Skin Cancers Now Removed Safely With Chemosurgery

Skin cancers of all readily accessible areas of the body can be removed completely and safely by chemosurgery, a technique which makes use of chemistry, surgery, and the microscope, according to Frederic E. Mohs, M. D., of Madison, Wis.

Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, Dr. Mohs says that chemosurgery is especially valuable for highly malignant or highly invasive lesions which fail to respond to other treatment. Dr. Mohs pioneered the development of chemosurgery, The technique is used on the face. lip, nose, ear, limbs, and other ex-

ternal parts of the body except some body openings. Chemosurgery is unprecedentedly successful against different types

of skin cancers and there is practically no mortality rate from the operation. Physicians using chemosurgery

can make sure that cancers are entirely removed because the technique is controlled microscopically, the article points out. This microscopic control makes it possible to remove each of the deeply permeating branches, which are characteristic of some skin cancers, without mutilating surrounding normal tissue to any significant extent, clinical results show. The technique is so accurate, Dr. Mohs says, that the margin of overremoval which may occur is less than

Small cancers may be treated chemosurgically without giving medicine to control pain. Relief of pain may be necessary in treating large lesions with chemosurgery, Dr. Mohs indicates.

Lack of Exercise in Cows May Be Cause of Ketosis

Ketosis, mainly a disease of highproducing cows, can also strike others if they are poorly fed, Dr. R. P. Link. University of Illinois college of veterinary medicine re-

In severe cases a cow may die during an attack of ketosis unless she is treated early. On the other hand, a cow with a mild case may recover without treatment.

To combat ketosis, cows should have good nutritious feed during their dry period before calving.

If ketosis develops, it's generally soon after calving when the milk flow is heavy. The cow's milk supply usually falls off and she loses her appetite. Most cows with ketosis act sleepy and are wobbly in their hind legs. Some are excitable and hard to manage.

"A cow with ketosis has too many ketone or acetone bodies in her blood," Dr. Link says. "Unless she gets enough starch from corn or other grains, she uses too much of her body fat, and ketosis develops.

Many cases of ketosis occur during the winter when cows get too little exercise. Without exercise they can't use enough of the ketone substances, or they can't get rid of them fast enough.

Storage of Vegetables

In storage both the temperature and the humidity need to be considered. Celery and root cropsbeets, carrots, parsnips, turnips, rutabagas-need to be kept cool and quite moist. Potatoes and cabbage need coolness and moderate moisture. Onions, squashes and pumpkins all should be kept dry, but squashes and pumpkins can stand more heat than onions. There are many practical devices, from pits and buried barrels to specially constructed store rooms, which you can use for your storage need. Root crops are often successfully stored in crates on a storage floor. Potatoes and cabbage can be left uncovered on shelves above the ground; the air should not be so moist that drops of water form on

To make work in the kitchen easier, Stella Mitchell, A. P. I. extension home management specialist, says there should be a work counter and storage cabinet mation on the carton. for every work center. Equipment, supplies, and food used at a particular work center should be stored there. Stack large dishes, supplies, and equipment one row deep. Use two rows for small ones. Place heavy stacks of plates and dishes within elbow reach. Do not stack different sized cishes together. "If work centers are far apart," says Miss Mitchell, "use a service table on wheels to carry things between them."



Southern Governors Plan Full-Time Capital Bureau

Details of completing a garment frequently offer a problem to those who have just begun to sew. Frequently, too, we find that even those who have made garments for some time are still at a loss as to how some basic construction problems are solved.

One of the main difficulties comes in fitting sleeves. This is easy to understand because there are three places for most sleeves to fit: at the shoulder where the sleeve joins the garment, at the elbow because of the movement of the arm, and, finally, at the wrist or cuff, if you are working on the long sleeve.

If you are using a pattern, you may be certain that the sleeve will fit the armhole, as this has been pre-tested. However, use a great deal of caution in cutting with the pattern. If the sleeve pattern moves even slightly on the material during the cutting, it will twist during the wearing.

Note, too, the mark for straight of the goods in placing the pattern on the fabric. Lay the fold of the

pattern on the straight fabric grain.

Cut the whole pattern, but particularly the sleeves, when you are at leisure and at ease. You can't hope to correct cutting faults in the fitting.

Fitting the Sleeve Requires Patience

On long sleeves, either the threequarter or full length, you will note

that there are darts at the elbow which permit activity. Be certain you include the material for these in cutting no matter how strange the sleeve pattern looks.

Some of the puffed sleeves will also look peculiar because of their fullness. However, when properly gathered, they are designed to fit.

Sleeves should not be fitted high on the shoulder to eliminate the soft fold of the waist at the front and back. The sleeve will tear out.

If you have a model, this helps in fitting sleeves. It cannot do the job completely, though. You'll have

Have your shoulder pads ready to insert when you fit the sleeve. These should be inserted before the fitting. You thould not do the final stitching before trying on sleeves with shoulder pads.

Pads Vary with Fabric Which is Used

Little padding is used currently on sleeves because the soft rounded, natural shoulder line is being hailed. However, most shoulder lines are improved if a slight padding is inserted to improve shoulder irregu-

The shape of the pad varies with the material used in sewing the gar-

The large triangles are used for woolens and some of the stiff, heavy silk and rayon materials. Small, long or round-shaped pads are considered best for the sheer fabrics, including the sheer woolens which are now so favored. For washable fabrics, you'll find that gathered taffeta serves quite well.

Raglan sleeves usually take a pie-shaped pad, with the broad edge wide enough to extend across the shoulder line. Join one point to the shoulder or top of the sleeve while the other points are placed where yoke and sleeve meet.

If you have one shoulder higher than the other, make a heavier and larger pad for the lower shoulder to even the shoulder line.

Stitch Side Seams Before Joining Waistline

To have the waistline fit properly, it's necessary to prefit the garment and to prepare the garment properly before joining the bodice with the lower half of the garment.

Amateurs frequently feel it is easier to sew the waistline and then follow this by joining the side seams. Well, it certainly is easier to sew this way, but the waistline will rarely fit properly. It is either too high or too low!

On some dresses which require a stiff waist, you many insert an inner belt to keep the waistline firm. Among the new sheer dresses now appearing, an elasticized waist is sometimes used so the dress gathers softly and evenly.

With an inner belt, join the seam first, then insert the belt, basting it to the seam.

Let these Tips Guide When Making Pockets

Pockets are not hard to make, and they frequently add value as well as decoration to the garment.

Patch pockets, which are frequently used on house dresses and aprons, children's clothing, and the like, are easiest to make. They must be absolutely true and even A cardboard pattern is best to use for cutting evenly. Baste before

Top edges of pockets are finished first. In lightweight fabrics, this edge is hemmed. In heavier fabrics, cover the raw edge with seam binding after turning the edge, then hem and pin pocket on the garment. Check your accuracy in placing it before stitching.

Frozen Pie Fruits

Fruits frozen with sugar to be used in pies and cobblers should be thawed just enough to spread.



when he appeared before the committee, John Gerdes, former chairman of the New York University Alumni Fund, explained the position of his institution in acquiring businesses valued at close to \$50,000,000, in this manner:

"New York University has always been handicapped by a lack of baby of Shabbona. funds. Its endowment is very small compared to that of other institutions, and the percentage of its income received from endowments probably is one of the smallest in the country. We should like to supplement that income, and that was our purpose in acquiring these busi-

Public Service "Those of us who have engaged in these projects are doing it in a spirit of public service. We are giving our time and attention in the hope of developing a source of income for New York University which will enable it to continue and expand its public service in New York City."

One member of the committee observed, in noting that the university "saved" \$1,500,000 in taxes that would have gone to the Federal Government if the businesses had remained in private hands: "The action taken is so extraordinary and so revolutionary in connection with these corporations that have been taken over that it occurs to me probably the whole system of tax exemption for educational and charitable organizations might seriously be threatened if this precedent is allowed to spread."

German People Found With Little Interest in Politics

PASSAU, GERMANY. - "The people are not interested in poli-

This sentence recurs repeatedly in reports from towns and villages throughout Germany. It shows the problem U. S. Military Government faces in trying to spread democracy among people who never have learned or understood that they have a personal interest in their country's politics.

A Military Government officer pointed to a report from Zulzbach, a small Bavarian town near here. It contained the usual line: "The people are not interested in politics." Then it added: "They are worried, however, about Germany's

"There's our real problem," said the officer, Marvon Glossop, of Winchester, Ill.

"What we must do is convince them that by taking an intelligent part in politics, by choosing their officials wisely, they can shape their country's future."

Many methods have been tried. The latest is a series of "democratization meetings" reaching even into the smallest of villages.

The villagers meet to talk over their problems-local, state national or even personal. They discuss how they-or their governmentshould handle these problems.
