The topic was among the items that came up during a recent Argyle Township Board meeting. Austin Township Supervisor Ed
Sadro was among the audience members who attended the meeting. He was there to ask Argyle Township about possibly furnishing fire stand-by service as well as medical first responder service for Austin Township in light of the uncertainty surrounding the future of ambulance coverage. The matter was discussed, but no gyle Township Clerk Ed Pfaff and Fire Chief Lyle Ramer agreed to attend the next Austin Township Board meeting to further discuss the issue. In November 2019, the Bingham Township Board announced its plans to shut down the ambulanc - effective Jan. 31

The decision was largely based on a lack of adequate personnel to man the service $24 / 7$, with pay rates of $\$ 3$ per hour on stand-by and $\$ 20$ for a run failing to draw enough interest to fill positions. factor. For the last four years, the township was forced to spend roughly $\$ 120,000$ in general fund dollars to keep the ambulance operating, according to Bingham Township Supervisor Donald Wright.
In mid-December, the township met with Central Huron Ambu-
lance (CHA) officials to try to lance (CHA) officials to try to
work out a deal for CHA to take over the ambulance service. According to CHA Executive Di rector Linda Shisler, CHA and the

## Radon risk is silent;

 test your home soonMichigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has declared Jan uary 2020 to be Radon Action Month in Michigan, and she is encouraging all state residents to learn more about this environmental hazard and test their homes during the heating season.
You cannot see, smell or taste radon, and there are no short-term side effects. However, long-term exposure to radon increases the risk of developing lung cancer. Testing for radon is easy, inexpensive and the only way to know if a home has a radon problem.
Lung cancer accounts for more deaths in both men and women than any other form of cancer in the United States.
The Department of Health and Human Services predicted that in 2019 there would be an estimated 8,070 new cases of lung cancer and 5,410 deaths from the disease in Michigan. Behind smoking, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer and considered a leading environmental cause of cancer mortality in the United States.
One in every four Michigan homes is expected to have radon levels exceeding the federal action level of 4 $p C i / L$. While radon poses a serious threat to community health, high radon concentrations are easily fixed.
According to figures compiled by the Michigan De partment of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), the percentage of elevated radon test results varies from county to county in Michigan based on test result data collected from Air Chek (Radon.com). Those results range from just two percent elevated radon levels in Muskegon County on the west side of the state, to 53 percent in Branch County, along Michigan's southern border.
In the Thumb, elevated radon levels were found in 29 percent of homes tested in Tuscola County, 24 percent in Huron County and 13 percent in Sanilac County, according to the data.
Any home could have a radon problem, whether it's in an area with a high radon potential or an area with a low radon potential, or whether it's old or new, en-ergy-efficient or drafty, built on a slab or built over a basement or crawlspace.
Because it's a tasteless, odorless, colorless gas, there are no physical signs that will alert you to the presence of radon in a home - It doesn't smell bad. There is no discoloration of the foundation. There are no visible traces of the gas. And, there are no warning symptoms to let you know you're being exposed (It doesn't cause headaches, nausea, fatigue, skin rashes, etc.)
The only way to know whether your home has a problem - or whether you are at risk - is to test
Testing is recommended every two years because homes settle, new cracks form in the foundation and radon levels can change. If test results show radon levels at or above $4 \mathrm{pCi} / L$, the USEPA recommends installing a radon mitigation system, which grabs the radon before it ever enters the home and vents it outside.

## Dazzlers 4-H Rocketry Team gearing up for latest challenge

eter that will house a team-de-
signed and constructed robotic
Mars Rover that must deploy from
the rocket prior to touch down,
and then execute a series of com-
mands, Patricia explained.
"There will be a secondary ejection charge that will separate the nose cone with its chute which will pull the rover out of the payload tube. If the chutes do not tangle, then the rover and nose cone will land separate of the rocket,"
she added. "The first command she added. "The first command
will release the parachute so the will release the parachute so the
rover can then drive away from rover can then drive away from
the recovery harness." the recovery harness. weighing in at about 24 pounds with its engine, is expected to reach a height of 1,300 feet before the main chute deploys, according to Mark Hansen, who said the rocket will reach a speed equal to roughly 254 miles per hour. He estimated that by the time the rocket clears the 12 -foot launch stand/pad during take-off, it will have already attained a speed of 55 miles per hour.
Mark said the rocket's secondary charged will fire at an altitude of
250 feet, releasing the land rover which will drift down under its own parachute. After landing, it must shed its parachute harness and travel exactly 36 inches. Both
of those actions will be pre-pro grammed by the students, who will then manually control the vehicle as it takes a photo and collects a soil sample.
In order to qualify for the upcom ing competition, student teams must submit acceptable prelimi views, build and launch scaled-down prototype of thei competition rocket, and then suc cessfully test launch the rocke hey plan to use in competition. Each step requires complex cal culations, and success rests squarely on the kids' shoulders them the engineering principles, but they have to do the work," she but the

## Green ooze has Sanilac County officials, lawmakers concerned

Green liquid ooze originating from a former electro-plating business discovered along I-696 ate last year is also causing concials in Sanilac County's Marion Township.
The ooze was traced back to an electro-plating services site in Madison Heights. The site gained national attention when chemicals, including hexavalent ing wall along the freeway and ing wall along the freew.
were discovered Dec. 20. State officials determined the green ooze came from a building owned by Gary Sayers, who also owns property in Sanilac County and in Detroit.
State and local health officials conducted a visual inspection of
Sayers' property in Sanilac Sayers' property in Sanilac
County, according to reports, which indicate officials observed barrels on the property, heightening their concerns.
After learning of the situation, 83rd District state Rep. Shane Hernandez demanded better com-
munication and collaboration when the state responds to environmental contamination threats. Hernandez, a Port Huron resident and chairman of the Michigan
House Appropriations Committee, House Appropriations Committee,
will be part of a committee hearwill be part of a committee hear-
ing to review how the state responded and communicated with
local governments and legislators local governments and legislators
related to Electro-Plating Services related to Electro-Plating Services
in Madison Heights and owner-ship-related properties in Sanilac ship-related properti
"This is an issue of great importance to the state of Michigan, the health and safety of its people, and
the future of our Great Lakes," the future of our Great Lakes," Hernandez said. "We must take a deep look at past and present ex-
periences to learn from them and periences to learn from them and
make changes for the better moving forward. It's part of our job as the committee that oversees the tax dollars of Michigan's hardworking residents.
The contamination incident along I-696 was found to include not only hexavalent chromium,
but also PFAS and other toxins that originated from the former electro-plating services site, which has a history of compliance violations dating back to the 1990s. The site was the subject of a $\$ 1.5$
million cleanup through the million cleanup through the federal Environmental Protection
Agency (EPA) in 2017. A 2019 assessment concluded there was a low risk for the site's contami-
nated soil and water to move off-
site.
The latest investigation led state authorities to address concerns over other property affiliated with the same owner, Gary Sayers, including land in Sanilac County
and Detroit and Detroit. Sanilac County officials, including Emergency Management Co-
ordinator Todd Hillman, Drain Commissioner Greg Alexander, and Marion Township Supervisor Kurt Shubel testified at a hearing, as did several officials from Madison Heights and Oakland County along with Liesl Clark, director of
the Michigan Department of Enthe Michigan Department of En-
vironment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE).
"We want to make sure the state is aggressive when we know there is a serial contaminator like Gary Sayers involved. These types of cases should be prioritized," Hernandez said. "There are frustra-
tions from local officials about how they found out about these situations, and I share these frustrations.
"This hearing is a good first step in what will be an ongoing conversation about how we invest in and communicate about environmental cleanup as a state. This is
about finding solutions." I am outraged by this situation. First we hear about the green ooze on 1-696, and now we see this alarming, situation in Sanilac "Weunty," Hernandez continued. "We spend hundreds of millions of dollars cleaning up the environ ment and protecting health. Citi-
zens demand that their tax dollars are spent effectively to protect public health, and they expect the state to respond quickly and effec tively any time public health may be jeopardized. It is my intent to ensure accountability so that hap pens."
State Rep. Phil Green (R-
Millingt Millington), who represents citi-
zens in Tuscola and Huron counties, also voiced concerned regarding the contamination issue. "We held an important committee hearing related to the 'green ooze' contamination...(and)we are discussing how state depart

Based on Peter's presentation of the time capsule proposal, the council approved the historical society's request
This time a lot of study and thought is going into the selection of a time capsule that will stand the test of time
A time capsule from 1930 was found when the oldest part of what is now Kingston School District's Elementary School was being razed in 2018.

At the time, its discovery created a lot of excitement because only few people remembered that a time capsule might have been placed in
the school's cornerstone 88 years before. As that excitement built for its discovery and fhowcased during the 2018 Kingston Days festival. However, the time capsule didn't hold up very well, so most of the contents inside were compromised.
Some of the items inside appeared to have been photographs, but they had deteriorated to crumbles. It was speculated that the kind of chemi cals used back in the day to develop photographs had bled through and ate away the paper.
An A.g. 2, 190, copy of the former Kingston Enterprise newspape was the only item inside the old capsule that had survived.

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs a blood transfusion, lifesaving measure that impacts millions of people. Donated blood helps people who have lost blood in an accident or who have an illness such as cancer, anemia, sickle cell disease or hemophilia.
Donated blood includes red blood cells and the other components of blood, such as platelets and plasma. Blood that contains each of the parts is called whole blood.
There are different ways people can help, and in honor of Nat
Blood Donor Month, I'd like to share some them Blood Donor Month, I'd like to share some of them with you.
You can donate blood at American Red Cross clinics or other clinic or blood banks. You may also be able to donate during blood drives at work, school, or in your community.
About one pint of blood is taken when you donate. The donation takes about 10 minutes and the whole process - which includes answering questions and having a short exam - can take up to an hour
The simplest of the options is donating whole blood. This is the most common form of blood donation, and many of you may have already
done this before. This type of donation can be done every 56 days so long as you are in generally good health and feeling well. You must be at least 16 years of age in Michigan and weigh at least 110 pounds. Other types of donations include power red donations - which con centrate the red blood cell donation - platelet donations, and plasma donations.
Those who have recent piercings or tattoos, have recently traveled out side the United States or have health issues face certain barriers to do nation.
Unfortunately, Michigan currently is facing a blood donation shortage, which is not uncommon during the winter months and holiday seasons due to family and holiday commitments, flu season and other factors. Tuscola County's only World War II Normandy Invasion veteran, Ger ald Johnston, 94, finally has his high school diploma. The Caro Board of Education recently presented Johnston, of Kingston, with the diploma, which he didn't receive decades ago be-
cause he was serving his country.

At just 19 years of age, he arrived on the shores of Omaha Beach at Normandy, France, on the second day of the invasion, June 7, 1944. Johnston was carrying 80 pounds of gear on his back as he left the LST (landing ship transport) in six feet of water for the shores, according to Kingston historian Richard Peter. "Over the next 10 months, the 753 rd Tank Battalion, armed with a tank, fought their way into Ger many."
Johnston is well known throughout the area for his music. He enjoys playing guitar and performing his interpretation of country-music star And, true to form, Johnson entertained the school board in Caro with his musical talents.
