Shoppe. Both are now located in the business block on East Main Street just completed by Clarence Burt. The two business houses occupy the front of the 36 by 104 ft. building and the rear of the block will be used by Mr. Burt for his

dairy business. The building is constructed of tile blocks with air spaces which promote coolness in summer and warmth in the winter time. Mr. Burt laid the tile himself in his

spare hours this summer. In the part devoted to the dairy business are a double garage 24 x 36 ft., a dairy room 32 x 36

ft., and an 8x8 ft. walk-in refrigerator. The dairy room has an aluminum ceiling which eliminates the need of painting. The room is well lighted. 





#### **Poultrymen Advised To Retain All Pullets Culling Hens Is Means**

**Of Increasing Returns** To assure top poultry profits during the winter season, keep an all

pullet flock. Pullets lay in the fall and winter when egg prices are are going through their fall molt and consuming 25 to 30 pounds of feed while producing no eggs.

In the spring, when old hens resume laying, egg prices are down. thus necessitating a

very heavy layer to pay the \$1.50 feed bill which was amassed during the winter months. Old hens may be

> may be culled individually as they go out of production. A weekly check of

the old hen flock will enable the poultryman to cull out the loafers. If an old hen flock is maintained housing for pullets and old hens

should be provided for best management and disease control. As another step in culling the poultry flock, old roosters also

should be eliminated. They serve no useful purpose and eat lots of feed.





The new radio, introduced by a Kansas City manufacturer, gives the farmer access during his working hours in the field to whatever he desires in the way of entertainment, news reports, crop information and weather forecasts.

Equipped with a universal mounting, this set is readily installed on any make or model farm tractor. Cabinet and chassis are weatherproof and shockproof. Eight tubes, including two rectifiers, a superheterodyne circuit and telescope an tenna comprise the power unit.

#### Fertilizer Is Valuable For Succeeding Crops

Farmers who think fertilizer costs should be charged off in one year are overlooking carry-over assets that pay long-term dividends in bigger crop yields, according to Middle West Soil Improvement committee. A good feed of fertilizer gives the soil a backlog of plant nutrients that benefit succeeding crops. Wellfertilized legume-grass crops in any good soil building program leave behind them important carry-over values. Legume-grass mixtures fed with plenty of phosphate and potash will add to the soil's organic matter and build soil structure. They will improve tilth, drainage and ventilation.

Because of these carry-over benefits, agronomists recommend a minimum of three years for charging off the cost of fertilizer applications.

#### Thorough Check of Silo Will Prevent Wastage

Silos will help to assure good use of this year's bumper crop of cornstalks. To prevent waste of the ensiled crop, however, the silo must be in good condition. Thorough cleaning is the first step, entailing cleaning out the pit and scraping old silage off walls, Walls should be examined for air leaks, using melted paraffin to fill small cracks in mortar joints or between silo staves





**Imagination Is Key to Simple But Effective Table Settings**

"OH, HOW I wish I were artistic and could do interesting things with my table settings," is a frequent cry heard when women gather. It happens especially when someone has put forth some thought in her table setting.

Well, you can all relax, that is, all of you who don't think you have artistic ability. If you know anything about color, and add to that your common sense, you can do something out of the ordinary.

Have you a red and white checked cloth? This is very seasonal currently and can be used for a baked bean and cider supper. Use some charming pottery plates for the dinner, brown mugs and a centerpiece of glowing red Indian corn arranged with dark green leaves in a polished wood salad bowl. Is there anything simpler?

What about using a gourd or a nollowed out squash for the centerpiece, with bittersweet or leaves or any array of fall fruit spilling out of it? This is very effective when the tablecloth is a mustard shade of yellow, a dark chartreuse green or a glowing tangerine color.

You don't have a cloth in any of those colors? Fix one out of a worn sheet, some flour or sugar sacks. dyed to one of the shades just mentioned. If the sheet needs stiffening, run it through a light starch after the last rinse so it will be crisp and new-looking.

It takes but a little imagination, as you can readily see, to make effective table settings.

For breakfast, lunch and family dinner or supper you can use all manner of simple fabrics to create





