In the sixth induction service held since the granting of the charter in April, 1945, the Cass City chapters of the National Honor Society added nineteen members to their rolls during an assembly held last Thursday afternoon. The total of local high school students who have to date won this unusual distinction now numbers one hundred thirteen.

Harold Oatley, sponsor of the chapters here, spoke briefly on the purpose and significance of the society, while members of the group participated in the induction ceremonies. Membership pins, certificates and cards were presented to the new inductees.

Election to the Honor Society is

by action of a faculty council guided to a great extent by expressions of opinion contributed by students as well as teachers. All nominees to the society are rated both by their classmates and by the faculty and much weight is given particularly to the ratings assigned by the students themselves.

A total of nine members of the class soon to be graduated have been elected to the honor group. These seniors, who will receive the added seal of the society on their diplomas, have distinguished themselves in the four fields upon which election is based, namely, character, scholarship, leadership, and service.

## Judge Boomhower Honored on His 76th Birthday

Circuit Judge X. A. Boomhower was honored at a dinner in the Hotel Irwin at Bad Axe Saturday night in observance of his 76th birthday which was Sunday.

The dinner was attended by attorneys of Huron and Sanilac Counties and other close friends of the judge.

Greetings were extended by Oscar Rogers, Byron Watson, Samuel H. Pangborn, Leo J. Thourib and Arthur A. Hartshorn, all of Bad Axe, Dr. Martin S. Tweedie, Sandusky, and Ernest Clabuesch, Pigeon.

Judge Boomhower was born March 21, 1872, in Ohio. His parents moved the next year to Sheridan Township, Huron County, where he spent his boyhood.

After attending high school at Cass City, he took a course of shorthand at Valparaiso University. He taught rural schools for a time before he returned to Valparaiso where he taught shorthand while he studied law.

Returning to Huron County, Judge Boomhower began the practice of law in Ubyl in 1901. He served several years as Ubyl Village President. In 1909, he became Huron County Prosecuting Attorney, serving 12 years.

He then engaged in private practice of law until he became Circuit Judge Jan. 1, 1924, a position he has held since. He was elected in 1946 to his fifth six-year term.

Therefore, I, Kim Sigler, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby proclaim Tuesday, April 6, 1948, as Army Day in Michigan, and call upon the citizens of the State to celebrate the day by the display of our national colors, parades, and meetings. I further call upon the loyal citizens of the State to give all possible assistance to the Army, the National Guard, and the Reserve organizations, so that our defense may be assured."

CONTROL WEEK IS

a neighborhood drive. All schools in the county will be asked to co-operate.

Village councils are urged to combine the rat control drive with their annual spring clean-up week. (Michigan Spring Clean-Up Week is also April 4 to April 10.)

Here is the suggested schedule for each home-owner to follow during the week:

April 4, 5 and 6—Pre-bait. Use garbage, apples, meat, etc. Get them coming to you.

April 7 and 8—Add poison to bait. Use Antu or other rat

poisons. (Place poison baits carefully. Protect children and other animals. Behind heavy boards is a good place.)

April 9 and 10—Collect dead rats, bury them. Do not handle. Pick up all unused bait and burn or bury.

Other suggestions for killing rats:

1. Carbon monoxide gas. (Exhaust from car or tractor directed in rat burrows).

2. Traps—Place in runways or under crates.

3. A good .22 rifle.

Statistic show that the number of rats in U. S. is about equal to number of people.

On this basis there are 35000 rats in Tuscola County. One rat will eat 40 pounds of grain per year. This is a loss of 1,400,000 pounds of grain per year in addition to damage done in spreading disease, destruction of property,

etc. An equal amount of grain would feed 1500 people for a year. This is a hungry world. Let's save food.

**Pointed Eggs**  
Eggs of birds that breed on rock ledges without building nests are very pointed, so that the eggs will tend to roll about in a small circle instead of rolling off the ledge.

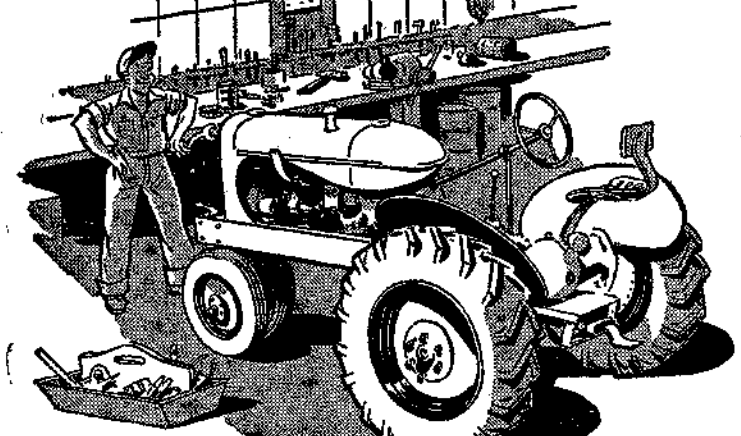
