Railway Freight Sets New Mark

Lines Establish Peacetime Record Despite Bad Box Car Shortage.

NEW YORK. - The railways hauled more freight more miles in 1947 than ever before in peacetime -but without stilling the clamor of

Shortage of freight cars persisted, but showed signs of easing at the year's end as output of new units

neared 10,000 a month. Hundreds of new passenger cars vent into service and streamliners became a common sight on many secondary runs-but travelers still found some reservations hard to

Freight rates and passenger fares advanced—and the carriers said the added revenue was largely offset by higher labor and material costs.

Twin measures of rail service performed are the passenger-mile (transporting one passenger one mile) and the ton-mile (moving one ton of freight one mile).

The railroads estimated 1347 passenger-miles at 44,789,600,000, around 30 per cent below the preceding year.

Carried the Freight.

As the 10,000-a-month goal was approached, the program's sights were raised to a 14,000-a-month level to be attained in 1948.

More than 800 gleaming new passenger train units were turned out by builders, enabling the railroads to offer day coach travelers unprecedented comfort and luxury on principal and many secondary runs.

Lack of this equipment was a factor cited as delaying the inauguration of through coast-to-coast trains, a normal outgrowth of the transcontinental sleepers placed in service

To facilitate travel, most of the country's major lines in 1947 inaugurated credit systems under which more than 25,000 companies and individuals now holding cards may obtain tickets without cash and pay for their purchases at the end of the

Revived from prewar days were rail-auto service (providing a car for use at the end of a train trip) and travel loans, whereby banks advance vacation funds which can be repaid in installments.

The railroads' prize performance of the year was in the freight field. Operating with 27 per cent fewer cars than in 1929, with total carrying capacity some 20 million tons below that prewar peak year, the railroads piled up an estimated 647,-358,500,000 ton-miles, which was 45 per cent above the 1929 total. Seek Efficiency.

Prospects for 1948 are cloudy. William T. Faricy, president of the Association of American Railroads.

"According to the best estimates now available, railroad freight traffic during the coming year will be 2.7 per cent less than it was in 1947. and passenger traffic will decline

"The railroads' financial situation during 1948 will depend largely on the outcome of their petition for increased freight rates adjusted to rising costs."

Despite their record freight carrying performance, which was made possible by larger cars, longer trains and more efficient handling, the railroads were unable to keep pace with the swiftly expanding national economy.

The shortage of box cars became the worst in 20 years.

Under the government auspices, a "task committee" of steel makers and car builders undertook to channel to car plants enough steel to produce 10,000 freight cars a month. The corner was turned finally in September when for the first time: since the war car deliveries exceeded retirement of over-age units.

NEW YORK.—A woman's life is harder than a man's and, surprisingly, more males subscribe to that view than do women.

This is revealed by a national magazine which says that a poll in three populous eastern states. New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey, showed 62 per cent think a woman has a harder life than a man. Twenty-five per cent believe: the opposite to be true.

But the proportion who think a yoman's life is harder was slightly, higher among men than among women. Thirteen per cent think men and women have it equally as diffi-




