Crash claims life of **Cass City man**

A Cass City man lost his life in a one-vehicle traffic crash last week in Tuscola County's Juniata Township, Tuscola County Sheriff's Department investigators reported.

The victim has been identified as Nicholas Williams, 35, according to Sheriff Glen Skrent, who noted a passenger in the vehicle – Williams' wife, Veronica Williams, 33 was seriously injured.

Deputies were dispatched to the scene of the crash – M-81 near Ringle Road – at about 12:20 p.m.

"The investigation has found that a vehicle was travelling westbound on M-81, lost control and left the roadway, striking several trees," Skrent said. "Witnesses to the crash indicate the vehicle was behind them as they were travelling westbound also. The vehicle then passed them and another vehicle at high speed, and that is when it lost control." Middleton settling into her role as agriscience instructor, FFA advisor

Heather Middleton couldn't help but revel in the excitement of her agriscience students at Cass City Junior-Senior High School recently as they welcomed a pair of newborn lambs at the district's ag learning lab.

"We have a ewe lamb and a ram lamb — their healthy and perfect," Middleton announced on the Cass City FFA Facebook page following the birth earlier this month.

Middleton joined the Cass City teaching staff in early October, and it hasn't taken her long to settle into a role that's a good fit for her background and interests as an educator.

"Teaching agriscience has always been a goal of mine," commented the lifelong Tuscola County resident, who along with her husband and four children own and operate a beef farm in Mayville.

"I was the Tuscola County 4-H coordinator for eight years," she said. "I left to pursue teaching and found a paraprofessional position at the Tuscola Technology Center, where I worked as a paraprofessional in agriscience and construction for a year and a half before coming to Cass City.

"(This job) was an opportunity that I have already dreamed about," Middleton added. "Agriscience programs are designed to inspire youth to pursue agricultural careers by teaching students about the many different aspects of agriculture, including large and small animals, leadership, wildlife, horticulture and aquaculture. It is a passion and love of mine to open those doors for our youth."

As the agriscience instructor and FFA advisor, her responsibilities include:

He was there to ask Argyle Township about possibly furnishing fire stand-by service as well as medical first responder service for Austin Township in light of the uncertainty surrounding the future of ambulance coverage.

The matter was discussed, but no decision was made. However, Argyle Township Clerk Ed Pfaff and Fire Chief Lyle Ramer agreed to attend the next Austin Township Board meeting to further discuss the issue.

In November 2019, the Bingham Township Board announced its plans to shut down the ambulance — which has operated since 1978 — effective Jan. 31.

The decision was largely based on a lack of adequate personnel to man the service 24/7, with pay rates of \$3 per hour on stand-by and \$20 for a run failing to draw enough interest to fill positions.

Operational costs are another factor. For the last four years, the township was forced to spend roughly \$120,000 in general fund dollars to keep the ambulance operating, according to Bingham Township Supervisor Donald Wright.

In mid-December, the township met with Central Huron Ambulance (CHA) officials to try to work out a deal for CHA to take over the ambulance service.

According to CHA Executive Director Linda Shisler, CHA and the

Radon risk is silent; test your home soon

Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has declared January 2020 to be Radon Action Month in Michigan, and she is encouraging all state residents to learn more about this environmental hazard and test their homes during the heating season.

You cannot see, smell or taste radon, and there are no short-term side effects. However, long-term exposure to radon increases the risk of developing lung cancer.

Testing for radon is easy, inexpensive and the only way to know if a home has a radon problem.

Lung cancer accounts for more deaths in both men and women than any other form of cancer in the United States.

The Department of Health and Human Services predicted that in 2019 there would be an estimated 8,070 new cases of lung cancer and 5,410 deaths from the disease in Michigan. Behind smoking, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer and considered a leading environmental cause of cancer mortality in the United States.

One in every four Michigan homes is expected to have radon levels exceeding the federal action level of 4 pCi/L. While radon poses a serious threat to community health, high radon concentrations are easily fixed.

According to figures compiled by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), the percentage of elevated radon test results varies from county to county in Michigan based on test result data collected from Air Chek (Radon.com). Those results range from just two percent elevated radon levels in Muskegon County on the west side of the state, to 53 percent in Branch County, along Michigan's southern border.

In the Thumb, elevated radon levels were found in 29 percent of homes tested in Tuscola County, 24 percent in Huron County and 13 percent in Sanilac County, according to the data.

Any home could have a radon problem, whether it's in an area with a high radon potential or an area with a low radon potential, or whether it's old or new, energy-efficient or drafty, built on a slab or built over a basement or crawlspace.

Because it's a tasteless, odorless, colorless gas, there

The only acceptable career choice left was secretary. So, I went to business school after I graduated from high school. Also, back in the day, the other option was being a wife and a mother, and in that order.

I've come to realize that back when I was a child, little girls were indoctrinated with being a good wife and mother by the toys we were given.

There were little kitchenettes, cupboards, miniature irons and ironing boards along with pint sized brooms and dust pans, and dishes because we were expected to make pretend tea luncheons.

We were given tons of baby dolls to train us to be mothers. Toy makers even upped the ante of keeping girls in their place by making dolls that "drank" from bottles and then wet themselves.


All of that was pure indoctrination. There weren't any real messes for us to clean up. There was no pretend toilet to scrub, and the dolls only made nice little wet messes, none of the real bathroom messy diapers that are a reality.

Despite all of that preparation, I wasn't and I don't think many other women were prepared for the stark reality that being a homemaker and a mother included.

Because of the limited career choices back in my day, STEM was just part of a flower.


Having a STEM education opens so many career choices for women: software developers, industrial engineers, civil engineers, electrical engineers, economists, chemists and more.

The STEM of my day meant "Still Trailing Exceptional Men." I can't help but wonder what my life



and career would have been like had I been born several decades later.

are no physical signs that will alert you to the presence of radon in a home — It doesn't smell bad. There is no discoloration of the foundation. There are no visible traces of the gas. And, there are no warning symptoms to let you know you're being exposed (It doesn't cause headaches, nausea, fatigue, skin rashes, etc.).

The only way to know whether your home has a problem — or whether you are at risk — is to test.

Testing is recommended every two years because homes settle, new cracks form in the foundation and radon levels can change. If test results show radon levels at or above 4 pCi/L, the USEPA recommends installing a radon mitigation system, which grabs the radon before it ever enters the home and vents it outside.

For help getting a radon test kit, or for more information regarding radon testing, mitigation and levels across Michigan, go to Michigan.gov/Radon, call 800-RADON GAS (800-723-6642), or e?mail Radon@Michigan.gov. Test kits also are available at local hardware stores.

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

The clerk administers all election functions required by law, in addition to tabulating ballots and training all election inspectors within the county.

The clerk also serves as the chairperson of the elections scheduling committee, clerk of the board of canvassers, member of the jury board, member of the plat board, member of the building authority, clerk of circuit court, elections commission and the clerk of

the county board of commissioners.



gadget bandwagon at just about every turn (I was dragged kicking and screaming 5 YEARS AGO (2015) into learning the computer program that enabled me to design pages of this news-

paper on a computer). Still, an Associated Press story on the technologies showcased at the annual Consumer Electronics Show (CES) gadget show in Las Vegas caught my eye. Among this year's highlights? Uber and Hyundai are teaming up to build a fleet of flying taxis.

I'm not really a technology nut. In fact, I tend to resist jumping on the latest

According to the story, Uber, the ride-hailing giant, said its four-passenger "Uber Air Taxi" will initially be piloted, but over time will become autonomous. Uber says it wants to conduct flight demonstrations in 2020 and make such vehicles commercially available in 2023.

The goal is to help riders breeze over traffic in shared air taxis between suburbs and cities and eventually within cities. Uber plans to launch the aircraft in Dallas, Los Angeles and Melbourne, Australia. The air taxis, which look like a cross between a helicopter and a small airplane, will be all-electric.

These air taxis are designed to take off vertically and cruise at speeds up to 200 miles and travel a distance of up to 60 miles at a time.

Now onto a really important advance in technology; a machine that will be there when you find yourself stranded on the toilet with an empty toilet paper roll.

According to the story, Charmin's solution is a two-wheeled robot that can fetch a fresh roll. The robot, around 6-inches tall, has the face of a bear — like the cartoon ones in Charmin's commercials - and toilet paper sitting on top.

But don't expect it to roll to your bathroom anytime soon. Procter and Gamble, the company that owns Charmin, said the robot won't be for sale and was just an example of what's possible.

Now if they could just invent a machine that installs that roll of toilet paper properly, as in so it hangs over - not under - the roll.

Other tech wonders unveiled at this year's show included new sensors that promise to stop water leaks before they ruin your home.

The story report that monitors from Alarm.com and Flo Technologies connect to homes' water lines and track usage. If the systems sense more water than usual is flowing through the pipes, they send an alert through their apps — after all, it could just be a long shower. But if something really seems off kilter, the monitors will automatically shut off water.

Flo used CES to launch its newest sensor, a raindrop-shaped device that looks like a smoke alarm and can detect any water or moisture when attached to toilets, washers or other leak-prone areas. Each detector costs \$50.

Finally, some companies are pitching ways to keep an eye on the elderly from afar.


The efforts come as the U.S. government expects adults over 65 to outnumber children for the first time by 2034.

One firm is offering sensors that track the elderly through motion detection, though the product can also tell if someone has showered by measuring humidity. Another company has a wrist-worn device that can detect falls and alert caregivers. It also tracks how much the person has moved around and what rooms they're spending most of their time in.

Tracking isn't cheap. One device, for instance, costs \$450 plus a \$70 monthly fee

Who knows? Maybe, while they're here, I'll ask them to make sure the bathrooms are well stocked with TP.

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Dazzlers 4-H Rocketry Team gearing up for latest challenge

first appearance in the Battle of the Rockets competition in Culpeper, Va. And there's still much work to do before they put their effort, skills and knowledge to the test.

"If everything goes well, they'll be in Culpeper April 17, 18, 19 and 20 for the competition, which is comprised of high school, 4-H (and) scout teams as well as about 30 university teams who make the cut," said Patricia Hansen, who along with her husband, Mark, founded the Deford Dazzlers 4-H STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) Club - back in 2019-10. The model rocket team is composed of members selected from the STEM club membership.

The students are in the process of building a rocket measuring 109 inches – A little over nine feet in height and 7.65 inches in diameter that will house a team-designed and constructed robotic Mars Rover that must deploy from the rocket prior to touch down, and then execute a series of commands, Patricia explained.

"There will be a secondary ejection charge that will separate the nose cone with its chute which will pull the rover out of the payload tube. If the chutes do not tangle, then the rover and nose cone will land separate of the rocket," she added. "The first command will release the parachute so the rover can then drive away from the recovery harness."

When launched, the rocket, weighing in at about 24 pounds with its engine, is expected to reach a height of 1,300 feet before the main chute deploys, according to Mark Hansen, who said the rocket will reach a speed equal to about one-third of Mach, or roughly 254 miles per hour. He estimated that by the time the rocket clears the 12-foot launch stand/pad during take-off, it will have already attained a speed of 55 miles per hour.

Mark said the rocket's secondary charged will fire at an altitude of 250 feet, releasing the land rover, which will drift down under its own parachute. After landing, it must shed its parachute harness and travel exactly 36 inches. Both of those actions will be pre-programmed by the students, who will then manually control the vehicle as it takes a photo and collects a soil sample.

In order to qualify for the upcoming competition, student teams must submit acceptable preliminary design and critical design reviews, build and launch a scaled-down prototype of their competition rocket, and then successfully test launch the rocket they plan to use in competition.

Each step requires complex calculations, and success rests squarely on the kids' shoulders, according to Patricia. "We teach them the engineering principles, but they have to do the work," she said.

This year's team members are: Teresa Tomasino, 17, of Caro team captain ; Sam Gordon, 16, Snover - co-captain; Mia Wright, 16, Cass City - safety officer; Kian Hoppe, 13, Cass City - rover/ro-botics specialist; Jannaeya Thomas, 15, Cass City - vehicle specialist; and Ethan Thane, 16, Caro - propulsion specialist.

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The upcoming competition offers a variety of challenges. That's nothing new for the Deford Dazzlers, which in the span of a decade has made a name for itself in national model rocket competitions

The Hansens actually established the model rocket team in 2010-11, a year after forming the Deford 4-H STEM club. The couple selected the club's oldest members who met age and grade requirements, and the team made its first attempt to qualify for the TARC National Finals, which are held annually in The Plains, Va. Unfortunately, they failed to qualify among the top 100 teams vying for a spot.

However, the team qualified the next year, coming home with a 10th-place finish and receiving an invitation to serve as special speakers at a 4-H STEM conference at Michigan State University. The Dazzlers went on to qualify for the TARC National Finals in each of the next four years, finishing in 14th place in 2013, and in 38th and 36th place in 2014 and 2015, respectively. The team also finished in third place in the TARC Engineering Presentation Competition in 2014 before winning the same competition outright in 2015.

A year later, the Deford Dazzlers was named one of the best student model rocket teams in the country following its impressive secondplace finish at the TARC National Finals, which also qualified the team for a coveted spot in the 2016-17 NASA Student Launch event.

"The team took a year off from TARC for 'student launch' and successfully completed the eightmonth engineering program," Hansen noted. "Students spent nearly a week in Huntsville, Ala., for aerospace education, science fair, touring RedStone Arsenal Base and Marshall Space Flight Center, and participating in the launch event.

The Dazzlers were the only Michigan team from Michigan chosen to take part in the 2017 NASA Student Launch, which offers middle school to college-aged students a chance to design, build and launch high-powered, reusable rockets to one-mileabove ground level. Interested teams are required to submit a proposal for comprehensive review by NASA subject matter experts. Teams are then chosen to participate based on detailed outlines of their rockets, its recovery systems, payloads, safety and educational engagement plans.

In 2018, the Dazzlers returned home from the TARC National Finals without a top-25 finish, but the Tuscola County youths did their hometown proud just the same. The team claimed first place in the 2018 TARC Presentation Contest, and Mark Hansen was honored as the Outstanding Mentor of the Year.

The team also competed but did not qualify for the TARC national event in 2019.

"It was a bad, bad year for Michigan weather. They missed the cut off by less than one point...which meant they did not get an invite to TARC Finals," Hansen recalled. "I think we froze and then froze some more trying to get practice launches in. And this close to the lake, due to polar wind vortexes coming over the bay, they encountered swirling winds.

"(But) they learned a lot, and decided to try another high-powered competition because the large rockets, and heavily powered motors compensate for local weather much better. They have also wanted to get some experience with more complicated payloads and complex robotics, so Battle of the Rockets seemed like a great idea for this year."

In addition, the year brought a big achievement for team members Teresa Tomasino and Jannaeya Thomas, who both earn their National Association of Rocketry (NAR) Junior Level I High Power Rocketry licenses.

Aside from mentoring the 4-H club, the Hansens have worked with students in other capacities in an effort to have a positive impact on others.

The couple taught an introduction to engineering class for 4-Hers at Deford Community Church in 2017-18.

"(We) spent 34 weeks working on projects in civil, environmental, chemical, mechanical, aeronautical and electrical engineering. The capstone project for the class was to design and manufacture a patient bed-call button system for a hospital overseas that had no such system for their patients," said Hansen, who noted the project was sponsored by the Deford Community Church and Caro United Methodist Church.

"They successfully completed the project, and Mark took it to the hospital and implemented it," she added. "Unfortunately, due to security concerns, I cannot give a location except to say somewhere in Africa."

Green ooze has Sanilac County officials, lawmakers concerned

Green liquid ooze originating from a former electro-plating business discovered along I-696 late last year is also causing concerns among residents and officials in Sanilac County's Marion Township.

The ooze was traced back to an electro-plating services site in Madison Heights. The site gained national attention when chemicals, including hexavalent chromium, seeped out of a retaining wall along the freeway and were discovered Dec. 20.

State officials determined the green ooze came from a building owned by Gary Sayers, who also owns property in Sanilac County and in Detroit.

State and local health officials conducted a visual inspection of Sayers' property in Sanilac County, according to reports, which indicate officials observed barrels on the property, heightening their concerns.

After learning of the situation, 83rd District state Rep. Shane Hernandez demanded better communication and collaboration when the state responds to environmental contamination threats. Hernandez, a Port Huron resident and chairman of the Michigan House Appropriations Committee, will be part of a committee hearing to review how the state responded and communicated with local governments and legislators related to Electro-Plating Services in Madison Heights and ownership-related properties in Sanilac County and Detroit.

"This is an issue of great importance to the state of Michigan, the health and safety of its people, and the future of our Great Lakes,' Hernandez said. "We must take a deep look at past and present experiences to learn from them and make changes for the better moving forward. It's part of our job as the committee that oversees the tax dollars of Michigan's hardworking residents.

The contamination incident along I-696 was found to include not only hexavalent chromium. but also PFAS and other toxins that originated from the former electro-plating services site, which has a history of compliance violations dating back to the 1990s.

The site was the subject of a \$1.5 million cleanup through the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in 2017. A 2019 as-

site. The latest investigation led state authorities to address concerns over other property affiliated with the same owner, Gary Sayers, including land in Sanilac County and Detroit.

Sanilac County officials, including Emergency Management Coordinator Todd Hillman, Drain Commissioner Greg Alexander, and Marion Township Supervisor Kurt Shubel testified at a hearing, as did several officials from Madison Heights and Oakland County along with Liesl Clark, director of the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE).

"We want to make sure the state is aggressive when we know there is a serial contaminator like Gary Sayers involved. These types of cases should be prioritized," Hernandez said. "There are frustrations from local officials about how they found out about these situations, and I share these frustrations.

"This hearing is a good first step in what will be an ongoing conversation about how we invest in and communicate about environmental cleanup as a state. This is not about pointing fingers. This is


about finding solutions."

"I am outraged by this situation. First we hear about the green ooze on I-696, and now we see this alarming situation in Sanilac County," Hernandez continued. "We spend hundreds of millions of dollars cleaning up the environment and protecting health. Citizens demand that their tax dollars are spent effectively to protect public health, and they expect the state to respond quickly and effectively any time public health may be jeopardized. It is my intent to ensure accountability so that happens."

State Rep. Phil Green (R-Millington), who represents citizens in Tuscola and Huron counties, also voiced concerned regarding the contamination issue.

"We held an important committee hearing related to the 'green ooze' contamination...(and)we are discussing how state departments can better work with local communities to keep them updated and involved any time a situation like this arises," said Green.

"We remain committed to providing a clean, healthy environment for our children and our children's children.'

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

Caro lands funding to spruce up downtown

State Senator Kevin Daley on Friday applauded a Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF) announcement approving a \$57,281 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) that will assist the city of Caro in making improvements to the city's downtown area.

"This is great news for the community," said Daley (R-Lum), whose 31st District includes Tuscola County. "This funding will help revitalize the downtown area and make Caro a more enjoyable place to live, work and visit. I appreciate the MSF's continued support of Michigan's rural communities."

Caro has received \$57,281 in Community Development Block Grant funds for the Caro Facades Project and an additional \$17,000 for a CDBG certified grant administrator to assist with the project.

The update is set to include the renovation of two storefronts in downtown. The facade restoration project is expected to be a catalyst for other projects and investment in downtown Caro. The project is also expected to have a substantial impact along North State Street.

"This money will help support local businesses and continue the economic growth occurring in downtown Caro," Daley said. "I applaud the city for working closely with state officials and ensuring they had everything lined up to get this done."

The MSF, in cooperation with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), administers the economic and community development portions of the CDBG program. The CDBG program is a federal grant program utilizing funds received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Kingston group hoping to bury another capsule

Plans for a new time capsule for the village of Kingston are being developed.

Richard Peter, a member of the Kingston Historical Society, presented the idea of a time capsule — to be opened in the year 2100 — during a presentation to the village council.

Peter brought in a concept design of the marker for the time capsule. He would like to be able to place the capsule in the park near the depot. The vault would be large enough to store letters, coins, etc., explained Peter, who sought the council's permission to continue working on the project.

Based on Peter's presentation of the time capsule proposal, the council approved the historical society's request.

This time a lot of study and thought is going into the selection of a time capsule that will stand the test of time.

A time capsule from 1930 was found when the oldest part of what is now Kingston School District's Elementary School was being razed in 2018.

At the time, its discovery created a lot of excitement because only a few people remembered that a time capsule might have been placed in the school's cornerstone 88 years before. As that excitement built — for its discovery and recovery of the capsule, an opening ceremony was showcased during the 2018 Kingston Days festival.

However, the time capsule didn't hold up very well, so most of the contents inside were compromised.

Some of the items inside appeared to have been photographs, but they had deteriorated to crumbles. It was speculated that the kind of chemicals used back in the day to develop photographs had bled through and ate away the paper.

An Aug. 29, 1930, copy of the former Kingston Enterprise newspaper was the only item inside the old capsule that had survived.



Fernald felt Hadyn Horne and Bryce Fernald had really nice

Quinn Boucard added 13 points for the Cardinals.


Alton Davis led Genesee (0-3, 2-4) with 6 points.

"She's going to be fun to watch," said Ketterer.



and equitable experiences leading to career preparation, continued education, and employment;

*Enhancing youth leadership and FFA as an integral part of instruction:

*Preparing lesson plans that conform to school policy for all courses offered;

*Overseeing instructional materials and methods used to make teaching and learning effective;

*Ensuring students develop basic skills and abilities in the barn learning lab;

*Assisting students in selecting a program that fits their interests and abilities; and

*Maintaining records for all students in agriculture science as well as FFA records.

Middleton teaches students in grades seven through 12.

"I teach an Introduction to ani-

mal science, two introduction classes of agriculture, a botany and zoology class and a natural resource class," she explained. "My classes are very hands-on, projectbased — for example, my natural resource class is going to be working on a pheasant restoration project in the spring.

Hands-on learning is also the focus inside the ag learning lab.

"Some of the learning aspects that benefit from the actual presence of animals at our learning lab include sheep shearing, vaccination methods, raising feeder calves and castrating calves and lambs, (and) collecting eggs, to just name a few things," she said. 'The learning lab also is helpful in demonstrations for showing animals at the fair, judging and evaluating livestock."

While Middleton has been busy staying on top of the demands of the varied agriscience curriculum,

she also has her eyes on expanding the available learning opportunities for her students in the future.

Her goals include adding a pasture, agronomy test plots, a greenhouse and more livestock.

"My favorite part of the job is being with the students, either in the classroom or in the learning lab, learning," she said.

"I love sharing my passion for agriculture with students - getting to see them make the connections to what we have been learning is rewarding."



Save a life!

The medical community is constantly evolving and is responsible for new breakthroughs that can improve an individual's quality of life and save even more lives. Advancements in medical technology are allowing us to do more with less and perform operations with increased levels of accuracy and success rates.

A large part of this is because of the volunteers who selflessly give back in order to help others.

Many who know me are aware of my passionate advocacy for the Donate Life campaign to encourage organ donations, but one of the other most important ways people can help is by donating blood.

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs a blood transfusion, a lifesaving measure that impacts millions of people. Donated blood helps people who have lost blood in an accident or who have an illness such as cancer, anemia, sickle cell disease or hemophilia.

Donated blood includes red blood cells and the other components of blood, such as platelets and plasma. Blood that contains each of the parts is called whole blood.

There are different ways people can help, and in honor of National Blood Donor Month, I'd like to share some of them with you.

You can donate blood at American Red Cross clinics or other clinics or blood banks. You may also be able to donate during blood drives at work, school, or in your community.

About one pint of blood is taken when you donate. The donation takes about 10 minutes and the whole process — which includes answering questions and having a short exam — can take up to an hour.

The simplest of the options is donating whole blood. This is the most common form of blood donation, and many of you may have already done this before. This type of donation can be done every 56 days so long as you are in generally good health and feeling well. You must be at least 16 years of age in Michigan and weigh at least 110 pounds.

Other types of donations include power red donations - which concentrate the red blood cell donation — platelet donations, and plasma donations.

Those who have recent piercings or tattoos, have recently traveled outside the United States or have health issues face certain barriers to donation.

Unfortunately, Michigan currently is facing a blood donation shortage, which is not uncommon during the winter months and holiday seasons due to family and holiday commitments, flu season and other factors.



O-negative and O-positive are especially in demand, so if you can, please donate and help improve or even save someone's life.



township are in the process of negotiating a possible agreement.

Bingham officials are hoping CHA will take over their ambulance coverage area and keep the ambulance base, located at 2241 Pierce St. in Ubly, operational. As a result of the on-going negotiations, the closing of the Bingham Ambulance Service has been delayed until March 31.

Currently, CHA provides service to 13 townships ranging from Port Austin to Bad Axe and part of Sheridan Township.

Bingham Ambulance service provides coverage to the townships of Bingham, Paris and half of Sheridan Township in Huron County. In Sanilac County, the service covers Austin Township along with portions of Minden and Argyle townships.

In other township matters, Ramer questioned why there are no rumble strips at the intersection of M-19 and Deckerville Road. Supervisor Jerome Foote said he will check with the Sanilac

County Road Commission on the issue.

The next road issue discussed was dust control for the coming year. The total cost before discounts is \$19,620, or \$17,985 if paid before April 1, or \$17,440 if a deposit of \$4,360 is paid before Feb. 28. The board approved paying \$17,440 with the \$4,360 deposit to be paid next month.







At just 19 years of age, he arrived on the shores of Omaha Beach at Normandy, France, on the second day of the invasion, June 7, 1944.

Johnston was carrying 80 pounds of gear on his back as he left the LST (landing ship transport) in six feet of water for the shores, according to Kingston historian Richard Peter. "Over the next 10 months, the 753rd Tank Battalion, armed with a tank, fought their way into Germany."

Johnston is well known throughout the area for his music. He enjoys playing guitar and performing his interpretation of country-music star Merle Haggard's work.

And, true to form, Johnson entertained the school board in Caro with his musical talents.




