MUNICH.-Murray D. Van Waggoner, former governor of Michigan feels that he has a big job on his hands here as military governor of Bavaria, one of the three laender (provinces) in the American zone of occupation in Germany.

Van Waggoner is less concerned with the actual execution of policy than he is with supervision of the way in which the elected German officials put these policies into ef-

But the field of this supervision is much broader than it would be in a state government at home, he says. In the absence of any federal government, the laender or state administrations must be both.

Waggoner points out that governors in the United States frequently have the assistance of organized commissions in broad fields of policy like public utilities or conservation.

He has studied the possibilities of such a reform here. But so it formally or in private conversations with the Bavarian leaders.


