Holiday Proves Traffic Deaths Can Be Avoided

At least 10 lives can be saved each week end the remainder of the summer if Michigan motorists exercise the same caution that they did over the recent Fourth of July week end, State Police' Commissioner Donald S. Leonard states.

Reports received thus far by the Department's safety and traffic bureau show only seven traffic deaths in the state over the recent holiday. This is the all-time low for that period. The previous low was 10 in 1946 and the high was 32 in 1938. Last year 23 lost their lives.

During the summer months of 1948 an average of 18 persons were killed in traffic accidents each week end. A saving of 10 lives a week would mean a total of 60 before the end of the present sum-

Of the total deaths recorded over a period of 13 consecutive week ends last year 50 occurred on Fridays, 95 on Saturdays and 86 on Sundays.

Leonard attributed the Fourth of July record this year to unusual officers and the constant emphasis placed on safety by press and

Sportsmen Urged to **Prevent Forest Fires**

"One of the biggest causes, if not the biggest cause of forest fires is careless smoking," said Charlie Welch of the state conservation education division recently. There's no reason that smoking should cause forest fires. It wouldn't if we were all careful of our smoking. Be sure your match is out, and your cigaret butt is out, and the tobacco from your pipe is out before you toss it away. By this simple rule you will help the state to save thousands of dollars in fire fighting and perhaps millions of dollars in valuable forests."

Welch also mentioned a few other ways in which sportsmanship can be shown, including cleaning up campsites and ice fishing sites after use, not throwing rubbish on the highways, and, of course, game and fish law violations.

"We have a record of more than 7.000 convictions during the past year but we're not proud of it," he said. "We'd be much happier if the record showed only a third of that number. Then we'd know we had a lot more good sportsmen in Michigan."

Check up on your tractor; inspect and repair your harvesting machinery, and see that all guards are in place before it goes into the field. See that controls, hitches, brakes, seats and steps are in safe condition. Do not try to oil, adjust or unclog machinery while it is operating. Keep an alert watchful eye on combines, threshing machines, corn pickers and shredders, cutting equipment, shafting, belting and gears. Don't wear loose. flopping or torn clothing which may catch in revolving machinery. Keep your small children away from tractor and harvesting ma-

animals results in many painful Place your order now. each year. Domestic iniuries bulls and cows are horses. dangerous animals. Approach all horses and cows with a reassuring word or pat. Keep feet away from cow's hooves. See that harnesses are safe. Have a sturdy bull pen.

Falls down loose steps, open hay chutes, off hay wagons, down dark or cluttered barn steps and from cracked ladder rungs disable farmers every day. Falls in homes disable their helpmates. Most of these falls are preventable.

If every Michigan farm person uses Farm Safety Week to repair one unsafe item of equipment or machinery and to eliminate one unsafe farming practice the farm accident toll in Michigan can be cut drastically, Dr. Heustis estimated. It's a good time to check up on hazards in the farm home, too. Be careful today and be farming

Michigan Mirror

By Gene Alleman

How's business in Michigan? Industrial employment is off 6 per cent as a state average, according to the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission and the state employment ser-

This figure was for July 1. The national average was 6.5 per cent. There are mid-July signs that the situation is improving somewhat.

At a capitol conference on Michigan economic trends, Gov. G. Mennen Williams reported that Muskegon was the top critical industrial center with unemployment running 23 per cent. Provi-Muskegon, a war boom town, was second.

Mining operations are lagging in the Upper Peninsula with a result that the northern peninsula has a jobless rating of 18.5 per cent. All copper mines of Calumet & Hecla are closed. Jackson has reported 15 per cent of its regularly employed workers to be idle; Port Huron, 13 per cent; Benton Harbor, 11 per cent, and Grand Rapids, 10

per cent. It is interesting to note that the state's total of employed citizens, despite the current deflation in industry, is pretty much the same today as it was one year ago. GI college students and high school graduates have entered the summer employment field, making up the difference.

How's the tourist business? Reflecting the general business downturn, tourist patronage is reported to be less than one year ago. The Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, sparked by enterprising George E. Bishop, reports that a spot check shows business at "some resorts" to be off as much as 20 to 30 per cent. There's always an exception, of course. Blaney Park's aggressive promotion by Ed Drier has boomed patronage for a 48 per cent increase during the first half of 1949. Reservations are 30 days ahead of last year.

Merchants cannot complain unduly, either. Retail trade (corrected for prices) on a national scale has dipped only a trifling 1 per cent below its 1948 peak. Sales are down only 4 per cent other-

The sag in consumer income was off only 2 per cent in April. More people are buying Opportunity (government) E bonds.

Maurice Eveland, banking commissioner, reports that the 357 state banks are bulging with savings. Deposits are three times as large as they were six years ago. "Banks are 71 per cent liquid," said




