Cost squeeze seen

> gearing up for a new financial pinch this week, following last week's announcement by Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield that it intends to cut back on hospital payments by an estimated \$60 million state wide.

According to Hospital Administrator Randy D. Howard, that translates into a 10 per cent ceiling in allowable increased payments over 1975 totals. Coupled with inflation and other increased costs such as food and surgical supplies that totaled over 15 per cent, Howard says the outlook isn't rosy.

"This is simply awful," Howard said, commenting on the Blues' decision. "This will especially hurt smaller hospitals such as ours that are already working on an efficient basis." He stated flatly that em-

the major third party reimburser to the hospital, Howard said. The Blues' total reimbursement is expected to hit around \$1 million, which represents about 50 per cent of the total operating costs at the facility.

According to Howard, the old formula of reimbursing on a cost plus two per cent basis will be scrapped in favor of making payments based on 1975's costs plus a 10 per cent inflation factor ceiling. It's too early to pinpoint exactly how much less the hospital will receive from the

Blues, but the impact has already been felt. One of the first areas to feel the change is staff. He said cutbacks in overtime have already begun and added that employees have indicated they prefer working four-day

weeks to layoffs if it reaches that point.

Howard said that the guality of patient care at the hospital won't be substantially lowered despite the funding pinch. "The quality of our patient care won't be cut to a point

where we'll have to worry about malpractice," he said. Areas that look prime for cost-cutting are supplies and some food items, he said. "The cost of cartons of milk

alone has gone up three times in the last two months," Howard said, citing an example.

"We've put this out for bids

bid on it. We're hoping for a price of around 10 cents a carton, but we've been told that if our supplier experiences dramatic price in-

creases, we probably will, too.' Howard has long advocated centralized purchasing of hospital supplies. He said a push is on to arrange contracts so that Hills and Dales can get discounts awarded to Saginaw General Hospital.

"We're hoping to pick up -their-discount-and-still-get-oursupplies drop-shipped here,"

he said. He said there really isn't much that can be done about food costs other than to monitor them and try to keep them in line,

papers in his shirt drawer. I asked Kelley for the contents of my FBI file, if any. This started a fascinating

correspondence which may result in the discovery of perpetual motion. Kelley's first letter said there'd be a delay in answering my letter.

send the file for \$33 to cover office expenses. I sent the dough and he wrote again saying I'd have to write again and this time have a notary public witness my signature. This was done. And finally last week, after 5 months, Kelley allowed me a slight peek under the curtain.

One reason I'm in the FBI files is because of something I wrote about the flag and J. Edgar Hoover in 1967. That was when some Vietnam war protestors were burning the flag, remember? And Hoover was bombarding newspapers with "official bulletins" saying flag burners were nasty people who should be ashamed of themselves. I wrote a column saying flag burners were stupid but not criminals, as long as they owned the flag. And this paragraph was

included: "If he hasn't anything better to do, I have a suggestion: Hoover should sit down and read that portion of the Warren Report which states clearly what a lousy job the FBI did in protecting John Kennedy from Lee Harvey Oswald. He might also prepare a message explaining why every cop in

the country knows there is a nationwide crime syndicate (Mafia) but little is ever done about it. No matter what Dick Tracy says, crime pays more every year and you'd better believe it."

That's what put the FBI on my tail. But Kelley admitted A month later he said he'd he wasn't revealing my entire file, saying the law allows him to withhold "information that is related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency and intra-agency memoranda not available through discovery proceedings during litiga-

It's difficult to be certain what that gobbledegook means, but I think Kelley is refusing to reveal how his agents went about investigating me Do "personnel rules" cover bugging? At any rate, he said I have 30 days to appeal his decision to the Attorney General, I intend to do it and will keep you posted if you live long enough.

Meanwhile, we can all feel sorry for that Secret Service man who threw our flag to the ground. A firing squad might be appropriate. If he wanted to throw flags he should have become a football official.

What's this? tax rate drops slightly in township

Elkland township property owners living in the Cass City School District will get a small break in their tax rate when they pay their 1975 property taxes, according to notices due to be sent out next week.

This year, Cass City district taxpayers will pay at a rate of 28.90 mills per \$1,000 assessed valuation, compared with an even 30 mills in 1974.

The drop comes in special voted millages for bridges and roads which totaled two mills and which expired with last year's taxes.

Total school millage rose to 20.90 mills from an even 20 last year. The increase was reflected in .90 mills going for debt retirement this year. Debt retirement millage as such was not levied last year. School operating millage is

A Caro area woman was sentenced Monday on charges of embezzlement when she appeared before Judge Martin Clements in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

local 4-H programs. "I've always done things like that and I've enjoyed it,' Miss DeLong said as she prepared to paint flesh tones on the styrofoam head and hands of her latest creation. She explained that about a year ago, she and a friend

was making dolls. It wasn't long before she became an

expert in doll making. Miss-DeLong says to date, she's made between 30 and 35 dolls, most of which she hopes to sell, especially during the holiday season. They really aren't playthings for children as much as they are simply decorative pieces, she said. The process starts with a discarded bottle. She uses large pop bottles for her tallest dolls and small, eightenrolled in a crafts class in Caro and one of the projects ounce bottles for the smallest

Christmas angels.

The bottle, a piece of wire wrapped around the neck to serve as arms, and a styrofoam ball mounted at the top starts each doll.

She fills each bottle about three-quarters full with sand to give the doll ballast. From there the process gets tricky. To form the doll's face, she uses a substance commercially known as "dip-

and-drape' "You get this stuff good and wet and then cut it and fit it

into the shape you want," she said.

As the substance dries, it --- Once the squares are fit intohardens into a plaster-like material with no resemblance to the fabric it really is.

Next comes a coat of something called "painting ground" which provides a smoother facial surface and allows the paint to flow evenly.

Once this is done, Miss DeLong says, comes the hard part-painting. "The face is the hardest thing about mak-ing these dolls," she says. "Sometimes I get a little frustrated and end up tossing a doll in the corner for awhile. Then I can go back and finish

Each of her dolls is outfitted with decorative costumes, But if you think those are really doll clothes that took hours to stitch on a sewing machine, guess again. Those are hard dip-anddrape creations, too. "I cut square or rectangular pieces of cloth and put it
