## Michigan Mirror

Governor Kim Sigler has a tough nut to crack: How can he successfully dissociate his personal ambitions from his new program of constitutional reform?

It's not an easy task. The problem boils down to something like this:

Sigler is asking the legislature to submit amendments to Michigan voters next November. These amendments, if approved, would lengthen terms of the governor and other state officials from two to four years, would permit the governor to appoint the secretary of state and attorney general, would permit legislators to get salaries of their successors and elective state officials, and would permit the calling of a constitutional convention by a majority of the votes cast for such a convention call, not a majority of all voters who go to the polls.

Governor Sigler is convinced that these steps would make for better and more responsible government in Michigan. But a number of legislators are yet to be convinced. They link the reforms to personal ambitions of Sigler, a desire to get greater power for himself, not for his successor.

If Sigler is re-elected in November for a second term, the four-year term amendment would deprive him of one month of this second term. He would go out of

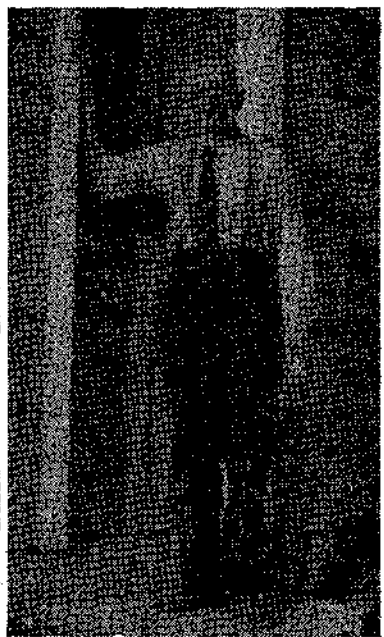

## John H. Kercher Died Sunday at Age of 88 Years

John H. Kercher, 88, passed away in an Owosso hospital on Sunday night where he had been a patient for four days. He had been in failing health for several weeks.

Funeral services were held in the Douglas Funeral Home on Thursday afternoon. Rev. Stanley P. Kirm, pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren Church of Cass City, of which Mr. Kercher was a member, was the officiating clergyman. Interment was made in the Colfax cemetery at Bad Axe.

John Henry Kercher was born November 2, 1859, at Sebringville, Ontario, and married Miss Louisa Merklinger at Milverton, Ontario, March 9, 1886. In 1887, they came to Elkton, Michigan, which at that

time had only two houses, both roughly hewn. He built a residence there in the fall of '87, and engaged in carpenter work, erecting many houses and large barns in and around Elkton and Pigeon.

After nine years, he returned to make Canada his home where he lived for five years and worked in a large furniture factory. In 1901, he again decided to make Michigan his home and came back to Elkton. He built seven different residences in and near Elkton which he sold. He constructed the first Evangelical Church in Elkton in 1888 and rebuilt it in 1898. In 1913, it was destroyed by fire and he again helped to rebuild it as it now stands. He served as usher in the church for many years.

On August 25, 1929, Mrs. Kercher died after 4½ years of illness from a stroke. Mr. Kercher came to Cass City that fall and has since made his home with his son, Erwin W., here and with another son, C. G. Kercher, at Owosso.

Mr. Kercher carried on his trade as carpenter and cabinet maker well past his 80th birthday and spent many hours each day in a shop at the rear of his son's residence in Cass City.

Mr. Kercher is survived by two sons, Erwin W. Kercher of Cass City and Clarence G. Kercher of Owosso; six grandsons, Charles Kercher of Bay City, Capt. Ferris Kercher of Columbus, Ga., Lt. Gerald Kercher stationed at Munich, Germany, Harold and Richard Kercher of Owosso, and Robert Kercher of Flint; six great grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Andrew Eckmeyer, and three nephews, Wesley, George and Gordon Strasser and a niece, Hilda Strasser, of Stratford, Ont.

## Detailed Study of Sanilac County's School Situation

About 300 questionnaires have been filled out by seventh and eighth graders of Sanilac County, and returned to the school committee of the Sanilac County Planning Committee, which met in the court house at Sandusky Wednesday according to Ward Hodge, committee chairman. The committee expects more questionnaires to be returned soon.

The purpose of these questionnaires is to delineate community boundaries for assisting in a detailed study of the county school situation.

Preliminary study by the community indicates there are five major trading areas in the county with five such centers with some fewer facilities and numerous minor trading centers.

It was pointed out that a good 12 grade school unit should offer a wide variety of subjects, and cater to the needs of the area served. A school should also serve as a community center for all people. To provide adequate facilities such as school should have a tax base of three million dollars, and at least 360 students in the upper six grades. Twenty to 25 students per class is an optimum number as pointed out by the committee.

Recreational facilities for lower grades is just as important as for the upper grades, Neil Murray pointed out.

In a thorough discussion of transportation, it was brought out that a child should not be required to ride on a school bus longer than 45 minutes.

If there were a good distribution of six, eight and twelve grade schools, strategically located in the county, a much more comprehensive school program could be offered. Overhead and transportation expenses could also be curtailed.

The next school committee meeting is scheduled for Thursday, April 22, at 8:00 p. m. in the courthouse, Sandusky.

## Funds Assured for Cass River Survey

Important information regarding the Cass River drain was brought to the drain committee of the Sanilac County Planning Committee at its meeting Wednesday afternoon by Russell Wait, committee chairman.

Wait reported that federal funds for an all-over survey of the Saginaw Valley drainage system, including Cass River, have been assured unless congress curtails appropriations for drainage and the flood control purposes. It is expected that the survey will be conducted this summer.

The committee recommended that two six-foot culverts be put in Snover Road west of Snover to relieve spring water congestion. Mr. Muir, county drain commissioner, stated that the state highway department will put a 40-foot by-pass across M-46 within 100 feet of the present Cass River bridge.

The committee requested Mr. Muir to contact the state highway department and get a definite statement relative to straightening the curve on M-51 north of M-46 where Black River crosses M-51 when further work will be done on Black River.

## Poultry Testing Show Results in The Past Year

Great strides have been made in disease eradication and improvement of Michigan poultry, C. G. Card, head of the Michigan State College poultry department, reports.

The National Poultry Improvement Plan and the National Turkey Improvement Plan, both working to stamp out the disease, are jointly sponsored by the Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association, MSC poultry department and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The results of the last few years' testing, retesting and check testing have improved the livability of chicks and poults produced last year to a very high level. Livability tests are based on cards sent out with each sale of chicks and poults by the hatchery. At the end of 14 days, the farmer returns this livability card to the Michigan State Poultry Improvement association office where results are tabulated.

In 1947 cards were received which accounted for 731,446 chicks and poults. The mortality percentage was 3.5 per cent on the birds and the livability percentage 96.5.

Other significant steps in the movement to provide good chicks and poults is the fact that 643,000 chicks in 2,500 flocks were blood tested and leg banded. In addition, 70,650 turkeys in 220 flocks were tested and leg banded.

Fifty-five percent of the total hatcheries in Michigan, representing over 60 percent of the total capacity, are now cooperating with the Michigan State Poultry Improvement association.

Lists of hatcheries cooperating can be secured from county agricultural agents, agricultural teachers, FFA and 4-H leaders or by writing to the Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association, East Lansing.

## Down Memory Lane

FROM THE FILES OF THE CHRONICLE

Twenty-five Years Ago.

office on December 1, 1950, instead of on Jan. 1, 1951.

As Sigler sees it, the Dec. 1 inauguration date is evidence itself that he would deprive himself of one month and that this would benefit his successor, not himself. While he has not said he would retire at the end of a second term, he had plainly inferred it.

Furthermore, the governor has emphasized repeatedly that he does not look upon the governorship as a stepping stone to the United States Senate or other political public service. He would like to do something about better government, and he is not satisfied to hold the office of governor unless he strives to accomplish this.

In the governor's mind, the reform program should not be associated with Sigler's political future. But it is inevitable, that some legislators will want to be convinced. Frankly, they're not altogether sold.

For one thing, the governor's amendments would strengthen the power of the governor and other elective officials, but they would do little for legislators. The right of the legislators to increase salaries would not apply to themselves but to their successors. Legislative incumbents would be exempt. State officials would not. While terms of elective officials would be stretched to four years, terms of senators and representatives would remain at two years.

Speaker Victor A. Knox of the Soc said, "there is a feeling among many members that if we are to grant a four-year term to the governor, the same reasoning would apply to the legislature itself."

And there you have it—human nature inevitably in action, linking a man's program of change to his personal ambitions.

Governor Sigler points out that since the 1908 constitution was adopted, only five governors have served more than one term. "Most of the time we have had a shift of administrations every two years. In the light of these facts, can anyone wonder why a well planned program of state government has not been carried out?"

"Does anyone seriously contend that a worth-while program can be accomplished in two years? . . . Governors are not in office long enough to lay out a program and see it through."

As for greater power for the governor, here is a quotation from Sigler's message to the legislature: "It is the governor to whom the people look for administrative accomplishment, and whom they blame for lack of it. The tools of administration, however, have not been provided to enable the chief executive of our state to fulfill this responsibility. . . . There should be authority commensurate with that responsibility."

Governor Sigler asks the legislature to create a state department of administration which would take over function of numerous state boards and agencies. The governor would appoint its director. This department would handle budgeting, purchasing and accounting. This department would give the governor, says Sigler, "the means to get a job done," a "right arm" with power to get results. It is a good illustration of what Kim Sigler wants.

## Chicks Need Feed And Water Early

Good feed and clean water are the two important needs for baby chicks during the early days of their life, advises Howard Zindel, extension poultryman at Michigan State College.

Hatcherymen are interested in the success of poultrymen and can recommend feed which will supply all of the essential nutrients necessary for the proper start.

The specialist reports that chicks will start eating more readily if mash is placed on paper, cardboard or egg case flats. These temporary feeders together with paper covering the litter should be taken up after the second or third day.

Chicks which have been shipped from a distance will start eating and drinking more readily if the beaks of a few chicks are individually dipped in water and then the chicks placed near the paper plates which contain feed.

## Sow Winners Used Good Practices

Winners in the 1947 sow testing project, sponsored by the Michigan State College animal husbandry extension service, followed sound and approved production practices, says Harry Moxley, MSC swine extension specialist.

Top record in the contest was that of the Jackson Farms, Centerville, Michigan, with a litter of 13 cross-bred pigs that weighed 544 and one-half pounds at 56 days of age.

Moxley points out that records such as this are achieved because of prolific breeding stock, saving large litters, and good feeding practices. Successful swine raisers were also careful to keep pigs thrifty and healthy and free from both internal and external parasites.

## VETERANNEWS

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

### Veterans' Problems Reported More Complex by Counselors

A compilation of reports received by the Office of Veterans' Affairs for the month of February from 41 counseling centers reflects 13,259 contacts. This is an average of 323.4 contacts per center for the month, and 16.2 contacts per day per center. Of the total contacts for the month, 63.24% were repeat visits by veterans.

Requests involving educational and vocational opportunities remained high this month, constituting 19.30% of total requests—an increase of 1.20% over similar requests in January. In this category, job training requests show the most marked increase; having risen steadily since the middle of 1947, going from 1.96% of total requests in July to 3.44% in February 1948.

This steady increase might be accounted for by the growing scarcity of employment opportunities, especially for untrained workers. Veterans are turning in greater numbers to opportunities afforded by on-the-job and apprenticeship training as a means to better equip themselves for a stable future.

On the other hand, the fact that 63.24% of all contacts at centers were made by veterans returning for further assistance bears out the contention that, for the most part, the men who are visiting the centers today have special and complex problems. This group is composed of veterans who will be visiting the centers for the next five years, at least, and who will expect to receive the further help necessary to effect complete adjustment in their individual lives.

The community counseling centers act as authorized agencies of the Office of Veterans' Affairs in carrying out the programs sponsored by and operated by the Office of Veterans' Affairs, in addition to the many other services which they render to veterans and their dependents.

## Finer Plants Result By Use of Gout Drug

### Secretary Anderson Tells of Hope for Future.

WASHINGTON.—A drug used to treat gout in humans will produce finer plants "that otherwise would be impossible," Secretary of Agriculture Anderson has announced.

He did not identify the drug. "In the future, on the same land we have today, fewer farmers will furnish greater abundance for more people," he said. "The matchless science of agriculture already enables the average farm worker to turn out nearly two-thirds more than he did 20 years ago."

"We shall have increasingly better crop varieties, including more hybrids. Scientists will create improved varieties to resist new strains of disease and insects that continually threaten our crops," said Anderson.

"They will give us progressively higher yields. They will make possible finer quality and greater food value," he continued.

"In livestock production we are just beginning to use the principle of hybrid vigor, so successful in plant-breeding. Farmers are beginning commercial production of hybrid hogs that bear larger litters and make quicker and cheaper gains."

## Gave Three Sons in War; Widow Seeks Citizenship

LYNDHURST, N. J. — A 58-year-old widow who lost three of her four sons in the last war received the last bit of information she believes she needs in her efforts to become a citizen.

Mrs. Stella Lewandowski was seeking a vital clue—the name of the ship in which she came to this country—required to prove legal entry to the United States. A fellow passenger offered the information. It was the Patricia of the Hamburg-American line which docked at Hoboken June 15, 1905.

The widow thought she had become a citizen automatically when her husband, Valenty, became a citizen May 18, 1923.

## Winter Sun Will Help Heat New Type of Solar Houses

TOLEDO, OHIO. — Mother Nature will help stoke the furnace in the home of the future, according to 49 leading American architects.

Selected by a panel of building authorities and commissioned by Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass company to plan homes that were best suited for each state and the District of Columbia, the architects have completed 49 house designs which are combined in a new book, "Your Solar House."

George Fred Keck, Chicago architect, who is represented in the book, explains: "A solar house is built so its main rooms face the sun. On south walls, thermopane insulating windows or even walls of glass utilize the warmth of the winter sun. In summer, when the sun is higher in the sky, an overhanging roof shades the windows."

The houses range in style from traditional architecture to streamlined modernism. But each puts year-round living under the sun, following a new trend toward using more glass in construction.

"Designing with light" is Los Angeles Architect Harwell H. Harris' definition of the new trend.

In addition to the benefits of solar heating during winter daylight hours, architects say the new houses achieve an "openness" to the surrounding landscape that gives a lift to living in all seasons.

## College Gives 'Backbone' Diet for Menu Planners

ITHACA, N. Y. — Harassed homemakers, valiantly trying to balance their food budgets without sacrificing the family's health, recently were recommended a "backbone" for their year-round menu planning. Miss Mable Rollins, associate professor of the State College of Home Economics, urged the following menu following a two-year study: White potatoes, whole wheat bread, rolled oats, beef and pig liver, pea beans, rutabagas, carrots by the pound, spinach and milk, fresh or canned.

## Jap War Machines Ordered Smashed by Gen. MacArthur

TOKYO.—Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur ordered the Japanese to destroy all industrial machinery specifically designed to produce combat equipment, whether the machinery is privately or publicly owned. Allied headquarters officials estimated that there are from 3,000 to 5,000 such machines, some of which had been listed for reparations.

WASHINGTON. — The army appointed Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer director of its general staff plans and operations division, a key post in planning defense of the nation. Wedemeyer succeeded Lt. Gen. 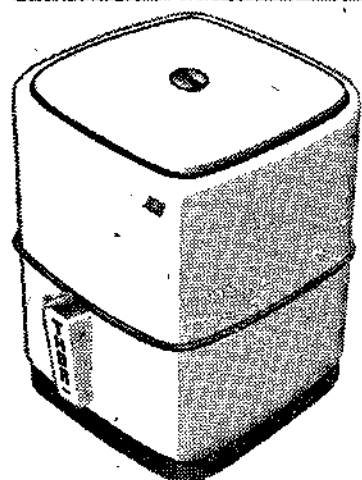
