Christmas Went Underground With Puritan Ban of 1644

mas went underground. People who advocated Christmas were in danger of arrest and imprisonment and it looked as though Christmas was on its way out.

It all happened around 1644 when the Puritans in England forbade any merriment or religious services, by act of parliament, on the ground that is was a heathen festival. What resulted was much grumbling, breaking of the law and Christmas underground which wrote and distributed pamphlets in favor of Christmas. .

In 1648, for instance, was pub-"Canterbury Christmas." This pamphlet gives an account of the subsequent proceedings after the Cryer of Canterbury had upon Wednesday, December 22, "openly proclaimed that Christmas day and other superstitious festivals should be put downe, and a market should be kept on Christmas day. Which being not observed, (but very ill taken by the country) the

THERE was a time when Christ- I town was thereby unserved with provision and trading very much hindered; which occasioned great discontent among people, caused them to rise in a rebellious way."

Among the rarest of the pamphlets issued at that time is one entitled "The Examination and Tryal of Old Father Christmas." la this little volume, "one old Christmas was commanded to be brought to the Bar, then was a jury for Life and Death to be impaneled." The Judge was called Judge Hate-bate. the Sheriff's name was called Leonard Love-peace."

In the end Christmas is acquitted. but is cautioned by Judge Hate-bate. "for avoiding all such scandals as have been cast upon you for the future, do think fit to admonish you that you remember your Office is not so much to feast the Body, as to refresh the Soul, by thankful and pious Meditations.'

Charles II re-established Christmas in 1878 and "jolly Old Father Christmas" has never had to stand trial since.

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



Although they are legendary, the carefully spun bits of folklore provide a colorful background for present day flower decorations which are used during the Christmas sea-

Holly, with its red berries, dark green leaves and needle-like spikes is a light-hearted symbol of friendship and good will when December arrives. According to legend, though, holly originally was used as an instrument of cruelty. The crown of thorns which Christ wore was fashioned from holly. Prior to the Crucifixion the plant bore white berries but after the Crucifixion the berries turned a bloody crimson. Mistletoe, a close associate of holly, is said to have been the wood from which Christ's cross was made.

poinsettia was introduced by J. R. Poinsett, an American politician and diplomat.

For years evergreens have flourished in homes at Christmastide to create a woodsy, outdoor atmosphere. In the aged line "hang up the holly, the box and the bay" it is significant to note that two of the plants mentioned, box and bay, are mentioned in Holy Scriptures as thriving on the mountains of Lebanon in the Holy Land.

Because of its symmetrical leaves, bay has been used for design throughout the ages. The Greeks used it on their coins and the Romans, too, favored it as a beautiful show piece. Today bay shrubbery graces the entrances to many American homes at yuletide.

Where a member of the house or senate formerly drew \$1,095 a year or \$2,190 for a two-year term, each legislator will receive \$2,900 a year or \$5,800 for the biennium. The increase will exceed 250 per cent. Each legislator will be entitled

to receive 10 cents per mile allowance round trip for travel once a month between home and the capitol.

On the basis of a 120-day legislative session (four months, each year), the legislative pay thus becomes \$24.16 a day for work performed at Lansing. As in the past, legislators will also receive special expenses for attending legislative committee sessions at Lansing or elsewhere when the legislature is not in official session. Such is the record.

The legislative special session just concluded at Lansing, set the pay of the governor at \$22,500, lieutenant governor \$6,400, speaker of the house \$3,900, and supreme court justices \$15,000. A flat \$12,500 salary was authorized for the following elective officials: Secretary of state, attorney general, auditor general, treasurer, highway commissioner and superintendent of public instruction.

Pay increases for the highway commissioner, superintendent of public instruction and supreme court justices would become effective later than Jan. 1, 1949, the date when other officials will draw bigger checks. The road and school administrators will begin new terms July 1, 1949. A constitutional provision prohibits any



Stiffness in pigs that are not sick is usually due to a nutritional deficiency, chiefly calcium, and occurs among swine that are fed almost entirely on grain. Grains are low in calcium even though they contain plenty of phosphorous. Feeding a supplement to give hogs a balanced diet will usually overcome this trouble, and a good supplement can also save grain for the hog raiser.
