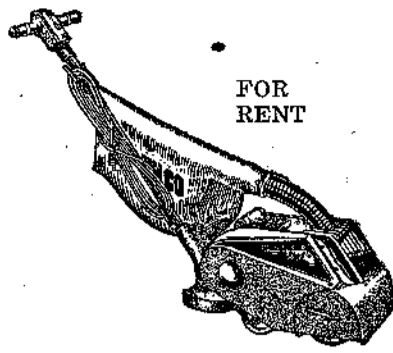




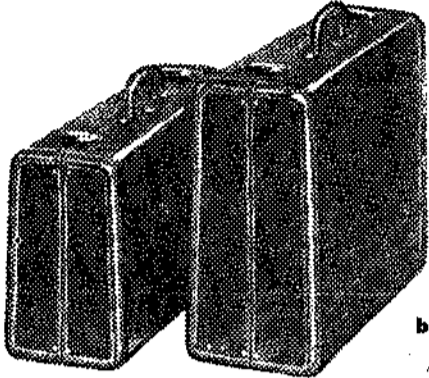

## Michigan Mirror

Ho, hum! That old sales tax amendment is back on the ballot. School teachers, city employees and township officials want to keep the diversion amendment in the constitution. They are campaigning vigorously to roll up a big "No" vote. Teachers and city employees have a direct pocket-book interest in the outcome, for the amendment would keep a steady flow of sales tax dollars coming back to school and city treasuries.

Contrasted to this, the taxpayer is yet to be convinced that school, city and state government needs cannot be adequately financed out of present taxes. Price inflation is yet running strong, and the cry of state officials that the "wolf" was at the door (a deficit in the Lansing kitty) has been repeatedly contradicted by new all-time highs in collection of taxes. The latest estimate puts the 1948 sales tax aggregate in the neighborhood of \$200,000,000—just \$5,000,000 more than state experts thought the state could possibly collect.

Early in 1947 Governor Sigler asked the state legislature to place the issue of amendment repeal on the 1948 general ballot. Later the governor changed his mind, convinced that only a whopping deficit in the state treasury could turn the tide of public opinion. He then advocated the calling of a constitutional convention plus other reforms designed to "streamline" state government. While the legislature did not remove the repeal proposal from the 1948 ballot, it did add the substitute call for revision of the entire state constitution.

The situation thereby has developed where state officials do not expect a majority of voters to vote "Yes" on the repeal amendment—No. 2 on the special ballot. Three groups are campaigning for a "No" vote: School teachers, city employees and township officials. No organized drive is in sight to get out a "Yes" vote.

### Colds May Be Measles

While children are the usual victims, adults can contract measles. When they do, they become very ill. Measles has the appearance of a simple head cold when it strikes. To vote upon the General Revision of the Constitution: Shall a convention for the purpose of a general revision of the constitution be held?

And to vote upon the following proposed Amendments to the State Constitution:

(Proposal No. 1).

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution relative to the order of succession in the performance of the powers and duties of the governor.

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to sections 16, 17 and 18 of article 6 of the state constitution relative to the order of succession in the performance of the powers and duties of the governor.

(Proposal No. 2).

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution Relative to the return of one cent of a sales tax levy.

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the state constitution providing for the repeal and striking therefrom of section 23 of article 10 of the state constitution relative to the return of one cent of a state sales tax levy to be divided among school districts, cities, townships and villages and providing for the making of annual grants to school districts out of general funds.

(Proposal No. 3).

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution relative to the compensation of governor and other state elected officers.

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to section 21 of article 6 of the state constitution, providing that the compensation of the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, auditor general and attorney general be determined by law.

(Proposal No. 4).

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution relative to the compensation and expense of the members of the legislature.

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to section 9 of article 5 of the state constitution, providing for the determination of the compensation and expenses of the legislature by law.

(Proposal No. 5).

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution relative to modifying the fifteen mill limitation.

Initiatory petitions proposing an amendment to Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan so as to modify the fifteen-mill limitation to permit increase of the limitation for a period of not to exceed twenty years, instead of five years, and to require a majority vote of the electors instead of a two-thirds vote to increase such limitation.

(Proposal No. 6).

Referendum of Act No. 270 of the public acts of 1947, entitled "An act to regulate and control the operation of foreign agencies acting within the state of Michigan; and to prescribe the penalties for violations of the provisions of this act."

Also to vote upon the following local proposals: The Proposition of Establishing a County Health Department.

Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

Election Revision of 1948—No. 72—Chapter VIII—Part 4

Section 1. On the day of any election, polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until eight o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the opening and closing of polls and for the conducting of elections, shall be governed by eastern standard time.

The Polls of said election will be open at seven o'clock a. m. and will remain open until eight o'clock p. m.

an "overwhelming negative vote can be expected."  
Brown feels that the "cities of

the state have suffered long at the hands of a legislature made up largely of members from rural sections." He continues: "Year after year and session after session city mayors, councilmen and managers; public works engineers and superintendents; controllers and treasurers;

and citizens of cities where adequate city services were impossible to provide from the property tax alone, sought help in Lansing. Consistently they were turned aside and sent home empty-handed. They were even denied the authority to levy excise taxes to help out in meeting the costs of essential services within the cities. None can complain too bitterly that once they got their 'mad up' these city folks dipped too deeply into state funds. Neither can the school teachers be condemned for helping themselves."

It is admittedly difficult to explain bookkeeping matters to the average citizen. This is especially true about the state treasury's "surplus." Funds earmarked for future expenditure become a part of the cash balance in the treasury. When the legislature wound up its 1948 affairs, there was a difference of \$35.3 millions between anticipated 1948-49 revenues (July 1, 1948 to July 1, 1949) and the legislature's 1948-49 appropriations.

However, the state had a \$23 million "surplus" (now you have it and now you don't!)-left over from previous years.

Auditor General Murl K. Aten has reported an additional balance of \$10.6 million at the end of the 1947-48 revenue - expenditure period.

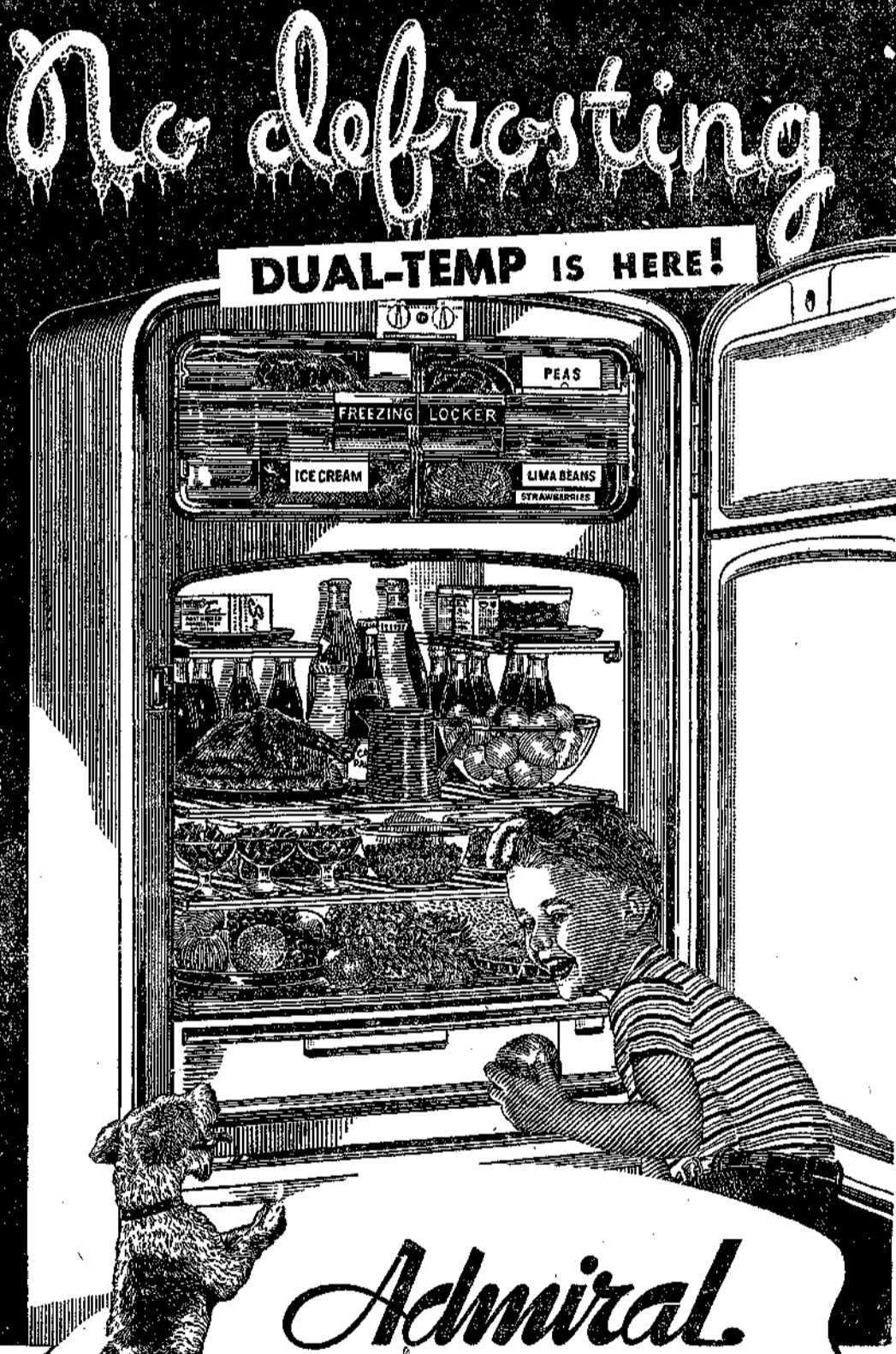

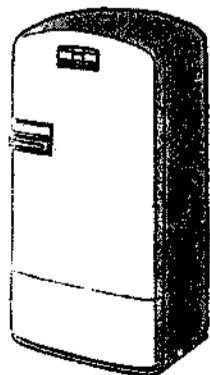

### Concise Statements Prepared by the Sec. of State Regarding Amendments

Concluded from page 1.

state officer-elect prior in line of succession to fill the office of governor, the powers and duties of the office of governor shall devolve upon the state officer-elect next in line on the commencement of his term of office.

Sec. 18. The lieutenant governor or other state officer in the line of succession, while performing the duties of governor, shall receive the same compensation as the governor.

Provision of existing constitution altered by such proposal if adopted, now reads as follows:

Sec. 16. In case of the impeachment of the governor, his removal from office, death, inability, resignation or absence from the state, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor for the residue of the term or until the disability ceases. When the governor shall be out of the state at the head of a military force thereof, he shall continue commander-in-chief of all the military force of the state.

Sec. 17. During a vacancy in the office of governor, if the lieutenant governor die, resign, or be impeached, displaced, be incapable of performing the duties of his office, or absent from the state, the secretary of state shall act as governor until the vacancy be filled or the disability cease.

Sec. 18. The lieutenant governor or secretary of state, while performing the duties of governor, shall receive the same compensation as the governor.

#### Proposal No. 2.

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution Providing for the Repeal of Section 23, Article 10.

A Joint Resolution of the 1947 Legislature proposing an amendment to the state constitution providing for the repeal and striking therefrom of section 23 of article 10 of the state constitution relative to the return of one cent of a state sales tax levy to be divided among school districts, cities, townships and villages and providing for the making of annual grants to school districts out of general funds.

Provision of existing constitution to be abrogated by such proposal, if adopted, now reads as follows:

Sec. 23. There shall be returned to local governmental units and school districts by the method hereinafter set forth, one cent of a state sales tax levy on each dollar of sales of tangible personal property on the present statutory base (not rate). The state tax collecting authority shall divide the entire said sum without deduction and remit 50% thereof among the school districts on the basis of the school census on which primary school money is distributed for that fiscal year. The balance of 50 per cent shall be returned to counties as a whole on a population basis and payment shall be made to the county treasurer who shall remit to the respective cities, townships and villages within the county on a per capita basis. Population computation shall be based on the last state-wide federal census for purposes of division among counties and upon the same basis or upon any special federal county-wide census, whichever is later, for intra-county division purposes. All remittances provided shall be made on a quarterly basis. The legislature shall hereafter make annual grants to school districts out of general funds, over and above all constitutional allocations heretofore and herein provided, in at least amounts which bear the same ratio to total state sales tax revenues of the preceding year which the legislative grants in the fiscal year 1945-1946 bore to said revenues of the preceding year.

#### Proposal No. 3.

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution Relative to Compensation of Certain State Officers.

A Joint Resolution of the 1948 Extra Session of the Legislature proposing an amendment to section 21 of article 6 of the state constitution, providing that the compensation of the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, auditor general, and attorney general be determined by law, and to read as follows:

Sec. 21. The governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, auditor general shall each receive such compensation as shall be prescribed by law which shall be in full for all services performed and expenses incurred during his term of office: Provided, That the same shall not be changed during the term of office for which elected.

Provision of existing constitution to be altered by such proposal, if adopted, now reads as follows:

Sec. 21. The governor and attorney general shall each receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars. The secretary of state, state treasurer, commissioner of the state land office and auditor general shall each receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred dollars. They shall receive no fees or perquisites whatever for the performance of any duties connected with the offices. It shall not be competent for the legisla-

ture to increase the salaries herein provided.

#### Proposal No. 4

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution Relative to Compensation and Expenses of Members of the Legislature.

A Joint Resolution of the 1948 Extra Session of the Legislature, proposing an amendment to section 9 of article 5 of the state constitution, providing for determination of the compensation and expenses of members of the legislature by law, and to read as follows:

Sec. 9. The compensation and expenses of the members of the legislature shall be determined by law: Provided, That no change in compensation or expenses shall be effective during the term of office for which the legislature making the change was elected. Each member shall be entitled to 1 copy of the laws, journals and documents of the legislature of which he is a member, but shall not receive, at the expense of the state, books, newspapers or perquisites of the office not expressly authorized by this constitution.

Provision of existing constitution to be altered by such proposal, if adopted, now reads as follows:

Sec. 9. The compensation of the members of the legislature shall be three dollars per diem during the term for which they are elected, and they shall receive no further compensation than as specified in this section for service when the legislature is convened in extra session. Members shall be entitled to ten cents per mile and no more for one round trip to each regular and special session of the legislature by the usually traveled route. Each member shall be entitled to one copy of the laws, journals and documents of the legislature of which he is a member, but shall not receive, at the expense of the state, books, newspapers or perquisites of the office not expressly authorized by this constitution.

#### Proposal No. 5

Amendment to the Constitution so as to Modify the Fifteen-mill Limitation.

Initiatory petition to amend section 21 of article 10 of the constitution of the state of Michigan so as to modify the fifteen-mill limitation for a period of not to exceed twenty years, and to require a majority vote of the electors instead of a two-thirds vote to increase such limitation, said amendment to read as follows:

Sec. 21. The total amount of taxes assessed against property for all purposes in any one year shall not exceed one and one-half per cent of the assessed valuation of said property, except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations heretofore incurred, which sums shall be separately assessed in all cases: Provided, That this limitation may be increased for a period of not to exceed twenty years at any one time, to not more than a total of five per cent of the assessed valuation, by a majority vote of the electors of any assessing district, or when provided for by the charter of a municipal corporation: Provided further, That this limitation shall not apply to taxes levied in the year 1932.

Provision of existing constitution altered by such proposal if adopted, now reads as follows:

Sec. 21. The total amount of taxes assessed against property for all purposes in any one year shall not exceed one and one half per cent of the assessed valuation of said property, except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations heretofore incurred, which sums shall be separately assessed in all cases: Provided, That this limitation may be increased for a period of not to exceed five years at any one time, to not more than a total of five per cent of the assessed valuation, by a two-thirds vote of the electors of any assessing district, or when provided for by the charter of a municipal corporation: Provided further, That this limitation shall not apply to taxes levied in the year 1932.

**Operation Salt Lick**

From time to time 25-pound blocks of salt are dropped by airplane to otherwise inaccessible deer range by the California division of fish and game, which reports that more than 90 deer were killed on highways and railroad tracks in the rugged Shasta county mountains during a period of six months. The deer linger on tracks and roads, licking salt drippings from refrigerated freight cars and trucks. By placing salt blocks a safe distance from dangerous thoroughfares, the deer are lured from certain death. Late snows and poor road conditions in the area this year prevented normal distribution of salt by automobile.

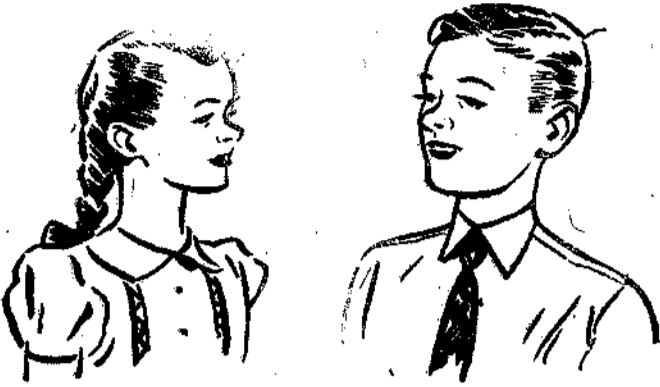
**Friendly Bear**

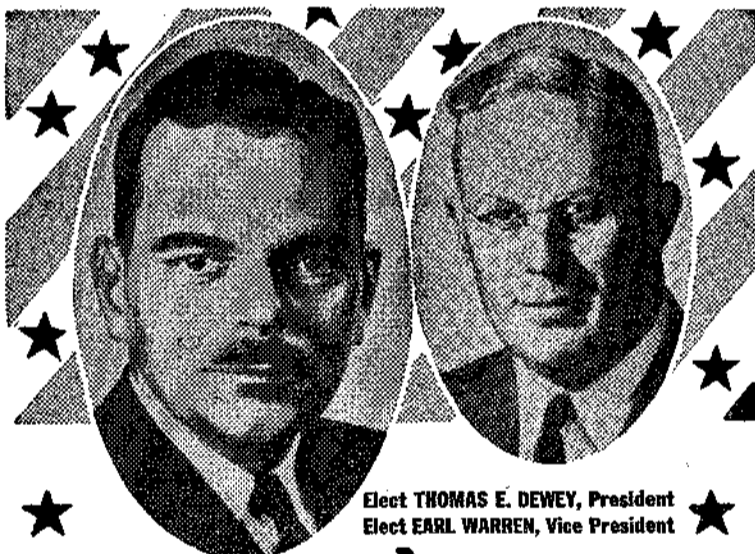

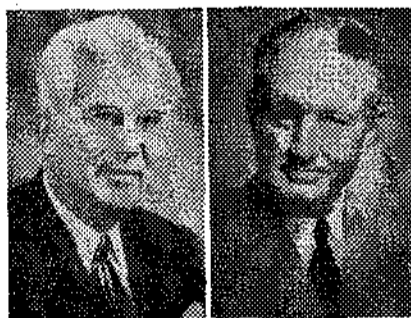
