PORK HAS ALWAYS been a favorite meat on American tables, Among the meats available, it's also an economical one, whether for a special family



Bl. as well as other nutrients. In buying pork, thrifty homemakers will find that steaks cut from the shoulder offer a real bargain. These have a good proportion of fat and lean, and very little bone, and they are tender and delicious. They are cooked like pork chops, that is in moist heat, slowly and until well done.

Blade pork steaks are cut from the Boston butt, the upper part of the shoulder. Each steak contains a portion of the blade bone.

THERE IS A seemingly endless variety of delicious ways of preparing pork steaks, all following the one basic method. But variety can be given by the use of different flavors in the liquid, and of different vegetables or fruits used with the me: '. Here are suggestions, to add



For the farmer who wishes to start raising broilers in a modest way and develop the business gradpandable," sectionally-built poultry house that is ideal. Stem Rust Control Important Part of Grain Production

"Control Stem Rust by Barberry Eradication" is a new Michigan State College extension publication to aid farmers in the fight against stem rust in grain crops.

Stem rust is caused by a fungus plant that lives alternately on the barberry bush, and the small grains and many wild grasses. The rust-spreading barberry was brought to Michigan by ploneers about 1805 and used for hedge and ornamental planting. Local de-structive epidemics of stem rust in the wheat, oat, barley and rye crops followed the introduction. Take the following steps to help

control stem rust: barberry bushes.

2. Grow only varieties of grain that are resistant to stem rust and that are recommended by Michigan State College.

8. Plant spring crops early and row early-maturing varieties.
A copy of the new folder, F-158, Control Stem Rust by Barberry eradication," may be obtained from county agricultural agents or by writing to the Bulletin Office, Department of Information Services, Michigan State College, East ansing, Michigan.

Good Pasture Aids In Worm Control

Good pasture will help farmers to control worms in chickens, J. M. Moore, extension poultryman at Michigan State College, advised this week.

Worm control is the most important reason why a new pasture should be provided each year for the growing flock, he says. So far as the egg business is concerned, the most difficult job the poultryman faces is to develop healthy, well-grown replacement pullets for the laying house.

Some of the better pasture grasses are a brome-alfalfa mixture or ladino-if the soil and temperature are suited to ladino. In the alfalfa-brome mixture, the brome provides early pasture while alfalfa is unsurpassed in providing a succulent green feed during the hot, dry part of the summer.

Any poultry pasture should be clipped or pastured by other farm animals occasionally so that new, tender grass is always provided for the chickens, Moore advises. Fibrous, dry, well-matured grasses

Chickens are not g cood rangers the poultryman says. They will go little distance from the summer shelter unless the feeders are allowed to become empty part of the day. Unless the house is moved, they do not get full advantage of the pasture provided. Frequent as well as feeders and waterers will bring the pasture to the grow-
