Pfc. Robert O'Dell Pens Letter in Korean Fox Hole

Pfc. Robert O'Dell tells some of his impressions of the Korean war in a letter written to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Kelley on May 4. Excerpts of his letter follow: "I am sitting in my fur-lined fox hole so thought I would drop you a line. It is raining here today and sort of miserable. We came off the front about five days ago for a rest and besides there were 'chinks' running all over the place and it was not a very healthy place to be. I think the big new offensive of the Chinese will be their last try to get us out of Korea. This country is awfully mountainous and it is hard to fight a war and climb mountains too. If this were level country the war would have been over long ago. This new bomb we use is really something. A couple of them will burn everything off a mountain." O'Dell is a cook in his outfit at the present time. His wife is with her people in Detroit. His address is included in the "Military Addresses."

Buel Starr Goes "Up The Ladder"

"Local Boy Makes Good" is a statement that is true when it is applied to Buel Starr, former Argyle resident, according to Dr. Harry C. Striffler of Pontiac.

In a letter to the Chronicle Dr. Striffler included a story of the achievements attained by Starr since he moved to Pontiac with his parents in 1913 at the age of 13. While attending school in Pontiac he worked summers in the Oakland Motor Car Company assembly plant. His first full-time job was as a draftsman, layoutman and checker in Detroit but he returned to the Pontiac plant in 1927.

Watch Milk Handling Methods In Summer

With warm weather approaching, it is necessary for dairy producers to check their milking equipment and cooling facilities to make sure that a good job is being done. D. L. Murray, Michigan State College extension dairyman, reports.

A check now will avoid quality problems in marketing milk during the months ahead, he believes.

Check the milking machine and replace rubber that has become checked or of such condition that it is difficult to keep clean. Another suggestion is to adopt the weekly routine of boiling the rubber inflations and milk hose in a lye solution for at least 15 minutes.

Pails and cans should be checked for milk deposits. If they

are present, Murray suggests that some milk stone remover should be used so that a clean, bright surface will be present for easy cleaning.

Cooling facilities should be operated so that milk will be cooled to below 60 degrees Fahrenheit within an hour after milking to reduce bacteria growth.

X-rays Get 'Converted'

X-rays just won't respond to any attempts to speed them up or focus them electrically. So, in creating the x-ray "telescope"—a device that gives a fluorescent image many times brighter than previously possible—scientists first converted the x-rays to electrons, and then speeded up the electrons.

New Folder Helps Choose Best Lease

The new leaflet also covers renting of fields, special problems

which frequently arise in preparation of lease agreements, and essentials for success on a rented farm.

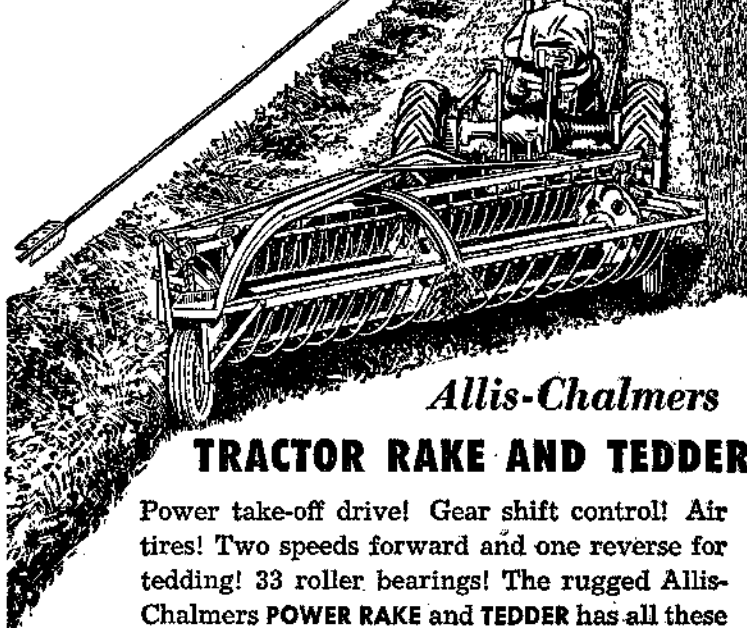

This, our hymn of grateful praise.

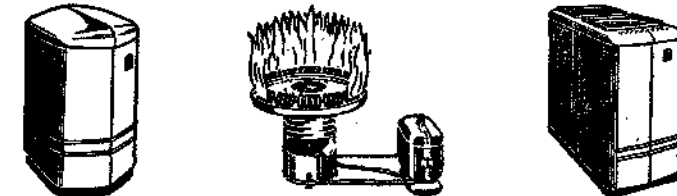

Four-H hybrid corn project sponsors have cooperated fully again this year. Agents and seed producers providing hybrid seed are Fritz Mantey & Sons, Fairgrove—Ohio and Michigan hybrids; Ward and Ellis Aldrich, Fairgrove—Ohio, Aldrich, Michi-

gan; John Hadaway, Fairgrove—DeKalb; Clare Turner, Cass City—Funk "G"; Lee Fowler, Mayville—Wolverine; Caro Farmers Coop. Elevator—Kingscrot; W. R. Kirk, Caro—Pioneer. Other seed corn agents are cooperating in the county but the above listed persons are the original project sponsors.

The week of May 15 to 20 is an ideal time to plow down alfalfa and clover sod for this year's bean

crop. At this time the legume plants have attained sufficient growth to be of maximum value in improving soil structure and fertility, yet have not caused a serious drain on the soil moisture supply. A rotation in which beans follow alfalfa or clover is most desirable to insure a good bean crop. Plowing legume sod later than May 20 often results in a moisture shortage which often causes a serious delay in the germination and growth of the bean crop. Some fertilizer is usually good for beans, but it should be placed in a band below and to the side of the seed or broadcast deeply before planting. Beans are injured by direct contact with commercial fertilizer.

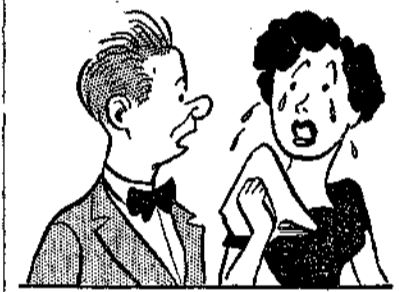

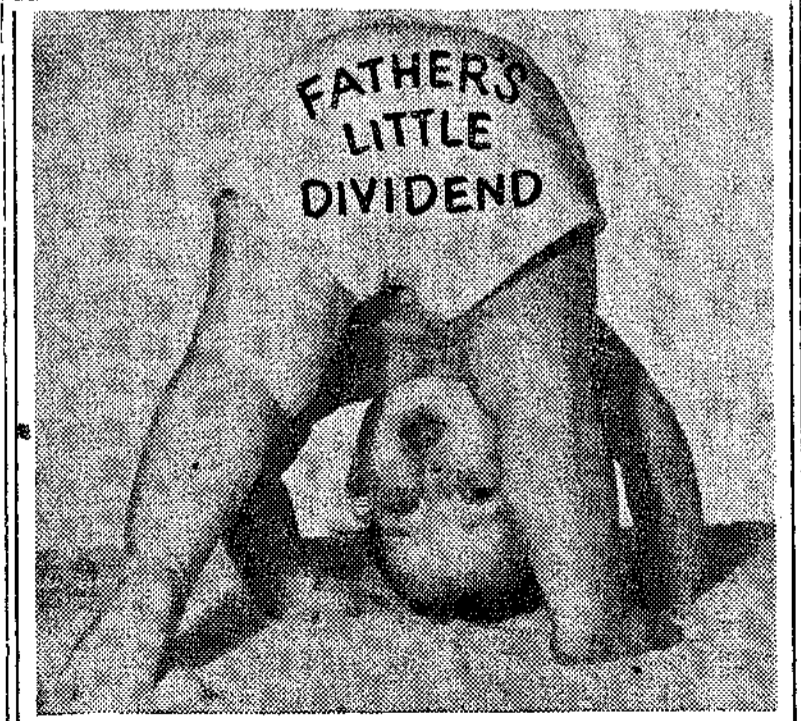

Like the old railroad collision joke, lobbyists who have seen legislatures function at the state capitol for many years concluded: "There ought to be a better way to run the legislature than this."

It is a logical possibility that if the gas tax veto promised by Williams is upheld by the legislature the deadlock will result in a special session. Recent figures released from the governor's office indicate that a 1.197 cent gas-tax plus truck taxes already approved would bring in the \$30,000,000 needed by the highway department.

In fact, one leading Republican office-holder, a popular vote-getter last November, believes that the Republican party must do something about the legislature's inefficiency if it is to merit continued support in Michigan. He proposes that the party caucus agree on legislative rules which might insure the 1952 session from degenerating into the same plight, a last minute rush to get action after months of delay and inaction.

Williams is still holding out for a corporations tax, even if he must cut his original four percent request. G. O. P. see such a levy as just another consumer tax.

Interesting enough is the trend of the "Little Hoover" fact-finding reports, as submitted by so-called experts, to recommend centralization of authority in the hands of the governor. Michigan's split between the governor and other administrative offices and the legislature has contributed to a stalemate with consequent confusion and strife.

Governor Williams has instructed the state racing commissioner to investigate a reported link between certain stockholders of the Wolverine raceway (Detroit) and Frank Costello, gambler of Kefauver committee fame—or notoriety.

The House of Representatives approved a bill to increase their salaries for the second time in two years. In 1948 legislators drew \$1,095. In 1949 this was raised, under authority of a new amendment to the constitution, to \$2,900 plus \$400 annual expenses. The House recently voted to boost this to \$4,500 a year—\$3,600 salary plus \$900 in expenses. A Republican caucus in the Senate cooled off the legislators' fever somewhat. No increase in salary but \$900 in expenses was recommended.

Detroit has been caught with its ballots down—and is screaming. Awakening to find the senate had passed a bill eliminating straight ballots, Wayne County Clerk Edgar M. Branigin looked down his nose and said, "It has all the appearances of a Republican finagle."

Senator Blair Moody, Williams' appointee at Washington, has indirectly prompted a movement among Republicans to nominate Arthur Vandenberg, Jr., for the office next year. Moody pleads for continuance of the Vandenberg tradition of unpartisan foreign relations, a policy probably better known to Vandenberg, Jr., than any other person at the state capitol. He was secretary to his illustrious father for many years; in fact, in appearance and speech is "a spitting image" of his dad. The appointment of Moody is being interpreted in G. O. P. circles as a move by Williams to get the Democratic nomination as vice president. The governor went speech making to Nebraska last week.

The highway department now is in the midst of painting markings of 7,000 miles of state arteries. First lower peninsula trunklines to be painted will be US12, US113, US16, M60, US27, US81 and US131, in that order.

The "Little Hoover" commission recommends that the job of superintendent of public instruction be taken out of politics, and Dr. Lee M. Thurston, now holding the position agrees. The commission urges creation of a board of laymen with power to appoint a professional commissioner of education.

Action on the St. Lawrence Seaways project has reached a new stage in that a meeting is planned soon for Omaha, Neb., to which 15 governors will be invited. Topics will include all improvements beneficial to the middlewest. But it is obvious that Governor Williams is setting the stage to

Elmer Butler Buys Brown Swiss Bull

Elmer Butler, Cass City, has recently purchased the registered Brown Swiss bull S. V. Acres Josephine Favor L. 105089 from Darius R. Tinsey, Grindstone City, according to a report from Fred S. Idise, Secretary of the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders' Association, Beloit, Wisconsin.

Not Too Early

It isn't too early to check hay harvesting tools to make sure they are ready for the campaign just ahead. Nutrition authorities remind us that early cut alfalfa and clover hay (about one-tenth bloom) provide the highest value forage, since at this stage they contain a high percentage of protein, thus reducing the supplement required to balance the livestock ration.

ABA Slates Airplane Service for County

The Michigan Artificial Breeders Cooperative of East Lansing plans to initiate an air delivery service to local inseminators in central eastern Michigan, which will include Tuscola County, according to word from assistant county agricultural agent, Eyrone E. Carpenter.

A. C. Baltzer, secretary-treasurer of the state artificial breeding organization, has requested locations of all inseminators so they can be spotted from the air, and semen from the East Lansing bull stud will be dropped by parachute to the five Tuscola County inseminator-managers three times a week. It is expected that the air service will begin in this area within three or four weeks. This service should permit the tri-weekly delivery of fresh semen at least twelve hours earlier than the parcel post system which has been used.

Air delivery is not entirely new to the Michigan Artificial Breeders Cooperative. This form of service has been used in southern Michigan for about a year, with two airborne circuits out of the East Lansing central, each making delivery to about 40 local inseminator-managers.

Among the local Tuscola ABA reports this month was the announcement by inseminator Franklin Stoll that the Huron-Tuscola association is now being supplied with semen from Guernsey bulls. Thus dairy farmers in the Unionville-Sebewaing area can now obtain breeding service from the high-index sires of Guernsey, Jersey and Holstein breeds.

Local ABA officers reported a total of nearly 400 first services in April in the five associations operating in Tuscola County. The Cass City organization was tops, reporting 96 first services, followed by Kingston with 84. First services provided by the Vassar ABA numbered 81. There were 62 firsts recorded by the Huron-Tuscola group and Bernard Jakubik, inseminator for the Millington association reported 58 firsts in April.

Eleven new members were enrolled by county ABA secretaries last month. Vassar and Huron-Tuscola ABA's each reported three new members, Cass City and Kingston two each, and one name was added to the roster of the Millington association.

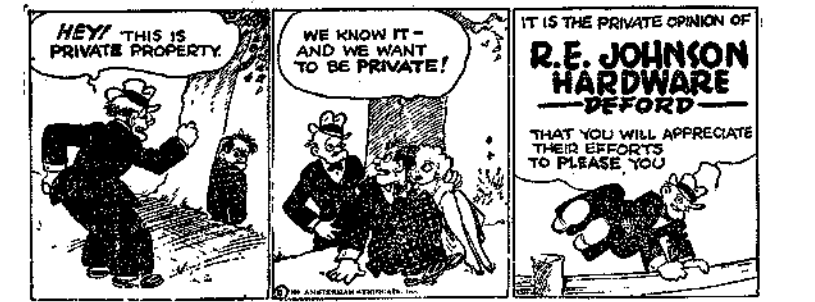

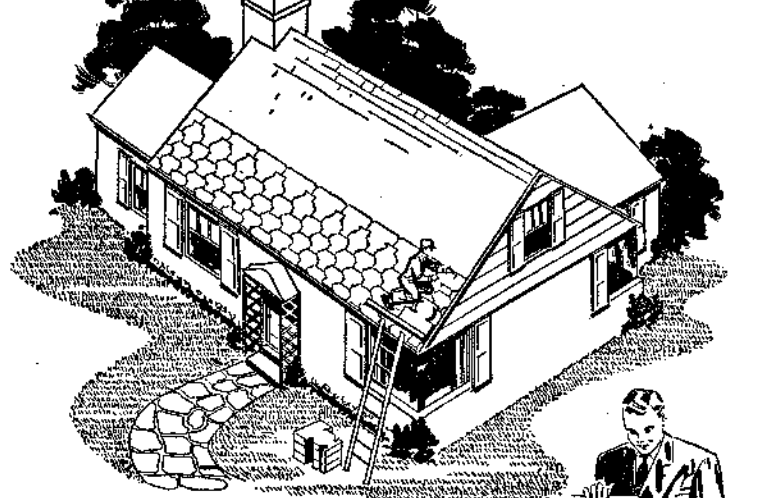

Unfamiliarity with the regulation, Hart said, simply cannot be accepted as an excuse for failure to comply. "If there is a disposition on the part of retailers to regard the price stabilization program with indifference and to assume that it can be ignored with impunity, I think they will soon learn that this is a mistake," Hart said.

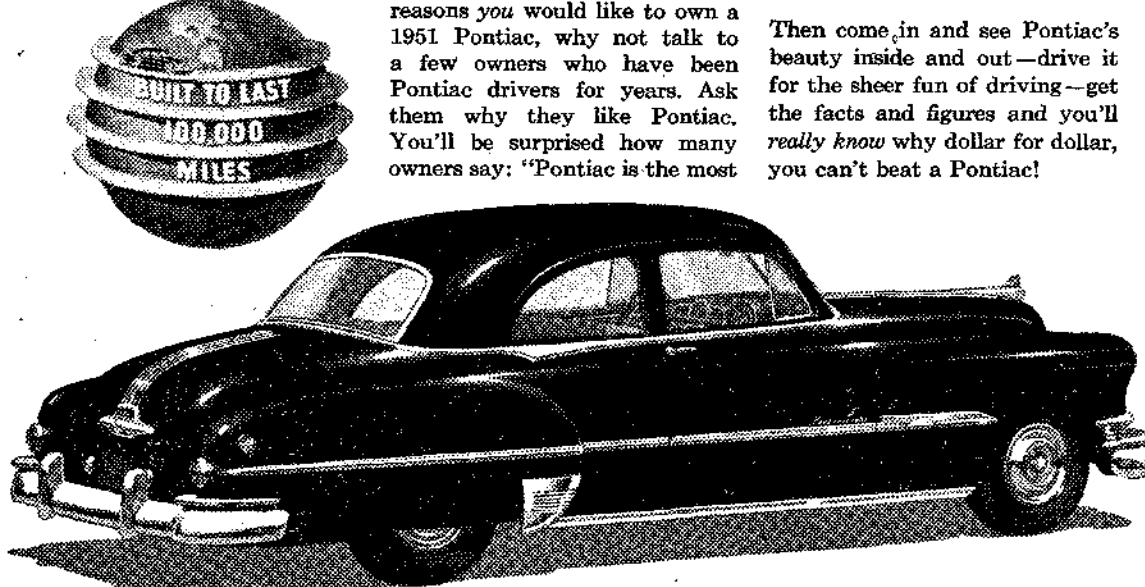
