

Michigan's bi-partisan government has entered its third month with little on the surface to indicate partisan differences.

Just as coming events have a habit of casting shadows before them, so the April election has created a temporary lull in the state legislature. A total of 379 bills were introduced in the Senate and House prior to March 1. Most of these are before committees for study, revision or pigeon-holing. Considerable work is done by legislators in committee, and often their best contributions are decisions to kill undesirable bills.

No major developments in the legislature are expected until the April ballots are counted.

The political strategy seems to be well set.

Republicans will concentrate on the rural vote, while the Democrats are replying heavily on another C. I. O. demonstration in Wayne and other industrial County

County highway departments are concerned about the possibility of the state highway department taking over control of state highway maintenance if Charles M. Ziegler, present highway commissioner at Lansing, is replaced by John H. McCarthy of Detroit, Democratic nominee.

Dr. Lee M. Thurston, superintendent of public instruction, is opposed by E. Murr Sherwood of Stambaugh, Democratic nominee.

Both parties have new state chairmen: Republican - Owen J. Cleary, Ypsilanti; Democrat-Hicks Griffiths, Detroit.

Hearings have been started on recommendations of the Michigan Good Roads Federation. These include a 1.3 cent gasoline tax increase, higher weight taxes, overadministration, and a change in the formula for highway taxes among local governmental units.

Motorists now pay 25 per cent in taxes on cost of five gallons of gasoline, currently sold (net) in Lansing for \$1.03. State gasoline tax is 15 cents, federal gasoline tax 7½ cents, state sales tax 3 cents. If the state gas tax were raised to odors.

Another measure, blessed by Governor Williams, would revise the Bonine-Tripp labor law to eliminate requirement of a strike vote by majority of employees before a legal strike can be called. Waiting period before a strike could be called would be cut from ten to five days, except in hospital and utility strikes where a 30-day "cooling off" period would be retained. The State Supreme court ruled that compulsory arbitration cow down to 30.0 b. f. in public utility disputes was unconstitutional.

Unemployment coverage would be extended by anemployees of firms which pay a minimum of \$150 weekly in wages. At present firms which hire eight or more workers are taxed. Maximum weekly payments would be raised to \$42 for 26 weeks, as contrasted to the present \$28 weekly for 20 weeks.

The cost of all governmentlocal, state and federal—will approximate one-third of the national income in 1949, reports the United Press. "New taxes are being proposed in nearly every state to help balance rising budgets."

Taxes levied in Michigan for county, municipal, school and other local units increased 15.78 per cent during 1948, according to the state board of assessors.

### Improvement of Land Cuts Production Cost Margin Between Return, **Expenses Is Narrowing**

Higher production costs now bitng deeper into farm profits emphasize the need for farmers to get their land in shape to produce more bushels at lower unit costs per acre, the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee points out.

The margin between what a farmer gets for his crops and what it costs him to produce them is narrowing steadily. Commodities used



in farm production have more than doubled in price since 1939. Prices of grain and field crops have declined steadily since early 1948.

The committee declared that greater crop producing efficiency is the answer to lower farm prices and higher production costs."

Crop production can be increased by "put back" soil management methods and "holding" operations. "Put back" methods include rebuilding the soil's organic matter supply by growing deep-rooted legumes in the rotation. They include replacing phosphate and potash drained off by constant row cropping. They also include putting all barnyard manure back on the soil and plowing under corn stalks, straw and other left-overs.

"Holding" operations can include contouring, grass waterways and terracing where necessary.

### Wire Recorder Check

When a pure-bred white leghorn climbs into a nest on the Heisdorf and Nelson breeding farm at Kirkland, Wash., it is, in its own way, making poultry history.

Unknown to the approximately 10,000 fowls on the farm, the most modern wire recorders candidly keep track of their every deed. As far as the four partners in the business know, it is the first time so many chickens have become subjects of a wire recorder.

Use of the recorder has resuited in huge saving of time and money. and records have never been so

accurate, according to Art Heisdorf, who with his wife, Mary, and the Nelson brothers, Bert and Clifford, operate the farm.

It was Art's brainchild to use the recorder in "running traps" checking up on the hens to find out which ones are laying and which ones are ''lying.''

It's done this way: Four days a week the trap is set. When the hen crawls in a nest a trap door closes behind her. She can't get out until one of the partners lets her out. Each hen then is given a number which is on a metal tab placed around her leg. When anyone "runs the traps", he wears a small microphone, presses the small mike button and states the number of the bird's tag, and then gives the number of eggs laid and any other pertinent information about the

### **Many Conditions Affect** Poultry Flock Breeding

There are several conditions which can affect the fertility of a breeding poultry flock. Experts say it is a good plan to wait for a week or 10 days after males have been put with the flock before starting to save eggs that are to be used for hatching.

Weather conditions, vigor of males, size of flock, condition of layers, and number of males are some of the important footors.





# New Nature Boy Renounces Shoes,

SANTA MONICA, CALIF.-Sam Price is Santa Monica's nature boy -a full bearded, barefoot young man clad in an ankle length robe made of sackcloth.

But Sam Price, who was a royal Canadian air force pilot during the war and more recently a labor organizer, is not trying to write a song. He threw away his shoes and orthodox clothing seven months ago to become what he calls a renun-

He wants to demonstrate to an atomic world of cold war and high prices that material things are unimportant.

With half a dozen other renunciates, he has formed the Church of Christian Living, with temporary headquarters in the back yard of Sam's home—a rattan hut four feet high, seven feet long and three feet wide that sits beneath a guava

### Legal Church

Forming a legal church was necessary, according to Sam, so that the several bearded disciples could come and go freely without suddenly finding themselves locked up in some small town on a vagrancy charge. Having a church of one's own is apparently very necessary in Sam's business.

Today Sam owns nothing. does not toil; neither does he spin -unless it's necessary to work a few days in order to earn enough money to help some one in need. He has no postwar housing problem. The current price of shoes does not clutter up his mind. Being barefoot in the coldest (California) weather hasn't even brought on a case of the sniffles. In fact, he needs nothing that others consider necessities.

His diet consists of the "perfect foods" referred to in the Biblefruits, nuts and vegetables, all unprepared. These perfect foods come to Sam perfectly free, apparently, but if he did have to pay for his daily subsistence it would cost only a few cents.

No Desire for Steak

Sam says he never misses the charcoal broiled steaks of his past life, no cheesecake, pork chops, beer, lemon pie or roast beef. He claims that after several months of perfect foods, such worldly cuisine is offensive to him.

The renunciates of the Church of Christian Living don't want to make converts to their extreme way of life. Their aim, Price says, is to show by example that true peace and the richest happiness come from within a person.

Once a day, when he's home, you'll find Sam watering the two small orange trees he set out near his rattan hut. That's not toil, he says; it's setting an example.

### U. S. Production Increases Six Billions Since June

WASHINGTON, - Record smashing results in the third quarter of 1948 were piled up by the nation's economic machine.

It produced goods and services at an unprecedented annual rate of 256 billion dollars, according to a commerce department estimate.

The turnout for the quarter was six billion dollars above the rate of the preceding quarter, and 11 billion dollars above the rate in 1948's first three months.

Spending, of course, kept pace as an overall matter. But officials found significance in the fact that outlays for personal consumption rose less than did personal income.

"Personal spending is more dependent on income now," one official said. "In the early part of the post-war boom, people increased spending even if they did not get an increase in income. Now, it looks as if they won't spend as much if they don't get more."

Personal income, after deducting tax payments amounting to more than 20 billion dollars on an annual basis, moved to a record high rate of 193,700 million dollars a year in the third quarter-up 5,500 million dollars from the second quarter.




### **Poor Soil Drainage** Is Serious Symptom

### Too Few Legumes May Aggravate the Problem

If your once well drained soil is clogged up, don't put all the blame on your drain tile system. The poor drainage may be due to damaged soil structure and loss of organic matter caused by overcropping.

year and too few deep-rooted legumes in the rotation have slowed drainage down to a "walk" on thouplant nutrients, manure and crop residues to the soil have aggravated the problem.

On such land the cushiony soil structure has been broken down.




Soil particles are jammed into a hard, compact mass, instead of clustering together in loose granules. Circulation of air and moisture is cut off. Water ponds on the surface instead of soaking in. Roots are up against a "concrete floor" that stops them from stretching out for needed nutrients. Crop yields are low.

For unclogging poorly drained soils, deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa and sweet clover are particularly important. The tap-roots open up tightly-packed soil and let water soak in faster. When well fed with phosphate and potash the roots put mineralized organic matter deep into the subsoil.

The organic matter added by roots and tops of legumes, manure and crop residues contains compounds that stick soil particles together in clusters. That makes good tilth and a loose, well-drained soil.

The organic matter helps the soil hold more water longer. Roots find it easy to get at moisture and plant nutrients. Crop yields increase.

### Early Egg-Laying Cited As Not Good for Hens

Healthy pullets can be fed to induce the starting of egg-laying during the fourth month, but experienced poultrymen usually avoid this early production on the theory that such pullets do not make as large or rugged hens.

Egg size continues to be small for a longer period where pullets are encouraged to lay early, thus reducing long range profits through premature development.


