New Ration Light Operational B practically has eliminated canned chopped meat items, such as corned beef hash, stew meat and vegetable. These components have been replaced by canned solid meats to allow more

variety in preparation and more per ration. This ration provides 4,200 calories

per man per day, in contrast to the minimum standard of 3,600 prescribed for an active soldier by the army surgeon general. Its 96 items allow for almost 15 days of variety in choice of foods by the soldier. Here is a typical day's menu



Stock of Feed Grain Lower This Year

Many Michigan farmers may find themselves short of feed grains before the next harvest rolls around, warns R. C. Hoglund, agricultural economist at Michigan State College.

Stocks of corn, oats and barley on Michigan farms and in elevators on January 1, 1951, were 15 percent smaller than a year ago. With increased livestock produc-

tion expected during 1951, this will mean a 16 to 20 percent reduction in feed grains available per animal unit.

The smaller feed-grain supply

in Michigan is due largely to a 22 million bushel reduction in the 1950 corn crop. This shortage can be relieved by increased feed imports from other states and by more efficient use of present feed stocks, Hoglund advises.

in farm animals, especially swine, according to a seasonal bulletin from veterinary medical leaders. Pigs get lackadaisical within three weeks after they start to eat the treated seed grain. They walk iimber-legged and bump into objects. then begin to die. Deaths continue to occur for many weeks after the poisonous grain is removed from the ration. In one case on record, an entire drove of 125 died from such poinsoning.

One out of 32 persons in the United States was disabled one or more days by injuries received in home accidents during 1949. Home injuires totaled 4,645,000 and these included 120,000 permanent impairments. The home death toll was 31,-000, of which about half resulted from falls.









Caustic Soda Caustic soda is one of the most important and widely used of industrial chemicals, and one of the most essential to our national economy. With all of its importance, however, comparatively few people are aware of what caustic soda is, and the extent of its uses and how it enters our lives as one of the ufacture of rayon and cellophane. Next largest requirements are in the soap and chemical industries. Vegetable oil and petroleum oil refining industries are consistent consumers in large volume. A growing use for caustic soda is in oil production, where it is used for conditioning drilling "mud" used in drilling operations.




