"I had a happy birthday yesterday. I went swimming and flew.

It is great to be flying. The 'S' in my address stands for scouting "We have been eating good. We have natives to wait on table, clear our rooms and make our beds. Their English is only slightly foreign and they seem intelligent. "Missionaries have done a lot of work. They have a school where the native children start at seven arrived at church this morning in time for the last song. I'll be able

to go quite regularly. "Everything is going good now I'll be glad when my mail starts coming through."

Paragraphs from May 4 letter: "It seems good to be back to vork again. I am a radio officer, which is my biggest job other than flying. I have quite a few men in the radio department but I have a good man in charge. I am navigation officer and chief censor too.

"We have softball games three times a week. We played a negro team last night and won.

"I went swimming today, in fact haven't missed a day this week. The water is warm and I am getting a nice tan.
