Hills and Dales touts OR equipment upgrade

Hills and Dales also recognized with governor's award for 2017

Hills and Dales General Hospital officials were on a roll in the good news department last week, starting with the unveiling of a new

piece of state-of-the-art surgical equipment.

The Cass City hospital was also named among this year's recipients of the Michigan Peer Review Organization (MPRO) Governor's Awards of Excellence for Outstanding Achievement in Effective Reporting and Measurement: Ambulatory Surgery Centers, Critical Access Hospitals and Inpatient Psychiatric Facilities.

Hospital officials announced that Hills and Dales is the first hospital in the eastern region of Michigan to purchase and use the Olympus' VISERA 4K Ultra High Definition (UHD) System for Minimally Invasive Surgery.

"This system delivers four times the pixels, higher resolution, better light, and a wider color gamut than High-Definition (HD) displays for a Big Screen Surgery experience in the operating room (OR). The system, which utilizes the same Sony technology used for the filming of Netflix 4K shows and other TV programs, is now available in our OR for surgeons," said Danielle Blaine, hospital community relations director. Blaine explained the technology should allow Hills and Dales surgeons to operate with increased precision and confidence, providing the surgical team with an im-

Recycling move could take year to complete

Although the sale and all of the necessary paperwork have been completed, it could still take Tuscola County Recycling officials about a year to relocate operations to their new home.

Aside from the logistics of the move, the county is hoping grants will cover some expenses.

"We submitted a request for \$50,000 to the DEQ (Michigan Department of Environmental Quality). They have an infrastructure grant for 2017," said Mike Miller, who is both the county's building and grounds director and recycling coordinator.

"We also applied for an educational grant from the DEQ for \$24,508. This grant is in partnership with Sanilac County. Both grants require a 25-percent match," he added.

The county expects to hear back in the next month if their request for grants was approved.

"The infrastructure grant will be used to aid the remodeling costs of the new location, and the education will be used for billboards, mailings, signs, radio spots and flyers throughout both counties," Miller ex-

"We are hoping to begin moving in the fall of this year or early 2018," The county bought the former Riverview Auto and Recycling property south of Caro to establish a new recycling facility. The 987 Ellington St. site has an approximate 7,000-square foot building and has been operated as a scrap and salvage yard since the early 1980s

The county's recycling program currently operates at 1123 Mertz Rd. (M-24), which is a one-acre site it rents from the city of Caro for \$1 a year. The property is the site of a former Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) facility and is landlocked.

The expanded facility could be a boon for the Thumb area. Representatives from Huron and Sanilac counties have expressed an interest in coordinating with Tuscola's recycling program to provide recycling services in their counties.

Recycling in the county and the state has the potential to expand. A report by the Michigan Recycling Coalition shows the state's overall recycling rate is only about 15 percent, which is behind the national av-Please turn to page 8.



wires," he pointed out. "That's part of the job too."

Although rewarding, fire fighting can take an emotional toll.

"It's nice when you are able to save a house, property and someone's life. They are very grateful and appreciative," Kretzschmer said. "And, then there are the fatal fires. You don't forget them."

Kretzschmer has seen a number

of changes over the years as a fire-

"The technique is still the same. You put water on the red stuff," said Kretzschmer. "There is a lot more training now. A lot more and it's more in-depth. The equipment we use now is a lot better. The turnout gear is better and the breathing equipment is better. The training and better equipment makes it safer."

Of the 42 years on the Owendale

Fire Department, Kretzschmer served as chief for 16 years.

"He's a great guy and fire fighter. He's going to be missed," said current Owendale Fire Chief Ed Champagne, whose department numbers 18 volunteer fire fight-

Although Kretzschmer has hung up the fire hose in favor of retirement, there is still another Kretzschmer actively fighting fires.

Alan and Brenda Kretzschmer's son, Kendall, is a volunteer fireman on the Howell Fire Department. He has been a fire fighter for 16 years. He joined the Owendale Fire Department when he was still in high school, and has been on the Howell Fire Department for 10 years.

The Kretzschmer family has a combined total of 117 years of fire fighting experience.

Motorcycle safety awareness is vital

We're joining Secretary of State Ruth Johnson in promoting May as May as Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month.

"Riding a motorcycle is a thrilling experience," said Johnson, who first learned to ride a motorcycle as a young teen. "But it's important to understand the risks and how to safely manage them. Take a motorcycle safety course, get your endorsement, wear the proper gear, and know what your skill level and limits are before

There are roughly 489,000 Michigan residents with a motorcycle endorsement on their driver's license. The endorsement is required to ride legally on public roads. Motorcyclists who ride without the endorsement risk having their bike ticketed and towed.

The Michigan Department of State Michigan Rider Education Program (Mi-REP) oversees the 33 public and private providers statewide that offer motorcycle rider safety training classes. Classes are available for novice and experienced motorcyclists and provide an excellent foundation for developing and improving the necessary skills to ride safely.

Taking a motorcycle safety class, getting the endorsement and wearing the proper gear when riding are three important steps motorcyclists can take to better protect themselves on the road.

Johnson added that motorists also have a responsibility to share the road safely with motorcyclists. Motorists are reminded to:

*Be extra cautious on weekends, when more motorcyclists take to the road.

*Provide motorcyclists adequate room to maneuver. Follow at least three to four seconds behind them.

*Look carefully for motorcycles, especially at intersections or when making a left turn, two of the most common denominators in vehicle-motorcycle crashes.

*Allow extra maneuvering room in areas with potholes, pavement transitions and railroad crossings. Motorcyclists may need to slow down, stop or adjust their lane

*Never try to share a lane with a motorcycle. Motorcycles have the same right to lanes as any other vehicle.

*If a motorcycle is nearby, check your mirrors carefully before changing lanes. Motorcycles may be in your blind spots or difficult to see because of their smaller size.

During a recent news conference, Johnson also highlighted veterans' causes as a nod to the upcoming Memorial Day holiday and to the many veterans who ride. She reminded veterans that the Department of State offers programs such as the veterans' designation on driver's licenses, veteran and military service license plates, and "Operation: Our Troops Count," for those casting ballots overseas.

But back to safety — according to the Michigan State Police, traffic deaths across the state increased last year by 10 percent, from 963 in 2015 to 1,064 in 2016. Motorcyclist fatalities increased from 138 in 2015 to 141 last year, up by two percent.

Michigan motorists – whether they drive a pickup truck or a Harley Davidson motorcycle — can do better. Let's all do our part to "bring 'em back alive."

I drank that water down as I eved the cup of coffee that was nearly as thick as syrup. I sent them for another glass of water as I poured the coffee on the nearest plant.


The black jelly mixture wasn't bad, so I ate that in front of them.

Anyone can also send an email to sos-ois@michigan.gov to communicate with the Secretary of State's Office of Investigative Services. OIS is the primary investigative authority within the Department of State and is charged with overseeing investigations involving the department's program areas.

Johnson created OIS as part of her focus on strengthening her office's consumer protection efforts. The office primarily investigates and inspects automotive-related businesses and consumer complaints against them.

The way I figure it, the good Lord gave us humor for a reason, you know?






Hopefully, I'll die knowing I at least tried to give of myself in as many ways as I could, without expecting something in return.

erage of 34 percent. That means more than \$435 million in recyclable metal, glass, paper and plastics goes from households to Michigan landfills each year.

Recycling in Tuscola started as a grassroots movement in the early 1990s. Because of its steady growth, recycling became a county-operated program funded by a millage. In August 2016, voters renewed a .15 of a mill for eight years to fund the service. That millage will generate about \$262,000 the first year.

livery of opioid antagonists as allowed by the newly-enacted law M.C.L. 380.1179b," explained Superintendent Terri Falkenberg, referring to legislation related to antagonist use.

"They (the board) also developed a policy that will be adopted that will set training, usage, storage, etc. in place," she said.

An opioid antagonist is a medication that can counteract the lifethreatening effects of an opioid overdose, whether it involves a legal opioid drug or an illegal drug such as heroin.

The term opiate antagonist or opioid antagonist is a medication that can block opioid receptors found naturally in the body. When the opioid antagonist binds to the

opioid receptors, it prevents other drugs such as opiates or heroin from binding and producing its ef-

Among the opioid receptors available is Narcan, also known by the generic name naloxone, which can be lifesaving when given immediately to someone who is experiencing a heroin or opioid-related overdose.

At the national level, U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow along with 19 other senators recently called on Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and House Speaker Paul Ryan to include an increase in funds to fight the opioid epidemic. The senators are seeking additional resources to help communities that have been hit hardest by the epidemic.

Michigan had the seventh most

overdose deaths in the nation in 2015, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Tuscola County added to that statistic last month when Emily Lynn Dennis, 26, Caro, died at a residence in Elmwood Township of a heroin overdose.

Also last month, Michigan State Police troopers arrested two Pennsylvania residents for drug possession during a traffic stop in Sanilac County as the pair was on their way home after visiting relatives in Huron County. Troopers seized 270 bindles of heroin packaged and ready for individual sale – along with 20 grams of

marijuana in the suspects' vehicle. The couple has since been arraigned on felony and misdemeanor drug charges.

Ubly was a double winner Tuesday in Pigeon, winning the boys' crown with 127 points and the girls' crown with 141 points.



New ambulance base open house on tap in Unionville

The ACW Ambulance Service, 6350 Center St., Unionville, will host an open house from one to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 21, to showcase its new

Since the service was formed in 1977, it has paid rent to share space in the Unionville Village Hall. The service paid the village \$150 a month to park the ambulance inside the hall and another \$250 a month to rent an apartment for on-duty crew members to stay while on duty.

That \$400 in rent payments will now go towards paying for the construction of the 40- by 70-foot base, which includes an office and living quarters.

The townships of Akron, Columbia and Wisner jointly own and operate the ACW Ambulance Service, which was formed by a group of volunteers who were mainly Jaycee members.

The new ambulance base was built by TDM construction of Cass City for about \$275,000.

Both the ACW and Sebewaing ambulance services are in need of statelicensed personnel to be on-call paid volunteers. The two services along with Sanilac County Medical Control are offering Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classes in mid-June at the Sebewaing ambulance base at 6 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays and some Saturdays.

ACW has a policy in place to assist with class costs and to fully reimburse the cost after one year of service with ACW ambulance.

creating the community survey," Jaroch said. "All community members are welcome and urged to attend. The planning commission will also be finalizing a list of volunteers who will assist them during the plan-

In addition, the commission is seeking an individual to fill a vacant seat as well as someone to serve as zoning administrator.

In other business, the council approved a zoning amendment related to accessory buildings.

"The change will allow for an increased size for storage buildings if sufficient lot size is determined," Jaroch explained. "The ordinance will be effective in a few weeks.

"Council is also working on clarification of the current zoning appeals process. Several development projects may require review before approval," he added.

The council unanimously approved an extension of the Emterra Waste Hauling contract.

"The residential waste collection contract will continue at the current level of service," Jaroch said. "Only village residents are allowed weekly collection and twice monthly curb side recycling along with reasonable large item pickup. Residents are strongly advised to abide by these rules. A good working relationship with Emterra has enabled the village to secure a favorable monthly rate."

Turning to other matters during the regular monthly meeting, the council learned about the Smart 911 program, which enables dispatchers to quickly assess the location and possible issues concerning an individual utilizing the cell phone number used. Everyone was encouraged to sign up for the free program.

*Heard from County Commissioner Dave Peruski during the public comment portion of the meeting. Peruski discussed solar energy zoning


