A veteran does not lose his right to a homestead exemption by renting his property, provided he maintains a continuous intent to return to such property and again use it June.

producing has no effect on the right of exemption, regardless of whether the entire property is rented or only a portion The request for an opinion of the

attorney general was to determine whether or not this 1944 opinion applied to a veteran as well as to soldier or sailor of the armed orces of the United States.

The opinion rendered this week eads, in part, as follows:

"The conclusion reached in opinion, dated May 8, 1944, is accordingly reaffirmed and it is held that no beneficiary of exemptions conferred upon homestead owners under Section 7, Subdivision Eleventh, of the General Property Tax Law, will lose his right to exemption by renting all or a portion of the property claimed as a homestead, provided during the time of such renting the owner maintains a continuing intent to return to and occupy such property as his home."



### **Shrews Sought** In Malaria Fight

### Rare Jungle Mammal Seen As Aid in Long Fight To Cure Disease.

WASHINGTON.—As another step in its long campaign to effect a cure for malaria, the navy is going hunting in African jungles for a giant

This rare specimen, which will be used as a laboratory aid in the malaria fight, has a body somewhat resembling a rat's, but it also has a long, elephantine snout and can hop around like a kangaroo.

It's a "giant" only as far as shrews go-about six inches long. The run-of-the-brush shrew is only mouse-length.

The navy wants to investigate a report that the African mammal has malaria naturally. If that is so, the jumping shrew would be one of the very few mammals, other than man, subject to the disease.

Phase of Major Study. The search will be only one phase of a year-long study of tropical diseases in Africa. The navy's six-man safari, headed by Comdr. J. M. Amberson of the medical corps, constitutes the medical research unit of a broader expedition sponsored by University of California.

Research to find a truly curative drug for malaria has been hampered by the fact that no completely satisfactory laboratory creature has been found. The most commonly used subject is the canary, but the form of malaria which birds get is far different from that in human

The only two mammals - other than man-which the navy knows to asites which cause the disease in four years in high school. these animals are also different from those which affect man. Nevertheless, these animals have been used to some extent because they are mammals.

#### Monkeys Are Unsatisfactory.

Both monkeys and bats have proved unsatisfactory for final discovery of a cure, says Capt. James J. Sapero of the navy's bureau of medicine and surgery. Also, monkeys are expensive and bat colonies are difficult to maintain.

Sapero said that if it is confirmed that the jumping shrew can acquire malaria naturally, it might be possible to take blood samples from the shrew and pass on the infection to some easily procurable animal, such as the guinea pig, rat or mouse.

Shrews are related to moles and hedgehogs, but these jumpers are not true shrews. They are found on rocky, bushy slopes in most parts of Africa south of the Sahara.

One scientist said he didn't quite know how the name "shrew" popped into the language as a tag for a vexatious woman. He said Shakespeare, in his "Taming of the Shrew," may have had in mind a small European variety of shrew which makes a squeaking noise. Encyclopedia Britannica describes a pigmy shrew found in Europe and

### Common Cold Germ Isolated;

Protective Vaccine Possible WASHINGTON. - A long-sought objective of science—laboratory isolation and growth of a "common cold" germ-has been achieved by two researchers of National Institute of Health.

The development, which opens the way to the "possibility" of producing a protective vaccine against this germ, was announced by Drs. Norman Topping and Leon T. Atlas.

The research was aided by prisoners of the District of Columbia's Lawton reformatory who volumteered to contract experimental

Starting with material taken from the nose of another scientist who was stricken with a natural cold. the doctors said they were able to grow in the fluid of fertile hens' eggs an "agent" which produced a characteristic cold in 57 of 60 prisoner volunteers innoculated with it. Dr. Topping said the cold produced was a prevalent type - a "thick, severe form - something like what we know as sinusitis."

"It's not the runny nose, runny eye sort of cold," he added. "Maybe there's another agent that produces that kind of cold."

The researchers said the exact nature of the germ they had corralled was not yet known. It is presumed to be a virus.

#### Demand for Penny Increases; Mint Assures Ample Supply

PHILADELPHIA. - The lowly penny is more in demand than ever what with odd-cent prices, sales taxes, slot machines and the like, but the U.S. mint assures there are Coppers enough to fill all needs.

Supt. Edwin H. Dressel says: "We have more one-cent pieces than the nation can handle and we're now making about 250,000 daily."

He adds there are 97,786,000 pennies in the vaults.

In 1946, the mint here coined 991.-655,000 pennies. In the first 10 months of 1947, the total was 171,-880,000 "and we're not getting rid of all those," Dressel said.

### New Slipcovers Will Relieve **Jaded Look of Tired Rooms**

By Ertta Haley

SLIP covers, whether you are plan-ning them as part of a redecorating scheme or using them to cover new furniture pieces done in muslin, are an important part of a dramatic decorating scheme, so it's a good idea to create styles that will enhance their surroundings.

Today, many newcomers to the homemaking ranks prefer to buy chairs, sofas or chaise lounge with only the muslin cover so they can use their own choice of style and fabric for either a traditional slip cover or a permanent slip cover to resemble the upholstery.

Even though you may be new to sewing, don't be afraid to tackle a slip cover project. The size need not overwhelm you as there is not much difficult sewing essential. And, if you want professional advice, there's a local sewing center which can give you latest decorating tricks and shortcuts to making them.

#### Plan Style, Select Fabric First

First decision in a sewing project of this type will be to decide the style you want to follow in decorating. After that you will know what to ask for in a fabric since patterns differ depending upon modern, 18th century or colonial.

Fabrics, you'll find, are plentiful, and there's a wide choice of floral, striped and plain designs running





the gamut from miniature to oversize designs as well as the old standbys in plain color minus designs of any kind. Pick your fabric according to size of the furniture piece; suit the type of room as well as the size of the furniture to be covered. It would be inadvisable, for exam-

ple, to use a large, bold design for a large, overstuffed chair when a plain, small printed design would do Market report for Tuesday, more to minimize the chair size.

Classic styles are nice to use when your room is of moderate proportions, and here, when you do not have too much space, it's wise to select solid colors neither too bright

Before joining the sections of slip cover, make trimming for seams and bottom edge. Applique cut-out flower clusters across back, seat or arms will have decorator appeal. The zigzagger attachment on the sewing machine can be used for this stitching job.

To give a corded finish to slip covers, make a welting and use it to join slip cover sections and bottom edge of plain box finish. Welting is a cotton cord covered with a blas strip of material. Cut bias one and one-half to one and three-quarters of an inch wide, depending upon cord used. Place cord in center of bias strip. Fold strip over, bringing the edges together.

Stitch close to the cord with cording foot attachment on sewing machine. The same fabric as used in the chair or sofa can be used for this finish or it can be contrasting. Closings for slip covers should be slide fasteners. Insert them at side of back leg, applying it as you would




