The Figures: If we thus earmarked the proceeds of 1 per cent of the 4 per cent corporation profits tax, we would get, from that source, about \$23,000,000 a year for highways.

If we need more money than that to finance a highway program (which is open to serious question) we could easily get it by earmarking 1½ per cent of the corporation tax rate.

That would yield a fund of about \$34,000,000 for highways, about a half million more than the expected returns from a 2-cent gas tax increase. With \$4,000,000 in added truck taxes, this would give us a total of \$39,500,000 for our highway program.

Michigan lawmakers are grimacing over the bitter pill tossed them by a specialist for the "little Hoover commission." Hardest to swallow was the assertion that the Democratic governor and his lieutenants have been tied down by 'connivance" of a politically hostile legislature whose ideas and methods he describes as "amateurish, blind, discredited and time-wasting." The critic was Arthur Eugene Buck of New York, a reformer more interested in ideas

than in results. * *

Constitutional earmarking of state funds and other restricted accounts have tied the hands of the legislature, Buck pointed out. Legislators now have control over only 36 per cent of general fund monies. In this "hodgepodge" is the sales tax diversion amendment whereby interest in the Michigan mining 78 per cent of sales tax revenues must be diverted to schools, cities, villages and townships. (Note: Counties do not receive sales tax revenues, as reported in error here last week.)

4,000 Kear Old Skull Found in California BERKELEY, Cal. - Scientists

believe man existed in coastal California "more than 4,000 years ago.'

Antropologist: base their conclusion on the geologic age of a gravel bed where a skull was found 27 years ago. The skull was embedded in gravel, 20 feet under

the surface. Geologists ruled out any possibility that the skull had washed down from higher levels. They said the specimen not only was full of gravel, but cemented securely in the same mixture.

The skull was believed to be that of a male aboriginal Indian about 38 years old. It'is now on display in Stanford's geological museum.

Other remains of early man have been discovered, but circumstances surrounding the discoveries made positive age identification doubtful. Until this latest report, there was little evidence that man has existed more than five centuries in California.



per cent of adults suffer low back pain. Dr. Paul Williams of Dallas said that most of it was due to "erroneous ideas about what constitutes correct posture."

He said that the military strut habit tended to accentuate a "hollow in the back." Certain joints and shock absorbing cushions in the lower back can be adversely affected unless we do everything possible to keep that "hollow" at a minimum,

He advises sitting slightly slumped so your spine will describe a moderate curve instead of being somewhat S shaped. Sit in a low chair, so your knees are higher than your hips.

As for walking, walk somewhat as you would if you were climbing a hill. Never "lead with your belly." And for sleeping, curl yourself up either on the side or on the back with the knees propped up. Never sleep on your tummy unless you place a pillow under it.

Himalayan Tribes Drown Or Stone Lepers to Death

NEW DELHI-According to reports from India some Himalayan tribes have a quick way of disposing of serious leprosy casesby drowning or stoning to death the patients.


In the Dun district, no sympathy is felt for lepers, who are believed to suffer for their sins of former births. The people also believe that if the leper sacrifices himself by drowning in the sacred Junna river the rest of the family become immune.

When the leper suffers from unbearable pain, he obtains permission to drown himself in the river. A secred day is selected. Friends and relatives of the patient gather on the banks of the river. They offer him sweets, so his future births at least may be sweet and freed from the disease. If he fails to drown himself, he is stoned to death. India has 1,000,000 lepers, a fifth of the total leper population of the world.
