Council approves contract offer to attract manager

An employment contract between Deboria Powell and the village of Cass City, along with repairs to the community's recreational park facilities, dominated much of Monday's 2 ½-hour regular meeting of the village council.

Powell, who was chosen to replace Peter Cristiano as the permanent, full-time Cass City Village manager earlier this month, will be offered a yearly salary of \$70,000 should she accept the contract drafted by village attorney Jason Bitzer and approved on a split, 5-2 vote of the coun-

Casting dissenting votes on the proposed contract were trustees Jenny Zawilinski and Nancy Barrios.

"I feel it should be lower," Zawilinski said of the salary offer to Powell, adding, "I think \$65,000 is fair."

Barrios, meanwhile, questioned other terms and conditions set forth in the contract, including moving expenses, vacation pay, insurance coverage, professional development and severance package.

In the approved employment package, Powell is set to receive six months of salary if terminated by the council without cause after one year of employment. Also for the same six-month period, Cass City will pay for Powell's health care benefits as outlined in the village employment handbook. The severance package – which Barrios felt should by 90 days – is conditioned on Powell signing a full release regarding any and all possible future claims against Cass City. Further, if Powell is terminated for cause, she will not be entitled to any severance pay.

Trustees Mick Kirn and Marilyn Biefer voiced support for Powell's starting salary, as did Bitzer.

"I think she is worth that amount of money," said Biefer. Kirn added, "Let's keep it at \$70,000. I don't want to go through this (process) again."

Local school board begins the process of prioritizing needs

The Cass City Board of Education reviewed some big numbers Monday – all involving future capital improvement projects, repairs and upgrades — but it won't be settling on any realistic estimates until sometime after touring the district's buildings and going through the process of prioritizing needs.

The board scheduled the walk-through and workshop session for Tuesday, Sept. 19, starting at 5 p.m.

School officials previously conducted a survey of staff and community members, requesting their input on needed repairs and upgrades. And, over the summer, project management and architect firms surveyed school buildings to assess the needs.

School Supt. Jeff Hartel and Chief Financial Officer Allison Zimba last spring approach the board with a proposal to fund the work – by extending an existing debt service tax.

The Cass City Public Schools currently levies a three-mill debt service

Sanilac County drug team shuts down meth lab, arrests suspects

The Sanilac County Drug Task Force shut down another homebased meth lab early last week, arresting three suspects and seizing drugs and drug paraphernalia in the process.

The sting took place during the later afternoon hours of Aug. 21 at a residence in the village of Carsonville, according to drug task force Director Jim Johnson.

"Discovered during the course of the search were the elements of a meth lab production located in the garage, and materials for producing methamphetamine," Johnson

reported. 'Seized from the home were crack cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine usage paraphernalia. Several used syringes, crack pipes, marijuana smoking apparatuses, unknown pills and numerous other drug related items were found and confiscated," he added. "A search and impound of a 2007 Chrysler four-door and cell

phones from suspects on scene was also completed."

Two adult males and an adult female at the home were transported to the Sanilac County Jail and lodged.

A 51-year-old male giving a Mar-

lette address was booked and released for frequenting a drug house, according to Johnson, who did not release the man's name pending formal arraignment.

Williams facing court dates

The man who allegedly attacked his wife with an ax is scheduled for several court appearances in the coming weeks.

William Russell Williams, 59, is charged with six felony counts in connection with the May 26 attack on his wife at their home at 1850 Mertz (M-24) Rd. in Tuscola County's Indianfields Township. His trial is expected to start after Thanksgiving.

According to court records, Williams has a final pretrial scheduled for 1 p.m. Monday, Oct. 2, and there is a hearing scheduled for 1 p.m. Monday, Nov. 13, if the defendant's attorneys have any motions they want heard before the trial.

No decision on second funding request in Ubly

Although Ubly school officials have reviewed the results of the Aug. 8 election in which voters turned down a pair of funding requests for capital improvement projects, the board of education hasn't made a decision regarding

whether or not they'll try again. The school board briefly talked about the election results during a

recent monthly meeting. Voters rejected by a 139-vote margin, 486 to 347, a proposal of 1.7 mills that would have generated \$8.3 million over 10 years. The community also rejected, by a 72-vote margin, a proposal to create a sinking fund of two mills for 10 years that would have gen-

Sheriff: School bus safety no accident

A new school year is just about here, and Tuscola County Sheriff Glen Skrent is repeating a message about school bus safety that most of us have heard before.

That message bears repeating, because if the following reminder saves even one young life, it's more than worth sharing.

"With schools starting across Michigan, the Tuscola County Sheriff's Office wants you to know the laws for school buses," Skrent says. "Passing a school bus that is loading or unloading students is prohibited under any circumstances."

Here are some other tips for local motorists:

- Slow down and prepare to stop whenever you see yellow school bus lights flashing.
- The law now requires motorists to come to a complete stop at least 20 feet from a school bus whenever a bus is stopped and employing the use of its two red flashing signals. The driver may proceed once the bus resumes motion.
- Never pass a school bus when children are loading or unloading. That is the law.
- Remember that children are unpredictable in their actions. Take extreme caution when traveling in a school zone.
- If you live in an area where there are no sidewalks, drive cautiously. Be more alert to the possibility of children walking in the road.
- Be more aware of children playing near school bus stops.
- Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- Reduce any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.
- Put down your phone don't talk or text while driving! Tips for students:
- Always arrive at the bus stop early.
- Prior to boarding, wait until the bus has come to a complete stop, the door is opened and the bus driver says that it's OK to board.
- Once on board proceed quickly to your seat and stay sitting until the bus arrives at your school or other drop off location.
- Do not move around on the bus.
- Always walk on the sidewalk when preparing to cross the street near a bus. Make eye contact with the driver so that you are sure he or she sees you.
- Never walk behind the bus.
- If you are walking beside the bus, make sure you are at least 10 feet (10 "giant" steps) away.
- Take extra precautions to make sure that clothing with drawstrings and book bags do not get caught in the hand rail or door.
- Never stop to pick something up you have dropped while the bus is stopped. Wait until the bus has driven off to avoid not being seen by the driver.

Real rose-colored glasses



As usual, I'm a day late and several dollars short. Despite months and months of hype, I totally missed the first coast-to-coast total solar eclipse in almost a century that happened Aug. 21.

I was so wrapped up in watching the coast-to-coast

ence fiction movies I've seen.

televised showing of the eclipse, and the reaction of people watching it, that I misjudged the time the Thumb area would go dark.

During the eclipse, the moon passed between the earth and the sun, casting about a 70-mile-wide shadow. The path of the shadow was called the "path of totality". I think that term is rather scary. It conjured up visions of some scary end-of-the world sci-

Because I missed the eclipse, I'm trying to console myself that I can "somewhat" experience the event by plunking down 49 cents to buy a first-of-its kind, first-class U.S. Postage Stamp. The special edition stamp is printed with thermochromic ink.


The "Total Eclipse of the Sun" stamp is the first U.S. stamp to use thermochromic ink. It reacts to body heat when touched. Placing a finger over the black disc on the stamp causes the ink to change from black to clear to reveal an underlying image of the moon. The image changes back when the stamp cools.

The backside of the stamp is printed with the path and the times the eclipse took as it crossed the United States

How, cool is that? I'm impressed, considering that when I first started using stamps in 1970, a first-class postage stamp in the United States cost six cents and a postcard stamp cost five cents. And, the stamps were the kind that had yucky tasting glue on the back that had to be licked, rather than the self-adhesive stamps they have now.

It seems like I was the only one who missed the eclipse. According to news reports, 240 million people liked or shared photos of the eclipse on Facebook, 160 million posted photographs of it on Instagram, and 2.5 million people posted on #Eclipse.

Of all of the comments and posting about the eclipse, I like the one Tuscola County Sheriff Glen Skrent reposted on the department's Facebook page:



Michigan apple lovers will be able to enjoy their favorite varieties earlier than usual this season, but there could be fewer of them, so says Susan Selasky, Detroit Free Press food writer.

Michigan State University Extension is predicting this year's harvest to be anywhere from a few days to 10 days ahead of normal harvest dates.

While apples, one of Michigan's most valuable fruit crops, may be early, don't expect a bushel buster of a crop this year. Because of frost and drought damage, according to the Fruit Growers News, the Michigan crop is projected at 20 million bushels. That estimate is lower than the 24-million-bushel average predicted by the Michigan Apple Committee.

Still, althought this year's yield could be lower than average, that prediction still puts Michigan as the third-largest producer of apples. Washington State is No. 1 and New York is ranked second.

The trial is slated to get underway Tuesday, Nov. 28, provided there is no plea agreement in the

Tuscola County Prosecutor Mark Reene alleges Williams struck his 57-year-old wife in the head with a splitting ax maul at about 3 a.m. May 26. Williams then went to work and, when he returned home about 15 hours later at 5 p.m., he allegedly damaged the home to make it look like an intruder had been there.

Williams called 911 to report the crime, and troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro responded. He initially told investigators his home had been invaded and his wife assaulted.

Williams' wife suffered a serious head wound and was transported by ambulance to an area hospital for treatment.

Williams is charged with assault with intent to murder, a felony punishable by up to life or any number of years in prison. He also faces four counts of falsely reporting a felony and lying to a police officer during a violent crime investigation. Each of those counts carries a maximum four-year prison term.

Tuscola County Prosecutor Mark E. Reene has said there "isn't a clear motive" in the case. "During (court) testimony, it was brought up that he and his wife had argued about his giving another woman money.'

"He 'whacked' — his term — his wife, went to work, and gave the woman they argued about some money," Reene added. "There is nothing that is clearly understandable in this case."

Williams remains lodged in the Tuscola County jail on a \$500,000

from Marlette and living at the (Carsonville) home along with Tyler Deaton, age 27, Marlette Township, each were booked on eight charges, including operating/maintaining a methamphetamine lab, operating a meth lab in presence of delivery/manufacturing meth, possession of meth, purchase/possess ephedrine or pseudoephedrine to make meth, possession of heroin, and maintaining a drug house," Johnson

Both suspects were arraigned in Sanilac County District Court and remain lodged in the Sanilac County Jail on \$100,000 bonds.

"An eight-year-old female family member at the house was taken to McKenzie Hospital by Sanilac EMS for medical evaluation and released to a grandmother. DHS (child protective service) was notified and is involved in the welfare of the child," Johnson noted.

The Sanilac drug team initiated an investigation back in May after several roadside dump sites of meth lab equipment and by-products were discovered and reported in and around Marlette Township.

"The sites were handled by DTF (drug task force) clan lab certified staff and evidence from those sites helped lead officers to the suspects and search warrants in Carsonville," Johnson said. He explained officers undergo special training to become clan (short for clandestine) lab certified.

"The members of the drug task force that have attended a 'clandestine lab' school for two weeks become certified to handle hazardous materials involved in the drug production process of methamphetamine and other dangerous drug by-products," he said. "Two members have gone to the DEA school in Quantico, Va.

"There were three (multiple) levels of training," Johnson continued. "They wear the hazmat suits

and we have a trailer with all the the Sanilac Drug Task Force or materials from the sites. Those that are certified to handle this also go for physicals and breathing testing once a year."

Johnson said drug team members transport seized drugs, drug residue, manufacturing chemicals and other hazardous materials to a pick-up location in St. Clair County, where the materials are then picked up by the state for disposal.

"We have also purchased a Tactic-ID analyzer that allows us to test the found chemicals through the packaging without touching the material itself," Johnson said. "This was about \$45,000, part of which — \$15,000 —was paid for through a Rural Development Grant applied for by the sheriff's office.'

Drug task force officers were assisted last week by the Sandusky Fire Hazmat Team, Sanilac EMS and the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department.

"We would like to remind the citizens of Sanilac County to contact

equipment needed to remove the any law enforcement agency when you find suspicious items. such as bottles or jars with unknown substances, some of which may have altered tops with attached tubing," Johnson said. "Please never handle, pick up the items, or knock them over to see what may be inside. We have been fortunate to have had some discoveries of meth labs or the component by-products by citizens and first responders who had been made aware of those dangers from our drug talks and reported their visual findings and suspi-

"All law enforcement and first responders need and appreciate those calls from you," he said, adding, "You can help prevent injuries and stop those involved in drug dealing while helping those with drug overdose and addiction issues."



Just divide... and conquer

Ever feel so overwhelmed with a list of tasks, no matter how menial, that you ended up just sitting down and accomplishing nothing?

I'm sure the experts have assigned a name to this sort of mental paralysis, but I couldn't say for sure. All I know is that I sat down to write this column in anticipation of taking a few vacation days this week, and it felt like I'd never get it done.

My mind kept wandering all over the place, from the stories I needed to wrap up and the photos still not taken for the front page, to whether or not to put the effort into cutting two acres of grass when only an eighth of that is really green thanks to days of dry weather, to figuring out some sort of rough menu for the week (I'm chief cook and bottle washer at home).

Tons of things to keep me occupied and then some, but I just couldn't seem to get busy on any of them.

I've felt this way before, and it always shut me down productivity-

wise, especially when it came to writing. Which would make just about every little stress seem much worse than it was, because each one reminded me of all that I needed to get done but hadn't yet. It's a pretty vicious circle, you know?

It's the sort of frustration that used to make it easy to pick up a drink – and, of course, that always made me much more productive. Not.

These days I make a more concerted effort to break free of this syndrome by doing the same thing that helped me to stay on the straight and narrow back when I was really struggling to hang onto my sobriety: I simply pick a task – any task, but typically a small one – and just get it done. Period.

Okay, so it isn't rocket science. But it does lighten the "list of things to do", gives you a little feeling of success and encourages you to move on to the next job at hand. You might also be surprised at how the stress level starts to fade.

Bottom line? It's a simple matter of learning to divide and conquer. The problem is what Aaron Lynn describes as "analysis paralysis" in an article posted on the website asianefficiency.com.

"No matter how many anti-procrastination tips and tricks you know, or how much mental discipline or self-control you have," Lynn says, "when you're faced with too many projects and tasks...it's hard to tell what's important, and what you're supposed to be working on next."

Lynn says reducing the number of tasks – say to three at a time – is the key, because when you have only a few things to focus on, you pretty much know if you're being productive (by doing it) or making excuses (by not). And, once you've accomplished those three, go to three more.

His other suggestions include avoiding multitasking, wrap up all your small tasks first, and change your work environment.

Sound advice and worth considering. And I will, just as soon as I can get past these other 19 things on my plate.



<u>IMMUNIZATIONS</u>

Act 299, Public Acts of 1975, authorized the Director of the Michigan Department of Public Health to specify, by regulation, the immunizations and tests required of all children enrolling in Michigan schools for the first time. This year the following immunizations are required:

Diphtheria, Tetanus, Rubella, Pertussis, Poliomyelitis, Chicken Pox (Varicella), Hepatitus B and Meningitis. In addition, each new school entry must have had a vision screening test.

The parent or guardian who, because of religious or other conviction, does not want his/her child protected from these diseases must, submit a signed statement to that effect. Waivers are available at your county Health Department. Please call for an appointment. The Heath Department is the only place a waiver can be obtained.

As part of our school admission procedure for your child, we must enforce the law stated above. We must have the health record or similar statement in order to admit your child officially to school.

If you have questions about this, please contact your local school, your doctor, or the Thumb District Health Department.

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. Households should answer all questions on the form NON FOOD STAMP HOUSEHOLDS:

An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total income by source for each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.); (2) names of all household members; (3) social security number of the adult household member who signs the application; and (4) the signature of an adult household member

FOOD STAMP/FIP HOUSEHOLDS:

If you currently receive Food Stamps or Family Independence Program (FIP) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or FIP case number and sign the application.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, verifying data, or qualifying children for other federal and state programs, as authorized by the United States Department of Agriculture. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school

If children are approved for free or reduced price meal benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time

In most cases, FOSTER CHILDREN are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy the building principal will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing.

To provide special recognition for the service and sacrifice of military veterans of WWII, the Korean Conflict and Vietnam era, Public Act 181 of 2001 and Public Act 55 of 2014 authorizes the board of a Michigan school district to award high school diplomas to WWII, Korean Conflict and Vietnam veterans. The law permits WWII veterans who left high school between December 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946 for immediate military service and did not subsequently receive a high school degree to now apply for a diploma. Korean War veterans who left high school between June 27, 1950 and January 31, 1955 may also apply. Family members may apply on the behalf of a living or deceased veteran. Veterans of the Vietnam era must have been drafted or enlisted between February 28, 1961 and May 7, 1975 to qualify for

The application requires a copy of the veteran's discharge from military service indicating honorable service between the dates of December 16 1940 and December 31, 1946 or June 27, 1950 and January 31, 1955 or February 28, 1961 and May 7, 1975. Also, the Vietnam era veteran must

erated \$490,000 per year. The final tally on that issue was 451 "no" to 379 "yes" votes.

"There will be a meeting later with concerned residents, those who helped with the bond, and others in the community to review where we will go from here," said school Supt. Joe Candela.

With the start of the 2017-18 school year approaching, the meeting won't be until later next month.

'We are getting ready for the start of school on Sept. 5, so the meeting won't be until later in September," said Candela. "It will be after Sept.


Had the ballot issues passed, they would have allowed the district to build new classrooms and close off seven classrooms in the upstairs section of the 1936 school that are outdated, furnish and equip the addition, complete remodeling along with furnishing and refurnishing, upgrade equipment, purchase and install instructional technology, improve playgrounds and athletic facilities, buy a new pickup, construct a drop-off loop at the elementary school, and upgrade the district's heat ing and cooling systems

The most immediate need involves the 1966 gym floor and bleachers. The district has about \$120,000 saved to begin work on that project next year.

In addition to gym repairs, some of the district's other priorities include closing off the upstairs in the oldest section of the school, but there would have to be new classrooms to do that along with plumbing and

Over the past decade, the Littles built a reputation for quality, fullservice wild game processing, from butchering to production of their own custom line of smoked snack sticks, summer sausage, fresh sausage, jerky and smoked venison ham.

The Chronicle was unable to reach Matt Little for further comment, but in an interview with the paper in November 2015, he talked about the business' success and the crew – including his wife, Jamie, and brothers Micah and Bill Little, as well as longtime friends Jonathan Fields and Joshua O'Dell - that made that success possible.

Little said he never expected his customer base to expand as it did. What began as an idea of processing perhaps a hundred deer and smoking some sausage for a limited number of customers blossomed into a business requiring long hours from the early youth deer hunt through the firearm sea-

How busy? Two years ago the Littles were forced to temporarily stop accepting deer during the regular firearm season after hunters delivered 90 whitetails in the first two days of the season. Two days later, they were accepting deer

Hard work and attention to quality were among the keys to success for the business, which Little described as a family affair, crediting his mom, Donna Little, with helping to get the enterprise on its feet early on – then supporting he and his brothers by caring for her grandchildren so her sons and their wives could juggle work and family life.

"I have the best crew, I believe, ever," Little commented at the time. "I had an idea, but it was all of us that made it come to light."

tax that was originally approved by voters to fund construction of the middle school. Later, residents supported an extension to pay for a host of capital improvement projects.

That tax is scheduled to expire within a couple years, and Hartel suggested that the board could ask voters for another extension in May 2018 in order to raise roughly \$8.5 million and pay off the debt over a period of years. If approved, the proposal would not increase what tax residents now pay, although school officials are also considering requesting a built-in one-mill increase, which would generate another \$4 mil-

At stake are the condition of two aging buildings, including the high school, which was built in 1967. The district's newest building – the former middle school, now known as Cass City Elementary School — was constructed about 20 years ago.

School officials have repeatedly discussed a number of priority projects over the past year, including repair/replacement of radiant heat panels along with other major

climate control upgrades at the high school, where aging fixtures have resulted in flooding damage; replacement of boilers that have reached their life expectancies in both buildings; and sidewalk repairs and construction of a new entrance at the elementary school to solve chronic bottleneck issues for parents dropping of their chil-

During Monday's regular monthly meeting, Scott Hoeft of Architect Engineering Consulting, Marquette, briefly outlined what he described as an extremely preliminary list of possible projects and their estimated costs.

The list is only "ink on paper," said Hoeft, who pointed out the school board won't have a handle on what it would like to spend until after priorities are set.

Hoeft's figures totaled more than \$12.6 million for combined projects at the elementary, junior-senior high and preschool buildings. However, a second set of numbers showed a pared down figure totaling \$7 million for "priority one" improvements, \$2,467,380 in "projects and \$2,723,860 for "priority three" up-

Should voters approve the bond

extension next spring, the continuing debt would continue for the next 16 years and generate funding in three separate years; \$1.960 million in 2018, \$3 million in 2020, and \$3.2 million in 2022. The total expenditures are estimated at \$8.5 million, with roughly \$2 million of that spent on technology equipment and transportation.

Bitzer's view on the offer was "she is taking a leap of faith" to come to Cass City and the amount may convince Powell to leave her current job with the city of Saginaw. Ideally, Bitzer said, Powell will start her new duties as village manage by the next council meeting, slated for Monday, Sept. 25.

Turning to repairs at Cass City Recreational Park, Tom Herron and Rob Piaskowski outlined several improvements/upgrades needed to bring the park system to its former glory.

Those renovations include a number of projects at Helen Steven Memorial Pool, where a steel roof on the south side to match the north side has been suggested. In addition, the crown jewel of the local park needs new toilets, a new pool liner, a new boiler, landscaping and concrete work.


"The list goes on and on," Herron said.

Piaskowski added that just ordinary maintenance – cleaning, painting, staining, etc. – could go a long way to improve the park's appearance. He noted the merry-go-round, drinking fountains, basketball courts and other structures would benefit from yearly upkeep.


Barrios agreed, but said bandage repairs, especially to the pool, are 'just getting us by.



Red Hawks cruise in season opener; tough Ubly up next

For a while Friday, it looked like visiting Flint Hamady would give host Cass City all they could handle in the gridiron season opener for both schools.

But after trailing 14-6 entering the second quarter, Cass City's defense would stiffen for the final three quarters resulting in a 54-30 non-conference victory.

"It was a great start for the Hawks. Hamady was a very physical and talented team. Proud of how our team played in the second half," said Coach Scott Cuthrell.

Demetries Davis put the visitors on the scoreboard first with a one-yard drive, only to see Cass City even the score on the first of four Brendan Hamilton touchdowns.

Hamady, however, would regain

the advantage, 14-6, on a nifty 28-yard gallop by Ali Brewster and 2-point conversion pass to Davis that ended the scoring in the initial quarter.

"We started out with a four-man front (on defense), but we made some adjustments that allowed us

to stay in the game," Cuthrell said.
With the Cass City defense switching to a five-man front, plus changing the secondary coverage from man-to-man to zone, the Red Hawks tallied 20 unanswered

points to lead 26-14 at the break. Hamilton, who rushed for 145 yards on 23 totes, scored on runs of 15 and two yards, before a 35-yard pass from quarterback Sandyn Cuthrell to Luke Stern completed the touchdown parade for the hosts in the second quarter. Both schools tallied third period

Both schools tallied third period scores, but another Stern TD with only 8:44 remaining on the clock

had the winners enjoying a 46-22 margin.

Stern chipped in 78 yards rushing on 11 carries. He tallied three markers, while Cuthrell picked up 108 yards rushing on a dozen attempts and 54 yards passing on 5-of-8 passes. Cuthrell also threw a pair of 2-point conversions passes, one each to Hunter Vaughn and Alex Perry.

Nick Perry added 71 yards to Cass City's ground attack that included one score.

Defensively, Hamilton recorded 14 tackles in a complete game showing, while Nick Perry and Hank Janik had eight and seven stops, respectively. Alex Perry had an interception.

The Red Hawk win, coupled with Ubly's 34-0 victory over the Unionville-Sebewaing Area Patriots, sets the stage for an early season showdown Thursday in Cass City.

Ditching desks

Veteran Cass City teacher receives grant to implement flexible seating in her class

Veteran Cass City Elementary School teacher Lisa Green has ditched the desks in her classroom.

Gone are the iconic student desks that have survived significant changes in education over the past several decades, serving as an orderly, functional seating arrangement for kids – all facing their teacher in a typical classroom.

But these days, as area teachers prepare for a new school year to get underway next week, Green's space resembles a livingroom or college lounge more than the rigid layout students have become accustomed to in schools across the Thumb.

This year they will find a variety of seating options, including colorful stools placed around a few large, round tables. There's a couch off to one side of the room, a small stack of "lap desks", a rack of stability balls nearby, and even what Green describes as a couple of "bungy

Green's fourth graders will be giving up their personal desk space and simplify their supplies. Each student has a personal "cubby" – courtesy of Cass City High School shop teacher Kurt Tuckey - for their supplies, with common items located in one spot for easy access.

The new classroom environment embraces the concept of flexible seating, according to Green, who explained the goal is to enable students to sit comfortably and still concentrate on their work.

Green purchased the new furnishings with a \$2,500 Thumbs Up for Kids grant she received through the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). Green spearheaded the effort, but is quick to credit Tracy Robinson, school social worker, and Nick Morehead and Stephanie Moore, both of the MDHHS, with helping her submit a successful grant application.

In a nutshell, Green explained, flexible seating is about letting kids have a choice for seating – a very organized choice – where they are free to explore their best learning environment.

"Kids are more tuned in. They're excited because it's a change," she

In addition to the new layout, students will have regular breaks – about three minutes or so in length – in which they will be participating in some sort of physical activity such as yoga or dance. The goal, Green explained, is to ward off day dreaming, which tends to derail the learning process. "Moving stimulates the brain, so you're all powered up to begin again," she said.

Incorporating those regular breaks into daily classes was part of Green's inspiration for experimenting with flexible seating. "There's not a lot of room for movement (with rows of desks in the center of the room). I had to figure out a way to have more space," she said.

Green, who has spent nearly her entire 20-year teaching career in Cass City, acknowledged the reviews of flexible seating from various educators have shown a great deal of promise when it comes to increased student interest and engagement in the classroom. In fact, a number of teachers who have adopted the concept say they would never go back to the old desks-and-chairs set-up.

"I'm very hopeful that's what I'm going to think, too, because this is a big change," she said.
