## Wet Corn in Crib

Planting Michigan's 1941 crop of orn for grain and silage may turn nto a headache unless farmers make sure their present supplies of seed are of good enough quality to nsure germination.

Too much of Michigan's corn market for heavy birds at any went into the crib last fall with time.' too high a moisture content, in the opinion of A. A. Johnson, farm crops specialist on the staff of Michigan State College. Samples and tests taken from various farm cribs convince him that ordinary seed supplies may not suffice this

He collected samples in January and February. The moisture content ranged from 18 to 35 per cent. These samples germinate from 40 to 85 per cent. Corn that was still in the field and caught in the cold spell that occurred November 11 germinated 50 per cent or less.

Not only was much of the corn comparatively high in moisture at cribbing time, but the winter months have not been dry enough to draw out this excess water. In some southern counties where corn went into the crib at 23 to 24 per cent moisture, that same corn has even taken on moisture and is up

Two lessons can be taken from the situation now apparent, according to Johnson. One is that some of the open pollinated varieties and some of the hybrids were not adapted, another lesson is that they were not low enough in moisture when cribbed. Low temperatures sharply reduce germination when moisture is above 20 per cent. For seed the open pollinated corn likely will be low in germination. For feed, any of this corn may mold when warm weather returns to the state.

Farmers, he says, should make ermination tests. They should have field selected and properly cured their seed corn last fall Now the best step is to test and if not satisfactory, to obtain seed that will give sufficient germination for a proper stand of corn in

#### Smoking Turkey **Opens New Sales**

New methods of marketing eavyweight turkeys, especially at times other than Thanksgiving or Christmas, are apparent in a smokng method developed at Michigan State College.

Yes, the meat is high priced, admits the college research man who worked on the problem, but it is no nigher than other similar delicacies used for sliced meat.

Here are the results he obtained in processing a turkey from live weight down to a squares-sided boneless loaf of turkey meat:

He took seven turkeys weighing an average of 14.3 pounds. When drawn as for roasting these weighed 10.4 pounds and when bones were removed as well as giblets and neck, there was 7.9 pounds of raw turkey meat remaining.

#### Winter Brings Milk Increase

January brought a slight in crease in milk and butterfat proluction of the 34,000 cows on test in the 90 Michigan dairy herd improvement associations. The average dairy herd improvement association cow produced 26.4 pounds of butterfat in January, as compared with 25.7 in December.

Cows removed from Michigan herds hit a new high, with a total of 909 cows removed. This removal indicated two things of in terest to the dairy farmer. Herds are being more closely culled, and more cows than ever before are being sold for dairy purposes.

Michigan is a great dairy cow exporting state, as the 182 cows sold for dairy purposes indicate. More and more buyers are coming to Michigan to obtain cows from the high producing herds, thus affording another outlet for profit to the Michigan dairy farmer.

Of cows remaining after sales for dairy purposes, 23 per cent were culled because of low production.
