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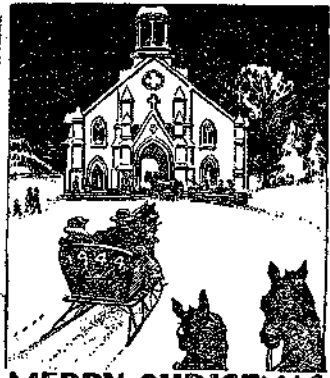

Cotton Rug

An all-cotton rug, if its colors are vat dyed, is completely washable. However, when washing be sure to use a mild soap and lukewarm water. Strong soaps and hot water make cotton rugs fuzzy. Be gentle. Dry it flat—not over a clothesline or radiator. It is this latter type of drying that makes cotton rugs buckle and lose their shape. Spots and stains may be washed out except those which are immune to water, such as grease or acid stains. These you can remove with a good dry cleaner. Or send the rug to a first class laundry.

Grinding Grain

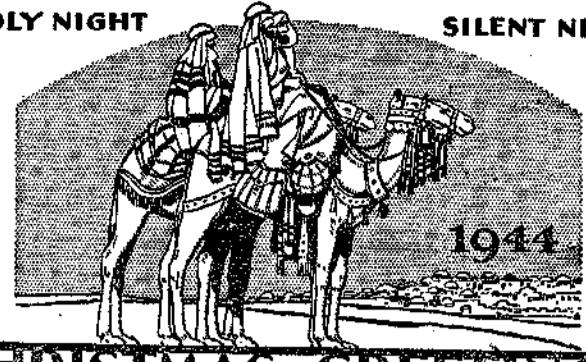
Grinding grain for dairy cows is a recommended practice. Greater milk production, especially with high producing cows, was obtained in all of the experiments at the Texas agricultural station when ground grains were fed. Most of this greater production appeared to be due to the greater amount of ground grain consumed. Even though more grain was eaten, the cows getting ground feed produced enough additional milk to justify the practice.
