Highway fund totals announced

The State Highway Commission has started distributing second quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

Henrik E. Stafseth, state highway director, said net Highway Fund receipts during April, May and June totaled \$67,060,769, an increase of \$11,133,623 or 16.6 percent more than the same period of 1967. Most of the increase is at-

tributed to the cent-a-gallon increase in the gas tax which took effect last Jan. 1, he said. Tuscola County's share is \$228,217 while Cass City will receive \$5,290.

The Motor Vehicle fund includes all state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, and license plate fees. After deductions for collection costs and the State Waterways Commission's share, 46 percent goes to the state, 34 percent to the counties, and 20 percent to the 525 incorporated cities and villages, for use on state and local highways, roads and streets.

Under this formula, the Department of State Highways will receive \$30,847,954, the counties \$22,800,661 and the cities and villages \$13,412,154.

Wouldn't it be easy to just wash cobs of green corn and put them in the freezer? It might be if you wouldn't mind having to throw them away next winter when you wanted to eat them. So get your vegetables into some hot water. Blanch them!

Blanching simply means immersing the vegetables in boiling water.

This hot bath does three important things. First, it stops the action of enzymes responsible for losses in quality. It also allows you to put more into each container because the food softens and shrinks. And last, blanching cleans the product and destroys surface bacteria.

Here's the procedure: Make sure you have plenty of boiling water -- at least one gallon for each pint of vegetables. Follow the suggested blanching times and timing methods in a reliable bulletin or cookbook. When the blanching time is up, plunge the vegetable into ice water to avoid over-cooking.

Farmers should prepare now for drying corn crop

Farmers should start now to make provisions for drying and storing this fall's corn crop. In some cases, the excess crop can be dried and stored commercially. But if the farm is in an expansion period, farmers should leave room and plan for adding a drying unit. Farmers won't have much

time for planning when the harvesting season arrives. Surveys by Michigan State University agricultural engineers show the average harvesting period in Michigan is usually only about 30 days. But, because of uncertain weather, it's best to count on only 15 days for sure.

Robert L. Maddex, MSU Extension agricultural engineer, recommends that farmers select equipment that can dry in 16 hours what harvesting equipment will handle in 12 hours. Two-row harvesting equip-

ment will harvest 125 to 150 bushels of corn an hour or 1,-000 bushels in an eight hour

A 10,000-bushel crop would mean handling 1,000 bushels a day with the drying equipment. With a batch-in-bin unit. Maddex says a 24-foot diameter bin would permit the farmer to handle 1,000 bushels daily with normal moisture removal. A good, small, automated batch drying system would also be suitable for this size of crop. There are many good units

to handle 10,000 to 15,000 bushels of grain in a season, says Maddex, and these can provide economical grain drying if properly operated,

Sleep

Some experts are alarmed over the rapid rise in the use of barbiturates by people who are convinced that they can't sleep without being drugged. The main cause of concern: most people are harmed more by their anxiety over the loss of sleep than by the "sleepless" nights.

First of all, not everybody requires eight hours of sleep per night. Our individual needs are different, and our sleeping patterns vary. One man will sleep nine hours a night, while his neighbor does quite well with six. Just lying awake in bed is almost as good for you as "sound sleep," if you don't fret about it.

Now that scientists can measure the way in which we slumber and dream, it appears that most people are poor judges of their own sleep patterns. You may believe you've "tossed and turned all night," while you've actually slept for hours.

Or we imagine that it takes hours for us to fall asleep, when we actually drop off into a light slumber after only a few minutes.

Sleep comes in waves; the soundest (and most beneficial) sleep occurs in the first threehour wave, which is probably reflected in the old adage, "An hour of sleep before midnight is worth two after." But when you retire isn't vital; regularity may be much more important. If it makes you restless sleepers feel any better, people with high IQs appear to get along with less sleep than

Cleon Kester of Millington is the area fieldman for the Caro plant of the Michigan Sugar Co. in the area of the county where the tour stops were held. While working closely with growers for the past several years and especially this crop year, he has been able to motivate at least some of the growers into using mechanical thinning. One of the more recent pieces of thinning equipment on the market used by several growers this spring is known as a "Speedy Thinner". Research in the design and operations of

mechanical thinners over the past 15 years has brought about and Mr. and Mrs. William Merz major improvements. So now that growers are faced with rising labor costs for thinning and in some cases labor telling the farmer what the rate should one day. Then he will go to be we will see more and more of them shifting from hand labor to mechanical thinning in 1969 and the years ahead, Cleon Kester stated that mechanical thinning saved growers in his field district a minimum of \$10 or more per acre. The billions of spores are carried to uninfected plants by winds - air currents - insects - animals and by man, Usually it spreads across a field from southwest to northeast by the prevailing winds. Halo blight which bit many fields of colored beans in early July develops more rapidly in cool weather. Common blight may attack colored beans but Halo blight seldom attacks navy beans,

President Althaver read the letter that he received in reproblem, and also the letter which he had written in reply.

Two test locations in Michigan proved that driver attention to the no passing zones was improved with special pennantshaped signs mounted on the left.

The improved signs have been used in Iowa for some time, and other states are ready to adopt the system, Judge Hart wonders out loud why Michigan drivers do not receive the same service.

Highway department officials agree the signs are effective, but they question whether accidents on hills and curves are reduced by their use, Harold Cooper, director of the traffic division, doesn't think so.

Officials also feared loss of federal highway funds since leftside erection was "non-conforming". Iowa, which did not wait for federal approval and just installed the signs, did not lose funds,

State police favor the new signs and cite traffic violations. as well as accident reductions as influencing factors, Sgt. Donald Calcatera, traffic analyst, said that state police records for 1967 show 617 accidents occurred on curves and 1,769 occurred on hills. Improper passing violations were recorded as causing 9,275 accidents in 1967, Reports of other law enforcement agencies are not included in the totals. Sgt. Calcatera recalls earlier service at the Gavlord post, which wrote more tickets for passing violations than any other post in the state, In 1960-61, the new system was installed on old U.S. 27. "Our citations fell to practically nothing," Sgt. Calcatera stated,

Cost of implementing the system state-wide has been estimated at \$175,000 to \$250,000. Cooper states that if the system were adopted, installation would occur only at "selected locations," not throughout the entire state. What is needed, the judge maintains, is enough people demanding the change to force the highway department to get off its present location and begin installation.
