Naval Reserve Commissions Open to Ex-Enlisted Men

Commissioned rank in volunteer Naval Reserve is open to certain former enlisted Navy men now honorably discharged.

Enlisted men who served with the Navy for less than one year and who have satisfactorily completed a four-year course of at least 120 semester hours at an accredited college or university are eligible to apply.

Men who have more than one year's service in the Navy may deduct an equivalent year of college education for each year of active service during the war, providing the candidate is of the four-year college educational level. However, no more than two years of the college requirement may be waived because of active duty, and active duty in a student status cannot be considered in waiving the college educational requirement.

Candidates must have been discharged honorably, be between the ages of 19 and 30 years, inclusive, veterans of World War II (service between December 7, 1941 and September 2, 1945) and American citizens.

Interested veterans desiring further information may apply to Office of Officer Procurement, Book Building, Washington Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan.

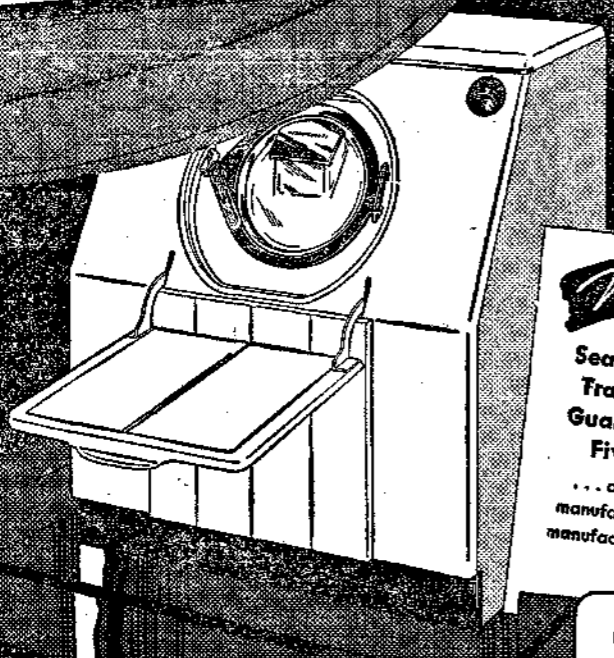

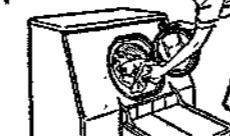

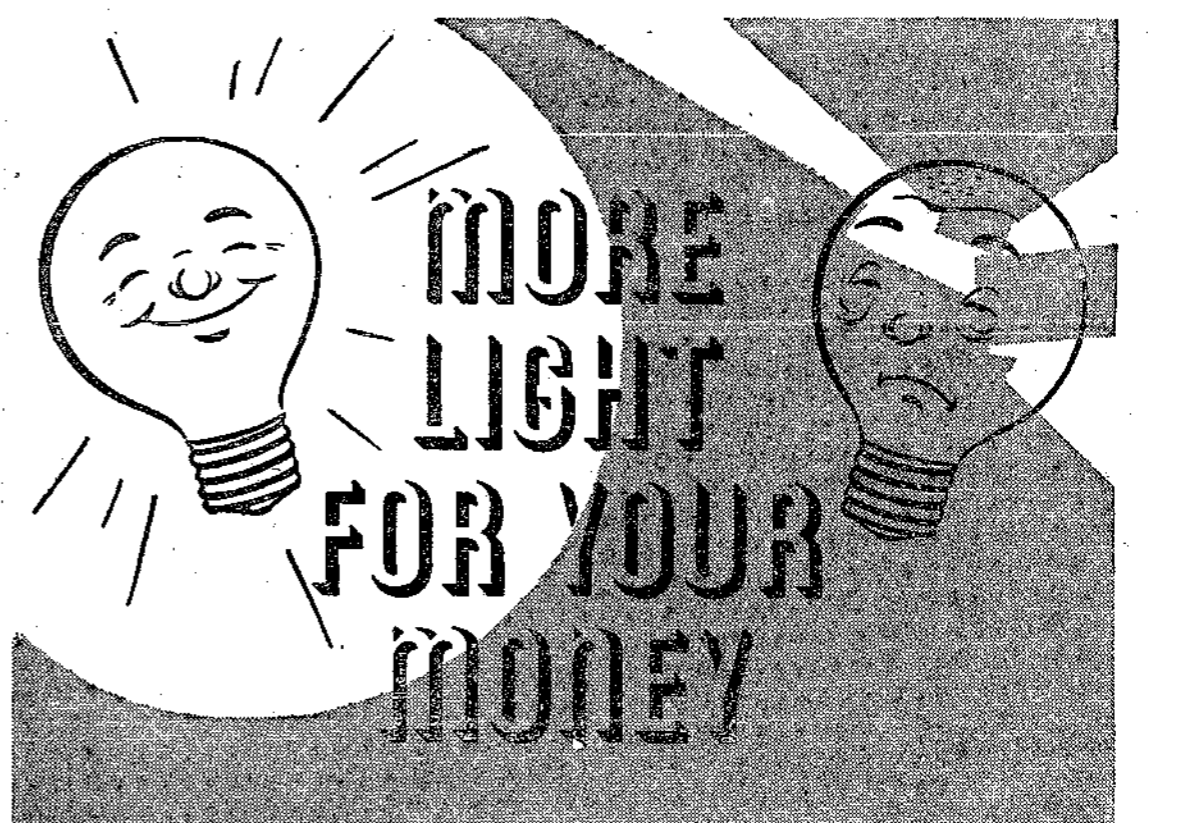

"Fortunately, we are in a strong position in several respects and may remain strong. Inventories are low. I believe they will continue to remain low. Keeping them that way is one of the most important contributions that businessmen can make toward achieving a smooth transition from the present state of affairs to a more normal one."

Soil Deficiencies Can Be Detected

Soil testing is one means by which farmers can determine in advance of planting whether lime or extra plant food in the form of stable manure and commercial fertilizer will prove profitable. Kirk Lawton, soils science specialist at Michigan State College, says that soil deficiencies can also be detected by testing the tissue of growing crops and even by the appearance of crops. He urges that farmers determine soil needs in advance of planting time. Waiting to diagnose soil deficiencies until the crop is partly grown, he points out, is similar to locking the barn after the horse is stolen—it may be too late to do anything about it.

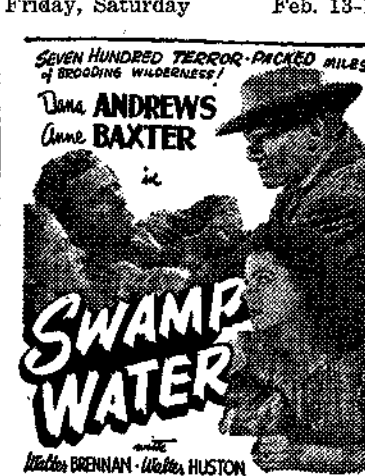
