Local sixth graders gearing up for state robotics finals



Try walking a mile in a trustee's shoes

Board of Education trustees are charged with the stewardship of multi-million dollar budgets as well as overseeing policies that guide teaching and administrative staffs and thousands of children.

School board members must understand the ins and outs of public education funding, including the impact of countless unfunded mandates, new state regulations and standardized tests that seem to change from one year to the next based on the whims of Lansing and/or Washington, D.C. This April it will be 105 years since the RMS someone had just set it down. Titanic sank in the Atlantic, killing more than 1,500 passengers.

The ship that was billed as "unsinkable" sank on its maiden voyage. The tragedy has been studied by several experts and immortalized in film and books. The passage of time has not dimmed widespread fascination to know more about the incident.

After another review of material of the accident, a new theory has emerged that the sinking wasn't just caused by striking an iceberg.

According to journalist Senan Molony's research, hitting the iceberg was not the main cause of the sinking and that a smoldering coal fire in one of the fuel storage areas weakened the steal.

The theory is based on a photo of a 30-foot long black mark on the right side of the hull just behind where the iceberg struck — The theory is that the smoldering coal fire weakened the steel, making it vulnerable to the iceberg — and on other information. Molony's theory was the focus of a documentary that aired on the history channel this month.

Of course, I was glued to the show. I, like millions of others, have been drawn to know more about the largest civilian sea disaster in history.

For those who are also interested in the Titanic's history, the Sloan-Longway Museum will host a display of the great ship's artifacts January 21 through May 21. Each visitor to the display will receive a replica of a boarding pass of an actual passenger that was aboard the Titanic. In the museum's Memorial Gallery, the boarding pass can be used to learn more about the person whose name is on the pass and if they survived or perished in the sinking.

The display is a chronological journey through the life of the Titanic — from the ship's construction, to life on-board, to the ill-fated sinking - along with amazing artifact rescue efforts. There will also be a re-creation of some of the rooms in the most majestic ship of its time, and a recounting of stories depicting heroism and humanity. More than 5,500 artifacts have been recovered from the ocean bottom.



I have read numerous books about the Titanic, watched several movies, and read dozens of articles. One story that got my attention was that the Titanic's last lunch menu sold for \$88,000 a few years ago. The menu was saved in the coat pocket of one of the

A few of the items listed on that menu included egg a l'Argenteul, chicken LA Marland, corned beef, dumplings, grilled mutton chops, and a buffet of salmon mayonnaise, potted shrimps, Norwegian anchovies, soused herrings, sardines as well as iced draught Munich Lager Beer.

I watched the first video of when the Titanic was discovered back in 1986. The one image that has stayed with me from that video even 31 years later is that of a China tea cup sitting neatly on a saucer as if

I really cannot explain why that image of all of those I have seen of the ship and its artifacts has stayed with me. Perhaps it is because back when that video was made, my sons were very young, and the last time I owned any kind of glass dinnerware was B.C. (before children).



The law enforcement community frequently finds itself on the receiving end of criticism these days. Unfortunately, often missed among the sensational headlines are simple gestures of kindness and compassion quietly demonstrated by the same men and women sworn to protect and serve.

"Seems the family was a bit down on their luck and did not have the money and were basically stranded along the road.

"If the family had not contacted us, we would not even have known that they did this gesture," Skrent added. "We have a great crew of deputies here — inside the jail, the courthouse and the road."

Did you know seasonal weight restrictions in Huron County went into effect Saturday, the earliest date ever put in place by the Huron County Road Commission?

The restrictions call for trucks to reduce normal gross weight by 35 percent on all county roads, except those designated "Class A" or any road that is part of the state trunkline system.

One of the most common business interactions with a county road agency concerns seasonal weight restrictions – sometimes called "frost laws."

While roads are concrete and asphalt and look indestructible, they can actually be quite fragile in late winter as frost comes out of the ground. Even strong late-winter sunlight on the dark paved surface has a significant impact on a

As frost melts beneath a paved road, the roadbed turns wet and spongy because water is trapped between the pavement and the remaining ice layer beneath. When trucks and heavy equipment travel over a layer of concrete or asphalt that isn't well supported beneath, permanent cracks can

Looking for a blind date? Library has your perfect match

Besides lending books, DVDs and magazines, Rawson Memorial District Library is gearing up to offer "blind dates" to its patrons. It doesn't matter if you are single, in a relationship, in a complicated situation with another, or even married.

No, the Cass City library isn't encouraging cheating – just reading with the "Have a Blind Date With a Book" event.

"With the books being wrapped, you don't know what you will be getting. That's part of the fun," explained library Director Kate Van Auken. "We've done this for the last few years. Our patrons enjoy it. It's a fun way to get someone to read a book they wouldn't normally pick for themselves.

At the end of the event, participants complete a short survey that enters them in a drawing.

The program is for those who are up for a "mysterious rendezvous". All they have to do is check out one or two of the books on display for the event. The books are covered in plain brown paper wrappers, so those well received at the local library.

who participate have no idea if they are getting a book of fiction or nonfiction. That's part of the mystery, just like a real blind date.

The event is being coordinated by Jesika Ferris-Struve, the library's special programming librarian.

"I can't take all of the credit for this. I read on-line about another library that did something similar. I made some changes to use it here," said Ferris-Struve.

There are advantages to having a date with a book. There are no uncomfortable questions, no awkward lulls in conversation. If you don't like the book, just close the cover and there won't be any hard feelings. Another advantage of a book date is wearing pajamas is fine and travel on snowy roads isn't required.

You might be disappointed with the book you selected or you might enjoy reading something that you wouldn't normally select, Van Auken said. And, just like any date, the book could be entertaining, informative, funny or disappointing, she added.

ACW Ambulance Service has home of its own

After nearly 40 years, an ambulance service in northern Tuscola County finally has its own home.

Construction of a 40-foot by 70foot base for the ACW Ambulance Service is complete and operational. The new base at 6356 Center St. in Unionville is the first facility the ambulance has had of its own since it was established in the early 1970s by a group of volunteers who were primarily area Jaycee members.

At the time, only a few communities had any type of ambulance serv-

ice, and most of them were operated Lutheran Church, which is about two by funeral homes.

The ambulance service had been paying the village of Unionville \$150 per month to store the ambulance at the village hall, as well as paying \$250 a month to rent an apartment for first responders to stay when on-call because some of them live out of the area. There is a fivemile-radius limit on residence requirement.



CWD confirmed in more state deer

MICHIGAN — Chronic wasting disease (CWD) was confirmed Friday in two female deer from a Mecosta County deer farm. CWD is a fatal neurological disease that affects white-tailed deer, mule deer, elk and moose. This is the second time the disease has been found in a farmed deer facility in Michigan. In 2008, a white-tailed deer from a Kent County deer farm tested

"Chronic wasting disease is a serious disease affecting both farmed and free-ranging deer," said MDARD State Veterinarian James Averill, DVM. "We are following the state's CWD response plan and taking the necessary steps to protect the health and well-being of all of Michigan's deer populations."

Samples from the two deer were submitted for testing as a part of MDARD's mandatory CWD surveillance program. All farmed deer facilities licensed with the Michigan Department Natural Resources must participate in this program.

"Any discovery of chronic wasting disease in free-ranging or farmed deer is disappointing," said Chad Stewart, DNR deer and elk specialist. "It will take significant time and effort – through immediate, targeted surveillance and mandatory checks during the upcoming deer seasons – to understand the current situation. The Michigan DNR remains committed in our efforts to contain this disease and safeguard our valuable wildlife resource."

8:53 p.m. about one mile off shore. The Coast Guard had also been notified and had just arrived with their airboat when the subjects were found." Skrent identified the fishermen as a 63-year-old Essexville man and a 37year-old man from Bay City. Neither was injured.

The sheriff said he appreciates the joint co-operation between Tuscola and Huron counties as well as assistance from the Caseville Fire Department in transporting the airboat to the launch location.

Skrent also issued some advice for anyone planning to venture out.

"Leaving shore without a means of direction finding is a recipe for disaster," he said. "Any smart phone has the capability of a compass app; however, it should not be relied up as smart phones lose battery strength quickly in the cold. A good, old fashioned compass should be taken anytime you ice fish on Saginaw Bay.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson also issued a word of caution to fishermen regarding ice conditions.

"With the next several days forecasted to have daytime temperatures definitely above freezing and the nights near or above freezing, ice conditions on our county and the adjacent waters of it will weaken," Hanson said last Wednesday.

"This advisory is especially important to anglers and outdoor enthusiasts because ice rescue incidents have already occurred on ice that some have believed to be already safe. And this has happened even before the warmer temperatures set in.'

In addition to Tuesday's incident, during which the sheriff's department airboat broke through the ice twice, Hanson said, a Thumb resident broke through the ice on an ATV while riding nearly two miles offshore on Wild Fowl Bay over the previous weekend. "Fortunately, a companion on another ATV was able to get him out of the water, but not without a lot of diffi-

"Although many other anglers have reported no major concerns, those two examples are definite proof to take nothing for granted when on the ice, especially when warmer temperatures are yet ahead."

The airboat used during last week's rescue was purchased largely with federal grant funding secured by the Huron and Tuscola county sheriff's departments, which cover a combined 116 miles of Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay shoreline. Officials from both counties also contributed to the purchase, with Huron County spending \$25,000 and Tuscola Count chipping in \$10,000.

The \$154,000 craft, commissioned last February, was named the "Sheriffs' Endeavor" in honor of the cooperative effort involving the two Thumb coun-

The new 20-foot patrol/airboat, specifically designed for harsh ice operations, is powered by a 650-horsepower General Motors engine. It features a heated pilot house that can accommodate up to five people.

The craft is equipped with a side-mounted jib crane that can lift 600 pounds, and has safety cameras, police and marine radios and a large screen



County buys property to relocate recycling center

The Tuscola County Recycling Center has enough room now to expand its services and possibly even become a hub for recycling for the Thumb area. Tuscola County Commissioners recently approved moving forward with

the purchase of the former Riverview Auto and Recycling property, a salvage vard located just south of the city of Caro.

"AKT Peerless did the phase one environmental study, and only minor

traces of contaminants were found. We did our due diligence in checking out the property," said Tuscola County Controller Mike Hoagland, whom commissioners authorized to sign the necessary documents to purchase the former salvage yard at 987 Ellington St. (M-24). "The site has plenty of elbow room for recycling to grow," added

Hoagland, who indicated the next steps are to finalize the paperwork and relocating recycling operations to the new location, which is about one-quarter of a mile north of the current recycling site the county rents from the city of Caro.

The soon-to-be new location of Tuscola County Recycling is a 10-acre site with an approximate 7,000-square-foot building. The purchase price was

'This opens up so many options for us," said Mike Miller, who serves as the county's building and grounds director as well as recycling director. "We will be able to accept different and more recycling items that we didn't have room" for before.

The county's current recycling center operates on a one-acre site at 1123 Mertz Rd. (M-24). The property is the site of a former Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) facility and is landlocked and too small for the recycling operation.

Miller has told commissioners for several years that the recycling facility is showing its age and more room is needed to operate efficiently.

"With this new site and its room, the sky is the limit on what we will be able to do," said Miller. Plus, he noted, representatives from Huron and Sanilac counties have previously expressed interest in coordinating with Tuscola's recycling program to provide recycling services to their counties.

Miller said coordinating recycling with other counties could be an option, but "that is a ways off. We need to get set up at the new site and work from there." Miller added he hopes the state will provide more grant money for

During the August 2016 election, voters renewed a special tax levy of .15 of a mill for eight years to fund recycling services in Tuscola County. That millage generates about \$262,000 a year. The money from that millage purchased the former Riverview Auto property.


"We don't do curbside recycling. What we collect people bring to us. Even people in Huron County and Sanilac County drive to Caro to bring us their modified by students," Woloshen recycling," said Miller. "About 80 to 90 percent of what we collect is brought to us, and the rest is from local businesses.'

Miller estimates about 1.3 million pounds of recyclables were dropped off in 2016, up from 1.2 million pounds in 2015.

"That's impressive, (considering) we don't have curbside collection, and the fact that our population numbers keep dropping but the amount of recycling increased," said Hoagland. "We are a leader in recycling in the area,

Recycling in Tuscola County started as a grassroots movement in the early 1990s. It has steadily grown and become a county-operated program funded

intuitive, tool-less system. Educators can utilize free VEX IQ curriculum to help teach valuable lessons and skills needed in today's changing world."

The robotics kits are built and explained. "There is a basic model, and students decide how to modify it to best suit the challenge. They use a snap-together construction of assorted pieces."

The goal is for the students to create robots that will efficiently perform tasks - in this case models that can pick up and transport small plastic "hex balls" in a mini-arena where they can attempt to place the balls in certain locations to score points, as well as attempting to finish with two robots parked and balancing on a

see-saw type "bridge". "Competitions are held on a fourfoot by eight-foot arena, which is reused each year, but with a different challenge," Woloshen said, adding this year's challenge included teamwork, with teams from various schools being partnered with teams from other schools, and both working together in an effort to achieve the highest score.

The competitions are broken down into one-minute rounds, during which each team switches drivers at the 30-second mark.

The Cass City boys' team was partnered with a group from Lakers at the Bad Axe meet. "The boys' team made it to the finals, and in the final round took first place. Because this was a sanctioned VEX IQ event, the boys qualified for the state finals," Woloshen said.

The Rawson Family was also one of the original donors to Hills and Dales General Hospital in 1959.

According to news accounts in the Cass City Chronicle archives, "A room size donation made by Audley Rawson and his son D.E. Rawson will be remembered by a simple inscription reading 'Rawson Family'. Audley Rawson is a farmer who lives five miles north of Cass City who has been prominent in county and state government. He was educated in Marlette Schools and at Michigan State University. He married the former Lena Day and the couple has lived in the community for 48 years. The Rawsons have four children. Audley served for four years as state representative from Tuscola County and four years as state senator from the 20th district..."

"When I was talking to Mr. Derfiny, he mentioned he thought the Rawson Family had donated to the original hospital," Blaine said. "With some research, we were able to find the newspaper article. What a really amazing circumstance, for a family's intentions to come full circle.

"The area will provide a more private registration process for the patient and also ensures someone is always available to greet and direct our patients and visitors," she said.

The plans also call for a new gift shop for the Hills and Dales General Hospital Auxiliary; an expansion to the existing cafeteria on the lower level, providing more dining options, additional seating capacity and a friendlier environment for patients and visitors; and a new main entrance canopy and lobby area for the hospital, which will allow for more protection from the elements of the weather, as well as an inviting needed," added Blaine, who noted seating area in the lobby for patients and visitors.



ment on several felony charges, remains lodged in the Sanilac County Jail.

According to Lt. Charlene Washkevich of the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department, the six-hour incident unfolded at about 9:35 a.m. when deputies were dispatched to a residence in the 2500 block of West Sanilac Road in Moore Township after a 20-year-old Snover resident reported that he had gotten into an argument with his 48-year-old roommate and, at one point during the argument, the roommate pulled a knife on him.

"Deputies arrived on scene and attempted to speak to the suspect. However, the suspect refused to comply with verbal commands to exit his vehicle," Washkevich said.

cle, directing it towards one of the deputies, (who) was able to safely retreat behind cover."

The suspect then fled, and deputies began pursuing him, but the pursuit was called off after a distance of roughly 10 miles due to poor weather conditions.

"Deputies began to canvass the area and, at approximately 2:55 p.m., they located the suspect still traveling in his vehicle near Mills and Banner Roads in Wheatland Township," Washkevich said.

Deputies again attempted to initiate a traffic stop, but the suspect refused to yield and continued to lead officers on multiple roads in Marion and Delaware townships.

"The suspect then reversed his vehi-evade arrest," Washkevich noted.

School investing \$30,000

becoming necessary at the now-20-year-old building.

Tri City Controls installed the original heating/cooling controls at the school, and those have been working together with controls later installed in conjunction with the Honeywell energy efficiency program (involving lighting upgrades and heating and cooling software designed to increase efficiency) school officials have been involved in for the past several years. However, the contractors indicated Monday that the two systems are "not very compatible", making it difficult to ensure proper heating throughout the building as well as cooling to vital areas such as those housing computers and servers.

The board agreed to spend roughly \$20,000 on an updated computer program and new temperature control system, plus another \$10,000 for a new air handler-exchanger that warms fresh air before circulating it throughout the building.

The unexpected expense will be covered with general fund dollars, according to Chief Financial Officer Allison Zimba, who indicated there is money available for the project.

Zimba also provided the board with a brief budget review and update, noting general fund revenues are about \$27,700 less than expected so far this fiscal year – in part due to a larger-than-expected dip in enrollment in 2016. At the same time, expenditures are now expected to be \$31,528 less than when the budget was adopted last June.

Zimba said the district remains financially stable, with an anticipated fund balance of about \$1.54 million at the end of this fiscal year, equal to roughly 15.84 percent of the school's general fund budget. "Overall, I think we're doing really well," she said.

As for the round table discussions, set for Jan. 31 and Feb. 7, the board agreed to set aside half of the meetings for administrators to attend and answer any questions that may arise during the discussions. In the past, the sessions have been attended by staff members and board representatives only.

Veteran teacher and union representative Kris Milligan noted some teach-

Veteran teacher and union representative Kris Milligan noted some teachers might be hesitant to air concerns to board members in the presence of administrators, especially now that performance reviews – not seniority –

are utilized to determine their continued employment with the district. Hartel, however, said he strongly disagrees with the implication that administrators may not be professional in dealing with criticism. He also pointed out performance reviews are based on student achievement.

Turning to other matters, the board conducted its annual reorganization meeting, starting with election of officers. The board reelected Alice Zaleski as president; selected secretary Janie Meeker as the new vice president, replacing former board member Craig Bellew; named Emily Phillips-Lasceski as the new secretary; and reelected Dave Osentoski as treasurer.

The board also agreed to continue conducting monthly meetings on the fourth Monday starting at 7 p.m. at the junior-senior high school, and appointed Phillips-Lasceski as the board's Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) delegate and representative to cast local votes on Tuscola Intermediate School District issues.

IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the board:

*Unanimously approved extending a contract with Anderson, Tuckey, Bernhardt and Doran, CPA, which conducts the district's annual audit. The cost of the audit was \$12,000 in 2016 and will be increased in each of the three years of the extension — \$12,400 in 2017, \$12,700 in 2018, and \$13,000 in 2019.

*Briefly discussed the Mackinac Center for Public Policy's 2016 Michigan Public High School Context and Performance (CAP) Report Card.


