Trooper will face charges in crash Thanksgiving Day

The driver of a vehicle in a one-car accident on Thanksgiving Day in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Township was an off-duty Michigan State Police (MSP) trooper, MSP officials confirmed last week. Sgt. Shelly Park of the Sanilac County Sheriff's De-

partment initially stated the crash – which occurred about a quarter-mile west of Germania Road and north of Cass City Road — was reported to Sanilac Central Dispatch at about 7:55 a.m.

CCH joins McLaren hospital group

After an intensive six-month review, the Caro Community Hospital's (CCH) Board of Trustees recently voted to join Grand Blanc-based McLaren Health Care Corp to become the not-for-profit system's 13th hospital.

CCH officials indicated the decision was on a belief that the arrangement is the best long-term fit for the Tuscola County hospital and those it serves.

"The CCH Board of Trustees has not taken this big step lightly," said Marc Augsburger, CCH president and CEO.

"Through significant due diligence, much discussion and contemplation, we have come to the decision that a formal transaction with McLaren Health Care is in the best interest of the residents of Caro and all of the surrounding communities that we serve," he added.

The arrangement between the hospi-

tals was announced last week after the CCH board voted Monday to join McLaren

In related news, the Huron Medical Center (HMC) Board of Trustees announced recently that it will pursue an exclusive letter of intent to become a part of McLaren, one of Michigan's largest integrated health systems, and become a wholly-owned subsidiary of McLaren Health Systems in three to six

"Caro's decision to join McLaren actually began a couple of years ago when Clarence Sevillian, president and CEO of McLaren Bay Region, began having discussions with Augsburger about how their two organizations could work collaboratively to provide coordinated health care services to meet the community needs," said Kevin Tompkins, McLaren's marketing and planning discoordinated

"Those initial discussions led to

greater interest on the part of CCH to consider a more formal relationship with McLaren" Tompkins added

Augsburger offered assurance that the Caro area was not at risk of losing its

"(What) CCH has experienced over the past five years is just the beginning of what the future will bring to our communities," he said. "Healthcare is changing rapidly and we are even better poised to answer the high quality, lower cost challenges that lie ahead."

As result, ČCH will be able to offer a greater variety of services, according to Augsburger.

"This is very exciting news for us, the community and those we serve. There will be some exciting changes coming," said Jamie Wark, CCH marketing manager

At this point, there will not be any facility changes.

Flu season is here, get vaccinated now

The holidays are an ideal time to celebrate with friends and family, but they can be downright miserable if you come down with the flu.

That's why Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) officials along with the Tuscola County Health Department are once again urging all residents to protect themselves against the flu and its potentially life-threatening consequences by getting vaccinated as soon as possible.

"The flu is a serious and potentially life-threatening illness; it's not something to be taken lightly," said Dr. Eden Wells, M.D., chief medical executive of the MDHHS. "In our communities and as health care professionals, it's important we all encourage our friends and family to remember to get their flu vaccine every year."

Officials at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) agree, saying an annual flu vaccine is the first and best way to protect yourself and your family from the flu.

In 2017, a study in "Pediatrics" was the first of its kind to show that flu vaccination also significantly reduced a child's risk of dying from influenza.

The more people who get vaccinated, the more people will be protected from flu, including older people, very young children, pregnant women, and people with certain long-term health conditions who are more vulnerable to serious flu complications.

While flu vaccines are updated each year to better match circulating viruses, the CDC is again recommending against using the nasal spray flu vaccine (LAIV) this year.

Flu is a contagious respiratory virus that often causes fever, sore throat, cough, body aches, and fatigue. People already infected with flu can spread the virus to others even before they feel sick. The flu vaccination is the single best way to prevent getting the flu and its complications.

Everyone six months of age and older should receive a flu vaccine every flu season.

It is especially important that children, adults aged 65 years and older, persons with chronic health conditions, and pregnant women get vaccinated against flu. Flu vaccination for pregnant women does not just protect the mother, it also protects her unborn baby.

It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body that protect against flu, according to CDC officials, who recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October, if possible. Getting vaccinated later, however, can still be beneficial and vaccination should continue to be offered throughout the flu season, even into January or later.

With the flu already confirmed in Michigan this season, health officials say it's vital that residents get vaccinated before they are exposed to a flu virus.

The Tuscola County Health Department has appointments available Monday through Friday as well as walk-in service. For county residents ages 60 to 64, the vaccine is covered by county senior millage funds. More information is available by calling (989) 673-8116 or 673-1680.

The bottom line is, don't wait – talk to your healthcare provider today about which flu vaccine is the best one for you, and then take a few minutes to get your vaccination.

Anyway, during the fall, Bobby had a health scare, which in turn also scared me. It seems like over the last few years every performing artist whose music I like passed away. News reports said his hand started tingling, and when he got the issue checked out, it showed he had a ruptured disc in his neck that pinched his spinal cord.

According to reports, he had surgery and is recover-

I have nearly all of his CDs and know most of the words to his songs by heart. Outside of the fact that I met Bobby when we were kids, I feel a close connection to him because the lyrics of his music speak to me and some of the songs parallel my life.

I was rather a wild child back in the day. His song, "Against the Wind," is the one that really connects with me because I made some bad choices that created a lot of hurt and drama.

"Against the Wind" starts out talking about young love and thinking about how it will never end, and being like a "wildfire out of control - until there was nothing left to burn and nothing left to prove."

That was so me. I ran headlong against the wind, challenging life, convention and rules. I made numerous mistakes. Like the song says, "I wish I didn't know now what I didn't know then..."

There have been some hard lessons along the way.

I also found myself "alone and surrounded by strangers I thought were my friends." I used to be constantly on the move, working two jobs, and riding my motorcycle all over the state. I would spend a day or two in a town, or if I liked it stayed there longer, sleeping under the stars at night.

"I was living to run and running to live," just like the song, and I "broke the rules that wouldn't bend."

Eventually, I settled down and put those drifter days of traveling on two wheels behind me.

Seger released "Against the Wind" in 1980. That also happened to be the year my son was born, changing my life.

Along with being a mother, becoming a journalist also helped me settle down and stop running against the wind. Motherhood and journalism put my life in perspective. As the song notes, "I have so much more to think about ... deadlines and commitments."

Motherhood and journalism became my shelters against the turbulent winds that used to buffet my life.

Dec. 7 should be declared holiday


Dear editor,

With the growing opioid epidemic and the issues of how to dispose of unused or expired prescription medications, Tuscola County now has six drop off locations. Area residents can now drop off their old medications with a no questions asked policy at the following locations:

*Reese Police Department – 2073 Gates St, Reese, MI – Monday-Friday from 8am-2pm *Vassar Police Department – 287 E. Huron Ave, Vassar, MI – 24/7 Drop Off

*Tuscola County Sheriff's Office – 420 Court St, Caro, MI – 24/7 Drop Off

The Big Red Barrels Project at local police departments - part of the county's Drug Disposal Campaign efforts - accept all medications except syringes, plastics, inhalers, liquids, and patches.

The goals of the Drug Disposal Campaign for Tuscola County are to reduce the number of illegal prescription drugs on our streets and to reduce misuse in our community. We also will be collecting data periodically to inform the community of the amount of drugs taken out of our county. This is a community service effort. Please bring medication in their original containers. Once meds are disposed of, you can appropriately recycle the plastic containers. It is best to remove the Rx labels prior to recycling. I'll always consider myself a stream fisherman at heart.

In fact, I've never caught a salt water fish in my life – until earlier this month when a group of area friends invaded Clearwater Beach, Florida for an extended weekend getaway.

For me that meant two days of off-shore fishing. On day one, we chartered a boat for a half day and targeted King and Spanish Mackerels. Trolling three rods at about five knocks per hour, we hooked many using spoons about seven miles out into the Atlantic Ocean.

On day two, we fished 25 miles from shore and targeted grouper using a variety of baits that we let drift just off the bottom near a spot known for ship wrecks in about 100' of water. The action started quickly – I caught my first Grunt - but tapered off in the afternoon.

Both days the weather was perfect with light winds, much to my liking.

To everyone's liking were the wildlife sightings

at sea including 1,000s of jelly fish, sea turtles, and of course, dolphins.

Wind farm development firm targeting land in Juniata Twp.

The possibility of another wind farm is on the horizon in western Tuscola County.

NextEra Energy Resources LLC officials submitted special landuse permits for their Pegasus Wind Energy Center project to build 31 turbines in Juniata Township. They also plan to build 32 turbines in Fairgrove Township as part of the same project.

At the same, a group of citizens is keeping a watchful eye on the proposals on behalf of their friends and neighbors.

The Juniata Concerned Citizen Group formed in November with some guidance from members of the Almer and Ellington group that opposed NextEra's wind project in those townships, according to Brenda Bigham, who has lived in Juniata Township all her life and is a member of the local concerned citizens group.

The citizens group's mission is to bring awareness and transparency to NextEra Energy's request for special land-use permits to build wind towers and to insure decisions protect the health, safety and wellbeing of the community, Bigham explained.

According to NextEra Manager of Communications Bryan Garner, the construction of 63 turbines in those two townships adds up to roughly a \$200 million investment and would generate about 150 million megawatts of power. The plan, he said, is to have the project completed by the end of 2018.

"The Pegasus Energy Center will tie in with our Tuscola Wind I and Tuscola Wind II (wind farms) in Tuscola County, and with our Pheasant Run (wind) farm in Huron County," Garner said.

The total height of the turbines in the Pegasus project, from the bottom to the tip of the blade, is just under 500 feet. Height is a concern because of traffic at the nearby Tuscola Area Airport in Caro. The turbines will exceed height limitations in the local zoning ordinance. Some or all of the special land-use permits could be denied, but there is an appeals

Because the new wind farm could be an area of contention, Tuscola County commissioners reviewed the Tuscola Area Airport Zoning Board of Appeals (AZBA) by-laws that were drafted in 2011, and the fact that the five-member board appointed at that time has only met once.

According to Tuscola County Controller Mike Hoagland, NextEra may have researched alternatives to height limitation with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and in some cases the FAA will make provisions to allow turbine construction with alternative land instruction to pilots to avoid turbne locations.

yield at the corner and pulled into the path of a southbound vehicle.

Foote was driving a Ford F150 pickup truck and the other driver, Kati Lasceski of Filion, was traveling southbound in a Ford Escort, according to Sgt. Ron DuBois, who said that Lasceski was treated at the scene for minor injuries by

Bingham EMS personnel. "The Argyle Fire Department was the responding fire department," DuBois noted. "Foote was issued a citation. Both drivers reported wearing their seatbelts, and alcohol was not a factor."

Five minutes later, deputies and some members of the Argyle Fire Department responded to another crash - this one on Ubly Road near Stone Road.

"The investigation by deputies determined that 73-year-old Mary Gibbs from Sandusky was driving a 2014 Jeep Grand Cherokee southbound on Ubly Road," DuBois said.

"Gibbs was slowed and preparing to make a left hand turn into a private drive. A 1998 Peterbilt semi with loaded trailer was southbound behind the jeep (and) the driver, 37-year-old Brian Jerome from North Branch was following too closely and was unable to stop in time, striking the back of the Jeep," he continued.

"The driver of the Jeep was transported to McKenzie (Memorial) Hospital by Sanilac EMS. The two other occupants of the Jeep were uninjured," DuBois reported. "The driver of the semi was cited for the accident. All occupants reported wearing seatbelts, and alcohol was not a factor in the accident."

Alcohol was suspected as a contributing factor in the crash, according to Sanilac County Undersheriff Brad Roff, who said the driver was then arrested on suspicion of drinking and driving and transported to the county jail. His name was withheld pending possible arraignment on charges.

Special First Lt. David Kaiser, public information officer for the MSP Third District, said criminal prosecution in the case is pending lab results on the blood draw taken from the driver of the vehicle.

"I can confirm the driver of the vehicle was an off-duty Michigan State police trooper assigned to the Flint Post. The trooper is currently off duty pending adjudication of this case," Kaiser said.

"The Michigan State police has a long-standing tradition of demanding the highest possible standards of professional conduct from its enforcement and civilian members. All allegations of misconduct are aggressively investigated," he added.

"The process used to investigate allegations of misconduct is clearly established in department policy," Kaiser noted. "Oversight of the investigation process is the responsibility of the professional standard section out of Lansing."

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

The Tuscola County Community Foundation was established after nine residents from the Cass City and Caro areas – Richard Ransford, Susan Walker, Robert Tuckey, Sue Ransford, Harry Schubel, Richard Donahue, Linda Marshall, James White and former Tuscola County District Court Judge Richard Kern – met to determine the requirements to establish a community foundation.

"Part of their motivation was the challenge issued by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to match \$1, up to \$1 million, for every \$2 raised by community foundations," Micklash explained. "To meet the requirements, a grant application had to be submitted by April 1, 1997, and a youth advisory committee (YAC) had to be estab-

"Through the diligent efforts of these volunteers along with the help of many others, all require-

ments for establishing a community foundation as well as the application for the Kellogg grant were completed," he continued. "In early 1998, trustees of the William A. and Ruth Janks Foundation and the Claude D. and Etta Andrews Foundation agreed to end their private foundation status and become part of the new Tuscola County Community Founda-

With all of the requirements fulfilled, a Challenge Youth Project Grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation was awarded to the Tuscola County Community Foundation in two installments — \$900,000 in November 1998 and \$100,000 in August 1999.

Today, the foundation maintains more than 90 funds, most of them endowed. Current assets total \$13 million, with over \$4.5 million awarded from the various funds to-date for the purpose of "helping to make Tuscola County a better place to live."

"We will soon be listed on the on-line website along with over 50,000 other Little Free Libraries in the nation," she said. "We are currently filling it with books for folks of all ages. Many children's books will be inside along with novels and fiction for older folks.

Kranz added, "The motto here is 'Take a Book. Leave a Book.' We hope many people find this useful in the Deford area."

The original Little Free Library was established about eight years ago, according to the project's website at Littlefreelibrary.org.

In 2009, Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin, built a model of a one room schoolhouse as a tribute to his mother; she was a teacher who loved to read. He filled it with books and put it on a post in his front yard. His neighbors and friends loved it, so he built several more and gave them

"Rick Brooks of UW-Madison saw Bol's do-it-yourself project while they were discussing potential social enterprises. Together, the two saw opportunities to achieve a variety of goals for the common good," the website states. "They were inspired by community gift-sharing networks, 'take a book, leave a book' collections in coffee shops and public spaces, and most especially by the philanthropist Andrew Carnegie."

Around the turn of the 20th century, Carnegie set a goal to fund the creation of 2,508 free public libraries across the English-speaking

That goal inspired Brooks and Bol to set their own goal of surpassing 2,508 Little Free Libraries by the end 2013. They wound up exceeding that goal in August of 2012, a year and a half before their target date. By 2010, the name Little Free Library was established and the purpose of these Little Free Library book exchanges became clear: to share good books and bring communities together.

The first official Little Free Library outside of the Hudson area was put on a bike path in Madison in the summer of 2010. Within a few months, thousands of people had seen the Library. As Bol and Brooks continued to give away Little Libraries with wooden charter signs, engraved with official charter numbers, curiosity and demand for more li-

The year 2011 brought national media attention, and by the end of the year there were nearly 400 Little Free Libraries in existence. That number would skyrocket to over 4,000 libraries by the end of 2012, the same year in which Little Free Library became a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the world.

As the Little Free Library movement has grown, notable people such as Matt Groening, creator of the Simpsons, have supported our mission and designed one-of-a-kind Little Library models.

In 2013, Little Free Library was honored to receive the Innovations in Reading Prize from the National Book Foundation, and Bol and Brooks were bestowed with the Movers and Shakers award from the American Library Association, highlighting them as thought leaders in the library

The organization has continued to grow and receive national media attention, with features in prestigious publications such as the New York Times, Washington Post, NBC Nightly News, USA Today, The Chronicle of Philanthropy, Reader's Digest, and many more.

In 2017, the organization surpassed 60,000 registered Little Free Libraries in all U.S. states and in more than 80 countries.





Pastor's Corner

First Baptist Church welcomes new pastor

After several months of waiting and praying, First Baptist Church of Cass City ended their pastoral search in October.

Pastor Christian Wright, formerly of Findlay, Ohio, recently began serving at First Baptist Church. He fills the vacancy left by Pastor David Hill, who retired.

Pastor Wright bridges a gap of some 200 miles by moving from Ohio to his new ministry in Cass City. However, he is by no means a stranger to Michigan. Originally from Grand Rapids, Pastor Wright spent a number of his growing up years in Bay City, Marlette, and Brown City before moving with his parents to northeastern Ohio.

It was around this time that Pastor Wright says he felt led to be in the ministry. "I accepted the Lord as my Savior at the age of eight... and as I grew in the Lord, it became clear to me that [He] was calling me into full-time Christian service."

Pastor Wright accepted that calling and later went on to earn degrees from both Pennsylvania's Baptist Bible College and Michigan's Detroit Baptist Theological Seminary, preparing him for future church service.

His first pastoral opportunity opened in 1998, when he was offered the youth pastor position at First Baptist Church in Gibraltar, MI. Since then, Pastor Wright has served as both assistant and senior pastor to Ohio churches, altogether holding 19 years of experience in full-time ministry.

Now, beginning fresh in Cass City, Pastor Wright's goal is "to lead the church family by preaching and teaching the Word of God." He also made clear that his ministry would not be confined to his new church. "I believe that it

is important to have an active part in our community," he later stated.

Not only is First Baptist Church gaining a new pastor; they are also looking forward to getting acquainted with all six members of the Wright family. Serving alongside of him is his wife, Pam, and their four children; Sarah, Elie, Katie, and Nathan.

Although they leave many friends behind, Pastor Wright assures "they are convinced that this move to Cass City is God's leading and are excited to see what [He] has planned for them here."

Taking his place as 31st pastor of First Baptist, Pastor Wright's first Sunday in Cass City was October 29th. He continues to bring messages from the Word of God each week on Sunday and Wednesday, eager to "reach the community with the gospel of Jesus Christ."





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Christmas Spirit

Huron County deputies join effort to help families during the holidays

Huron County Sheriff's deputies joined have again joined with county businesses, organizations, individuals and a small army of volunteers to help make the holidays something special for hundreds of youngsters

Deputies were working side by side Saturday, distributing toys at North Huron High School with Huron County Juvenile Office Kelly Leavine, who also serves as Huron County's Toys for Tots coordinator.

"This effort began seven years ago when Leavine was a full-time deputy sheriff and has continued with overwhelming success," Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said. "When she originally took the task over, around 100 kids were being helped. Now it has grown to over 300.

"Each year when the Toys for Tots campaign begins, our deputies place and retrieve the majority of toy collection boxes, as well as the monetary donation containers throughout our county," Hanson added. "They also conduct the registration and screening portion of the event at our office.

"This whole program is no small undertaking, and our county's residents, factories and businesses have been extremely supportive."

During Saturday's distribution, organizers estimated nearly \$40,000 worth of toys were given to parents or guardians of children who wouldn't have otherwise found much under their Christmas trees due to family hardships.

Hanson indicated the campaign was truly a community effort.

"Leavine was assisted during the event by 44 volunteers who consisted of deputies, Bay Port State Bank personnel, students from the North Huron and Harbor Beach Schools and family and friends of Leavine," he said. "The Ubly Women's Life Chapter generously Christmas wrapped toys for parents wanting them wrapped.

"This whole organized distribution would have not been possible without the help of the volunteers, as well as being able to use the North Huron High School, which is also actually used year around to store leftover toys, or toys that come in before the campaign begins," Hanson noted. "The goodwill project is certainly one that separates our county from many others."

The sheriff's department also participates in and oversees is the distribution of monetary gifts and food gift certificates to residents and families experience difficult times in their lives.

"Some examples of those having a bad year include those who have lost a loved one, extended illness, grandparents having to raise grand-children, those losing a job because their place of employment closes, etc. We've also helped a couple of non-profit organization committed to the same cause," Hanson explained.

"This program began four years ago when caring Huron County citizens, wanting to remain anonymous, came to me and asked that we use our discretion to distribute \$100 bills, or \$100 food certificates to those who may have had a bad year, or are in a bad way. Each year I ask for recommendations of recipients from other local police agencies, clergy, municipal and school leaders and other agencies that deal with the well-being of people," he continued.

"On average, we've been receiving around \$4,000 per year to distribute, but there was one year we got over \$7,000," Hanson said. "So far this year, we've received \$1,700 but we're hoping for a little more because we know of at least 39 (residents) who could use some extra help. I likely will do a follow-up update on this effort as we get closer to Christmas.

Shift to early start for schools alive and well in area

The number of Huron County Schools planning to start school before

Labor Day next fall is growing.

The Huron Intermediate School District (HISD) is expected to receive a waiver from the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) to start the 2018-19 school year before Labor Day if all schools in the county

And schools in Tuscola County may be the next to ask for a waiver.

"Our superintendent group will be discussing this issue on Dec. 14 (when they meet)," said Tuscola Intermediate School District (TISD) Supt. Gene Pierce. "No decisions have been solidified at this time." Officials in the Cass City School District are taking the change to start the school year earlier under consideration.

"We are in negotiations with teachers now. That is something that probably will be looked at," said Cass City Supt. Jeff Hartel.

Legislation was enacted in 2005 — when Jennifer Granholm was governor of Michigan — prohibiting schools from starting classes before Labor Day. The goal behind the legislation was to boost tourism in the state.

However, recent proposed legislature, Senate Bill 271, would allow school districts to opt out of that requirement by getting a waiver from the MDE, allowing for an earlier start. However, the bill outlines that classes in August can only be held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays until September.

According to Pierce, there is only one school district in Tuscola County that is using an alternative school-year schedule.

"The Akron-Fairgrove (School District) was approved by MDE for a balanced calendar last year and they will continue for next year," he noted

With the balanced school year schedule, students go to school year around with breaks throughout the year, instead of a full summer vacation

Going with an earlier start is designed to address the "educational slide" students experience over the summer break. During that time off, many students have to relearn information from the previous school year. It also provides students with more time to prepare for standard-

many students have to relearn information from the previous school year. It also provides students with more time to prepare for standardized tests such as SAT and M-STEP.

"Everyone agrees student retention (of information) is better when there isn't a long lag between learning," Hartel explained, adding ob-

taining a waiver from the MDE isn't a difficult process. "If you want a special waiver to start early, the MDE will give it to you," he said. If the Tuscola ISD gets a waiver to start classes in August, it could im-

pact a school district located in two counties.

The Unionville-Sebewaing Area School District is in both Huron County and Tuscola County. When ISDs were created, USA officials selected going with the Tuscola ISD.
