Car-deer crashes dip (slightly), but risk high this time of year

It's no coincidence that the arrival of fall also brings an increase in vehicle-deer collisions. After all, Michigan's deer herd is plentiful, and the last quarter of the year marks a time when deer are active and in search of mates as well as food before winter hits.

But motorists can take some steps to prevent a car-deer crash from becoming more than an inconvenience.

The number of car-deer collisions in Michigan fell slightly in compared to 47,001 in 2015.

Fatal car-deer accidents in 2016 claimed 14 lives, including nine riding motorcycles. Another 1,240 people were injured last year.

These crashes are costly, adding up to some \$130 million in damage a year in Michigan. The average car-deer collision causes about \$2,100 in damage, usually to the front end, often leaving the vehicle undriveable.

More than half of all car-deer

crashes occur in southern lower Michigan. In 2016, Oakland County had the most deer-vehicle accidents with 1,847. The other top counties included Kent (1,481), Lapeer (1,308), Jackson (1,254), Sanilac (1,119), Ottawa (1,116), Ingham (1,096), Calhoun (1,056), Genesee (1,000), Eaton (998) and Isabella (980)

In the Thumb, Tuscola County reported 806 car-deer accidents, while Huron County reported 935.

As many as half of the vehicledeer crashes may not be reported, so actual numbers may be much higher, according to officials with the Michigan Deer Crash Coalition, which was formed in 1996 to increase awareness about the deer crash problem in Michigan and reduce the number of deaths and injuries resulting from these

While the state's two million deer are most active in spring and fall, vehicle-deer crashes are a

year-round problem. The three biggest months for deer collisions are October, November and December - roughly

43 percent, or 19,950 of Michigan car-deer accidents occurred during the last quarter of 2016 — and the timing all has to do with reproduc-

In most of North America, deer rut - compete for mates and breed — in October and November, with November being the busiest month in the deer social calendar followed by October. During the rut, deer populations become highly mobile as bucks compete to build a harem of does.

The heightened activity of the breeding season is closely followed six months later in June and July, when new fawns are born and anxious mothers look for as much fresh food as they can find; their preference for new grass often brings them out of the deep woods to the sides of roads where spring sunshine creates a constantly replenished source of fresh grass.

About 80 percent of vehicle-deer collision crashes occur on twolane roads between dusk and dawn. Last year, the highest num-

Heart safe

Cass City Schools lone Thumb district honored with state's designation

No one wants to think about the possibility of school officials facing a cardiac emergency in the classroom or cafeteria, but should it happen, Cass City School officials are prepared for the worst.

In fact, the local district is among 125 in Michigan recognized Thursday in Lansing with the MI HEARTSafe School designation, presented by a partnership that includes the Michigan departments of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) and Education (MDE); American Heart Association (AHA); Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA); and Michigan Alliance for Prevention of Sudden Cardiac Death of the Young (MAP-SCDY).

The Cass City Public Schools – both the elementary and junior-senior high buildings – was among the first districts to earn the designation when the MI HEARTSafe project was established four years ago, and is still the only Thumb area school district certified by the program.

"Sudden cardiac death of a young person is tragic and some of these events can be prevented with fast, appropriate medical response within three to five minutes," said Dr. Eden Wells, chief medical executive of MDHHS. "It is always wonderful to see communities come together to help prepare schools to respond to these medical emergencies.'

In order for a school to receive a MI HEARTSafe School designation, it must perform at least one cardiac emergency response drill per year. This school year, MAP-SCDY has identified the weeks of Nov. 6-10, 2017, and Feb. 5-9, 2018, as CPR/AED (automated external defibrillator) drill weeks to remind schools about the importance of practicing for this type of emergency.

Other requirements for the MI HEARTSafe award include having a written medical emergency response plan and team; current CPR/AED certification of at least 10 percent of staff and 50 percent of coaches

Williams undergoing exam to determine responsibility

An evaluation at the Center for Forensic Psychiatry in Ypsilanti is underway for a 59-year old Caro man accused of striking his wife in the head with an ax last spring, leaving her critically injured.

William Russell Williams is charged with six felony counts in connection with the May ax attack on his wife at their home at 1850 Mertz Rd. (M-24) Rd. in Tuscola County's Indianfields Township.

"He (Williams) is undergoing a criminal responsibility evaluation at this time, said Tuscola County Prosecutor Mark Reene. "It is done to determine if a person was responsible for their actions at the time of commission of a crime.

"It is different than a competency hearing that is done to see if a person is competent to understand what is happening (in court) and able to assist with court proceedings against them," Reene noted.

Williams is charged with assault with in-

tent to murder, a felony punishable by up to life in prison or any number "He is also charged with four counts of false report of a felony, and

lying to a police officer during a violent crime investigation," said Each of those five counts carries a four-year prison term if found guilty. "His trial is expected to begin at the end of November or the beginning of December," said Reene, who alleges Williams struck his 57-year old

wife in the head with an ax maul at about 3 a.m. May 26, and then went

A splitting-ax maul is heavier than an ax. The assault resulted in the woman suffering a serious head wound.

When Williams returned home about 15 hours later at 5 p.m., he damaged the home to make it look like an intruder had been there, according to Reene. Williams then called 911 to report the crime.

Michigan State Police Troopers from the Caro post responded. Williams initially told investigators his home had been invaded and his wife assaulted.

As the investigation progressed, the victim's husband became the suspect and was arrested May 27.

A motive in the incident remains unclear.

According to Reene, Williams uttered some "difficult to decipher comments" that seemed to indicate general "marital discord."

During his arraignment before Tuscola County Magistrate Joe Van Auken, Williams was asked if he had appeared in court proceedings before. "He answered no," said Reene. "The other question asked was if he had been treated for mental health issues. He said, 'not yet.""

Glenn announces bid for Senate seat


The race is on for the 31st State Senate seat currently held by Senator Mike Green (R-Mayville).

During a press conference Friday in Caro, State Rep. Gary Glenn of the 98th District officially announced his candidacy for Green's seat when it is available. Green, who term limits out this year, is expected to be appointed as Michigan's director of the USDA Rural Development office in Lansing next month.

When Green is appointed to the USDA Rural Development office,

it will be up to the governor to schedule a special election to fill the rest of Green's unexpired

"The winner of the election will serve for the balance of the term of office in the senate," said Green's aide James McLoskey.

Green, whose district covers Bay, Lapeer and Tuscola counties, previously served area residents as a state representative and, before that, as a Tuscola County commissioner.

Glenn, meanwhile, was first elected to the Michigan House of Representatives in November 2014, serving the 98th District, which includes the cities of Auburn, Linwood, Midland and Pinconning, the village of Sanford, and thirteen suburban and rural townships in Bay and Midland counties.

Now in his second term, Glenn is chair of the House Energy Committee. He also was named to a second term on the Military and Veterans Affairs Committee, and also serves on the Communications and Technology, and Insurance committees.

Our auto insurance premiums too high

Studies show that Michigan auto insurance premiums are at or near the top of lists of the most expensive in the nation.

The reason? Michigan's unique no-fault insurance laws, originally created in 1973. Although these laws were intended to decrease premiums by reducing court costs associated with auto accidents, they have proven to have just the opposite effect.

In the Mackinac Center's new policy brief, "What's Wrong With Michigan's No-Fault Automobile Insurance," Matthew Coffey, an attorney and lecturer at Central Michigan University, explains what went wrong and how to fix it.

The key theory to the benefits of a no-fault system, which only 11 other states use, is that it will drive down the number of lawsuits filed as a result of car accidents and thereby limit court costs. But in Michigan, the number of lawsuits has actually increased under our no-fault system.

"Recent decisions by the Michigan Supreme Court have drastically reduced the difficulty associated with suing at-fault drivers for negligence, which is contrary to one of the primary purposes of Michigan's no-fault system — the reduction of personal injury lawsuits in exchange for very generous benefits," explained Coffey.

"Providing stricter standards for these lawsuits would help fix this problem and do what no-fault was intended to do in the first place: reduce legal costs associated with auto accidents," he said.

Perhaps the biggest driver of high auto insurance rates is uncapped personal injury protection benefits. Under Michigan law, people injured in automobile accidents can receive an unlimited amount of benefits and every driver must purchase this level of coverage.

"No other state in the country requires drivers to purchase coverage for unlimited, lifelong benefits if they are injured in a car accident," said Coffey. "The closest would be New York, which only mandates drivers carry \$50,000 of personal injury protection. That would be a much more reasonable standard for Michigan."

Creating a fee schedule for medical treatment after a car accident would also help contain costs.

While medical insurance companies and government programs like Medicare and Medicaid use such practices, the same is not true for auto insurance companies. As a result, it is not unusual for hospitals to charge these companies five times more than they would charge Medicare for the same service.

"The current system lacks flexibility, creates opportunity for fraud, doesn't achieve its goal of limiting lawsuits and is outrageously expensive," Coffey said.

"As a result, more than one in five Michigan drivers is uninsured. Michigan's no-fault experiment was well-intentioned, but it has failed. It's time to enact more reasonable standards, which will mean lower rates for everyone and fewer uninsured drivers."


But wait, there's more!



Several appear on felony charges

The following people appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

*Starr O. Ray, 38, Flint, pleaded guilty to a charge of malicious destruction of utility property Feb. 10 in Almer Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered in the case and bond was continued at \$10,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

*William M. Burnham, 42, Caro, was sentenced to 365 days in the county jail following his plea of no contest to a charge of assault with intent to commit great bodily harm less than murder May 16 in

He was also placed on 60 months probation and ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$258 plus restitution of \$335.02.

*Brent M. Rodriguez, 19, Fostoria, was sentenced to 365 days in jail and 60 months probation following his plea of no contest to one count of criminal sexual conduct, second degree, involving injury to an incapacitated victim April 3, 2016, in Watertown

Townsnip He was also ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$758 plus restitution of \$845 and attorneys fees of \$500.

*Karch M. Taylor, 30, Caro, was sentenced to 365 days in jail following his plea of no contest to domestic violence, third degree, June 19-20 in Caro. He was also convicted of being an habitual offender (three or more prior felony convictions).

In addition to jail time, the defendant was placed on 60 months probation and ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$1,008 plus attorneys fees of \$500.

The accident occurred at about 10:40 a.m. on West Bay City-Forestville Road near Germania Road, according to Deputy Otto Kutach of the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department.

"A Kubota M6040 loader tractor was traveling westbound on Bay City-Forestville Road, preparing to turn left into a private drive. The operator, a 16-year-old male from Cass City, checked for cars and then activated his left turn signal prior to making the turn," Kutach reported. "A 2004 Chevrolet Aveo being driven by 31-year-old Ashley Chase from Cass City was also traveling westbound on West Bay City-Forestville Road," he

"Ashley's vehicle came over a hill, and she saw the tractor in front of her. The driver thought the (tractor's) four-way flashers were on and moved into the opposite lane to pass the tractor," Kutach continued. "When she got closer, she realized the left turn signal was on. She tried to stop as the tractor turned into the private drive, but her vehicle struck the rear of the tractor."

The impact caused the tractor to roll over and eject the 16-year-old.

"The operator of the tractor was taken by Bingham EMS to Huron Medical Center in Bad Axe," Kutach said. He did not release the teen's name. Information on the extent of his injuries also was not

Nag the women in your life this month

I tease my wife frequently about being a big nag, but she and my grown children will tell you (with pleasure) that I'm the biggest nag in the house.

They're right, but I like to think of myself as being a good "reminder".

It can be a bad habit, but not when it comes to protecting your loved ones from breast cancer.

Area residents have been hearing plenty about October's designation as Breast Cancer Awareness Month. If you've passed through Cass City lately, no doubt you've seen large pink ribbons and business windows promoting awareness of breast cancer during the community's annual Pinktober celebration this month.

The effort will also hopefully serve as a reminder that a diagnosis of this horrible disease doesn't have to be a death sentence. Far from it

But it takes a proactive approach to beat this killer, something many area residents know firsthand. Countless others have also experienced the dread of hearing the word "cancer" — after all, how many of us haven't been touched in some way by breast cancer, whether it involved a mom or grandmother, a sister or niece, or a close friend?

Among Michigan women, breast cancer is the most commonly newly-diagnosed cancer, according to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS).

In 2013, 7,676 Michigan women were diagnosed with breast cancer, and it's estimated that there will be 8,160 new cases of the disease this year.

Breast cancer is the second-leading cause of cancer deaths among women in the state. The death toll was about 1,460 women in 2014, and projections indicated the disease will claim another 1,410 victims in 2017.

In spite of those statistics, MDHHS officials say the number of breast cancer deaths and new diagnoses have declined in Michigan, from 32.9 deaths per 100,000 women in 1995 to 22.2 deaths per 100,000 women in 2014.

Bottom line? Many women are surviving.

Just ask my mom.

I was 16 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer. She spent her 40th birthday in a hospital bed after surgeons removed her left breast. It was a devastating experience for her.

But that was 39 years ago. At the end of August, mom celebrated her 79th birthday.

Doctors say early detection is the key to survival. With regular screening, breast cancer is more likely to be detected at an earlier stage, when it is most treatable.

Now, I'll be the first to say breast cancer isn't the easiest topic for a man to bring up with the women in his life. But any discomfort you might feel simply doesn't compare to the dread of having to schedule an appointment with an oncologist. Or sitting in a hospital waiting room while someone close to you is undergoing a mastecture.


Like I said, it's all about early detection.

So go ahead, guys, remind your wife, your daughters, your mother and your sisters about the importance of doing monthly breast self-exams, scheduling an annual clinical exam by their health care provider, and getting a mammogram every year if they're over the age of 40

And then, remind them again.

Do whatever it takes to prevent your loved ones from becoming another statistic in a book that might be quite a bit thinner if we all did a little more nagging.





Suspicious persons report leads officers to pot stash

Some reported suspicious suspects led Tuscola County law enforcement officials to a residence in Fremont Township, where they discovered and seized more than three pounds of processed marijuana along

Thursday. Tuscola County Sheriff Glen Skrent reported Deputy Steve Roland was conducting a routine liquor inspection at a Caro area business at about noon when it was reported to

him that there were several suspicious suspects in the area "acting very nervous.

A unit from the Michigan State Police post in Caro arrived to assist, and they discovered three subjects from Pennsylvania sitting in a stolen vehicle, according to the sheriff.

"More follow-up...done by deputies and detectives led to a house in Fremont Township, where over three pounds of illegally grown processed marijuana and many plants were discovered," he said, noting the case remains under investigation.

(including all head varsity coaches and physical education staff); accessible, properly maintained and inspected AEDs with signs identifying their location; and ensure pre-participation sports screening of all student athletes using the current physical and history form endorsed by the MHSAA.

Ensuring everyone is prepared for a cardiac emergency is an ongoing process, according to Cass City School Supt. Jeff Hartel, who cited continuing training for staff members – administrators, many teachers, para-professionals, bus drivers, etc. – as an example. "A lot of people in this district are trained in CPR," he said.

Aside from having AEDs in both buildings, the school system has its own "Code Blue Team" charged with responding in an emergency. Each team member is assigned a responsibility such as calling 911, getting an AED, taking notes for emergency responders, and meeting an ambulance crew at the front doors to ensure quick access to the victim.

"So, there's a plan in place that is followed in case of a medical emergency, and there's a back-up person for every job (on the Code Blue Team)," Hartel said.

Since the launch of the MI HEARTSafe program in 2014, at least three people suffering sudden cardiac arrest are known to have been successfully resuscitated at schools that were preparing for or had recently submitted a MI HEARTSafe application.

"We are so proud to support Michigan's HEARTSafe schools," said State Superintendent Brian Whiston. "Ensuring schools are prepared for sudden cardiac emergencies through planning, training, and life-saving AEDs is an important part of having safer learning environments for students, staff and the community."

This is the fourth year of the MI HEARTSafe Schools program in Michigan. The designation lasts for three years, and this year, 22 schools - including Cass City received their second MI HEART-Safe award.

In the first three years of the initiative, 266 schools were designated as MI HEARTSafe Schools and thus better prepared to help reduce the number of sudden cardiac deaths among Michigan stu-

Public Act 12 of 2014 requires all schools (grades kindergarten to 12) to have a cardiac emergency response plan in place, and Public Act 388 of 2016 requires CPR and AED instruction for pupils enrolled in grades seven through 12.

ber of reported accidents (nearly 25 percent) occurred between 6 and 8:59 p.m. The highest number of fatal car-deer collisions (five) occurred between 9 and 12:59 p.m., according to the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP).

The most serious crashes occur when motorists swerve to avoid a deer and hit another vehicle or a fixed object, or when their vehicle rolls over.

The Michigan Deer Crash Coalition, Michigan State Police and other agencies offer the following safety tips:

*Stay aware, awake and sober. *Vehicle-deer crashes occur

year-round, but be especially alert in spring and fall.

*Signs are placed at known deer crossing areas to alert you of the possible presence of deer. Deer are herd animals and frequently travel in single file. If you see one deer cross the road, chances are there are more waiting.

*Don't rely on gimmicks, flashing your high-beam headlights or honking your horn to deter deer.

*If a crash is unavoidable, don't swerve. Brake firmly, hold onto the steering wheel, and bring your vehicle to a controlled stop. Pull off the road, turn on your emergency flashers, and be cautious of other traffic if you exit your vehicle. Report the crash to the nearest police agency.

Drivers are also reminded to buckle up because seat belts are motorists' best defense in the event of a crash.


The loss knocked Cass City from the top of the GTW standings, a spot they have occupied since mid

Pet FriendZ plan spooky fundraiser

Area residents can help to keep the pet-overpopulation problem down in Tuscola County and at the same time enjoy an evening of dancing fun during the Cass River Pet FriendZ second annual Spooktacular Halloween Fundraising

The event is slated for Saturday, Oct. 28, at the Brentwood in Caro. Costumes are optional, said Cass River Pet FriendZ member Patricia Trisch, who noted the doors will open at 7 p.m. and music will be provided until midnight by Rusch Entertainment DJs.

"The suggested donation is \$10 at the door and you must be 21 to enter," she said. "This will be an inexpensive and fun evening out for the community."

Trying to keep the pet over-population problem under control is a never ending and costly task, according to Trisch.

"Since forming in September of 2001, the group has actively helped others get their pets fixed as well as assisted with emergency veterinary assistance for low income people," she said. "We spend approximately \$500 per month helping low-income people fix their pets.

"We've had some grant money in the past, but that's gone, and takes a lot of time for the paperwork. The sale of homemade catnip bags generates around \$100 a month," Trisch added. "(But) the calls for financial assistance to help lowincome people get their pets fixed are never ending. The pet population continues to explode and we are forced to rely on other sources for money.'

Cats in particular are a huge overpopulation problem in Tuscola County. "Last year over \$15,000 was spent fixing people's cats, and this year will be even more," Trisch said. "Additional funds are desperately needed."

Tuscola ISD preparing for new rules regarding third grade benchmark

As state lawmakers continue to change benchmarks, educators are hiring tutors to be able to keep pace.

The newest change is the law regarding third-grade students' reading objectives. Gov. Rick Snyder signed the law in Sept. 2016. One of the key provisions in the law requires schools to hold back third-graders who are more than a grade level behind in the subject.

However, not all third-graders who are behind would have to be held back. The law does allow parents to request an exemption allowing their child to go on to fourth grade, and for new students in a district.

Although the law does not go into effect until the 2019-2020 school year, those in the Tuscola Intermediate School District (TISD) are taking steps to prepare this year.

The TISD Board hired Emily Caylor as the Early Literacy Coach to

help the ISD's nine school districts prepare to meet the new regulations. This is a grant position with partial funding from the Michigan Department of Education," said TISD Superintendent Gene Pierce. Emily's primary responsibility is working with the nine local school districts and grades first through third."

During Tuscola County wide board of education dinner at the Tuscola Tech Center Nov. 2, Caylor will be introduced and she will provide an overview of the state's Third-grade Reading Law.

Reading proficiently by the end of third grade has become a milestone in a student's education. At that grade level, the focus is on reading to learn rather than learning to read.

To enforce that stance, states like Michigan have enacted legislation that requires students not reading proficiently by the end of third grade

Because the changes do not start immediately, there is time for districts to prepare for the change, and they are. The hiring of a literacy coach will help guide districts through the process that needs to be in place.

According to a report from the National Conference of State Legislatures, research showed students not reading proficiently at the end of third grade are four times more likely to not finish high school. Under the new reading regulations for third graders, starting next

school year kindergarten through third-grade students have to be tested three times a year, and students with reading deficiencies must be given an Individual Reading Plan (IRP).

Districts with struggling readers also will be required to provide teachers with additional professional development during school time and literacy coaches who will train, model, and offer feedback on best practices in teaching reading, according to the Michigan Education Association (MEA).

In order for the students to keep pace, services for them will include increased small group and one-on-one intervention time as well as "read at home plans" to promote parental involvement. And, districts will be encouraged to provide summer reading camps using teachers rated as


In other ISD matters, Baker College offered to sell the ISD the Welding Lab equipment at the Cass City campus for \$36,767 because the program is being closed and that campus is being phased out.
