd. (M-24) that it rents from the city of Caro for \$1 a year. 

first year, with a scheduled depreciation to 30 percent value in 15 years when it would level out, to an 80 percent initial assessment, with a depreciation to 30 percent value in six years.

Although the state changed the tax schedule, local assessors and boards of review could still use the old depreciation schedule if they felt it was an accurate cash value of turbines, which they did. That prompted energy companies to challenge the decision to use the original rate rather than the new one.

As the MREC awaits its day in court, member municipalities have escrowed the difference in tax revenues between the STC rate and the Appraisal Economic (AE) rate assessors used.

The first wind farm in Tuscola Count started in 2012, and more wind development is on the horizon as NextEra Energy Resources LLC and Consumers Energy are each in the process of developing wind farms, so the amount of revenue at stake is increasing.

Energy company officials contend the value of a multi-million wind turbine should be 30 percent less than the original cost from the start because of a federal grant that helped pay for it, so their cost is lower.

MREC's position is that the full value of the turbine is taxable no matter how it is funded.

"Both parties will most likely appeal the tax tribunal ruling, and it could take up to two years for the court of appeals to hear the case," Hoagland pointed out, noting the issue could eventually go before the Michigan Supreme Court.

The decision on assessments could have a long-range financial impact

The decision on assessments could have a long-range financial impact because in late 2016, lawmakers approved a rewrite of state energy laws that boosts the renewable source threshold, which means more energy development in the future.

Michigan's previous requirement — that energy providers achieve a retail supply portfolio that includes at least 10 percent renewable energy by 2015

One of the last items lawmakers approved in December 2016 was requiring electricity providers to produce 15 percent of their power from wind or other renewable sources by the end of 2021. They also set a non-binding goal of meeting 35 percent of Michigan's power needs by 2025 through a combination of renewable energy and energy conservation.

MICHIGAN — Speed limits on certain Michigan roadways may increase after studies are conducted to ensure safety under legislation signed by Gov. Rick Snyder.

HBs 4423–4427, sponsored by state Reps. Bradford Jacobsen, Rick Outman, John Kivela and Charles Smiley, respectively, require the Michigan Department of Transportation to allow the speed limit to be raised up to 75 mph on at least 600 miles of freeways and up to 65 mph on at least 900 miles of non-freeway "M" roads.

The increases are allowed only if safety and engineering studies show the 85th percentile of speeds currently driven on those roads allow for it. The bills also raise the maximum speed limit for trucks from 60 to 65 mph and adjusts measures used by insurers to determine eligibility for auto insurance. The measures are now Public Acts 445-449 of 2016.

Trades licenses now streamlined

Michigan — Skilled trades workers now have a more efficient and streamlined process to apply for and renew their skilled trades license under legislation signed last week by Gov. Rick Snyder.

"Our talented workforce makes Michigan a national leader, and these bills help provide skilled trades workers with a streamlined framework for licensing," Snyder said. "This legislation helps ensure that Michigan will continue to meet the needs of the 21st century workforce and economy."

Senate Bills 963-972, repeal five separate public acts and streamline regulations into the Skilled Trades Regulation Act. The new act will provide uniformity and consistency among application, renewal, and enforcement provisions for all skilled trades licensees. The bills are now Public Acts 407-416 of 2016

In situations involving a death, advocates may accompany deputies to residences, Skrent said. "The officers will make the death notification and leave when deemed appropriate. The advocates will remain with the family and help contact other family members, clergy, neighbors, friends, and may assist in making initial contacts with the funeral home. Advocates usually remain with the family until an adequate support group is in place."

Background checks are conducted on all victim services unit advocates, and they are provided with training

through the Michigan Sheriff's unit, Tuscola County Association before they are able to

Skrent noted the program is not funded with taxpayer dollars.

"It is funded partially through grants from Michigan Sheriff's Association, and volunteers often pay out of pocket for uniforms and travel," he said. "The program coordinator position is funded entirely by a Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) grant, which is applied for annually."

Donations for this program are appreciated and essential in order to assist victims in need and for program equipment, according to the sheriff.

In addition to this victim advocate county.org.

Services offers support and services to any victim of crime, focusing on domestic violence and sexual assaults, throughout their involvement in the criminal justice system free of charge.

"Other volunteer positions are available for those who may want to help, but are not able to go out on calls," Skrent said.

"She also had a dedicated constitution about staying physically fit, and it wasn't unusual seeing her hiking down country roads a ways from her home, and she had a brisk and steady stride. Her annual 'Big Mac' bridge walk pilgrimages are a very distinct testimony to her character," Lounsbury added.

"Dagmar will certainly be missed and truly never forgotten. They broke the mold in her regard... a very special lady.'

Michigan 31st District Senator Mike Green (R-Mayville) agreed.

"Dagmar was a very unique person, someone that did not know the word relax. Any job that she had she never slowed down. She walked many miles a day because she wanted to." Green said.

"Her loyalty to the armed services was also her passion. She will be missed in our community.'

Although Brown was quiet and reserved, she touched the hearts of many people in the Thumb.

"I met Dagmar at my first walk as a newer employee of HDC, 27 years ago. I remember being so impressed by the local group of VFW women, all handsomely attired in their military uniforms (doing the walk for warmth)," recalled Tuscola County Human Development Commission Director Lori Offenbecher. "In the beginning, her and a group of committed women from the local VFW would raise pledges and come to the walk. As the years passed, she continued to support her local community by raising pledges and

Dagmar walked in 25 out of the 27 HDC Walk for Warmth events to support the needs of people in Tuscola County by assisting them with their util-

"I remember the year she had to use her walker. She completed the entire Chippewa Landing walk, and even though it took her longer than everyone else, she persevered and did the entire thing!" Offenbecher said.

Besides her commitment to walking, Brown's indomitable spirit touched

"Every time I talked with Dagmar, she made me laugh, and I always walked away learning something from her. She taught me how to be more patient, caring and a more compassionate person," said HDC staff member Tammy

"I loved listening to her stories, and when she gave you advice, you knew it came from her heart and her wisdom. There is always a handful a people that you meet in your life and you're a better person for having known them, and she is one of them," Ewald added.

"She lived life on her own terms and her way."

Although the HDC Walk for Warmth isn't until February, Brown's presence is already being missed.

"The Walk for Warmth in Tuscola County will be a little less joyous than years past as we have lost a valiant supporter of our walk, the community at large, and a great person all around," Ewald continued.

Each fall after completing the bridge walk, Brown would bring a brief note of her accomplishment to the newspaper. "I will certainly miss our chats at the Chronicle when she'd bring in news

of her walks across the bridge, and seeing her walking up and down the road," said Krysta Boyce, advertising sales executive at the Cass City

Brown is being remembered by different people in a variety of ways. "I can readily remember her driving her car around not that many years

ago. If I came upon a long line of cars on M-81 waiting to pass something up ahead going 15 miles per hour, I knew it was either farm equipment or Dagmar, who would be intensely focused on the road over her steering wheel, and holding a steady course," Lounsbury recalled. "And, there was no mistaking Dagmar's car as it had all sorts of military and patriotic decals pasted onto it. It was readily apparent (that) 'U.S. NAVY' — in big emboldened letters — was a special favorite."

Lounsbury has one regret.

"I was planning on interviewing Dagmar for my radio show. It is one of those 'I should haves' I will always regret," he said. "I guess I naturally assumed she was invincible, because in many ways she was.'

Brown served in the U.S. Navy, during World War II and the Korean War, when she earned her credentials as an LPN. She retired from the service as a dental technician chief.


Whenever there was a veterans' event, Brown was there. She was part of Cass City's Freedom Festival last year. She planned to march in that parade walker and all, but was directed to ride rather than walk.

"She was relegated to the back of my jeep... a fact she was not happy about at all," said fellow veteran Dave McNaughton. "A feisty lady... I have lots of respect for her."

Brown was an active member of Cass City VFW Post 3644.

At Brown's request, there will be no funeral service. Her wish was to be buried at sea, which will take place in the Atlantic Ocean off Norfolk, Va., at a later date, with a committal service provided by members of the U.S.
