# Homeowner wounded, two men dead following home invasion in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Twp.

Sanilac Sheriff Garry Biniecki assured residents that all suspects were in custody following a reported home invasion that left two men dead and another suffering a gunshot wound to the leg early Sunday morning in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Township.

The double homicide investigation unfolded after the man targeted in the home invasion placed a 911 call to Sanilac Central Dispatch at about 5 a.m., according to Biniecki, who issued a news release Sunday afternoon stating the call came from a residence in the 4300 block of Holbrook Road.

"The caller advised that three male subjects just broke into his home and shot him in the leg. Gun fire was returned and one or more of the suspects were shot," Biniecki said. "One of the suspects was at the residence deceased and the other suspects fled on foot.

"Upon arrival to the Holbrook residence, a vehicle was located in a ditch at Holbrook and Germania. Located inside the vehicle was a black male from the Flint area, deceased with a gunshot injury," the sheriff continued. "The vehicle was reported as stolen from the Flint area back in October 2017."

The sheriff's department had not released any names as of the Chronicle's press time, nor have investigators publicly speculated about the motivation behind the home invasion.

All suspects are accounted for, Biniecki said, adding the crimes remain under investigation, and more information will be released as it becomes available.

Residents living in the area surrounding the crime scene spent several hours indoors Sunday after the sheriff's department ordered citizens to

stay home, lock their doors and not allow anyone inside.

Neighbors like Taylor Rocheleau, who along with his family reside about a mile away on Germania Road, were understandably concerned.

# Local teen recovering after head-on collision with truck

A Cass City area teen who suffered a serious head injury when the pickup truck he was driving collided head-on with a beet truck earlier this month in Huron County's Sheridan Township is reportedly recovering at home.

The accident occurred shortly after 8 a.m. Nov. 10 on Atwater Road, just east of M-53, according to Michigan State Police Specialist/First Lt. David A. Kaiser, Third District Headquarters public information officer.

A witness told troopers he was following a pickup truck driven by the 17-year-old, westbound on Atwater Road, when he saw the pickup cross over the road centerline. "There was a semi-truck eastbound, and the pickup truck was not crossing back over into his own lane," Kaiser reported. "The semi-truck started to brake and the pickup truck...turned

#### Prepare now for Old Man Winter

Fall's brilliant colors have disappeared, which can only mean the imminent arrival of another Michigan winter. In fact, area residents have already been exposed to a small taste of the cold and snow to come.

That's why Michigan State Police, Emergency Man-Homeland Security agement and (MSP/EMHSD) officials are encouraging all Michiganders to make winter emergency preparedness a prior-

"Part of Michigan has seen snow already," said Capt. Chris A. Kelenske, deputy state director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and commander of the MSP/EMHSD. "Now is the time to make sure you are prepared. Taking a few extra steps will ensure that you and your family are ready before winter weather fully arrives."

Severe winter weather poses health and safety concerns related to extremely cold temperatures, freezing pipes, potential propane shortages and power outages.

Residents across the state, including those of us in the Thumb, are encouraged to take the following actions to be prepared for the upcoming winter months:

\*Weatherproof your home by installing weather-stripping and caulking and insulating walls, doors and windows.

\*Insulate any water lines that run along exterior walls so pipes are less likely to freeze.

\*Lock in a propane rate now and have a backup heating plan, such as a generator, wood stove or fireplace.

\*Have gas or oil furnaces inspected by a qualified professional and change the air filter.

\*Have your fireplace and chimney cleaned and inspected. Contact your local fire department for a referral or look for a local inspector online.

\*Install battery-operated carbon monoxide (CO) detectors near every sleeping area. CO poisoning is most prevalent when furnaces are turned on to fight cold winter temperatures, but commonly occurs after winter storms and accompanying power outages, when people tend to rely on portable generators for electricity.

\*Clean gutters to prevent ice dams from forming. Roof ice dams can cause water to build-up, leading to interior damage.

\*Have an emergency preparedness kit stored safely in your house that includes: bottled water, non-perishable food, a first aid kit, extra batteries, a battery or handcrank powered radio, emergency lighting or flashlights, extra blankets and warm clothing.

\*Have your vehicle's radiator system serviced before winter and make sure to replace windshield wipers and wiper fluid with a wintertime mixture that will not freeze.

\*Replace any worn tires and check air pressure regu-

\*Have your brakes, brake fluid, oil, car battery, heater and exhaust checked to make sure everything is running efficiently.

\*Keep an emergency preparedness kit in your vehicle stocked with batteries, battery powered or hand-crank radio, flashlight, windshield scraper, jumper cables, mobile phone charger, shovel, blankets, first-aid kit, non-perishable food and bottled water in the event you get stranded or stuck.

The day my innocence died



It was while watching some black and white documentary films on the television that I realized I've not only lived through several historic events, but also saw them as they were first televised.

The memory of the events that happened 54 years ago is still with me — especially today.

The strongest memory is seeing a grown man cry when he heard of John F. Kennedy's assassination on Nov. 22, 1963. It was the first time I saw a man cry. That man was John Nelson, who was my teacher at Columbia Corners Country School. It was also the first time I saw a veteran news reporter so shaken he had to blink back tears as he was telling the world the president was assassinated.

For days, the TV showed coverage of the event, including Jack Ruby shooting Lee Harvey Oswald. I'm not sure, but I think the shooting of Kennedy and Oswald were the first shooting deaths captured on live

It was the first time that I heard Kennedy's time in office and his legacy referred to as "Camelot." That term supposedly came from Kennedy's love of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table, which was about a magical time of promise, truth and the fight for what is right.

I don't think that life has been the same for those who were around at the time of Kennedy's assassination.

For me, the events that happened back then spelled the death of my innocence. I never looked at the world in quite the same way after that, or truly felt safe since

Kennedy's assassination happened in public with secret service agents around him and with his wife sitting beside him. With all of that, Kennedy was killed. Then, Jack Ruby killed Oswald in a police station while he was surrounded by law enforcement officers and reporters. That underscored my realization that no place is truly safe

Those tragic incidents happened in 1963 during a genteel era. It was a time when men wore hats and suits; ladies wore dresses, gloves, and hats; and children respected their elders.

To me, after Kennedy's death, it seemed like the whole world changed. The last vestige of my innocence was murdered in Dallas as well. I think JFK's and Oswald's deaths are what prompted me to become a reporter.

At that time, The Warren Commission's investigation concluded that Oswald acted alone when he assassinated Kennedy; and that Ruby also acted alone when he killed Oswald. I, like many, am skeptical of that report and feel there is a conspiracy there somewhere (that is the questioning nature of a reporter).

I have read numerous books and watched several documentaries on the topic. The U.S. Select Committee on Assassinations reportedly concluded in 1978 that Kennedy was probably assassinated as a result of a conspiracy, and that the Warren report and investigations at the time were flawed. That report contends there is "...a high probability that two gunmen fired at [the] president," but they didn't pinpoint who.

With the release of some classified documents this month related to the assassination, there might be some new insight into what, who, why and how things happened.

Michigan producers are slowly progressing with harvest through wet conditions, according to Marlo Johnson, Director of the USDA, NASS, Great Lakes Regional Office. Highlights of the 2017 November Crop Report include:

\*\*\*\*\*

\*Michigan corn yield is up 10 bushels from last year to 167 bushels per acre. Total production is expected to be 325.7 million bushels.

\*Michigan Soybean yield is forecast at 45 bushels per acre. The yield is down 5.5 bushels from 2016, and production is 102.6 million bushels. Soybeans were 78 percent harvested by Oct. 29th, ahead last year and five-year average.

\*Sugarbeet growers anticipate a yield of 27.3 tons per acre, down 3.5 tons from last year. Production is forecast at 3.9 million tons. Sugarbeet harvest in Michigan was 47 percent complete as of the week ending Oct. 29.

\*U.S. corn production is forecast at 14.6 billion bushels, down 4 percent from last year but up 2 percent from the Oct. forecast. Yields are expected to average 175.4 bushels per acre, up 3.6 bushels from the Oct. forecast and up 0.8 bushel from 2016. If realized, this will be the highest yield on record for the United States.

\*Nationally, soybean production is forecast at a record 4.43 billion bushels, down less than one percent from Oct. but up 3 percent from last year. Yields are expected to average 49.5 bushels per acre.

Don't forget to thank our crop farmers around the dinner table this Thanksgiving.

To help establish a healthy tradition, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will waive entry fees to Michigan State Parks, recreation areas, trails and boating access sites on Friday,

\*Hike or bike more than 12,500 miles of trials. \*Drop on line off in a state park or explore a new hunting spot with your dog.

\*Bird-watching, and finding historical markers can be fun and educational.

#### Deputies investigating crash

Sanilac County Sheriff's deputies are continuing their investigation into a two-vehicle trafcrash last Wednesday afternoon in Bridgehampton Township.

Officers were dispatched to the intersection of Ruth and East Sanilac (M-46) roads at about 2:30 p.m., according to Deputy Fred Ameel.

"The accident happened when a 1992 Ford F150 being driven by

38-year-old a male from Carsonville was traveling westbound on East Sanilac Road. The driver reported seeing a vehicle traveling eastbound near the intersection," Ameel reported. "The eastbound vehicle, a 2004 Toyota Tundra being driven by a 61-year-old male from Deckerville, turned north onto Ruth Road, directly in the path of the westbound vehicle. The two vehicles collided and went off the roadway."

The driver of the westbound vehicle was transported by Sanilac EMS to McKenzie Memorial

Hospital in Sandusky, while the other motorist, along with a 54year-old passenger, was taken by Sanilac EMS to Deckerville Community Hospital.

"The names of the people involved are being withheld pending further investigation into the accident and pending charges," Ameel said. "All occupants reported wearing their seatbelts and alcohol was a factor in the acci-

Both the Carsonville and Sandusky fire departments assisted deputies at the scene.

#### Warrant leads to arrest of pair on drug charges

Deputies serving a search warrant in an effort to locate a Huron County man for missing a court date ended in the arrest of two people on drugrelated charges late Thursday morning.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said deputies served a search warrant at a South Port Crescent residence in Bad Axe shortly before noon and located the 20-year-old suspect, who was wanted charges related to probation and his failure to appear in court.

"When they entered the residence to look for him, they found him and a 31-year-old Bad Axe woman in possession of a syringe loaded with heroin and drug paraphernalia," Hanson reported.

"The deputies then obtained another search warrant to look for more possible illegal drugs and did the search. Between the original arrest and second search, heroin, marijuana in individual packages, scales and other paraphernalia were seized," the sheriff said. "Felony possession charges were added to the man, as well the woman was charged with it

Both individuals were taken to the hospital to be medically cleared, according to Hanson, who noted officers believed the pair had used heroin earlier.

"Both are now lodged in our jail, with the man needing \$10,000 cash to be released and the woman's bail set at \$5,000 cash," he said. Hanson added the Bad Axe City Police Department assisted deputies throughout the investigation.




In other words, if you figure you've been blessed, pass it on.

#### **Energy officials: demand for heating** fuels is on the rise this winter in state

Officials with the Michigan Agency for Energy last week offered a mixed bag of projected fuel prices in the agency's annual Winter Energy Appraisal.

With cold temperatures and a hint of snow having already arrived in the state, officials are not surprisingly predicting higher demand for natural gas and electricdespite projected year-over-year declines in 2017 – as well as propane, through the winter season. Demand for gasoline and distillate – primarily used to produce diesel fuel – is also projected to be higher compared to 2016.

The rise reflects trends that have been underway for the past several years, driven partially by recent mild winter seasons. The annual drop in electricity use was attributed to energy waste reduction initiatives and other factors, which has led to a decline of 2.7 percent this year.

According to the report, homeowners who use natural gas for heat – about 77 percent of Michigan households — can expect their costs to remain fairly stable, based on supplies that are near the five-year average for this time of year and prices that are projected to hold steady through the winter season. However, those who use propane or heating oil will see slightly higher prices and increased demand

The report offers the following breakdown of projects by fuel

#### **NATURAL GAS**

Key takeaway: A warmer winter in 2016-17, cooler summer, and energy waste reductions led to lower demand.

Demand: Projected to decrease 5.4 percent.

Supply: Inventories up four percent over five-year average.

Cost: Overall use, and bills, expected to increase as normal, colder winter weather is predicted

#### **PROPANE**

compared to last winter.

Key takeaway: More than eight percent of Michigan households heat with propane vs. five percent nationally.

Demand: Expected to be up 11.76 percent for 2017 over the previous year, but could climb more if temperatures turn colder than expected.

Supply: Midwest supply down about six percent from same period last year.

Prices: Up 39 cents per gallon from last year, and have increased 18 cents so far this heating season.

#### MOTOR GASOLINE

Key takeaway: Increase in consumption the result of more miles traveled due to stable prices, growing employment, and rising

Demand: 2017 is fifth year in a row of higher demand in Michigan, although the increase was not as large as it was in 2016.

Supply: Regional gas production down slightly, but inventories up slightly.

Prices: Up an average of 67 cents per gallon from last year in Michigan.

#### **ELECTRICITY**

Key takeaway: Only DTE Electric prices were down from last year; UMERC had the largest in-

Demand: Total electric sales expected to be down 2.1 percent in

2017. Despite strong economy, anticipated energy waste reduction efforts, and lower demand are

contributing to sales slide. Supply: Adequate reserves pro-

jected to meet consumer demand. Prices: Moderate increases ex-

#### DISTILLATE FUELS

Key takeaway: This year was second year in a row of growing sales for distillate, 99 percent of which is used to produce diesel

Demand: 1.2 percent growth in 2017 for industrial production, down from two percent growth the year before.

Supply: Regional production expected to be up, while national inventories are down.


Prices: Diesel fuel prices are up 55 cents per gallon; heating oil is nearly 30 percent higher than last year.

Among significant developments in the state's energy outlook is the construction of three natural gas pipelines, approval of two new power plants in the Upper Peninsula, and the results of an electrical grid study in the U.P.

In the Lower Peninsula, the Rover and Nexus pipelines are under development to bring East Coast natural gas to Michigan, increasing the delivery infrastrucand adding redundancy and system resiliency. In the Upper Peninsula, SEMCO Energy Co. received approval from the Michigan Public Service Commission to build natural gas pipelines to service two new electric generation plants.

The two new plants proposed by the Upper Michigan Energy Resources Corporation (UMERC) will replace the electricity provided by the aging Presque Isle Power Plant, which is slated to close in 2020.

#### Home heating credit gets \$22 to \$44 boost for some

Roughly 309,000 Michigan taxpayers who received Home Heating Credits in 2016 will get an additional one-time credit of \$44 or \$22 this month to help keep their homes warm.

That's according to officials at the Michigan Department of Treasury, who say the payments are the result of \$12 million remaining this year in supplemental federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program block grant dollars received by Michigan.

The additional credit will be generated automatically. Eligible households do not need to do anything to receive the credit.

Households that had direct heating obligations – such as heating bills that they paid – will receive \$44. Households with indirect heating obligations – heat cost included in their rent or a heat bill in someone else's name - will receive \$22.

Recipients of the additional credit are households that filed a 2016 MI-1040ĈR-7 Home Heating Credit Claim and qualified for the credit.

Anyone whose original Home Heating Credit was paid directly to their heat provider will also have the supplemental payment sent to the heating provider and will receive written notification in a mailing the Michigan Department of Treasury is sending this month.

Treasury will mail checks to all other households that are eligible for the supplemental Home Heating Credit. Recipients are encouraged to apply this payment to their heat bill even if there is no current balance owed.

The credit cannot be replaced or reissued. Anyone who receives a utility shutoff notice during the next six months cannot receive shutoff assistance from MDHHS if the credit is not applied to their heating bill. # NextEra seeks land-use permits for Pegasus Wind Energy development

The focus of wind development is blowing in a different direction in Tuscola County.

NextEra Energy Resources LLC is applying for special land use permits for wind development in Juniata Township as part of their Pegasus Wind Energy Center. The township board is in the process of reviewing the applications.

"The plan for that project is 63 turbines, with 31 in Juniata Township and 32 in Fairgrove Township. It is a \$200 million investment and would generate about 150 million megawatts of power," said Bryan Garner, manager of communications for NextEra Energy Resources. "There would be 350 construction jobs during the project, and then seven to 12 full-time jobs when completed."

If all goes according to plan, completion of that project is expected by the end of 2018.

Over the life of the project — 30 years — it would generate about \$35 million in property taxes and \$20 million lease payments for the landowners, according to Garner.

Although townships around Juniata have been receptive to wind development, there are concerns turbine construction in Juniata would be too close to the Tuscola Area Airport.

"The total height of the turbines to the tip of the blade is just under 500 feet," he said. "We understand

the concerns about the airport and we will be working with the airport and the township.

"The Pegasus Energy Center will tie in with our Tuscola Wind I and Tuscola Wind II (developments) in Tuscola County, and with our Pheasant Run (wind) farm in Huron County."

Even though NextEra is working on the Pegasus Wind Energy Center, that doesn't mean company officials have given up on the proposed Tuscola Wind III project in Almer and Ellington townships.

Earlier this month, U.S. Federal District Court Judge Thomas Ludington sided with Almer Township officials against NextEra Energy Resources LLC in lawsuit filed by the energy company. Tuscola

Wind III LLC, which is a subsidiary of NextEra, filed a lawsuit against Almer Township and the township board alleging there was an effort to stop the energy company from developing a wind farm of 55 turbines in those two townships.

Despite that decision, the issues between Almer Township and NextEra's developments are not over, according to Garner, who noted NextEra has not given up on developing Tuscola Wind III. "Only part of the lawsuit was decided on. There are still other issues," he added.

And, Tuscola Wind III has a similar lawsuit against Ellington Township that is still pending in court

The region's sheriff's departments are urging drivers to be on the lookout for whitetails, especially while traveling during dusk and dawn, which is when deer are the most active. But car-deer accidents can occur at any time.

It has gotten to a point where there are more deer in the Lower Peninsula than up north, a trend reflected in the number of deer taken during hunting season.

The number one area for deer hunting is in the Thumb.

According to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Management Unit, there were 24,995 deer harvested in the Thumb counties of Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola during the 2016 hunting season.

The proliferation of deer in the Lower Peninsula also accounts for the number of dead deer that can be found throughout the year along highways.

In a recent trip along M-81 from Saginaw County to M-53, 25 carcasses were counted, and along M-53 from Marlette to Bad Axe, there were more than 20.

The Huron County Sheriff's Department handled about 800 car-deer accidents in 2016, while Tuscola County reported 806. Sanilac County had 1,119 car-deer accidents last year.

"It was first thing in the morning when I got a phone call from my wife's grandma and grandpa" who live nearby, Rocheleau said. "They just said there was a shooting down on Holbrook Road, and there was still at least one suspect on the loose; that we were on 100 percent 'lockdown' and to stay in the house and keep the doors locked.

"My biggest concern was...the first thing that goes through your mind is, how many other people are they (suspects) going to go after. At that point and time, we had no idea what all had happened – just that there had been several shootings," recalled Rocheleau, who said he and his wife have three young daughters.

"It didn't take me but two seconds to get my gun," he added. "I live right out in front of a two-mile section of woods. There are a lot of places somebody could hide."

Rocheleau said he and his wife, who received word in the afternoon that the suspects were in custody, kept a careful watch on their property through their windows until they knew it was safe.

Deputies received assistance in the form of a host of other law enforcement officers from various agencies along with helicopter surveillance, K-9 units and crime scene investigators.

Assisting deputies at the scene were the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, Cass City police, troopers from the Michigan State Police (MSP) post in Caro, MSP Crime Lab, Sanilac County Sheriff's Department K-9 Unit, St. Clair County Sheriff's Department K-9 Unit, Sanilac County Detective Bureau, officers from the Sanilac County Drug Task Force, Sandusky police, Bingham EMS, and the Sanilac Road Com-



#### Unwanted prescription drop boxes in place across county

A new avenue of trying to address the prescription drug overdose epi-

demic is in place in Tuscola County.

Special collection boxes for unwanted prescriptions have been set up in various communities in Tuscola County, including one located in the Cass City Municipal Building. Others are located in the villages of Mayville and Reese.

The drug disposal campaign is designed to keep prescriptions that are old or no longer needed out of landfills and water ecosystems, and also to protect against theft or abuse by providing a safe and secure disposal method, according to Cass City Village officials.

In getting the collection boxes to the communities, Tuscola County deputies and an inmate worksite crew assisted the local drug task force in delivering the red collection boxes, said Tuscola County Sheriff Glen Skrent, noting the sheriff's department is also getting a drop box in the vestibule so that unwanted drugs can be dropped off at any time, whether or not the lobby is open.

The receptacles, known as Big Red Barrels, are not to be used to collect syringes, liquids, inhalers or medicated patches.

The special red containers were obtained through a program sponsored

by List Psychological Services. In addition to the red boxes, the Michigan State Police post in Caro, the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, the Huron County Sheriff's Department and some pharmacies also accept unwanted drugs for disposal throughout the year, and during special "take-back" events held during the year.

During the latest take-back campaign in October, the Huron County Sheriff's Department collected eight pounds of pills, the Cass City Police Department collected 25 pounds of pills, the Tuscola County Sheriff

THE TUSCOLA County Prevention and Recovery Coalition has placed drug collection receptacles in various locations, including this one in Cass City.

Department, 15 pounds, the Sanilac County Sheriff Department, eight pounds, the Sanilac County Drug Task Force, 90 pounds, and the state police, five pounds.

Law enforcement agencies turn over the collected medications to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) for disposal.

Court records are rife with charges for illegal possession of controlled substances, which officials hope to see decline by disposing of unwanted prescription drugs to keep them out of the wrong hands.

According to the Michigan Prescription Drug and Opioid Task Force, a recent national study revealed more than 54 million people ages 12 and older have abused prescription drugs at some point in their lives. The survey also determined more than 70 percent of people who abused prescription

painkillers obtained them from friends or relatives, while only about five percent got them from a drug dealer or from the Internet.

The typical possession charge is for opioid drugs such as OxyContin,

Vicodin, Xanax or their derivatives.

Michigan has been identified by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control as one of 19 states that has had a statistically significant increase in opioid-related deaths.

"Carley was the only athlete picked unanimous first team in our division. She is a great allaround player who was at the top, or near the top in every statistical category. She is a third year varsity player and was a team captain as a junior this season. She made big improvements in every category this year and really was a force offensively for us. She has always had a powerful swing, but this year she was able to mix in off speed shots to help keep the defense guessing. She really stepped it up from the service line this year which was a real difference maker for us," said Hunter.

Also earning first team all-conference honors for Kingston were junior setter Camryn MacGuire and sophomore hitter Payton Kolacz.

MacGuire led the Cardinals with 423 assists. She also chipped in 80 digs, and 36 aces on the year.

"Camryn is also a third year varsity player and was a team captain as a junior. She really elevated her game this season and as the year progressed she really controlled our offense. She did a great job distributing the ball to our hitters and had a good feel of how to beat defenses. She almost doubled her assists from last year to this year and she really took to her leadership role. She was our first server and was our tone setter every night. Camryn was automatic when she went behind the serving line, finishing the season on a streak of 178 serves in a row without a miss," Hunter said, adding, "Payton is a first year varsity player and a very gifted athlete. She swings big, she blocks big and she can go on a serving run when we need it. She adjusted nicely to the varsity level and really found her stride the second half of the season. She has a high ceiling and the future is very bright for the next few years with

Payton on board."

Kolacz was credited with 110 kills, 28 blocks and 11 aces during the 2017 campaign.

Rounding out Kingston's allconference picks were Abigail Chappel and Lily Lyons.

Chappel, senior outside hitter, was named to the NCTL-Stars all-conference second team after

a final Cardinal season that included 135 digs, 90 kills and 50 aces, while Lyons collected honorable mention praises for a junior season that was highlighted by 56 kills, 53 digs and 14 aces.

Coach Hunter acknowledged the contributions of both girls.

"Abigail loves the game of volleyball and it was always evident every time she stepped on the court. She was a great senior leader for us this season. Abigail was the engine of our team and was always there to make the hustle plays. If there was a positive momentum swing in a match, she was usually part of it. She stepped up her defensive game for us this year and led us in digs."

"Lily was a dual sport athlete this season running cross country as well. She transitioned from being a middle to an outside hitter this year and really gave us some flexibility defensively. She really turned up her game midway through the season to help us peak at the right time. She had some big games for us when some of our other hitters struggled and became our go to option those nights."



advantage of a windfall of sorts to make significant headway on improvements.

After NextEra Energy Resources recently dropped its lawsuit related to how wind farms are taxed, the money the county had put into escrow during the dispute can now be used. Roughly \$667,774 that was previously escrowed in wind turbine revenues has been placed into a newlycreated jail capital fund account for jail improvements and expansion.

"We are very pleased that the board of commissioners are taking the jail renovations seriously," said Tuscola County Sheriff Glen Skrent. "The jail was built in 1965 and is in dire need of renovations."

The jail was built utilizing an old method called Linear Design instead of the newer pod type system, which is much more efficient

of the newer pod type system, which is much more efficient. "The jail is so old, locks for the cells cannot be found, so they were replaced and it was difficult to do that. And, new windows are needed

along with many other repairs," said county Controller Mike Hoagland. Among the other issues plaguing the jail so far this year are leaking pipes, a leaking roof, sewer backups, heating and cooling breakdowns, and asbestos removal.

"We are not asking for a new jail — just improvements to make it in compliance with the standards in place for modern corrections," Skrent caid

Since the jail, located within the sheriff's department building at 420 Court St., Caro, was built 52 years ago, numerous renovations have been done to the original 46-bed facility. Back when the original jail was constructed, it was common for the sheriff and his family to have living quarters in the jail, and for his wife to cook meals for the inmates.

Eventually, that practice ended. The former living quarters were renovated and became an administration area.

As the years passed, more renovations were tackled to create more usable space and add beds. Over the years, three renovations were completed, resulting in an 80-bed facility. And, interior renovations were done four years ago to create 12 more beds for a total of 92 beds, but once again overcrowding has become an issue.

"We have some inmates in other jails because of overcrowding. We need to add a new cell to hold a few more inmates so this does not happen. It is costly to send inmates to other jails," Skrent said. "Our jail holds 93; but per state rules, we can only keep 88 at a maximum.

"We have had four inmates in Lapeer. They were there for about three months but have been brought back now," added Skrent, who noted it costs \$35 per day per inmate to house them out of the county, plus the county where the inmate is supposed to be housed has to pay any medical expenses while the inmates are housed in other counties.

Before renovations to add beds were finished four years ago, the tab one year for housing inmates out of county topped \$250,000.

"We expect population to rise as do other jails. We are at max population right now, but it fluctuates up and down daily. We added more beds a few years ago but can't add anymore unless we expand the jail,"

Besides having to address infrastructure issues, state and federal guidelines and requirements are constantly changing.

"We also need more conference rooms as new federal rules are coming out that we must comply with," he said. "We desperately need more holding cells, conference rooms and cells to meet current requirements."

The needed upgrades and expansion is not for inmate comfort, but rather to meet new correctional requirements, for the safety of correction officers, and in order to avoid having to pay to house inmates in other counties.
