Excavators Discover Hoard of Gold Coins

Buried Wealth Found at Site of New School Building.

MONTEREY, CALIF.—Hundreds of men, women and children were "prospecting" with shovels, rakes, trowels, knives, forks and even old mining tools in a gold rush that swept Monterey.

The "bonanza" is located in a 100-by-100-foot school excavation site, only two blocks from the main street of this historic California city. It's not nuggets the "prospectors" are after, but \$20 gold coins. Already more than 125 of the coins have been dug up by the treasure-seekers. Their nominal value is more than \$2,500, but they are worth considerably more because the coins are collectors' items.

One of the \$20 pieces, dated 1895, has a catalog value of \$60. Most of the coins thus far discovered were minted between 1890 and 1900 and nearly all are in excellent condition.

The coins were buried in the lot nearly half a century ago by Will H. Martin, wealthy Monterey property owner who died in 1913.

The modern-day gold rush began after the first coin of the cache was found by Damon Burgess, employee of a construction company excavating the site for a new music school building. The word got around town swiftly and the rush was on.

One of the first to reach the scene was a man with a bulldozer which immediately clawed 15 of the coins out of the earth.

Martin's nephew, Carmel Martin, former Monterey mayor, bought out a hardware store in order to provide digging tools for the amateur prospectors and presided over the treasure hunt.

up in the air. They may be revised later. Some mention has been made of the possibility that the governor should appoint all officials except the auditor general.

Assuming that 167,000 persons can be induced to sign the petitions (and some citizens have been known to sign petitions without knowing what they proposed) then Michigan voters would be asked to judge the following constitutional changes at the November election:

(1) Should a convention be called to revise the state constitution?

(2) Should the sales tax diversion amendment be repealed?

(3) Should present constitutional limitations be removed from salaries of state officials and state legislators?

(4) Should Michigan 100-plus state agencies be merged into not more than 20 state departments whereby the governor would appoint all department heads?

With these proposed reforms, Michigan voters will have plenty to decide in 1948.

Rebuffed by the state legislature which flatly rejected his leading reforms, Governor Sigler has announced he would take the issue direct to the people.

The legislators' decisions indicate that the debate will be vigorous. More centralized power in the hands of the governor will be contested within his party. Not even the governor's so-called "cabinet" is unanimous in its support. The fight will be lively.

Veteran Students Have July 1 Deadline for Retroactive Payments

Veterans pursuing full time courses in schools and colleges who are entitled to increased subsistence rates by reason of dependency have until July 1 to submit proof for retroactive payments.

If veterans submit evidence by July 1, they will receive retroactive payments at the new rates back to April 1. Evidence received after that date will be effective the day of receipt.

New rates now in effect allow veterans with one dependent the sum of \$105 a month and \$120 for those with more than one dependent. Single veterans receive \$75. Eligible veterans now in school who are entitled to \$75 or \$105 do not have to apply because Veterans Administration offices have the information required to pay the increases automatically.

Proof of additional dependency for the new increases consist of photostats or certified copies of birth in the case of dependent children and evidence of actual dependency in the case of dependent parents.

Bruce Clothier Agrees with Sigler

Bruce Clothier, North Branch, when recently elected president of the American Dairy Association of Michigan, agreed with Governor Kim Sigler, guest speaker, applauding the association as one worthy of attention financing themselves with no thought of government subsidy, but on their toes with the realization that the farmers of this state must advertise their products as never before in the history of the dairy industry.

"Happenings of this past week in the 'Fight for Fats'" says Clothier "must bring this realization home to every thinking farmer in this state." Sigler wants Michigan dairy products developed and advertised as such until the state is recognized over the nation as one of the mid-west leading dairy states. . . and Clothier is ready to second the governor's request. He believes it can be done through the efforts of the American Dairy Association, which is an organization made up of dairy farmers following a national program of increased advertising, further research to perfect dairy products and an attractive campaign to merchandise them.

The veteran, Raymond Slovenski, 21, pleaded guilty to robbing a candy store of \$53, after holding up a 16-year-old counter girl, Juanita Giffin, at pistol point. Slovenski told the court he had found his mother's home impossible. He said he hoped to obtain enough money from the robbery to make a home for his own family. Railroads Improve Equipment With New Box Cars, Engines

CHICAGO.—All railroads and private carlines had 125,395 new freight cars on order on December 1, the Association of American Railroads has announced. The number on order on November 1, 1947, was 126,213. Of the total number on order December 1, Class I rails and railroad-owned private-controlled refrigerator companies had 110,882 new freight cars on order. This was the largest number on order at any time since April 1, 1923, when the total was 116,890. New freight cars on order December 1 totaled 63,616 while on November 30 the total was 109,467. Class I rails also had on order 1,180 locomotives. This was the most since October, 1923, when there were 1,242 locomotives on order. On December 1, 1946, the railroads had 364 on order.
