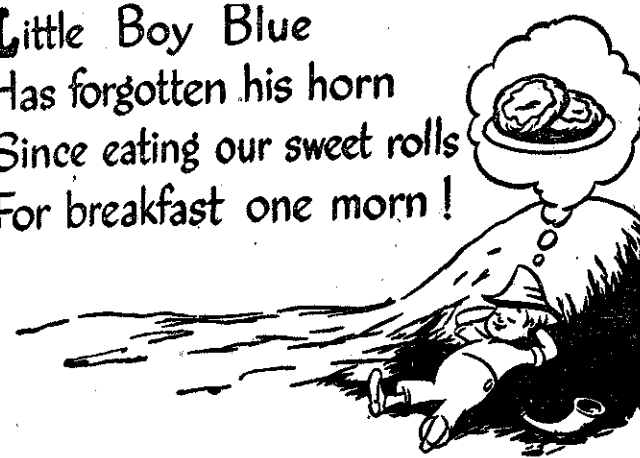

Cancer Strikes Dogs Cancer is as much a plague of dogdom as it is of man, but not as much is heard about it because many affected animals are never brought to the attention of veterinarians. Cancer-stricken dogs sometimes show only mild symptoms of illness and may die without arousing suspicion of that disease. CROP Milk Reaches Children Overseas Thousands of refugee children, such as this one being fed by Sister Klara, Lutheran nurse in the Lobe Haus Children's home in Munich, have been supplied with milk through the contributions of American farmers to the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP), according to John D. Metzler, national chairman. In the year ending June 1, CROP handled 75,668,581 pounds of farm commodities, valued at \$6,576,000. Included in this amount were 4,470,000 pounds of milk. Shipments were made to 22 foreign countries. "Since milk is desperately needed, we shall strive to obtain a larger quantity of it in the 1949 CROP campaign," Metzler said. "In many areas children over nine months still get no milk at all. Younger ones get one-fourth pint a day." CROP is sponsored nationally by Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service, and Lutheran World Relief.

Concluded from page 1. event, and a bill is now before Congress to assure federal participation. * * * Every Michigan child is told in school how the Soo canal carries more freight traffic in a year than all the other canals in the world. The great Panama canal is a piker by comparison, although equally vital to our security. The military strategic importance of the Soo locks was doubly recognized by the United States government during World War II when a huge ore-loading railroad terminal was rushed to near completion at Escanaba. This project swallowed up many millions of war bond money. It reflected the jittery fears of Washington strategists as to what might happen if the Soo canal locks were bombed out of usefulness by raiding Germans. Today, as midwest tourists again freely inspect the canal locks, they do so in the shadow of war-time security fences. Fort Brady will probably be reactivated before 1955 when the Centennial is held. This northerly Michigan city remains a key economic artery of our nation in peace as in war.

Rev. M. G. McIntosh Died in Kansas

The following account of the death of Rev. Mark G. McIntosh of Iola, Kansas, was taken from a newspaper of that state. Mr. McIntosh was a brother of Mrs. Harmon Enderbe of Detroit, formerly of this community. The Rev. Mark G. McIntosh, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Church of Iola, Kansas, died unexpectedly Monday night, July 4, of a heart attack in the home of his daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. James F. Aiken, Jr., in Lawrence, Kansas, where he and Mrs. McIntosh were spending the Fourth of July holiday. He was born in Ontario Dec. 12, 1892, and is the son of the late Thomas and Matilda McIntosh of Grant Township, Huron County, Mich. He became interested in the ministry at an early age. He served in the Detroit conference and was transferred to the Kansas conference in 1921. Before coming to Iola, he was pastor of the Methodist Church at LaHarpe. Mr. McIntosh was president of the Iola Ministerial Alliance. He was found cooperative, alert and helpful, an energetic leader of his parish people, a faithful husband and father in family life, and a devoted follower of Jesus Christ. He is survived by his wife and seven children, Mrs. James Aiken, Jr., Mrs. Rees Clair, Bushton; Mrs. Seward Wilson, Tonganoxie; Grant McIntosh, Meade; Mrs. Tom Korachak, Rochester, N. Y.; and Miss Martha and Larry at home. He is also survived by four brothers, and two sisters.

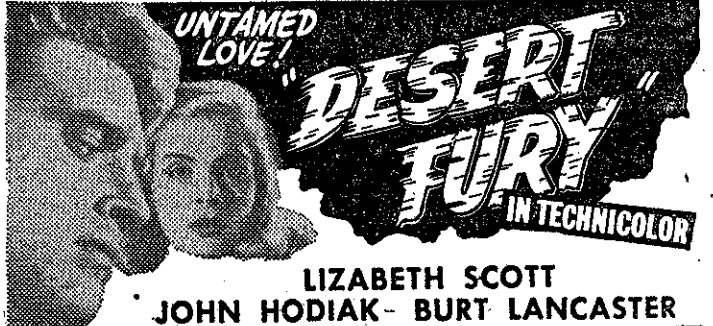

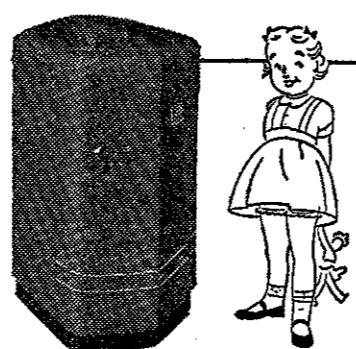

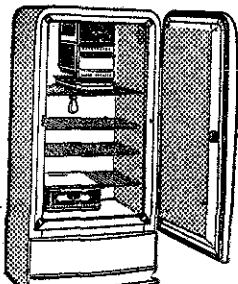
