Judge overrules State Board in Owen-Gage-MFC hassle

The embattled Owen-Gage School District chalked up another legal victory last week against the State Board

of Education. In a ruling issued Friday, Ingham County Circuit Court Judge James T. Kaliman ordered the State Board to vacate its April 7 resolution instructing State School Supt. Dr. John Porter to vote no on bond sales to build a new Owen-Gage High School.

Porter is a member of the all-important Municipal Finance Commission (MFC) which must unanimously approve sale of all municipal bonds before they may be Owen-Gage voters okayed the bond issue last—chances for the bond issue's Dec. 20. Since then, MFC 're-

Owen-Gage Supt. Ronald Erickson said Monday Judge Kallman's order in effect says the State Board acted illegally when it "advised" Porter to vote no on the bond

Erickson said once the advisory document is rescinded, Porter will be acting as an individual at the MFC. He said the ruling increases approval.

According to Charles Keeleral in charge of education, Kallman's oral decision directs lawyers for both sides to prepare an order based on the judge's opinion.

Keeley said the state is proposing that the April 7 resolution be rescinded. As soon as details are ironed out. he said, the order will be sent to the State Board.

Death toll hits 18

Two killed in separate grinding auto crashes

Two persons were killed and a third remained in critical condition following one of the bloodiest four days on Tuscola county roads in recent memory.

Grant Wesley Ball, 59, of 6806 E. Cass City Rd., became the county's 17th traffic fatality of 1976 Saturday night when he died from multiple injuries suffered in a cartruck crash at the intersection of Mushroom and Crawford Roads late Thursday

Caro State Police reported Ball was northbound on Crawford Road when his pickup was struck in the driver's side by a car driven by Josephine Olewski, 68, of

Mrs. Olewski told police she was eastbound on Mushroom Road at about 25 miles an hour when Ball's truck suddenly darted into the intersection. Police said Ball apparently did not stop for the intersection.



The force of the crash threw both vehicles into a field at the northeast corner of the intersection.

Ball was taken to Hills and Dales General Hospital reportedly suffering from a punctured lung and several broken ribs. He remained in critical condition until Saturday night when an attempt was made to transfer him to a Saginaw hospital.

Ball reportedly died shortly after 9:00 p.m. en route. Mrs. Olewski was listed in satisfactory condition at Mar-

lette Community Hospital. The accident took place at 4:15 p.m.


A passenger in the car, Jack Wayne Hamlett, also of the Cass City address, was injured.

Fire destroys portable welder

No one was injured when fire destroyed a portable acetylene welding rig near the intersection of Elmwood and Dodge Roads, four miles southwest of Cass City, Fri-

day afternoon. Elkland Township Fire Chief Jim Jezewski said the rig, mounted on the back of a 1976 pickup truck, was owned by Floyd Tubbs of South Boardman, Mich., and was being used to weld sections of gas line together on a Southeastern Michigan Gas Co.


Jezewski said the blaze probably started from a spark in the welding unit. The truck was engulfed in flames when firemen arrived at the scene shortly after 2:30 p.m.

Firemen managed to keep two large canisters of compressed oxygen mounted on the truck from exploding.

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
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"If It Fitz . . . " Hum along with me

mmmmmmm") The world probably lost a great musical artist because of my deprived childhood. I was forever forced to seek melodious satisfaction vicariously, applauding when I should be performing. If I had been born into another family, I would probably be

playing piano in a bar today. But listening is next best. Some people like to shoot deer or worry about the Detroit Lions. I like to sit on a swivel stool, hunched over a piano bar, with both feet on a brass

In Detroit, my favorite piano man is Ernie Swan at the Salamander Bar. In Port Huron, there's Bob Gibbs and his group at the Curtana. And in Flint, my man is Ray Lowell at the Shorthorn.

Denny McLain used to play the organ at the Shorthorn, before he won 30 games. He was pretty awful but he wasn't the worst noise ever heard there. The worst is the spoon players.

It does no good to hide the silverware. Several Shorthorn regulars bring their own spoons, sticking out of their hip pockets and rattling in their purses. Lowell, who is too nice a guy to scream in agony, allows the spoonists to clack along with his piano. It sounds like a mess hall riot at San Quentin.

A change in the Thumb Area Consortium's status could mean more dollars to fight unemployment in the three-county area.

Director Frank Lenard told board members during a Thursday meeting in Cass City the Consortium is in line for designation as a prime

Prime sponsorship means the Consortium would deal directly with federal Department of Labor officials for funding. Presently, as a program agent, Lenard must go through the state's labor department which costs the area five per cent of each CETA program along with five per cent of all CETA

The change should mean more money to operate CETA programs which totaled over \$6 million for the Thumb this

When the Consortium recently earned the program agent status, it theoretically eliminated county lines when it comes to funding. The change had been a goal of Sanilac county commissioners who believed their county was being shortchanged in

It's too early to tell how much more money may be headed for the Thumb. Figures won't be available until Congress appropriates new CETA allocations for 1977.

Current unemployment totals show Huron county with 13 per cent, or 2,025 persons without jobs; Tuscola county with 11 per cent or 2,500 persons out of work and Sanilac county with 7.9 per cent or 1,300 jobless residents.

Sanilac commissioner Sam Work, Croswell, criticized the figures as inaccurate and said his county should press legal action against the Michigan Employment Security Commission to reform its record

Unemployment figures are one basis for allocating CETA

funds. In other business, the board okayed contracts with the Human Development Commission for Title I Work Experience. The contract totals \$302,693, of which \$213,495 will be spent on wages. An estimated 190 persons will be served from Oct.

1 through Sept. 30, 1977. The board also gave its approval to a payment program with MESC for \$210,125. MESC issues weekly checks to persons participating in classroom training programs run by the Consortium. The program is virtually the only connection the board maintains with the state employment service.

Lenard reported CETA Title VI has been extended by Congress, but the program is still not funded. He said money for the program probably won't be approved until

after the November election. He speculated that new funding will probably equal the present \$2.3 million for the Thumb.

member Calvin Board Reibling, Elkton, was critical of some Title VI jobs which he felt were simply make-work

'Ît's fine to create jobs, but if that's what we're supposed to do, we should create jobs that last permanently," he said. "If an employer says we don't need these people when the money runs out, he didn't need them in the beginning."

Lenard said he favored WPA-type projects where a work crew could be organized for a specific project, such as the construction of a ball field at Port Hope this year.

Drugs and medicines

> perfectly happy and well. For many years, doctors have not seemed to realize that people have many different reactions to drugs and it doesn't make sense to prescribe one dose for everyone, expecting to get the same result. Some people are very sensitive to drugs; some don't react at all to a big dose; others react to a usually harmless drug with nausea and vomiting or even skin

Many persons have what we doctors call side reactions - sometimes so unpleasant or dangerous that the patient must immediately stop taking the medicine.

To illustrate: I once saw a fine businesswoman who said that when she got severe arthritis in her hands, her doctors had given her plenty of cortisone, a marvelous but powerful drug. It gave her great relief from the pain, but a few weeks later she woke up in a mental hospital, because the drug caused a psychosis, as it sometimes does when it is taken in too-large doses for too long a time.

Some of our powerful modern drugs should not be taken in combination with alcohol or in combination with each other. A patient is wise to ask his doctor if he can safely take alcohol with the drug that he is being given and also he should tell the doctor honestly what other drugs he is taking at the time. perhaps those prescribed by another specialist.





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

Little support for public

transit tax

Only half the persons who endorse improved public transportation are willing to support it with local tax dollars, according to Automobile Club of Michigan's September Motor News mag-

That opinion was among several revealed by Market Opinion Research of Detroit last February following a study of 1,001 Michigan households. The survey was conducted on behalf of the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation, and results were published in a Motor News article entitled, "Public Transportation Yes, but. . .'

Individuals queried reside in Detroit, its suburbs, outstate cities, outstate suburbs and rural areas, the article notes. Individuals surveyed were asked a variety of questions about roads and public transportation.

"The study came up with conclusions that are ambivalent, if not downright contradictory," says Motor News. For example, 70 per cent of those queried statewide were in favor of bus system improvements. But asked about spending state tax dollars on such improvements, only 35 per cent would increase spending while 32 per cent favored spending the same amount as at present.

The study also indicated Michigan residents will support improvement and maintenance of highways and improvements to bus systems and railroads, but would oppose building a rapid transit system in Detroit or more metropolitan freeways or interstate highways.

"Unclear from the 57-page report," says Motor News, is whether support of public transportation would translate into actual usage. That is significant, since backers of public transportation urge subsidies for capital costs and operation of that transportation."

The specific question, "Do you favor or oppose rapid rail transit, above or below ground?" elicited no majority anywhere. Statewide, averages were 30 per cent for and 35 per cent against while 35 per cent said they didn't

Motor News said the negative response to mass transit indicated that a lot of educational work needs to be done if there is to be any broad support for the long-debated, multibillion-dollar Detroit mass transit plan.

"Half of those living in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties said they didn't know if they would use such a system," the article continues, "Perhaps that might be expected in a state where, the study notes, 89 per cent of those employed use cars to get to work."

Motor News noted that public transportation becomes more attractive statewide as gasoline prices increase, but gas would have to cost \$1 per gallon before 50 per cent of those surveyed say they would use buses.

Plan pre-school workshop

Aliene Mills - Extension Agent

Play and its role in your childs development will be the topic of a workshop for

parents and teachers, Sept. 28. The workshop, sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac counties, will be held at 6:00 p.m. at Wildwood Farms, just south of the intersection of M-81 and M-53 near Cass City.

The workshop fee of \$4.00 will cover dinner as well as the presentation by Extension Child Development Specialist Jean Brown and graduate students Kathy LeBlanc and LeeAnne Harness.

Tuscola County Extension Home Economist, Aliene Mills, who organized the workshop, points out that play is the preschool childs work. "Young children in todays world have much to learn,' Mrs. Mills says. "They have to learn how to get along with other people in the family and community. There's the whole world of nature to explore, and there's the man made world: vacuum cleaners, the kitchen stove, automobiles and airplanes-they're all wonders to learn

"The world that contains

these wonders is large, complicated and more than a little scary" she notes, "but the child can cope with it by reducing it to a smaller world where he is in charge. This is the world of play.'

"Through play, the child exchanges relationships between people, between people and nature, between people and the things they have made, and between things and ideas and other things and ideas," Mrs. Mills explains.

Parents are a very important part of the childs play, she points out. They set up the environment for play so that it is safe and interesting and provides the play materials. They also play with the child and so enrich his play and stimulate the child to find new possibilities in familiar objects and games.



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

Record drop in complaints

A decline in complaints, both in Elkland township and countywide, was recorded in August by the Tuscola County Sheriff's department.

According to Sheriff Hugh Marr's monthly report to the County Board of Commissioners, Elkland township recorded 67 complaints in August, compared with 102 in

Vassar township led the way with 169 complaints, up 35 from the previous month, followed by Millington with 71, a drop of 37 from July. Elkland township remained

A total of 928 complaints were handled by the Sheriff's department, a drop of 71 from

The drop was also reflected in the total number of traffic accidents policed by the department. A total of 41 injury and property damage accidents were handled, compared with 75 in July.

Sheriff's deputies issued 168 speeding tickets in August, an increase of 30 from July.

Deputies handled 78 larceny reports, 38 assaults, 36 burglaries, 97 vandalisms and 52 disorderly persons.

The Driver's License Bureau issued 595 renewals, 207 originals and 58 duplicates. A total of 81 voter registrations were handled by the bureau.

Patrol units travelled 30,643 miles and consumed 2,769 gallons of gasoline in August. The county jail received 135 inmates and released 134.





A reminder: drivers don't

have to turn on red

Great, isn't it, that new law allowing motorists to turn right on red after stopping. Great for folks in a hurry.

But what about those unfortunate enough to be in the right lane planning to go straight ahead? It's nerveshattering to say the least to have some impatient car jockey honking like crazy be-

A reminder to all drivers:

the Department of State Highways and Transportation says there is no obligation for a driver to turn right after stopping at a red light. (Left either, for that matter, depending on which way the streets go.)

It is a courtesy, however, to stay out of turning lanes if you plan to go straight ahead. This will keep traffic flowing as the new law intended.

One more point about the red-turning law. Seems blind people, long accustomed to walking across intersections after hearing vehicles stop for a red light, now have trouble figuring out when to cross because of cars turning on

Michigan's \ State Police Director George Halverson issues this warning to drivers. They must let pedestrians cross the street BEFORE making a turn on a red light.

"Motorists should be especially cautious when they see a blind person about to make a crossing," he says. "They must stop when approaching a person carrying a white cane or accompanied by a leader dog."

Rules for Hunting

Hunters: Don't just shoulder that gun and head out into the woods to do your thing. Take your sharpest wits with

Last year, according to a safety expert with the Department of Natural Resources, 234 hunters were hurt in hunting accidents in Michigan. (Some 1.2 million persons took part in hunting

And, says recreational safety supervisor Frank Opolka, nearly 50 per cent of the hunting accidents last year happened when the shooter and victim were less than 10 yards apart."

Shotguns were involved in almost two-thirds of the accidents, Opolka recounts, and the most frequent cause of hunting accidents in 1975 was poor judgment on the part of the shooter.

Opolka lists five essential safety precautions: Be certain of your target. Be equally certain no one is

in your line of fire. Know where your hunting partners are at all times. When unloading your gun, check twice before you consider it unloaded.

Don't drink alcohol while you're hunting.

Rod Wright was the meet medalist with a 38, but Vassar's over-all strength spelled the difference. Following


