Locust Easy Prey

Sluggish and unwary, slow to take wing, 17 year locusts are easy prey for enemies on the ground and in the air. Digger wasps, domestic fowls and hogs are alert foes. Predatory insects feed upon the eggs. In the vicinity of towns cicadas are attacked by English sparrows. The clearing of woodlands, and the shrinkage of old forest areas have also checked an increase in the numbers of the pests.

**Oriental Poppy** 

The oriental poppy (Papaver orientalis) is perhaps the most popular of the poppies-with large flowers from 6 to 12 inches across. They follow the iris into bloom, are very hardy perennials and apparently have no important diseases or insect pests. They grow well in almost any soil but demand full sun for profuse blooming.
