





Cattle owners should be on the alert for a dangerous new cattle disease which first appeared in this country seven years ago and appears to be spreading, veterinary authorities said today.

"The disease, leptospirosis, was first diagnosed in Connecticut in 1944, and has now invaded the majority of our best cattle producing

jority of our best cattle producing states," reports the American Foundation for Animal Health.

"Control efforts have been handicapped because symptoms of the disease vary so widely. Sometimes cows may be stricken without the owner knowing it. Sudden illness, loss of appetite, fever, depression

Recovered animals may act as disease carriers for a considerable length of time, the report says. Also, owners may confuse the disease with mastitis or anaplasmosis. The only sure way of determining if leptospirosis is present in a herd is through blood tests and isolation of the disease-causing
