

#### Mastitis Control

Use plenty of bedding to shelter cows from cold floors is one way to keep bovine mastitis under control in infected herds. #### Scholar Who Dared Death Three Weeks Learns Old Secret

TEHERAN.-An American professor, who dared death every day for three weeks, said he had learned the secret of the inscriptions Persian King Darius had carved on

Mount Bisitum 2,400 years ago. Prof. George Cameron of the University of Michigan and the American School of Oriental Research copied the rock carvings by means of a rubber compound. He did his work suspended 194 feet from a mountain ledge and 100 feet above the rocky ground just east of Kermanshah in western Iran. Sometimes his son, Thomas, 15, went up with him on the scaffold and helped.

"The story of Darius' life now appears with remarkable clarity," Mr. Cameron said. "I know now the secret of four huge columns of the inscriptions, which have not been read before because they were in an inaccessible spot. The full secret, however, is one that I shall not divulge until I have had further time for study."



EXTRA CARE AT SEEDING TIME IS RECOMMENDED

A little extra care at seeding time is recommended by C. M. Harrison, Michigan State College farm crops research specialist, to help insure success of forage crops. Small seeds of the legumes such as alfalfa, red clover, or the forage grasses should be handled differently from the cereal grains at

seeding time, he says.

Plenty of lime in the soil is the irst requirement. Then provision should be made for an application of adequate phosphorus and potash commercial fertilizer before or at the time of seeding. All forage

eedings should be made shallow. Harrison advises that there is no best" way of seeding. Much clover seed is broadcast on top of wheat in early spring while the ground is still freezing and thawing. Alfalfa seed does not do as well when broadcast early as it does when drilled on with a drill after the ground has dried out sufficiently allow machinery operation.

Bromegrass is best seeded with alfalfa by mixing the brome with the grain and seeding from the the grass seed is sown shallow.

County agricultural agents, vocational'agricultural teachers or agronomists at state colleges and experiment stations are glad to cooperate in making such tests.

Testing is always the safest course in applying lime. Some soils have plenty lime. Adding more might be harmful rather than helpful to crop production.



To soils that need it, lime is the keystone of any well-planned soil building program. Lime adds needed calcium. Lime boosts the efficiency of fertilizers.
