### Divided council rejects medical pot plant

In a split decision Monday night, the Cass City Village Council told businessmen Gary Vollmar and Gus Ploss their proposed medical marijuana processing plant isn't the right fit for the local community. But before Monday's 3-4 roll call vote – conducted during a regular monthly meeting of the village council, eliminating the need to craft an ordinance to establish a medical marijuana growing operation in an unused, 25,000-squarefoot area inside the Millennium Industries factory at 6285 Garfield Ave. — a parade of supporters for the plan addressed the overflowing crowd in attendance.

Don Ball, Joe Van Auken, Janie Meeker and Gary Jones were among the citizens that voiced support for granting a Class C license, which allows for the growing, cultivation and curing of up to 1,500 marijuana plants.

Vollmar had assured village offi-

cials that the proposed plant would be a well-controlled operation featuring a state-of-the-art H/Vac system to control any odor, 24/7 security with camera monitoring, a hydroponic growing system, and a carefully selected workforce required to undergo criminal background checks.

Vollmar and Ploss estimated their

initial investment in the business at roughly \$1.5 million, with the venture generating \$40,000 in property taxes, 30 to 35 full-time jobs and a payroll of roughly \$1 million in the first year.

"If this council votes against it, you are not supporting industry,"

A Flint man scheduled for a jury trial this fall in connection with a break-in and double homicide at a residence in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Township last year entered pleas in the case.

Preston Xavier Jack, 31, whose four-day trial was scheduled to begin Sept. 18, appeared in front of Sanilac County Circuit Judge

In accordance with a plea agreement reached with Sanilac County Prosecutor James V. Young, Jack will serve a minimum sentence of 10 years in prison plus a two-year

### Village planners okay site plan for grocery

The Cass City Planning Commission unanimously approved the site plan for the community's long-promised grocery store during a meeting last week.

The board approved developer and Thumb businessman Jim Zyrowski's plans for what will be called Ben's Fresh Neighborhood Market, which will be located in the former Erla's Food Center building on Church Street.

"The store will have groceries, a deli, a bakery and sitting area to drink coffee, an area for hardware (and) a pharmacy," said Russ Biefer, chairman of the planning commission. "The plan looked like it was going to have a nice layout. It all looked pretty interesting."

The business will feature a full-service deli offering chicken along with other lunch and dinner entrees. Another part of Zyrowski's plan is to house a branch of Frankenmuth Credit Union inside the new store, a move made possible last year when he secured a zoning variance allowing construction of a bank drive-through along the north side of Church Street, within less than the 60-foot setback requirement in the village's zoning ordinance.

Zyrowski, who said last week he expects to open the doors for business by the end of the year, noted the final step will be securing the permits

needed from the county to complete renovations at the store. Zyrowski said the design for his Cass City store incorporates a variety of departments beyond groceries.

The reason, he explained, is the days of small communities having stand-alone bakeries and meat shops, for example, are gone.

"You have to be the community center today. The cost of doing business today is so great, you have to have a mix," he added. "I know the business well, and it has to be right. There's no room for error."

Ben's Supercenter is family owned and operated. Founded in 1965, the company currently has three locations; Ben's Supercenter in Brown City, Ben's Supercenter in Marlette and Ben's Contractor Center/Ben's Great Outdoors, also in Marlette.

When renovations are completed at the Cass City location, the store will actually yield one-third more space than when Erla's was open because the area previously devoted to meat processing will now be used for the grocery/deli/bakery sections of the new business, according to Zyrowski.

Zyrowski originally planned to build a grocery store just north of M-81 on the west end of Cass City on the site of the former Croft Clara lumber yard, but later opted to use the Erla's building — which he purchased in the fall of 2015 – saying it would be far less expensive to renovate than to build from scratch.

Cass City has been without a grocery store for nearly four years. In September 2014, former Erla's Food Center owner Venu Ganga closed the business after owning and operating the store for about 2 ½ years. Ganga originally purchased the business in February 2011, marking the end of a 57-year business tradition established by the Erla family.

mandatory term for the felony firearm conviction. Teeple will determine the maximum sentence in the case.

Jack is scheduled for sentencing Wednesday, Sept. 12.

Jack was arraigned on a host of felony charges following the Nov. 19 crime in Greenleaf Township that left two other Flint men dead from gunshot wounds.

Investigators said the motive behind the break-in was the planned robbery of a medical marijuana growing operation at the residence.

The double homicide investigation unfolded after the man targeted in the home invasion placed a 911 call to Sanilac Central Dispatch at about 5 a.m., saying three males had just broken to his home in the 4300 block of Holbrook Road and shot him in the leg. Gun fire was returned, according to reports, who stated one of the suspects was found at the residence deceased and the others fled on foot.

Investigators subsequently discovered a vehicle in a ditch at Holbrook and Germania roads. Inside the vehicle was a black male from the Flint area, deceased with a gunshot injury. Law enforcement officials said the vehicle had been reported stolen from the Flint area last October.

Jack and a co-defendant, Stephen V. Shimmel, 47, also of Flint, were subsequently captured and charged with two counts of assault with intent to commit murder, conspiracy to commit assault with intent to murder, armed robbery causing serious injury, two counts of assault with intent to rob while armed, conspiracy to commit armed robbery, first degree home invasion, possession of a firearm by a felon, receiving and concealing a stolen motor vehicle, and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Hours later, Shimmel took his own life, with Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki reporting the defendant hung himself inside a single-occupant cell in the upper level of the county jail.

Jack, who underwent a forensic psychiatric evaluation earlier this year and was deemed competent to stand trial, remains incarcerated at the Sanilac County Jail without bond.

to run for a seat on the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners. Her bid was unsuccessful, but she returned to the council via appointment to fill a trustee seat vacated by the Rev. Mark Karwowski.

### Beware of rabies risk involving bats

Summer brings plenty of opportunity to enjoy the outdoors, and Michigan is an ideal playground for all ages, whether you enjoy a dip in a Great Lake or camping in the deep woods.

But summer also brings out wildlife that present health risks to people and their pets.

Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) officials say they're seeing an uptick in bats testing positive for rabies. As of June 28, the MDHHS Bureau of Laboratories had identified rabies in 22 bats and two skunks. Last year at the same time, MDHHS had identified nine bats with rabies.

Rabies is a viral disease of mammals that is transmitted through the bite or scratch of an infected animal, and bats and skunks are the most common carriers of rabies in Michigan.

In 2017, there were 38 cases of rabies in animals in Michigan, including 35 bats, two skunks and one cat.

Local health departments experience an increase in calls from citizens about bat encounters during the warm weather months between May and September, when bats are more active, searching for food and rearing their young.

People or pets usually get exposed to rabies when they are bitten by an infected animal. Other situations that may present a risk are when a bat is found in a room with people who have been asleep, or a bat is found with an unattended child or impaired adult who cannot be sure they didn't have contact with the bat. In these cases, it is important to collect the bat for rabies testing.

Rabies is fatal to humans. Post exposure treatment is given to people who are exposed to a potentially rabid animal. Treatment is not necessary if the animal tests negative for rabies.

You can help to protect your family and pets from rabies by taking the following simple steps:

\*Avoid contact with wild animals. Do not keep wild animals as pets and do not try to rehabilitate wild animals yourself. Wild animals can carry rabies without looking sick.

\*If a wild animal appears sick, report it to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) online or by calling (517) 336-5030. \*If you are bitten or scratched by an animal, seek immediate medical attention and alert the local health department. A directory of local public health departments is available at Malph.org. \*If you find a bat in your home, safely confine or collect the bat if possible and contact your local health department to determine if it should be tested for rabies. More information on how to collect a bat safely can be found on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's website. \*Protect your pets by getting them vaccinated against rabies. Even cats that live indoors and never go outside can encounter a bat that gets inside the home. \*If your animal is bitten or scratched by a wild animal, or if you believe they have had unsupervised contact with wildlife, contact your veterinarian as soon as possible. Even if your pet is currently vaccinated against rabies, additional actions may need to be taken to prevent them from becoming infected. If possible, safely confine or capture the wild animal without touching it and contact your local animal control officer or veterinarian, as the animal may need to be tested for rabies.

### Aircraft crash claims one life

County and federal agencies are continuing their investigation into an aircraft accident that cost a Huron County man his life early last week.

The victim was identified as 44year-old pilot Trever Engler of Bad Axe.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said his department is

working with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the Na-Transportation Safety tional Board (NTSB) as officials work to determine the cause of the Monday afternoon crash.

It didn't take long for Jim Zyrowski to present the site plan for his planned grocery store in Cass City before the grapevine and Facebook lit up (a little) with comments from a handful of folks picking at the veteran businessman's decision to include a pharmacy, bank, hardware section, etc. in his new venture.

"We don't need another pharmacy – we already have two," one individual complained. "Why is he putting in a hardware? We already have one," another pointed out.

And on and on.

You're right, folks; Cass City already has two pharmacies and a hardware store.

What Cass City doesn't have – and hasn't had for nearly four years – is a grocery store.

And when someone is finally willing to put his money where his mouth is, with plans to invest hundreds of thousands of dollars into bringing a grocery to the community, you start nit picking and whining? Really? Of course, everyone certainly has the right to voice their opinion.

But think about what we're getting here. Start with a full selection of groceries, fresh produce, a deli, bakery and more, all inside a top-quality facility and within a short distance of home. That's especially important for our senior citizens, some of whom have limited choices when it comes to traveling the distance most of us do now to shop for groceries.

I believe we're also getting a new member of the business community that will be willing to give back to the community in the coming years. Not every business in town does that.

If you're skeptical, take a drive to Marlette sometime, tour Zyrowski's Ben's Supercenter there and ask around about the business.

It's never a challenge finding someone willing to bad-mouth this or that store or business. Heck, some folks have turned that sort of negativity into a hobby of sorts.

However, when a business owner is willing to invest in a new business in the village, what they sell is their call alone – not yours and not the local government (which, to their credit, hasn't made an effort to dictate that sort of thing). It's called free enterprise.

When my wife and I arrived in the Thumb close to 32 years ago, Cass City had two grocery stores, a couple of clothing stores, two pharmacies (located right next to each other), two bakeries, etc. Decades earlier, the town even had two newspapers for a period of time.

Sure, that was a different time.

So is this. Zyrowski offered the following explanation when asked about the variety of merchandise he plans to offer when he opens the doors to his new business: "You have to be the community center today. The cost of doing business today is so great, you have to have a mix," he said.

Maybe Zyrowski's grocery store in Cass City will have a significant, negative impact on other established businesses in town. Maybe not. Perhaps any negative impact would be lessened if folks forgo that trip to Caro and picked up the new screwdriver or prescription they need locally instead.

In any event, if you're still bothered by Zyrowski's decisions in designing the new Ben's Fresh Neighborhood Market – the name of his Cass City location, expected to open by the end of this year – you're always welcome to open your own grocery. Your way. With your money.

Until then, hopefully the community will welcome Zyrowski's effort and investment by giving him as much business as it can.

Tuscola Night Out, slated for Thursday, Aug. 2, is a family-friendly event that features fire department and law enforcement equipment and demonstrations, along with other information displays.

The free event allows citizens the chance to interact with local first responders. Free food will also be available while it lasts.

### Rawson Memorial District Library renewal on ballot Elkland among townships seeking road funding

It's going to be a busy election day in Tuscola County.

Voters will decide a slew of funding requests — most of them special millages for specific purposes – during the Tuesday, Aug. 7, election, including 21 local questions submitted by various units of government.

In addition, voters in the Cass City area are being asked to renew a tax levy of .35 of a mill for four years, through 2022, to continuing funding services provided by Rawson Memorial District Library.

If approved, the tax would raise about \$57,000 next year. For the owner of a home with a market value of \$80,000, the millage costs roughly \$14 annually.

"The library is, in essence, simply asking for a renewal of the current operating millage, in order to continue current operations," Rawson Memorial District Library Director Kate Van Auken said.

"Property taxes and penal fines (make up) 86 percent of the operating budget," she noted. "Penal fines — 13 percent of the budget — are an unstable source of funding and have consistently gone down for the past three years. The library needs these funds for dayto-day operations."

In 2017, local library patrons had access to more than 26,000 physical items plus 10,500 virtual items in the Rawson Memorial District Library collection. More than 350 patrons are using the library's virtual services to check out downloadable audio, ebooks and emagazines.

In addition, the library's 11 public computers were used more than 5,000 times for word processing or to access the Internet for job searches, research, etc.

Patrons borrowed more than 1,280 items from other libraries through Rawson Memorial, and a combined 6,448 residents participated in 454 programs held in the library's meeting/study rooms.

#### **Elkland Township**

Among the local units of government asking citizens to support funding requests is Elkland Township, where voters will decide a proposed one-mill increase for road construction, improvement and maintenance over the next six years.

"After years of seeing township revenues decline, and the cost of our road work increase, the Elkland Township Board decided that we need to join (other) Tuscola County townships in putting a road millage on the...ballot," said Elkland Township Clerk Ed La-Belle.

"Resurfacing of our existing paved roads has increased substantially in the past few years (along) with gravel work that is needed to keep our roads in good condition," LaBelle added.

The tax would raise roughly \$80,000 in the first year and cost the owner of an \$80,000 home roughly \$40 annually.

#### Other townships

Ellington Township officials have a pair of millage renewal requests on the August ballot, including three mills for five years to fund construction, preservation, improvement, repairs and maintenance of township roads.

Three mills generates about \$115,000 annually and costs the owner of an \$80,000 home roughly \$120 annually.

In addition, Ellington Township voters will decide the proposal renewal of one mill for five years for fire protection services provided via contracts with other area municipalities, including Elkland Township and the city of Caro. The tax adds up to about \$38,000 a year, costing the owner of an \$80,000 home \$40 annually.

Elmwood Township residents, meanwhile, will decide two millage requests, including a proposed one-mill increase for 10 years for the construction, preservation, improvement, repairs and maintenance of township roads.

If approved, the tax would raise \$41,000 a year and cost the owner of an \$80,000 home about \$40 annually.

Township officials are also asking residents to support renewal of 1.4985 mills for 10 years, also for road construction, repair and maintenance. The renewal amount generates about \$62,500 annually, costing the owner of an \$80,000 home roughly \$60 a year.

Also in the Cass City area, officials in Novesta Township are asking their citizens to approve renewal of one mill for four years to fund ditching, grading, graveling and paving of township roads.

The millage raises roughly \$35,800 annually and costs the owner of an \$80,000 home about \$40 a year.

#### U.S. Senator - six-year term

Vying for the seat, which represents citizens in Tuscola and Huron counties, are Republicans Matthew D. Bierlein of Vassar, Phil Green of Millington and Dean Smith of Bay Port; and Democrat William Shoop of Vassar.

#### Tuscola Road Commission - six year term

Running for the two seats are Republicans Gary L. Parsell of Caro and Duane Weber of Vassar.

### Tuscola County Commissioners - two-year term

cut in half," Khoury commented. "And it is felt especially in the summer when someone wants to buy. We have to turn them away and say that we can't sell on Sundays."

The debate over packaged liquor sales on Sundays in Tuscola County was reignited back in December when some retailers asked commissioners to make a change. At that meeting, Tim Wingert of Wingert's Food Center, Mayville, said he had spoken with 14 other businesses that sell spirits, and they were all in favor of being allowed to begin offering Sunday liquor sales.

Wingert estimated the loss of sales for just his store – due to the current law — at about \$300,000 a year.

Tuscola's ban impacts businesses that are near the border with other counties, including Huron and Sanilac, which both allow Sunday liquor sales.

Although commissioners have the authority to make the change, they voted three to two in December not to do so based on liability concerns. In 1994, a similar ballot issue was placed before Tuscola County voters, who defeated the measure on a vote of 9,460 to 7,387.

According to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, Tuscola and Hillsdale counties are the only counties, along with a few individual municipalities across the state, that prohibit Sunday packaged liquor sales.

### **Medical care**

Another countywide proposal will ask voters to approve renewal of .25 of a mill for the next 10 years to help fund operations at the Tuscola County Medical Care Facility in Caro.

The tax generates an estimated \$434,465 annually and costs the owner of an \$80,000 home roughly \$10 a year.

commented Ball.

Van Auken added, "It's an economical question. These gentlemen aren't stupid; they'll take their business somewhere else."

Jones said he has followed the issue closely and has mixed emotions, but told trustees to "seize the moment. You might not get another opportunity."

Legal marijuana sales are expected to reach \$22 billion by 2022, with 340 full-time jobs generated by what is the fastest growing industry in the nation, according to Ploss, who also says the demand for medical marijuana continues to grow, with Michigan boasting 277,000 registered patients – the second highest in the country.

Cass City business owner Bud Schneeberger offered an opposing view on the subject, but not before the council heard a heartfelt plea from another Cass City resident, Richard Gentner.

"I am in constant pain 24-7," said the 83-year-old. "I...don't believe in recreational marijuana. I've never smoked it, but believe it's a good idea to bring it (marijuana for medical use) in."

Schneeberger, who expressed his feelings against the plan during a public forum on the issue held at the Cass City VFW Hall last month, indicated he feels the state of Michigan is making a bad mistake on the marijuana issue.

"We keep promoting it and that's not right. Drugs take lives, it's killing us," he Schneeberger said.

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In a final appeal, Vollmar noted that in 1973, 16 percent of the nation approved of marijuana. Since then, he said, the approval rate has risen to 64-percent.

"Times are changing. We can talk jobs. But we need to understand we need to listen to the voters," he added.

The spirited debate on the matter continued after the citizen comment portion of the meeting, with trustees Nancy Barrios and Rob Piaskowski exchanging heated words.

"I am not in favor of it," Barrios said, noting that property values near the factory would suffer because of "the smell."

Piaskowski fired back, saying the owners can control the smell. He added, sarcastically, that his property value is lower because of the smell of manure spread in the fields near his home by farmers.

Meanwhile, Vollmar has indicated failure on the part of the village to support the plan could result in the loss of factory jobs downs the road, in part because the 120,000-square-foot Millennium building is underutilized and in need of repairs, including a \$500,000 roof.

Voting against the proposed medical marijuana facility were trustee Barrios, Marilyn Biefer, Jenny Zawilinski and President Carl Palmateer, while trustees Michael Kirn, Tom Herron and Piaskowski supported the proposal.
