E. L. Anthony **Featured Speaker On Grass Day**

Tuscola Co. Program Will Be Held at Dorr Perry Farm in Elmwood Twp.

E. L. Anthony, dean of agriculture at Michigan State College, has been named as the featured speaker at the Grass Day program to be held in Tuscola County on June 21.

Dean Anthony's talk will be one of the highlights of the day-long program which has been arranged by the MSC cooperative extension service in cooperation with the county agricultural agent and local committees. He has occupied the position of dean of agriculture at MSC since 1932. Born and reared on a livestock farm and ranch, he realizes the value of good acreages of grass and legumes in the farming program.
